



Decided at Commissioner's meeting

Sheriff/Tax separation vote postponed

Donley County voters' chance to decide if the office of Sheriff and Tax Assessor will be separated into two positions was postponed at the County Commissioner's meeting Monday, Oct. 11.

County voters were originally scheduled to decide the matter in an election to be in conjunction with the Presidential Race Nov. 2. According to a ruling by Texas Secretary of State Mark White, holding these two elections the same day might leave the vote vulnerable to legal questions.

White based his decision on Article 2.01b of the Texas Election Laws. The election has only been postponed, however, not dropped. According to White's decision, such an election may be held in conjunction with other elections after the first of the year. Earliest possible date would be the third Saturday

in January.

The court did not reset a date for the upcoming election. Next regularly scheduled county election after Nov. 2 will be the school and hospital elections the first Saturday in April.

If the tax office/sheriff question was decided at the April election, the county would save cost of having an extra election this year.

Other possible times for the election in 1977 are the second Saturday in August or the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November.

If Donley county voters decide to separate the two offices an acting Tax Assessor would have to be appointed until another election could be held to decide a winning candidate for that office.

In other major county business Monday: the commissioners held public hearing for the 1977 County Budget; and hired Clarendon lawyer Mike Sanders to collect unpaid 1975 county taxes.

Estimated budget expenditures for the County from Jan. 1 to Dec. 31, 1977 is \$354,725. This compares to an estimated \$338,333 expected county income, creating an approximate \$16,000 deficit. The county has approximately \$111,000 in reserve, however, not listed on the budget, according to County Judge Billy Christal.

Christal said inflation has caused county expenses to rise over the years while the tax rate remained the same, thus creating a budget deficit.

This deficit is being narrowed each year through tax increases and budget cuts, Christal said. The county used approximately \$17,000 of their money reserves to balance the 1976

Budget, about \$1,000 more than this year.

The commissioners also met with lawyer Sanders and hired him to collect the unpaid 1975 county taxes. Sanders fee for this service will be 15 per cent of all tax money he initiates payment of.

In discussion, the commissioners said most persons still owing 1975 county taxes are probably not aware of the owed money. Many persons are listed owing less than \$10. Each name on the list, however, requires the same amount of bookkeeping for county employees. If these debts were paid, the county tax office work load could be eased.

For larger amounts of 1975 taxes still owed, Sanders said he would file suit to recover the money. For smaller amounts, persons will just be notified.

Nine County cases in September

Nine County Court cases were tried during September by County Judge Billy I. Christal, five of these involving county men charged with Driving While Intoxicated.

Of the five D.W.I. charges, all men were fined from \$100 to \$150 plus county court costs of \$51 and placed on probated jail sentences. One of the five

also had his driver's license suspended for 12 months.

Other county cases involved charges of swindle by worthless check, threatening bodily harm and criminal trespass.

The worthless check charge was brought against a transient passing through Donley County Aug. 10 this year. He was charged with writing a worthless check in a

Clarendon Men's Store. Charges were later dropped in the case and the man allowed to leave the county by local law officials.

The bodily harm charge arose from an altercation between two county men. The defendant plead guilty and was fined \$1 and court costs plus 10 days in jail. The jail sentence was probated for a six-month period.

Two Criminal Trespass charges were filed against a county couple by members of their family. The couple reportedly refused to leave a house owned by the family members. These charges were later dismissed when a witness against the couple refused to testify.

Bronchos beat Quanah Indians 13-6

Clarendon's Bronchos managed to hold off repeated second half offensive threats by the Quanah Chiefs Friday, Oct. 8, to keep a single touchdown lead intact till game's end.

The Bronchos won it 13-6 in Quanah, making their season record four wins and two losses. Clarendon Quarterback Howard Weatherton scored both Broncho touchdowns with first and third quarter runs of 47 and 43 yards.

Defensive play highlighted the game, however, with Quanah's punter forced to kick seven times by the Clarendon squad. Broncho punter Irven Thomas punted four times, kicking his team free deep in their own territory twice in the second half.

