

Democrats get county voter preference

Democrat Jimmy Carter carried the Donley County vote with a total voter preference of 895 compared to a 704 tally for Republican Gerald Ford.

Donley County voters had a moderately good turnout as 1,824 voters cast ballots out of 2,869 registered. In the county 183 voted absentee.

The county vote showed a clear preference for the

Democratic party with that political view taking the larger number of votes in each contested election.

In Tuesday's vote, 55.8 per cent of those voting in the Presidential race went for Carter. For Ford, 43.9 cast supporting ballots.

All nine ballot boxes in the county were turned in Tuesday night by 9:30 p.m. County Clerk P.C. Messer was in charge of tabulating

the votes.

The Jericho community in Donley County had a perfect voter turnout with each one of the 24 registered voters casting ballots.

Other than the Presidential race, the Representative race for local Dist. 13 gathered considerable attention from local voters during the campaign. In that race between Incumbent Democrat Jack

Hightower and Bob Price, Hightower gathered the majority of votes here with 1,144. Price drew voter support from 644 here.

In the state wide race between incumbent Senator Lloyd Bentsen and Alan Steelman, Democrat Bentsen polled almost twice as many Donley County votes as his opponent. Final tally was 1,178 for Bentsen and 507 for Steelman.

For Railroad Commission, the county went for Democrat Jon Newton by a large margin. He obtained 1,230 votes compared to his Republican opponent, Walter Wendlandt, with 380.

and Tom Lorange, 26. County residents voted closely for or against the two proposed Texas Constitutional Amendments on Tuesday's ballot. The first proposal, which dealt with water development bonds, was voted down here, 617 against to 572 for. The second proposal, which was concerned with water quality improvement bonds, won here by five votes, 590 for and 585 against.

All county Democrats on the ballot were unopposed in Tuesday's election. These winning candidates will officially take office Jan. 1, 1977.

These candidates were: John Knorpp, county attorney; Truett Behrens, sheriff/tax collector; Jerry Hawkins, county school superintendent; Gene White, commissioner Pct. 1; and Buford Holland, Pct. 3.

In final CC poll, Carter still ahead

President Gerald Ford moved slightly closer to Jimmy Carter in the college Presidential preference poll in the sample taken Oct. 25-26. But Ford still trailed 22 percentage points.

When the poll began, Carter obtained 58 per cent of the student's preference, compared to a 33 per cent level for Ford. At one point, Carter obtained a high of 67 per cent to Ford's 27 per cent. An original figure of 9

per cent were undecided on the election, compared to the 10 per cent still undecided at the last polling.

Taylor conducted a similar poll among his students during the last Presidential election. At that time, he said, the final results were within two percentage points of how the entire Panhandle vote went.

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Seventy-five Clarendon graduates since '72 attend college

Most colleges and universities are back in fall session, and many Clarendon High School graduates are either attending classes or are recently graduated.

Clarendon High School Counselor Ethelyn Grady maintains an official record of Clarendon graduates attending college. The following information is gathered from Mrs. Grady's files and the staff of Clarendon's superintendent's office and the Clarendon College Registrar.

A check on CHS graduates was done only through the class of 1972, theoretically the group graduating from

college last spring. If the record of CHS grads attending college since 1972 is incomplete, please contact the "Clarendon Press" and corrections will be printed.

Since 1972, 211 students have graduated from Clarendon High School. Of these 211, eight have graduated from four year colleges or universities with 67 still in school.

'Plaza Suite' begins run this Thursday

Neil Simon's comedy hit "Plaza Suite" comes to Clarendon Thursday, Nov. 4, for three scheduled performances at the Clarendon College Harned Sisters Fine Arts Building on campus.

The play, to be performed by CC's Drama Dept., will consist of two separate plays with the same setting: the "Plaza Suite" of a large downtown New York hotel.

