 Yes. The cash value may also be borrowed... using the policy as collateral and continuing the policy in force. The latter would seem to be the better course of action. You could probably not replace the policy at an older age for the premium you are paying now. Screw worms in Collingsworth

Lab identification of Collingsworth County's first 1976 screwworm case today helped swell the year's Texas count to 6,398 says a U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) veterinarian.
 Dr. M.E. (Cotton) Meadows, Jr., director of the Screwworm Eradication Program, says these cases came from 135 counties. The program is operated for USDA by the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS).
 The Collingsworth County case was treated by Mark Fires, DVM, of Wellington. He collected the sample five miles west of Wellington from the navel of a calf owned by Travis McGuire of that community.
 Screwworms are larvae (maggots) of the screwworm fly. Adult females of this species deposit eggs on wounds in warm blooded animals. As eggs hatch the tiny worms enter the wound to feed on live flesh, growing to about half an inch long within a week.
 The APHIS program uses the sterile male principle in fighting this pest. Female screwworm flies mate only once in their lifetimes.
 Wild screwworm populations are located by lab study of samples collected by livestock owners. Sterile flies, produced in the APHIS insectary, are released to mate with the wild flies. Eggs produced as a result of a sterile to fertile mating will not hatch -- ending the life cycle.
 Meadows asks livestock owners to carefully watch animals for signs of screwworm infested wounds. Free, self addressed, postage paid sample kits are available from County Agents, veterinarians, or livestock inspectors.
 Of the more than six million veterans who have trained under the current GI Bill, 15 percent lived in California at the time of application.

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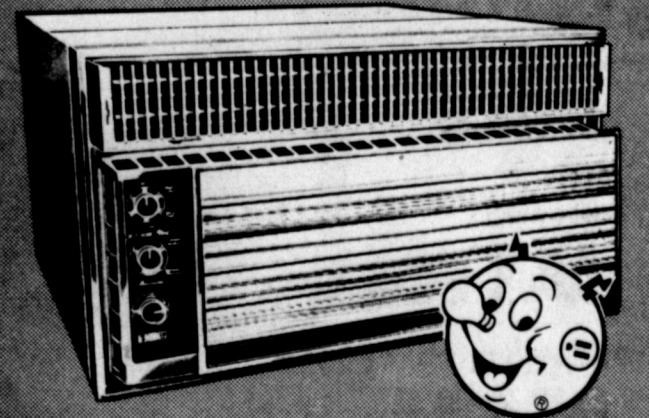

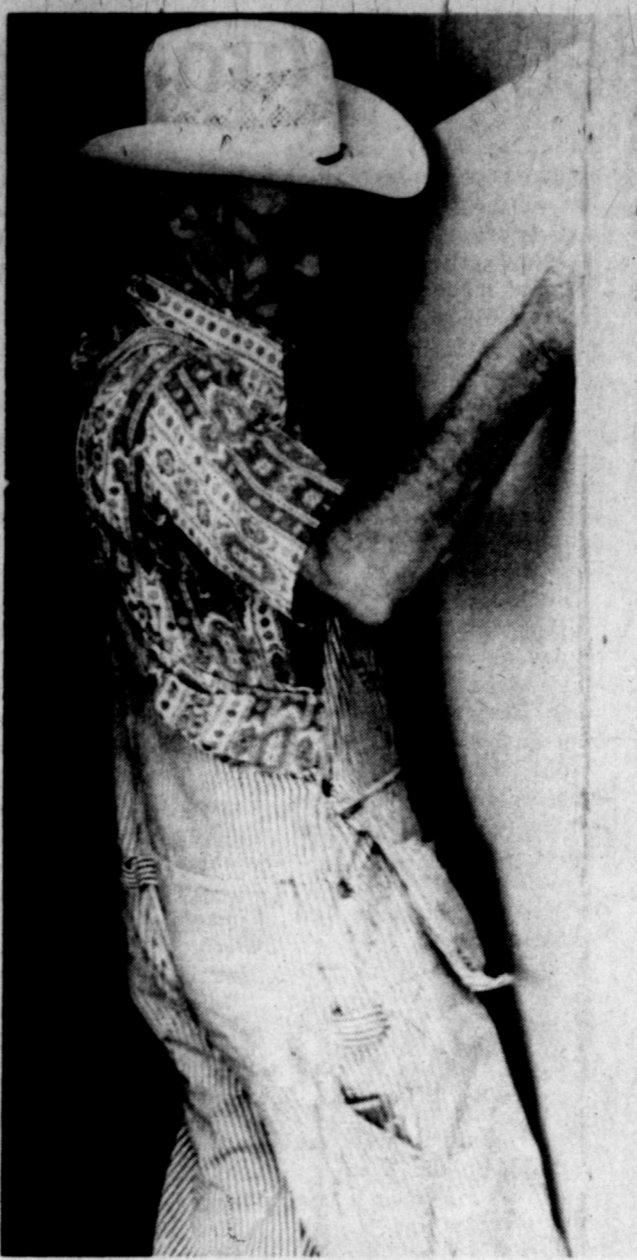

How high will gas bills go, and when will they level off?

Making pickles at home, some helpful hints given

Have you ever wondered how you could make pickles at home? One way is to put such vegetables as cucumbers, cabbage or green tomatoes in a brine made of a mixture of salt and water and let them set about three weeks. They go through a fermentation and are called brined pickles.

Another way is to brine such vegetables as cross cut cucumber slices, sweet gherkins or green beans a few hours or overnight; drain them and pack them with boiling hot vinegar, spices and other seasonings. These are quick to prepare and are known as fresh-pack pickles.

Relishes are prepared from fruits or vegetables and are chopped, seasoned, and then cooked to a desired consistency. Relishes include piccalilli, pepper-onion, tomato-apple chutney, horseradish and corn relish.

Whether you make brined, fresh pack, fruit pickles or relishes, your family will enjoy eating pickles made using any of the old time favorites you may choose to make. If you want more information about preparing pickles, contact your County Extension Office for brochures.

Each homemaker that does make pickles probably at one time or another has problems with her pickles. Problems with pickle making can be perturbing. Some common problems are shriveled, hollow, soft, slippery and dark pickles.

Shriveled pickles may

result from using too strong a vinegar, sugar or salt solution at the start of the pickling process. In making very sweet or very sour pickles, it is best to start with a dilute solution and increase gradually to the desired strength. Overcooking or overprocessing may also cause shrinkage.

Hollow pickles may result from one of several causes. Poorly developed pickles may become hollow. Holding cucumbers too long before pickling is another cause. Hollowness may also result from too rapid fermentation or too weak a brine during fermentation.

Soft or slippery pickles usually result from microbial action which causes spoilage. Once a pickle becomes soft it cannot be made firm. Microbial activity may be caused by too little salt or acid; cucumbers not covered with brine during fermentation; scum scattered throughout the brine during fermentation; insufficient heat treatment; a seal that is not airtight; or moldy garlic or spices. Blossoms, if not entirely removed from the cucumbers before fermentation, may contain fungi or yeast responsible for enzymatic softening of pickles.

Dark pickles may be caused by ground spice; too much spice; iodized salt; overcooking; or minerals in water, especially iron utensils.

For best results with pickles use only quality cucumbers or other vegetables or fruits and follow tested recipes.