The Broncho defense also stopped the Indians three times during the game with Quanah threatening within the Clarendon 20 yard line.

Clarendon led the entire game. The Indians pulled within one point with a touchdown in the second quarter, but Broncho's Barry Schaffer and Mike Newhouse blocked the extra point attempt to keep the Indians behind 7-6.

First quarter play consisted of three stymied offensive drives by the teams before Clarendon managed to get on the scoreboard. A short punt by Quanah with 5:52 left in the first quarter made it Clarendon first and ten on Quanah's 47. Broncho Quarterback Weatherton made it a short offensive drive by running the ball all the way on the first play. Barry Schaffer's kick made it 7 to 0.

Quanah was again unable to move the ball. After two Indian punts, Clarendon almost scored again, but Barry Schaffer ended a long gainer by fumbling on the Indian five.

Another Clarendon offensive bungle on their next possession set up the Indians' only score. A Howard Weatherton throw to Lynn Chilton passed from his hands to the arms of a Quanah defensive back. His interception run-back plus a 15 yard penalty against Clarendon made it the Indians' ball on the Broncho 33. Quanah scored a few plays later on a 19 yard pass play. The point after block by Schaffer and Newhouse kept the Indians' trailing, however.

First half play was winding down as Clarendon fumbled on their 31 with 1:17 left in the half. A long pass play almost put the Indians into the end zone, but linebacker Schaffer pulled down the receiver at the nine. The Broncho defense toughened up from here and held the Indians' away from the goal line until time ran out.

A large portion of third quarter play consisted of a Quanah offensive drive beginning with a Broncho fumble at mid-field but weakened repeatedly by Quanah mistakes.

Two straight penalties by the Indians forced them into a punting situation. The kicker was roughed, however ever, and Quanah had another chance at Clarendon's 37. The offensive effort moved to the 15 yard line and a fourth and four situation. An Indian back dove for the first down yardage, but an offside penalty brought it back to fourth and nine. An illegal procedure call against the Indians moved the ball further back and an incomplete pass ended the threat. Clarendon had the ball again on their own 26. From there, Barry Schaffer

rambled cross mid-field to the Indian's 43, setting up Weatherton's second long TD of the night. Schaffer's point after kick was no good, however, and Clarendon led in the third quarter's final seconds 13-6.

Clarendon never had field position in the fourth quarter with Quanah spending most of their offensive time near mid-field or in Broncho territory. Outstanding Clarendon defensive play and good pressure punting by Irven Thomas kept the Bronchos out of serious trouble, however.

In the fourth quarter, Thomas had to punt away three times deep in Broncho

Carter popularity on increase according to instructor's poll

CC Pampa enrollment increases

Enrollement in classes taught in Pampa by Clarendon College more than doubled this fall in comparison to the enrollment at pampa for the same time last year, according to Loyd Waters, Dean of students at the college.

This year there are 149 students taking classes at Pampa compared to 69 last fall. Clarendon College is currently teaching 19 academic courses at Pampa High School. This is the third year that Clarendon College has offered classes at Pampa and each year has produced a tremendous increase in local people enrolling for the college classes. Each semester Clarendon College has expanded its course offerings in Pampa to meet the educational needs and desires of Pampa residents. Additional course work is planned for the Pampa system by Clarendon so that residents of Pampa may

complete degree required courses at the freshman and sophomore levels.

The large increase in enrollment indicates that there is a definite need for college class offerings in Pampa. Many of the students at Pampa have indicated that they would be unable to attend college if the classes were not there and others would be out the expense of traveling to area colleges to continue their education.

The addition of the secretarial science program to the Pampa curriculum is responsible for a large portion of the increase. This program, offered evenings and days, has made it possible for ladies wanting to learn secretarial skills for employment opportunities and for those already employed as secretaries to enroll in additional skills classes at night to do so.

Also, the accounting classes have proven to be

very popular. Many local residents are enrolled in accounting for self-employment reasons. They own their own businesses and need the accounting skills so they can keep their own books.

Courses attracting attention as a hobby or for self-improvement interest are Creative Hobbies and Conversational Spanish.

