Family needs aid after fire

A fire that refused to be put out destroyed the possessions of a Donley County family of five last week.

A trailer house, the home of Mr. and Mrs. W.R. Beck and their three children, caught fire on four occasions since Sept. 10. It was located on the Nelson-Sikes Ranch near Alanreed.

W.R. Beck was employed by the Nelson-Sikes Pipeline Construction Co. of Pampa. The trailer belonged to the company.

Citizens of the Alanreed community are sponsoring a miscellaneous shower for the Beck family Tuesday, Sept. 28, at the cafeteria of the Alanreed School.

All of the Beck's household goods as well as most of their clothing was destroyed by the fires. First fire in the trailer house broke out Sept. 10. The insulation of a hot water

heater had begun to smolder when a neighbor discovered it and turned off a gas feed to the heater.

On Sept. 15, Beck noticed smoke coming from inside the trailer. Inside, he discovered the curtains above a television set on fire.

Another fire broke out early Friday morning Sept. 17, destroying the trailer's interior. The Beck's were away when the fire started. The Mail Carrier for the Alanreed Route discovered the blaze about 8:30 P.M. Saturday. The McLean Fire Dept. was called in to extinguish the blaze which destroyed the trailer's interior.

In addition to the miscellaneous shower, a relief fund has been established for the Beck's at Farmer's State Bank in Clarendon. Persons wishing to make a donation to aid the family may do so

by making their contribution to the W.R. Beck Fire Contribution account.

The family is also in immediate need of clothing, according to a neighbor Mr. Jess Finley. Mrs. Finley asked all those willing to donate clothing to the family to call her at 799-3147 or come by her home in Alanreed. Clothing contributions to the Beck's will also be accepted at the "Clarendon Press" for distribution.

Bronchos keep perfect win record against Stinnett

Clarendon Coach Jerry Wilson had special praise for the Broncho offensive line after Friday night's 28-7 victory over the Stinnett Rattlers.

The win Sept. 17 in Broncho Stadium leaves the Clarendon team with a perfect 3-0 record. According to the Clarendon coaches grading system, three of the five interior Broncho linemen succeeded in their blocking assignments over 70 per cent

of the time. The ratings are assigned after CHS coaches study the film made of each Friday's game.

Top Clarendon offensive lineman was Ken Shelton with an 8 per cent success rating on blocking assignments. Paul Hermesmeier was next with 82 per cent followed by new Broncho center Mark Mann with 73 per cent.

"It was the best game for our linemen," Wilson said. "If we can block like we did against Stinnett all the time

and our backs start running like they did against White Deer, we'd be in good shape."

Clarendon was in good shape against the Rattlers Friday the majority of the game. The Bronchos scored first on the initial possession of the ball. Barry Schafer took the football around his right end at the Stinnett 47 yard line and rambled for the touchdown. Schafer added the extra point kick to put Clarendon ahead 7-0.

Schafer was also top

Clarendon rusher for the night, piling up 130 yards on 26 carries. Close behind him was Broncho back Howard Weatherton with 115 yards on 17 carries.

Clarendon almost scored again on their next possession, driving down to the Stinnett's 22 yard line before the ball went over downs.

The Rattlers were unable to generate offensive play as their next drive ended with a pass interception by Keith Topper. The Bronchos even totally traded off the ball again on downs, punting into Stinnett's end zone.

Broncho's almost held, but on 4th down Rattler Quarterback Craig Snider hit end Carl Lanetelme perfectly in the end zone for the score. A good kick made the game count 7-7.

Next drive for Clarendon paved the way for Stinnett's defeat, however. Along with Broncho Quarterback Howard Weathertons game stopping 69 yard run for Clarendon's second score was an injury to Stinnett's number 1 Quarterback Craig Snider. With Clarendon now leading 14-7, the new Stinnett Quarterback fumbled and Broncho Dwight Hardin recovered on the Rattler 18. The fumble recovery allowed Barry Schafer to make it into the end zone one more time before the half ended with a Broncho lead 21-7.

Third quarter play consist-

ed of both teams trading the ball back and forth. It ended with Clarendon in possession at mid-field.

The Bronchos moved from there to the Rattler 12 yard line. A fourth down pass play by Weatherton was intercepted by Stinnett's Danny Brawley, however, and the Rattlers took over deep in their own territory.

This ball position soon proved disastrous for them.

Stinnett's second stringer Quarterback lost the football on a broken statue of liberty type play and Clarendon's Dwight Hardin recovered his second fumble of the night in the Rattler end zone. Hardin's score made it 28-7 for the Bronchos.

The game ended with Stinnett attempting an offensive comeback. They moved to the Clarendon 20 yard line thanks to a long

pass completion with a Clarendon 15 yard penalty tacked on. Another pass completion made it first down from the 10. It all went for naught, however, as two sacks by Clarendon defensive men set Stinnett too far back with too little time.

Broncho big hit award went to John Hall for a leveling block he made on a Stinnett linebacker in the game's first half.

Guided tours Thursday at SCS plant

Plans are complete for the field trip to be held at the Soil Conservation Service plant materials center at Knox City Thursday, September 23, a local conservation leader said today.

James Gellespie, Jack Moreman, and Jim Donaho are among those who plan to attend from the Clarendon area.

Donaho, SCS district conservationist at Clarendon said guided tours are planned through the 92-acre center starting at 8:30 a.m. They will run continually until about 3:00 p.m.

