

Most Clarendon businesses to be closed Thanksgiving

Few Clarendon businesses will be open Thanksgiving Day but the majority will reopen Friday after a one-day holiday respite.

Only Clarendon businesses open Thanksgiving will be the local Gibson's store, Allsup's Grocery and three restaurants. Restaurants open Thursday will be Bradshaws Country Kitchen, The Broncho Drive-in and Allie May's Restaurant. All Clarendon eating places will re-open Friday.

The tax offices of the public schools, college and hospital district will all be closed Thursday and Friday. Dr. Richard Gilkey's clinic at the Medical Center will also be closed those two days.

Offices of the City and County will be closed both Thursday and Friday. West Texas Gas and West Texas Utility offices will be closed both Thursday and Friday, but the Lone Star Gas office will re-open Friday.

Both Clarendon banks will re-open Friday after their Thanksgiving holiday, according to spokesman from the Farmers State Bank and Donley County State Bank.

The Donley County Day Care Center will also close Thursday, but re-open Friday. The Community Action Center will be closed both days, however.

According to Postmaster Bob McCombs, the Post Office facility will be closed Thanksgiving, but first class mail

and newspapers will be delivered Thursday morning. The facility will be open for business as usual Friday.

Both Clarendon College and the Clarendon Public Schools will resume classes Monday morning, Nov. 29. Both will let out Wednesday after the last class of the day.

The "Clarendon Press" will be mailed one day early this week and the office will be closed Wednesday and Thursday. Office hours will resume Friday, however.

Ambulance operator asks for salary

Delbert Robertson, who has operated the county's Emergency Ambulance Vehicle the past five years, has notified local officials he will have to begin charging for that service after June 1, 1977.

Robertson has been operating the ambulance at no charge since 1970, but he said new federal requirements will soon make this financially impossible. A federal statute at present not being enforced in Texas requires two certified ambulance personnel be on call 24 hours a day year around. Robertson speculated this law will be enforced in Texas very soon and will require hiring additional personnel.

County Judge Billy Christal said the request from Robertson was not unexpected. "Frankly," he said, "We're grateful to Delbert for operating the service on a volunteer basis as long as he has. It just the federal requirements are going to make it impossible to continue without spending some money."

At present, Donley County and the City of Clarendon own a 1970 ambulance which is furnished for Robertson's use. Robertson has been operating the ambulance on a voluntary basis. Charges for ambulance calls are used for maintenance on the ambulance. Any remaining money derived from these calls are turned into the Emergency Ambulance Fund controlled by the city.

Robertson has offered local authorities two possible payment plans. If the city and the county retain the ambulance currently in use or provide another ambulance, Robertson estimated he would need \$900 per month for the emergency service. This cost includes salaries for the newly hired personnel and expense for the monthly billing of persons using the ambulance.

Robertson also said if local authorities wanted him to provide his own ambulance, he would require a monthly payment of \$1,200. The additional money would defray costs of a new ambulance.

He estimated a new ambulance would cost approximately \$14,200. Robertson said he was asking local authorities to reach some decision by Jan. 1 this year.

This would insure him enough time to take the three-month Emergency Medical Technician license (EMT) course, which must be renewed every two years.

Robertson speculated matching fund grant money might be obtained by local authorities from the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission for the purchase of a new ambulance. This matching-fund grant would pay half the ambulance's expense. Robertson said application for such a grant would probably have to be filed one year before it was

granted.

Currently, Robertson said, he answers approximately 15 emergency calls per month with each call requiring about two hours time. "But the big job," he said, "is the billing each month."

Charge for ambulance calls is \$20 base for calls within a 15 mile radius of Clarendon. An additional \$5

is charged if it is an emergency call or if oxygen has to be used. For calls outside the 15 mile limit, fifty cents per mile is charged in addition to the base costs.

The request from Robertson was mailed to the City of Clarendon, Donley County and the County's Medical District last week. No action has been taken on the request as of Monday, Nov. 22.

