# Separating Sheriff/Tax office vote due

Separation of the Donley County Sheriff/Tax Assessor office will be decided at the Nov. 2 General Election by county voters.

The election was called by the Donley County Commissioners Court at their September meeting Monday the 13th.

The issue of separating the office into two positions had been discussed in the county for several years. The decision Monday was prompted by several petitions circulated in the county during the past months which were signed by persons favoring separating the office.

The election to decide the issue will be in conjunction with the Presidential election Nov. 2. A separate balloting box will be used for the tax assessor vote.

Monday's meeting of the Commissioners Court was a lengthy one with several items on the agenda. All commissioners were present including Buford Holland, incoming commissioner of Pct. 3 who will take office Jan. 1. Those attending were Judge Billy I. Christal; Gene White, Pct. 1; Olace Hicks, Pct. 2; Junior Hill, Pct. 3; and Jess Finley, Pct. 4.

In other county business, the commissioners approved a tax discount system for residents paying their taxes within the next three months. Taxes paid during October will have three per cent of their total deducted. Those paying in November will receive a 2 per cent

discount and in December a one per cent cut.

The commissioners discussed at length policy concerning amounts of county property or machinery each commissioner may sell without the consent of the entire court. No final decision was reached and Commissioner Gene White suggested the court write to Texas law officials for an opinion. The court voted to inquire about such a ruling and final decision on the matter was tabled.

Much discussion at the meeting centered on the upcoming 1977 County Budget. County Judge Christal has been working on the budget during the past weeks. He outlined it to the court and solicited any questions the commissioners might have. Public hearing for the budget was set by the commissioners as Oct. 11 beginning at 1 p.m. in the Courthouse Annex. All interested citizens of Donley County may attend the hearing.

Recent problems with unaccountable long distance telephone calls from the courthouse phone prompted one court vote. The commissioners voted to require all county offices to maintain a record of each long distance call made and the approximate length of the phone call. County Clerk P. C. Messer said the county's recent telephone bill had several calls listed on it which could not be accounted for as county business.

Disposal of a 1972 Mercury owned by the county and used earlier as a police car was also discussed. The county earlier advertised for bids on the car, but received only one bid. The bid was not considered because price offered was judged too low. The court decided Monday to have all police radio equipment removed from the auto along with the radio antennas. Police decals on both doors are also to be removed. After the necessary repairs are made to the car, it is to be offered for sale again by the county. Commissioner Jess Finley was placed in charge of

repairs to the car. In other county business, the commissioners--hired Kitty Asher as new secretary for the Clarendon Justice of the Peace to replace Dixie Ward who recently resigned from that position. Approved a \$75 expense budget for County Agent Cynthia Manning to attend a County Agent's Convention at College Station. Granted permission for the Courthouse Annex to be used as location for the upcoming swine flu vaccinations. In final county business, the commissioners voted to participate in a bicentennial

project sponsored by the American Legion Post in Porter, Texas. For that project, Commander of the post will ride on horseback from Porter to Valley Forge, Pa. He will carry with him a teaspoon of dirt contributed from each county in Texas. The Texas soil will be spread over an acre of land at Valley Forge donated to the state in commemoration of each of Texas' Congressional Medal of Honor winners. Soil to be sent for the project was scooped from the Donley County Liberty tree growing in front of the Courthouse Annex.

The Bloodmobile from the Red River Regional Red Cross Blood program will arrive in Clarendon Wednesday morning. Blood donations will begin at 1:45 p.m. and continue to 5:30 p.m. in the CC Harned Sisters Fine Arts Center.

Hamilton said four vein-puncture nurses from Wichita Falls will accompany the Bloodmobile Wednesday. Locally, about 40 professional and non-professional volunteers are needed to aid with the blood drive.

In last springs blood drive, 113 units of blood were donated by Donley County citizens. Hamilton said the drive Wednesday will employ more beds than last spring so less time will be required to donate.

## Bronchos beat Bucks in thriller Friday

Clarendon's 20-15 victory over the White Deer Bucks Friday, Sept. 10, was an offensive thriller highlighted by crucial plays and decided by who could take advantage of the breaks.

