### Four new teachers in Clarendon system

Four new school teachers were hired by the Clarendon Public School System for the upcoming 1976-77 school year.

The newly hired instructors bring the total number of teachers in the system to 39 plus three teacher's aids, two principals, two secretarial aids and the school superintendent.

New this year will be Dean Overcast, new Broncho head basketball coach; Greg Slover, asst. high school football coach; Bobbie

Thornberry, high school English teacher; and Retha Barton, elementary remedial reading teacher.

Overcast and his wife Donna moved to Clarendon from Holdenville, Okla. where he taught and coached last year. They have a two year old son, Monte Dean.

Overcast received his BA degree from Fort Lewis College in Durango, Colo. and his high school diploma at Ava, Missouri.

His first coaching experience was as basketball

coach of an Army basketball team in Warrington, Virginia. He served in the U.S. Army for four years, two of those in Vietnam.

While at Fort Lewis college, he coached the junior varsity basketball team. His public school experience includes teaching and coaching at Ava Junior High School, Ava, Missouri; and Moss High School, Holdenville, Okla. He taught physical education at both schools.

Overcast brings an overall

win-loss basketball record of 69 wins and 32 defeats to Clarendon.

Greg Slover, new Broncho asst. football coach, is a July graduate of West Texas University in Canyon. He received his BA degree in physical education. Slover is a 1972 high school graduate of Springlake-Earth.

At Clarendon, he will teach junior high English and coach junior varsity boys basketball and football.

He and his wife Darla recently moved here from Amarillo. She is also a graduate of Springlake-Earth.

New high school English teacher Bobbie Thornberry has been teaching in the Silverton school system for the past two years.

She is a 1974 graduate of Texas Tech in Lubbock with a degree in secondary education. She will teach high school Spanish and English plus junior high English at Clarendon.

She and her husband, Sandy, also a Tech graduate, live south of Brice on their farm.

Retha Barton, new elementary remedial reading instructor, moved to Clarendon last spring with her husband Wayne and their three children. He owns Wayne's Barber Shop in Clarendon. Before moving here, Barton served for 21 years with the U.S. Army.

Mrs. Barton has gathered seven years teaching experience since receiving her elementary education degree. She graduated in 1960 from Mary Hardin Baylor at Belton in Central Texas.

Her first teaching experience was with the Amarillo School System's San Jacinto Elementary. She taught 2nd grade. While accompanying her husband on U.S. Army tours in Germany, she taught Kindergarten in Hildeburgh. On subsequent tours, she taught Kindergarten at Karlsruhe; 3rd through 5th at Graven; and 2nd grade at Heilbronn, Germany.

In U.S. public schools, she has taught 3rd grade at Grafrod, Tx.; and 2nd grade at Mineral Wells.

The Barton's have two sons: Nolan, 13; Kirby, 12; and a daughter, Janeen, 9.

High School students will register at different times Friday in the school cafeteria. Seniors will register from 9 to 10:30 a.m.; Juniors, 10:30 to 12 o'clock noon; Sophomores, 1 to 2:30 p.m.; and Freshman, 2:30 to 4 p.m.

All Kindergarten students and those entering the school system must bring their birth certificate and shot form indicating they have had all required immunization shots. These shot forms may be picked up from the Junior High Principal or from area doctors.

All students transferring into the system are asked to come by their principal's office before Aug. 23 to provide information needed to complete the transfer.

### Bus routes outlined for county students

Seven bus routes were approved for the Clarendon School District at the Donley County School Board's August meeting.

In the county, 374 miles will be driven twice daily by nine bus drivers in both the Clarendon and Hedley school systems. Clarendon will employ seven and Hedley two bus drivers to cover the daily 748 miles.

Clarendon School Superintendent Jeff Walker asked parents of new bus students to contact his office before school begins August 23 to verify where bus drivers are to pick up their children. Parents may also bring their children the first day of

Clarendon schools also have one privately contracted bus route which services the JA Ranch area. It is driven by Leora Sparks.