Evening performances are set for 7:30 p.m. Thursday and Saturday with a special matinee Sunday at 2 p.m. There will be a reception after Sunday's performance in the classroom area at the Fine Arts Building.

Against the "Plaza Suite" setting, adult comedies are acting out with author Simon poking general fun at wedded bliss. In the first playlet, a Hollywood producer confesses to the small town girl he left behind about "three rotten divorces," while she wonders, "Have you met Frank Sinatra?"

"Yes," he replies, "I've had dinner with him two times."

"Is he as generous as they say?"

"Oh yes, he served very large portions."

The second playlet revolves around a questioning bride who locks herself in the Plaza Suite bathroom shortly

before the ceremony. A frantic Father of the Bride beseeches his daughter to come out, finally trying to get in the bathroom by walking the outside ledge and entering a window. As his panic-stricken wife listens for his falling scream, he bursts through the suite door. "I had to come back through another apartment," he says. "There may be a lawsuit."

"Plaza Suite," was the fifth consecutive Broadway hit by playwright Simon. Other plays include "The Odd Couple" and "Barefoot in the Park."

CC production are Joe Porter and Loree Gayler in the first playlet; Roy Monroe and Marianne Hill play the prospective in-laws in playlet 2; with Randy Wilson and Sandi Van Pelt as the bride and groom.

The entire production is under the direction of CC Drama Instructor Leslie Schnauer. Assisting with set design were Fine Arts Dept. Head Jim Barnard and Psychology Instructor Mike Pelfrey.

Admission price for each performance is \$1.50 for adults and \$1 for students. All Clarendon College students will be admitted free.

Team potential good Head Coach says CC Men's Basketball begins here Nov. 12

Clarendon College's Men's Basketball begins Nov. 12 and Bulldog Coach Gene Davis is calling his team "the best one I've had since I came here."

Friday, Nov. 12, they'll play a home game opener against the Trinidad, Colo. team in the Bulldog gym. Game time is 7:30 p.m.

Davis' pronouncement about this year's team being "best" is based partly on pre-season scrimmages. He said the Bulldogs "handled" the team from Seward County College; perhaps were "beat a little" by a tough Cameron College team from Laughton, Okla.; and "played even" with Western Conference rivals Amarillo College. The Amarillo team defeated Western Texas last year at the Regional V Tournament play-offs. Western Texas was champ last year of CC's own Western Conference.

This year's Bulldogs are also the tallest team Davis has had at Clarendon. Tallest man on the squad is Curtis Constein at 6'8" followed closely by Frank Hobson at 6'7½" and Robert Nard at 6'7". Ten of the 18 team members out are over 6'3" tall.

Davis said his description of "best" isn't just a comment on ability and size. "They've also got the best working attitude and general desire," he said.

Davis said he's now working out his starting five for the season's opener. Each position has a possible number one man along with good back-up candidates, he said.

At Point Guard, the main ball handling guard, Davis

said he has two "excellent possibilities," with 5'9" Larry Mackey, only returning Bulldog starter from last season; and 5'10" Dave Anderson. Davis said at present Mackey has a small edge over Anderson, but the

position "is solid" for CC. The number two guard position has no less than four possible starters with 6'3" Carl Davis, 6'2" Billy Wilbon, 6'3" Don Fee and 6'3½" Terry Collins. Davis picked Carl Davis as the

most likely starter. Unlike most of the other three, Davis has not been hampered with injuries thus far and has been able to get more workout practice.

Any of the four might also be used as a working Small Forward for the 1976-77 Bulldog team, Davis said.

Positions left to fill include two spots requiring tall, tall players for under the basket play: Center and Big Forward.

To fill the Center's position, Davis picked 6'7½" Frank Hobson; and at Big Forward, 6'7" Bobby Nard. Competing close behind either Hobson or Nard for their positions is 6'4" Steve Lowrey, Davis said. Other possible candidates are 6'8" Curtis Constein, 6'5" Jimmy Price and 6'6" Keith Sawatzky.