Penalty calls played the major role in breaks offered both teams. Clarendon made theirs worth a winning touchdown while White Deer faltered on the verge of passing the Bronchos.

For Clarendon, the big break came in the fourth quarter when they trailed White Deer 15 to 12. The play was fourth down and eight yards to go when Clarendon was incomplete on a halfback pass from Barry Schafer to Larry Brackett. The refs called roughing the passer on White Deer, however, and the Bronchos were first and ten on the Buck's 15 yard line. A few plays later, John Hall scored for the Bronchos. Quarterback Howard Weatherthorn's pass to End Bubba Newhouse for the extra point pulled Clarendon ahead 20 to 15 with 8:43 left in the game.

Clarendon won the game, but they trailed about as much as they lead. White Deer scored first after the Bronchos failed to take advantage of an early break.

White Deer received the kick-off, and fumbled on the first play of the game. Clarendon's Ricky Gerner recovered on White Deer's 40 yard line. The Bronco's moved well, taking the ball within the five yard line until finally stopped by tough defensive play.

Clarendon regained the ball on a punt, but soon offered White Deer their first break of the game. Quarterback Howard Weatherthorn fumbled on White Deer's 45. The mistake set the Buck's up for their first scoring drive of the evening. They moved down to eventually cross the Clarendon goal line with 3:32 left in the first quarter. White Deer faked the extra-point kick and ran the ball over for the two points to lead 8-0.

The stage was now set for what Broncho Coach Jerry

Wilson called the big play of the ball game. On the kick-off, Howard Weatherthorn fielded the ball on his own 35 yard line and knifed his way through Buck tacklers to finally break away for the long touchdown. With Clarendon fans on their feet and yelling their support, Weatherthorn attempted to run the extra-point in but was stopped short. Clarendon still trailed 8-6.

"That run turned the game for us," Wilson said. "White Deer seemed to have the momentum, but with that score I think our kids realized we could play ball with them and win."

White Deer's next possession lasted almost to the second quarter but failed to turn up any points. Clarendon's offense regained the ball just before the quarter ended and began their second scoring drive.

Broncho Backs Weatherthorn, John Hall and Barry Schafer all contributed first down efforts in the drive, eventually moving from their own 35 to the Buck's 11. On third down, Weatherthorn rolled around his left end to score, only to have the play called back because of a penalty. Barry Schafer next passed to End Irven Thomas and the Broncho's were first and goal to go on the one yard line. John Hall eventually bulled it over for the score. The extra point run again failed, but the Bronco's were ahead 12-8.

That was still the score as the half ended with a failed Clarendon field goal. The Broncho's had regained the ball and pushed it to the White Deer 15 yard line, but time and downs ran out for the Broncho's. On fourth and 12 to go with only seconds left on the clock, Dennis Swinney's field goal attempt was no-good.

After the second-half kick-off, Clarendon fumbled in their first ball possession. White Deer recovered the ball on their own 40 yard line, and put together their

most impressive offensive effort of the night.

From the 40, they worked their way steadily down the field, capturing large chunks of Clarendon turf. The Buck's eventually pushed the ball to the Clarendon one yard line. White Deer back Don Webb went over for the score and the lead. A Buck extra-point kick put them ahead 15-12 with 5:17 left in the third quarter.

The seven points weren't the only misfortune suffered by Clarendon on the touchdown play. During the play, Clarendon had an extra man mistakenly on field, a 15 yard penalty. During the point-after attempt, the Broncho's were called off-side, and according to high school rules, penalties during scoring plays can be combined. The added five yard off-side infraction gave Clarendon a 20 yard penalty counted off against them before the kick-off. With the ball moved 20 yards closer to Clarendon's goal line, the Buck kick-off man bounced the ball off the goal post crossbar. Clarendon took over on the 20, trailing by three points.

This drive lasted into the fourth quarter and culminated with the final Broncho score aided by the roughing the passer penalty call.

Coach Wilson expressed pride in his team's second game effort. "I think we improved in all areas," he said, "particularly in our blocking." Wilson singled out his team's improved downfield block efforts. Broncho's Corky Patterson and Dewey Ford were individually praised.

