

# Seperating Sheriff/Tax office vote due

Separation of the Donley County Sheriff/Tax Assessor office will be decided at the Nov. 2 General Election by county voters.

the Donley County Commissioners Court at their decision was reached and September meeting Monday the 13th.

The issue of separating the office into two positions had been discussed in the county for several years. The decision Monday was prompted by several petitions circulated in the county during the past months. which were signed by persons favoring separating the office.

The election to decide the issue will be in conjunction with the Presidential election Nov. 2. A separate balloting might have. Public hearing box will be used for the tax assessor vote.

Monday's meeting of the Commissioners Court was a lengthy one with several items on the agenda. All commissioners were present including Buford Holland, Jan. 1. Those attending were Judge Billy I. Christal; Gene and Jess Finley, Pct. 4.

# **Bronchos beat Bucks in thriller Friday**

**By DONNY L. BROWN** Clarendon's 20-15 victory over the White Deer Bucks Friday, Sept. 10, was an offensive thriller highlighted by crucial plays and decided by who could take advantage of the breaks.





### PUBLIC NOTICE SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS **GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 2, 1976**

### NUMBER ONE **ON THE BALLOT** (S.J.R. 49)

**Repealing Sections 49-d** and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The' amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest rate limit on such bonds.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

amendment authorizing an increase of \$400 million in the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the legislature; amending and consolidating provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution; and repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution.'




H.J.R. 99 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the aggregate principle amount of Texas water development bonds which may be issued and outstanding by the Texas Water Development Board to provide grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as estab-lished by the Legislature.