"And then I got six other guys who may come into the picture," Davis said. These include 6'4" Anthony Bailey, 5'11" Artis Betts, 6'2" Michael Curry, 6'1" Larry Futch, 5'9" Gary Jack, and 6'2" Gary Wischkaemper.

So with the season nearly underway, Davis thinks he has a team who can compete in the tough Western Conference. "With college teams you never know," he said. "Your whole team might be ineligible the second semester because of grades. Right now it looks good and if it all comes together we can beat any team in the league on a given night."

"I will say this, our best players are probably our freshman. If we keep them together, next year we're definitely in the title picture."

Bronchos still in 2-A running

Clarendon's Bronchos travel to Memphis Friday, Nov. 5, still in the running for the District 2-A football championship.

They'll face a tough Cyclone team that knocked off favored Wellington last Friday, Oct. 29, 12-0. In District 2-A, only Memphis remains undefeated. Shamrock has lost three district contests, with Claude, Wellington, and Clarendon losing one apiece.

In District 2-A now, the formula for success is to beat Memphis, and Clarendon is the team with the chance. If Memphis trips up the Bronchos, Claude has the final opportunity at them Nov. 12. Wellington finishes up their season this Friday, also against the Claude Mustangs.

A win for Clarendon Friday would throw the district into a three-way tie, providing Clarendon comes out winners over the three district loser Shamrock. A three-way tie means a coin flip to decide who advances to Regional play-offs.

But this line of thought is speculative and Head Broncho Coach Jerry Wilson isn't planning anything past a definite 7:30 p.m. kick-off time in Memphis Nov. 5.

"If there's a time to take Memphis," he said, "now's got to be it. They're bound to be flat after knocking off Wellington."

Flat or no, Wilson admits they're going to be tough. "As far as ability, they're not as good as Wellington," he said. But if Memphis doesn't have the raw talent of the Skyrockets, they more than make up for it with two important factors: they execute their plays to perfection and they play as a team.

"Against Wellington, Memphis played a flawless game," Wilson said. Size and weights which made Memphis underdogs by some 20 pounds against Wellington beef was also not a telling factor. In size, Memphis is comparable to the Bronchos.

Many of the Broncho team got to see first hand their opponents Friday as several of them attended the Wellington game.

Senior Bronchos will also remember last year's game versus the Cyclones. That one ended in a 14-13 Clarendon win labeled by many as the most exciting game the Bronchos played all season.

According to Wilson, "When Clarendon and Memphis meet, just throw open the door 'cause its nothing but a grudge match."

For Clarendon to repeat last year's verdict, they've got both an offensive and defensive challenge. On offense, they'll have to

generate yardage against a quick Cyclone defense, a defense that, according to Wilson, "beat Wellington almost single handedly." In that game two pass interceptions by the Memphis secondary set up Cyclone touchdowns.

On defense, Wilson said the Bronchos have to contain "the best passer we've faced this season," Cyclone Quarter back is Don Cofer, number 15. His main target has been receiver Anthony Johnson.

On offense, the Cyclones also specialize in a six-man sweep, which means they send half their ball club blocking around an end position to protect the runner. In front of the ball carrier will be two guards, a flanker back, a lead back, the quarterback and a split end.

"But we've been stopping our opponents outside this year," Wilson said. "We can do the same thing against Memphis."

But if Wilson's description of a contest where game possibilities are "thrown open," the opponents in Friday's match-up won't be concerned with possible futures. After Friday's "grudge match" is over, then both teams will stop and count up who's in first place.

Control steps for peach tree borers

One of the most destructive peach pest is the peach tree borer. The larval stage damages the peach tree by burrowing the trunk of the tree near the ground line. Infested trees decline in vigor and may die as a result of the damage inflicted by peachtree borer larvae. Now is the time to protect your peach trees from the peachtree borer damage according to Ronald Gooch, County Extension Agent.