Hedley schools began Monday, August 16, with drivers Connie DeBord and Sam Sanders currently running those routes.

### July traffic accidents result in five injured

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated eight accidents on rural highways in Donley County during the month of July, 1976 according to Sergeant J.R. Smith, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and five persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first seven months of 1976 shows a total of 29 accidents resulting in four persons killed and 11 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for July, 1976, shows a total of 592 accidents resulting in 22 persons killed and 388 injured, as compared to July, 1975, with 568 accidents resulting in 22 persons killed and 398 persons injured.

## Artist paints American West

Justin Wells of Amarillo, likes to do one thing — draw horses. More specifically, he sketches and paints the people, animals and landscapes associated with the horse culture of the American West.

Although this is a fascinating field for an artist to explore, Wells is even more interested in the Western Culture as it exists in America today. "Cattle people are still a unique class of human being," says the artist. "They are distinctly recognizable apart from any other group of men who make their living outdoors."

It seems that the idea of making one's living horseback has always been attractive in a romantic way. Although the reality of such a life has as much sweat and cruelty as any other occupation, it's rewards offer a man some very special satisfactions.

It is this type of man and the culture that surrounds him that Wells is trying to capture on paper and canvas. He ought to know what he is talking about because he comes from this culture and is still very much in the middle of it. "All my pictures are of things I have seen and done or would like to have seen and done."

Always an admirer of good horses Wells raises and trains registered Quarter Horses. Next to painting a picture of a good colt he would rather train one, and indeed one helps the other. Knowing how a horse operates by personal experience rather than by observation above enables the artist's imagination to communicate the reality of a scene much more effectively.

This is the basis of Wells' philosophy of art — one should paint what he knows and has experienced — and Justin Wells certainly knows and has experienced what he paints — The American West.

Justin Wells was born in Elk City, Oklahoma in 1941. He lived in Texas and California before returning to Oklahoma City in 1960. He is a graduate of Putnam City High School and has attended Central State University in Edmond, Okla.

Wells has exhibited his art in museums and galleries in Oklahoma, Texas, California, Colorado, Wyoming, New Mexico and Arizona.

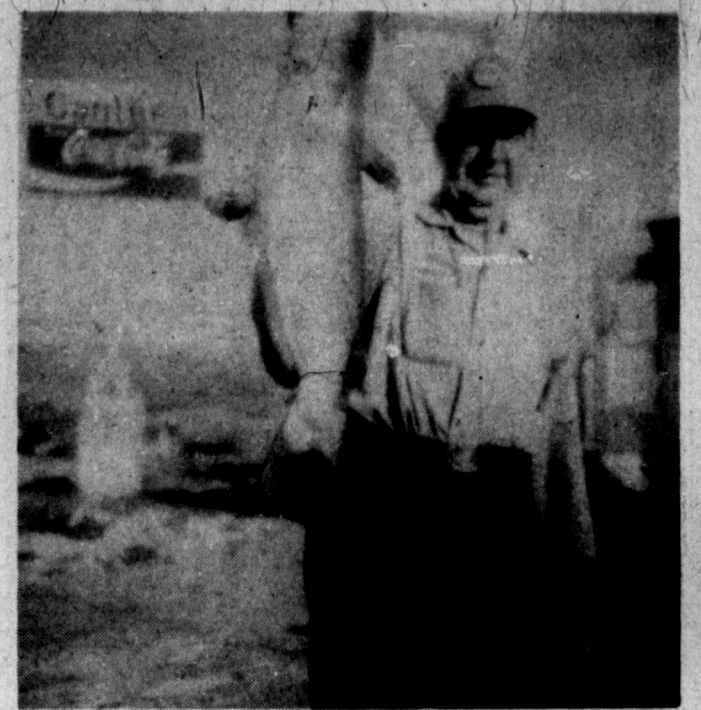