The classes are made up of all ages and types of people. These are young students working toward a degree, middle-age and older people looking for additional skills to benefit their job advancement, young housewives learning skills for job opportunities, senior citizens enjoying receiving additional education or learning a hobby in the art classes, or in some cases, all ages doing something they always wanted to do...attend college!

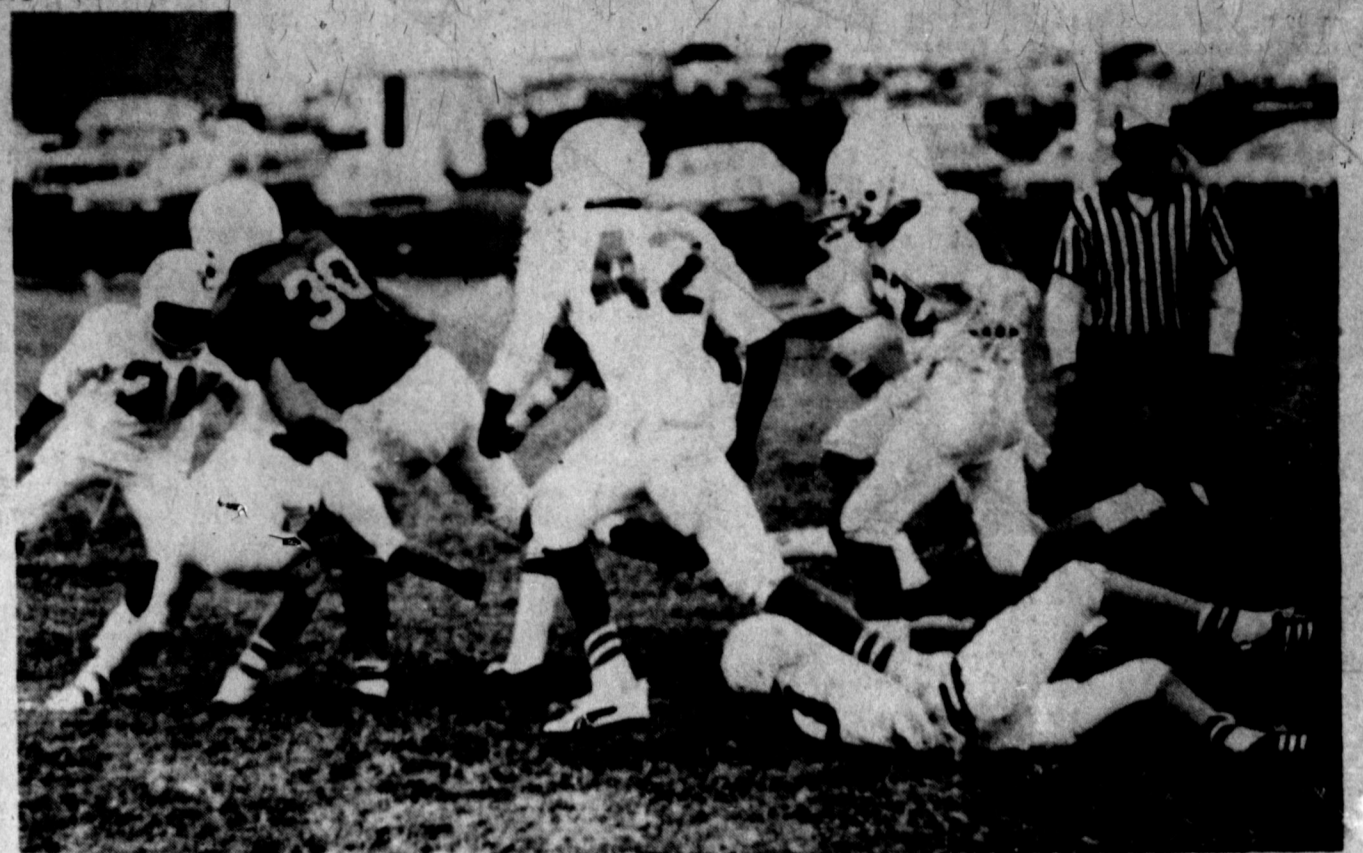