The best way to determine if a peach tree is infested by

these borers is to inspect the trunk of the tree at the soil line. When large masses of gum which contains a brown sawdust like material are found, peachtree borers are present. Peach trees should be inspected several times each year to determine if control measures are needed.

These borers can be controlled by an application of paradichlorobenzene crystals (PDB crystals) applied around the base of the tree during the period of October 20 to November 30. The use of PDB crystals in the proper manner will, in most cases, eliminate the infestations. The crystals should be applied when the soil is dry and the temperature is 55 degrees F. or above. Weeds should be removed from around the base of the tree and the soil leveled one foot from the tree trunk. Place the PDB crystals in a narrow groove encircling the tree about two inches from the tree trunk. Care should be taken to keep any of the crystals from coming in direct contact with the tree. Clean soil should be placed over the crystals so as to form a cone shaped pile about six to eight inches high around the base of the tree.

This soil should be removed from the base of the tree in late March or early April.

The amount of PDB crystals to be used is determined by the age and size of the tree. In general, one-half (1/2) ounce of crystals should be used for two year old trees, three-fourths (3/4) ounce for four to five year old trees and one (1) ounce for mature trees.

Where peach tree borer are a problem, the use of this control measure for this pest will greatly lengthen the life of the peach tree. Further information on control of the peachtree borer is available at your county extension Agent's Office. Gooch said.

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Autumn leaves can be used as a compost pile

Efficient gardeners or thrifty homeowners can make good use of those piles of autumn leaves, dead branches or other plant debris by converting the waste material into a compost pile notes Ronald Gooch, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The compost pit is an effective method of fertilizing a yard or garden with no odor, little trouble and a small expense. The pit also prevents added pollution to the air caused by burning the waste products.

Compost can be produced by forming a pit or pile of waste material of almost any type in an area close to a water source. The pit should be well ventilated and open to sunshine.

Begin the pile with a six-to-eight inch layer of debris and add a layer of soil or finished compost one-to-two inches thick. The final layer should be one-to-two inches of manure or one-to-two cups of a commercial fertilizer per square yard of surface area. The pile should then be well watered but not saturated, advises Gooch.

Layers should be repeated until the pile is four to five feet high. When a pile is completed, it should be turned every two or three months to speed decomposition and equalize overall breakdown.



Post Office offers mail order hints

"Thumbing through a sales catalog, choosing merchandise and dropping an order in the mail can be fun and an easy way to Christmas shop," according to Postmaster Robert McCombs.
 "Most mail order firms rely on repeat business and usually provide fast shipment and quality merchandise. That's good business," he said.
 "However," Postmaster McCombs warns, "if you order merchandise by mail and must wait a long time to receive it or never get it at all—that's bad business."
 Postmaster McCombs points out that a Federal Trade Commission rule now protects customers who order merchandise by mail. The rule gives customers: The right to know when to expect shipment of the merchandise. For example, if an ad indicated a "rush"

shipment in less than a week, the manufacturer must do so within that time. If no date is stated, the items must be shipped within 30 days.
 The right to cancel the order when shipment is not made within the stated time or the maximum 30-day period. The firm must indicate the delay and provide a free means for the customer's response, such as a postage-paid postcard. Customers may cancel the order or agree to the new shipping date.
 The right to receive a refund when canceling an order because shipment can not be made within the prescribed time period. The seller must mail the refund within seven days after a customer cancels. If there is a credit sale, the firm has only one billing cycle to make the proper adjustment to the customer's account.
 The rule, however, does

not apply to the following mail order services: photo finishing; magazine subscriptions; serial (more than one) deliveries except for the initial shipment; seeds and growing plants; COD (collect on delivery) shipments; and credit orders where the customer's account is not charged prior to the merchandise shipment.
 If the customer feels the company has not fulfilled its obligations under the Federal Trade Commission rule, a short letter—outlining all of the circumstances—should be mailed with a copy of the ad to: Director, Bureau of Consumer Protection (MO-P), Federal Trade Commission, Washington, DC 20580. ***



