

Bronchos lose championship hopes to Memphis

District 2-A Championship questions were answered Friday, Nov. 5, as the Memphis Cyclones outdistanced Clarendon's Bronchos 26-0 in Memphis. The win places Memphis in undisputed first place for 7th, 8th, J.V. to play Shamrock

the district lead. Clarendon's loss dropped them to 1-2 in district play, and 5-4 for the season. Memphis will play the District 1-A Champs in Bi-District competition. The Memphis passing game repeatedly punched

holes in Clarendon's defense and accounted for three of Memphis' four touchdowns. The Cyclones amassed almost as many yards in the air as they did on the ground, 148 passing to 168 yards rushed.

For Clarendon fans, the most exciting moments of the game came early. After receiving the opening kick-off, Memphis was intercepted by Broncho Howard Weatherton on their second play of the game.

His run-back put the Bronchos to work on the 45 yard line of Memphis. Clarendon put together four first-down efforts, two of them gained in crucial fourth down efforts. The drive faltered within the Cyclone 10 yard line, however, with Clarendon facing a 4th down situation with 3 1/2 yards to go. A field goal attempt by John Hall was wide and Clarendon's chance for points faded.

The Memphis offense came right back, beginning their first scoring drive of the night from their own 20. The score came several plays later on 4th and 13 at the Broncho 25. A long pass into the endzone put the Cyclones ahead, a position they retained the rest of the game.

The Bronchos failed to generate much offense the remainder of the first half while the Cyclones came back with a 45 yard pass play

early in the second quarter. As the half ended, Clarendon trailed 14-0.

After receiving the opening second half kick-off, the Bronchos again failed to put together a crucial come-back offensive drive and were forced to punt. As soon as the Cyclone punt returned got his hands on the spiraling ball, he didn't let go of it until he'd carried it across the Broncho goal line for the night's third score. The 65 yard run-back put Memphis ahead 20-0 with most of the third quarter left to play.

Clarendon's defensive unit pulled together late in the third quarter to stop another Memphis scoring threat on the Bronco 12 yard line. The ball went over on downs to Clarendon at the 14. Broncho Barry Schafer carried it for a long gain a few plays later, advancing Clarendon to their own 30. A bungled hand-off was lost on the next play, however, and the Cyclones recovered on the 33 of Clarendon. With 2:04 left in the third quarter, Memphis was set up for their final scoring effort of the game. As the quarter ended, Memphis once again crossed the goal line with a 12 yard pass play. The extra-point kick was wide but without it Cyclones' led 26-0.

Memphis scored again in the fourth period, but a personal foul call nullified it. The penalty yardage made it 1st down again but from Clarendon's 27 yard line. The Bronchos contained them for the next four downs, the drive ending with Broncho Tony Wallace batting a pass down in the end zone.

It came too late, but the Bronchos put together their longest offensive effort of the night in their final possession. Starting from their own 10 and aided by a roughing the kicker penalty, they managed to progress to the Cyclone 15 yard line before the clock ended their scoring hopes. Final game score was 26-0.