All starting Clarendon backs were also complimented by Wilson, along with the passing game. The Broncho's were six complete for eight attempts Friday. Howard Weatherthorn had a perfect five for five record with ends Irven Thomas catching three for three and Bubba Newhouse two for

three.

Defensive "Headhunter" honors went to Keith Topper. The saving touchdown was the final score in the game, but the Buck's had their chance, thanks again to a break offered by a referee's call.

With a little over three minutes left in the game, Clarendon was stopped for three downs by the Buck defense. Forced to punt, Broncho Irven Thomas had just kicked the ball away when three White Deer Buck's rushed in too late and knocked him down. A referee by the play reached for his flag but didn't throw it and White Deer had the ball on their 48 yard line.

Head Coach Jerry Wilson said he thought it was definitely roughing the kicker. "It sure looks like it in the film," he said.

This was the Buck's final possession of the night. They moved into Clarendon's territory on the 32, but failed to connect with successive passes and gave up the ball with 1:28 left in the game.

## CC enrollment down

Enrollment was down for the 1976 fall semester at Clarendon College compared to 1975 fall enrollment figures.

Total enrollment at CC was 501 this fall, combining on campus tallies of academic and vocational classes plus off-campus figures of students enrolled in Pampa and Childress extension courses. Majority of enrollment decreases came in on campus academic students. This fall, 241 enrolled at the college compared to the 338 1975 figure. This accounted for 97 less students. Overall the college was down 95 students from last year.

Vocational course enrollment remained stable with 69 students enrolled in either Auto Mechanics, Cosmetology, Radio-T. V., Ranch Operations or Vocational

Nursing classes. Sixty-seven students enrolled in vocational courses last fall at CC.

The enrollment figures were boosted by a large student increase in extension work offered in Pampa by the college. In Pampa, 175 students were enrolled as compared to the 91 enrolled for the 1975 fall term. Of the 1976 figures, 143 enrolled for academic and 32 for cosmetology course work.

In all, extension class enrollment for CC courses was up three students, 191 to 188, from last year. This was despite classes not being offered in four towns included last year. Classes were eliminated in Valley, Memphis, McLean and Wellington this fall. Sixteen students are currently enrolled in a Childress class.

Basically, the team runs a triple-option offense. The Rattler playbook includes numerous trap plays with sweep and bootleg type runs.

"They run alot of wide plays, from the tackle on out. That's where we're going to have to stop them."

Added to their wide-open offense is what Wilson described as a "premier punter," capable of turning advantage to liability with deep punts.

So Friday's game, like the White Deer contest, may come down to evenly matched teams fighting for first breaks. "If you're tough you make the breaks," Wilson said. "That's what we're shooting for."



# Chamber directors plan local tourist brochure

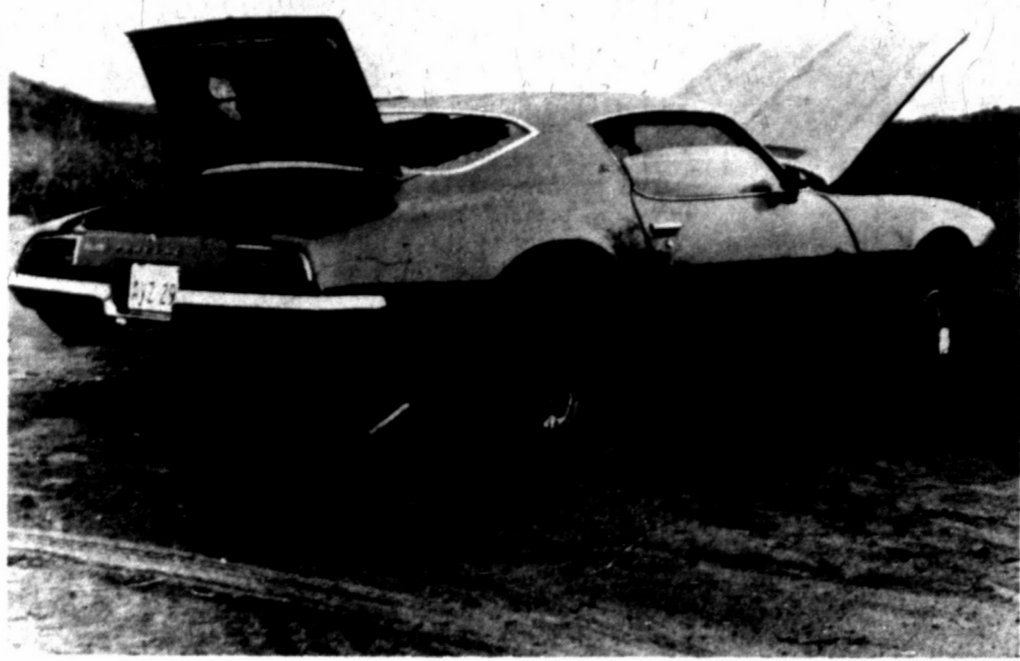
Plans for a tourist brochure featuring the Clarendon-Lake Greenbelt area are now in the final stages under direction of the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce.