Mooring was selected to represent the county by the Rural Development Committee, composed of representatives from the local ASC, FHA, and SCS offices.

Nominees for the Top Hand Award were judged on their farming operations, plus qualities in community leadership. A panel of judges at the seminar selected the winner.

City, Gas Company to discuss increase

Representatives of Lone Star Gas will meet with Clarendon City Councilmen this Tuesday, Nov. 23, to discuss a proposed city gas rate increase.

Lone Star is asking the city to accept an eight per cent increase on the return of their investment in the Clarendon system. Roughly, this increase, if approved, would mean residents of the city would pay approximately 21 cents more per 1000 cubic ft. of gas used per month. Gas company representatives have figured this would cost a family who uses 8,000 cubic ft. of gas per month

\$1.61 more on their present monthly bill.

The 8,000 cubic ft. figure is said to be an approximate average of yearly consumer consumption. Gene Swearingen, manager of the Clarendon Lone Star Gas Company, said this figure is probably less than an average monthly consumption for winter, however.

Swearingen and the Lone Star Manager in Memphis, Mike Lockett will be meeting with the Clarendon City Council Tuesday. The meeting is set to begin at 7 p.m. at City Hall.

City Administrator Bud Knorpp speculated the initial Lone Star proposal will be turned down by the council. He said a final revenue increase figure would have to be worked out among the gas company and the City of Clarendon.

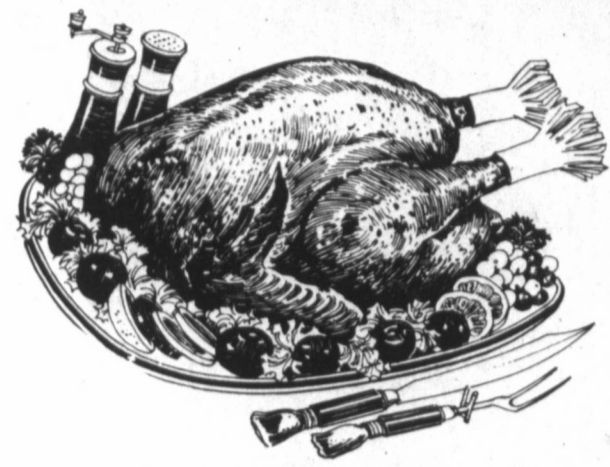

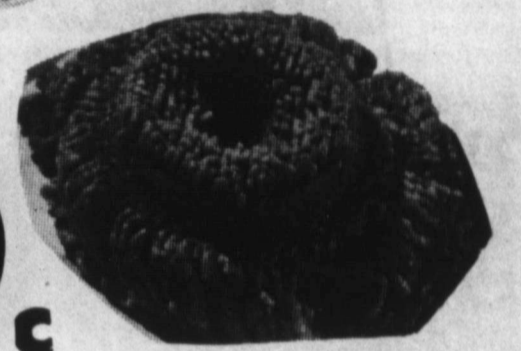

a very moving story about the first Thanksgiving from the standpoint of an Indian boy. (the author was Amos Morris Lillie.)

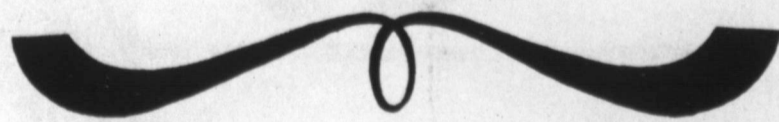

Sarah Josepha Hall was the first person to suggest that Thanksgiving Day should be a National patriotic holiday. 20 years later she was able to gain support of Abraham Lincoln. So he proclaimed a national day of Thanksgiving to be celebrated on Nov. 26th, 1864. So Thursday Nov. 25th is a National holiday. Lets make Thanksgiving Day more than Turkey Day. Lets be thankful.