To get to the center, Donaho said you go north of Knox City on Highway 6 about 2 miles, then turn left

on FM 1292 for 2 1/2 miles. There are signs at both the turn-off and the center, he said.

Donaho also said Knox City has a 3,200-foot allweather runway near the plant center for those wanting to fly to the field day in private or chartered planes. Transportation from the airport to the center will be furnished by the Knox City chamber of commerce.

Grass seed dealers, seed growers, conservation district directors, research workers, wildlife enthusiasts, livestock producers, and others interested in the search for better plants are invited to attend. The center serves both Texas and Oklahoma.

Grasses which are attracting wide interest at the center include a superior switchgrass for use in Texas and Oklahoma; a desert strain of sideoats grama; a southern strain of sand lovegrass; a western wheatgrass selected for bottomlands and waterway plantings in west central Texas; and a blue grama selection adapted to the redded soils of western Oklahoma and Texas.

Forbs (broad-leaved, herbaceous plants), native legumes, and woody plants relished by wildlife and livestock are also being evaluated at Knox City. Such plants may have great value, especially for deer, turkey, quail, dove, songbirds, and other wildlife when used in mixtures with range and pasture plantings.

Forbs which appear most promising include selections of englemannidaisy, maximilian sunflower, bush-sunflower, and showy menodora. Legumes under evaluation include trailing wildbean, least snoutbean, prairieclover, and western indigo. Woody plants being grown at the center include littleleaf leadtree, Texas kidneywood, and wild plum.

Seed or rootstock are collected from promising plants, then are grown and evaluated at Knox City, Donaho explained. Those

that show the most promise for solving certain problems are then grown under field conditions on farms and ranches of soil and water conservation district cooperators. Selections that prove they can solve a specific problem while being superior to other strains available are then released by conservation districts to commercial seed growers. These producers then grow seed and sell it to the public.

Grass strains proven and put into use by SCS include Selection 75 kleingrass; El Reno, Uvalde, and Vaughn sideoats grama; King Ranch bluestem; green sprangle-top, and Grenville switchgrass.

Donaho said SCS plant materials work developed ways to harvest and plant most of the range grasses being planted in Texas and Oklahoma today.

Some of the groups who cooperate with SCS in its plant materials work in Texas include Agricultural Research Service, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas A & M University, Texas Tech. University, Prairie View A & M University, Abilene Christian University, U. S. Air Force, U. S. Corps of Engineers, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, and soil and water conservation districts.



Members of the First Lady's Volunteer program are looking for more volunteers to assist with mass immunization efforts against the A/New Jersey strain of influenza, according to Robbie Hill, volunteer coordinator for Donley County.

The virulent strain of influenza is expected to appear in epidemic proportions this fall and winter unless enough Texans are immunized against it.

The Texas Department of Health Resources and The First Lady's Volunteer program are combining their forces in an attempt to eliminate the threat of this epidemic.

Clinics will be established in every community in the state to meet this challenge. These clinic shots will be free.

The First Ladies are assisting with the recruitment and organization of the state-wide volunteer program to complete immunization campaign.

The immunization program will be carried out in two stages.

A bivalent vaccine, for the elderly and those with chronic illness, will be available in late August. It will contain protection against both the A/New Jersey and A/Victoria strains of influenza.

A monovalent vaccine, for A/New Jersey only, will be available early in September for the remaining population. This vaccine will be given in special clinics and regular

Health Department clinics throughout Texas.

State health authorities urge all Texans to get their flu immunizations as early as

possible to avoid the risk of flu this winter.


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Bureau honors son of locals

Bell is part of old-Clarendon folklore

A tale of Old Clarendon came to light recently thanks to ex-Clarendon resident Mrs. L.G. Bobbitt, currently living in Dalhart.

Mrs. Bobbitt sent the "Clarendon Press" a news clipping from the "Dalhart Daily Texan" XII Edition printed this year. The story concerned a 96 year old church bell which once hung in a Clarendon Methodist Church at the turn of this past century. Clarendon citizens lost the bell, according to the article, after their attempts to regain it with force failed. The story went thus.

In 1880, the McShane Company of Baltimore cast the 500 pound bell. It was placed on exhibition in May of 1880 and won a prize for its outstanding tone.

The story goes that Rev. L.H. Carhart of Sherman first tried to buy the bell for the then new Panhandle colony called Clarendon. Initial attempts to buy the bell failed, but an agreement was finally reached to donate the bell to a Methodist Church in Clarendon at that time. The church agreed to pay freight expenses from Baltimore.

The bell was shipped from Baltimore to Dodge City, Kansas by rail. From Dodge to Clarendon the bell was transported by ox cart.

The bell remained in Clarendon until 1902. By that time, the Methodist Church had lost most of its financial support. Dalhart citizens agreed to buy the church building for indebtedness against it, total price \$28.

Apparently, Clarendon citizens never realized the bell would be part of the agreement until it was loaded on a train along with the rest of the disassembled church building.

According to the article, a group of Clarendon citizens set out to regain the bell, only to be met by "a large group of six guns peering out of the boxcars." The citizen's group relented and the bell was moved to Dalhart.

The bell is still used today in Dalhart. It was originally placed in the reconstructed Clarendon church, the First Methodist Episcopal Church in North Dalhart. This church later became the Pine Street Methodist Church. In 1962, the Lakeview Methodist Church was built and the bell was hung in a special campanile at the church's front. It is still rung today to call members to service at the church.


All Clarendon teams undefeated this year