# Auto stolen, valdalized here last week

A 1970 Pontiac Firebird was stolen and vandalized Tuesday night, Sept. 7 by what Donley County law enforcement officials suspect were local thieves.

Tuesday's incident was the second time the Firebird had been stolen from Chamberlain Motor Company in Clarendon. The auto was first taken Aug. 27. It was found abandoned in a maize field Aug. 28. An ignition key to the auto was found and local authorities believe the initial thieves may have also stolen the car Tuesday. The car was found Wednesday, Sept. 8, at the Clarendon landfill.

The theft culminated with the auto being wrecked by vandalism this time. The thieves apparently drove the auto to the landfill where it was wrecked.

The car was high centered over a mound of dirt and the gas accelerator wedged to the floorboard by a speaker ripped from the car's rear package tray.

From evidence at the scene, the car was left in gear and the tires allowed to spin until the engine of the car overheated and stopped running. A rear tire of the auto had all of the rubber thrown from the rim. The rear body of the car was also dented, apparently by rubber strips from the tire beating against it.

All glass in the auto had been broke and the engine's valve covers and carburetor had apparently been hit repeatedly with a tire tool taken from the car's trunk.

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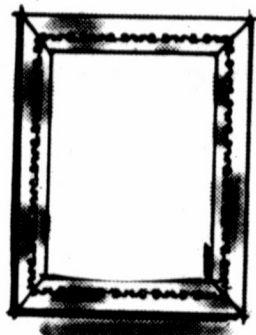
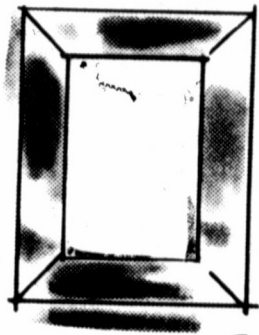

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS**  
GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 2, 1976

**NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)**  
Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.  
The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.  
The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest rate limit on such bonds.  
The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:  
"The constitutional amendment authorizing an increase of \$400 million in the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the legislature; amending and consolidating provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution; and repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution."  
**NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 99)**  
H.J.R. 99 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the aggregate principle amount of Texas water development bonds which may be issued and outstanding by the Texas Water Development Board to provide grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature.  
The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:  
"A constitutional amendment to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued for water quality enhancement purposes."