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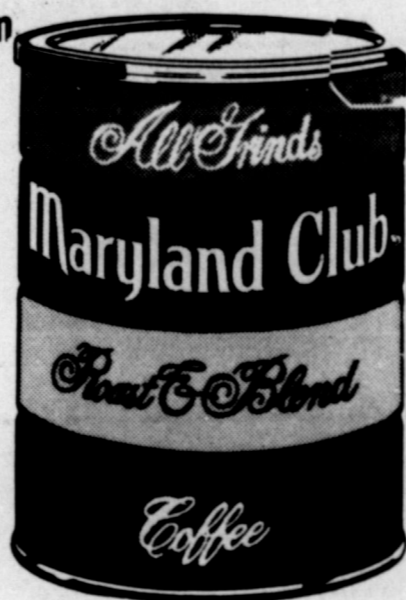

Public hunting available for quail season

Adequate cover and wet ground should help the quail hunter and his dog as the season opens Nov. 13-Feb. 13, 1977. The daily bag limit is 12 birds and possession limit of 36 birds will allow plenty of shooting for both dove and blue or scaled quail.

Most of the quail hunting in Texas is on private property with leases and day hunting fees, but there are two public hunting areas in northwest Texas open to the general public this fall.

The popular Matador wildlife management area, located 11 miles northwest of Paducah in Cottle county, will open its gates for quail hunting on Nov. 6-7, 13-14, 20-21; Dec. 4-5, 11-12, 18-19, 1976; Jan. 8-9, 15-16, 22-23; Feb. 5-6, 12-13, 19-20, 1977. Quail hunts on the Gene Howe wildlife management area, six miles east of Canadian in Hemphill County, will open to quail hunting on Nov. 6-7; Dec. 11-12, 1976; Jan. 8-9, 22-23; Feb. 5-6; Mar. 5-6, 1977. To help defray the cost of

conducting the hunt, a fee of \$1.00 will be charged for each hunter for each day hunted. Fees will be paid at check stations when the hunters report to hunt.

Hunters will start arriving several hours prior to the legal shooting time on each area and first come-first served policy has worked well over the last few seasons.

Only persons 12 years of age or older will be eligible to hunt on any of the wildlife management areas open to quail hunting. The under 17

participant must be accompanied by his parent or by a person 21 years of age or older who shall be responsible for the conduct of the minor. The "under-age" hunter shall remain under the immediate supervision of his sponsor while hunting and will not under any circumstances be allowed to hunt alone. An adult may sponsor only one hunter.

Information and directions concerning assigned areas and other regulations will be given each hunter as he or she clears the check station.

It wasn't...Another question WHY???

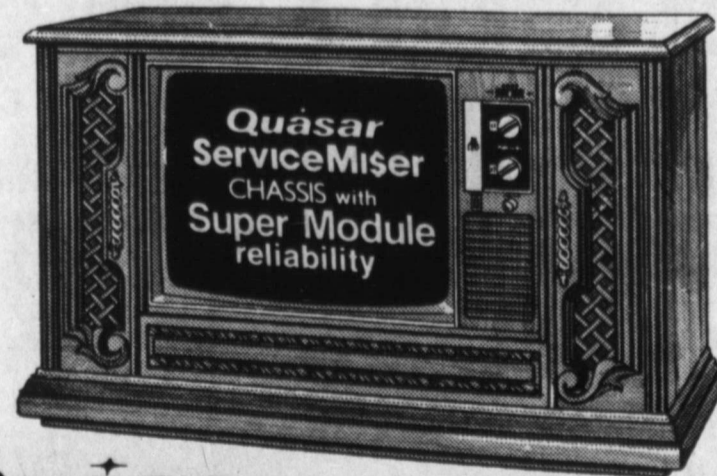
Childhood vaccinations set