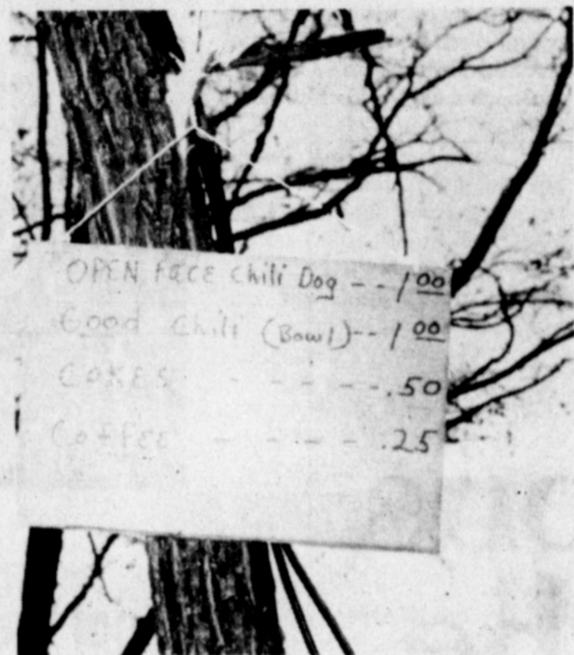

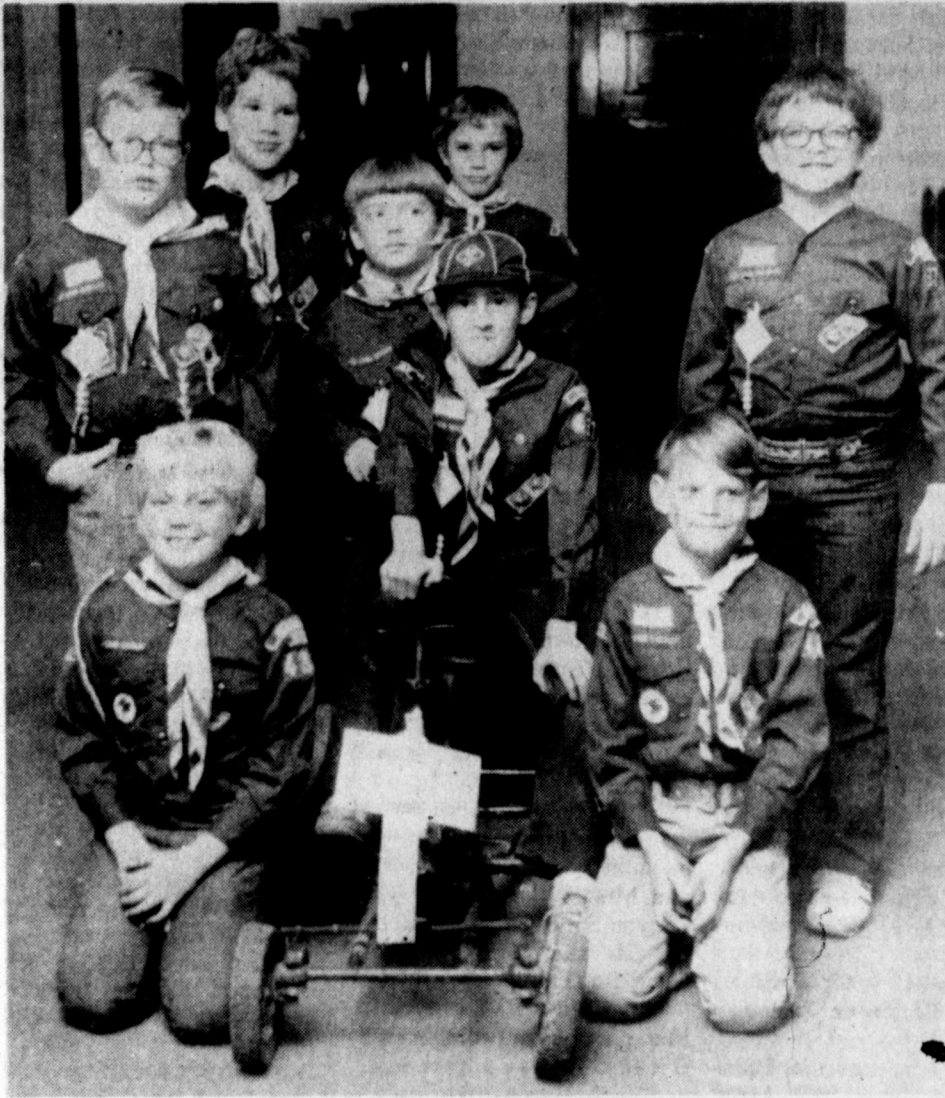