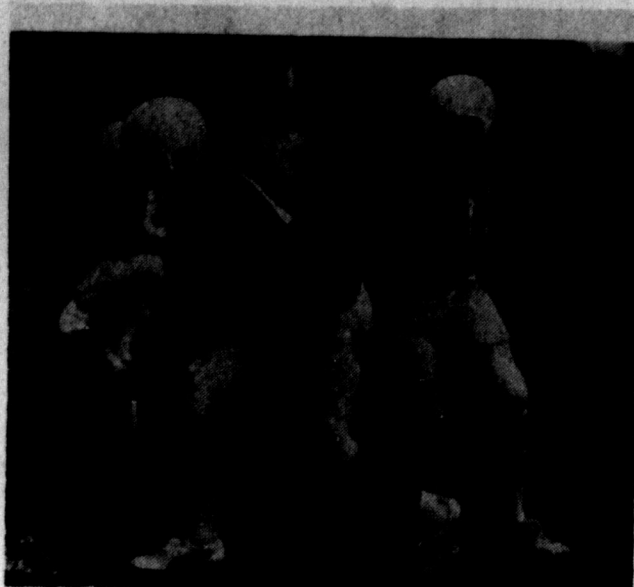

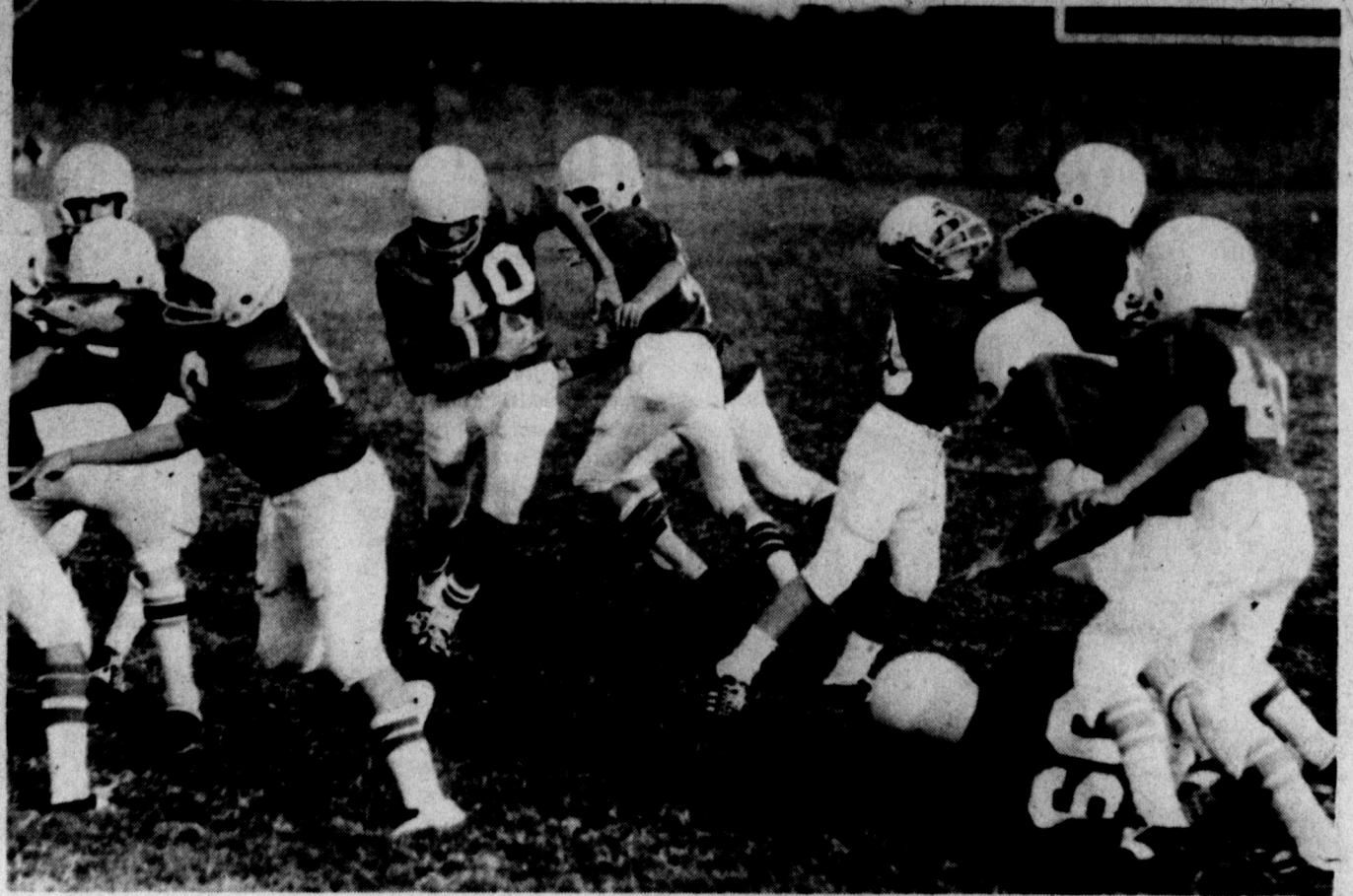
