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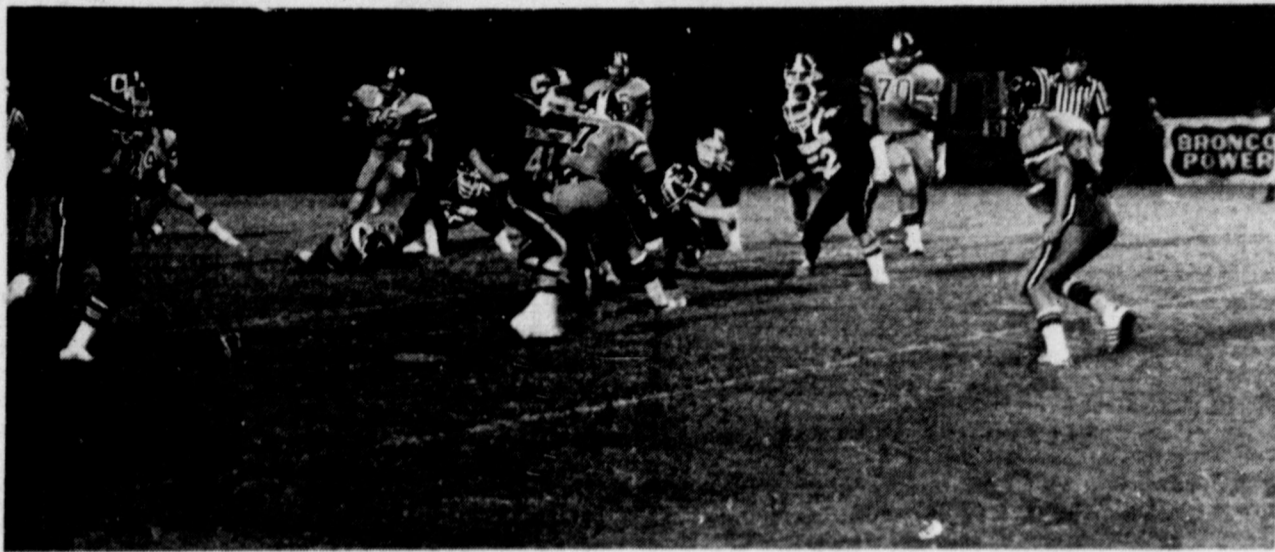

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Bronchos win opening game of the season over Canadian.

Bronchos beat Wildcats 20-7

The Clarendon Bronchos started the 1983 season with a 20 to 7 victory over the Canadian Wildcats.

The game started with a dazzling display of strength and skill. The Bronchos kicked off to the Wildcats starting the game with a superb defense. The game continued scoreless through the first quarter. Then early in the second quarter, Broncho Rodney Smith broke through the Wildcat defense making a 16 yard run and scoring the first touchdown of the game. The Wildcats, unable to break through the Broncho defensive line, remained scoreless throughout the first half of the game.

In the third quarter the Bronchos once again demonstrated their offensive superiority as quarterback Dyron Howell made an 8 yard run scoring the second touchdown of the game. Doug Walker then completed a pass to Glenn Weatherton for the extra point. The Bronchos were then leading 14 to 0. In the fourth quarter, the Wildcats managed to slip past the Bronchos with a 53 yard run

for the only Wildcat touchdown of the game. The cats also managed to complete their extra point attempt making the score 14 to 7. The Bronchos once again took the offense and control of the game. Rodney Smith again took the ball making an 81 yard run for the third and final Broncho touchdown. The score then stood Bronchos 20, Wildcats 7 and

so ended the game.

Some outstanding Broncho players were: Rodney Smith with 16 carries for a total of 169 yards, 2 touchdowns, 12 tackles and 5 assists; Glenn Weatherton with 11 carries for a total of 70 yards, 5 tackles, 4 assists, 2 broken passes, and one interception; Dyron Howell with 12 carries for a total of 53 yards and one touchdown; Dean Cearley

with 9 tackles, one assist, one broken pass, and one sack; Creed Wright with 9 tackles and 2 assists; Brian

Smith with 8 tackles, 1 assist, and 2 broken passes; Richard Gaines gained 38 yards on a pass and had 7 tackles and 1 broken pass; Johnny Gaines with 2 tackles, 1 assist, 1 broken pass and 2 sacks.

Clarendon to play at Kress Friday

After a very exciting opening of the season, the Bronchos are on the road to Kress for the second game of the season.

During the 20-7 victory over Canadian, there were several highlights of the game. The offensive line did an outstanding job of executing their blocking assignments. The coaches felt that we had as good of a game in executing of the offense as there has been in several years. In addition, the defense was in better than average position, the defensive ends, Rod Keown, Johnny Gaines, Tim Cole and Lynn Alderson and the linebackers, Creed Wright, Rodney Smith, Russ Alexander were keeping the force unit in good position all night while up front Arlis Thomas, Bret White, Dan Nichols and Dean Cearley were holding up their part of the defense very well.

Kress, a play-off team for the last two years is headed up by a former Clarendon standout, Monte Land and a former assistant coach, Eric Erwin. The Roos are extremely big, averaging 217 pounds in the offensive and defensive line. The backfield is as big averaging 185 pounds per man.

They will lineup offensively in a multiple formation and are very physical. Defensively, they are almost as talented in that they line up in nearly a dozen different looks. These multiple fronts are giving the Broncho coaches and players a very hard time, trying to adjust to the many different plays from each formation and the blocking schemes for the many different defensive fronts.

Some of the outstanding young men for the Roos are Kerry Harris, 6'1", 180 lb

QB-Safety; Lynn Freeman, 6'2" 210 lb. FB-LB; Sammy Shannon 6'1" 185 lb TB-Safety; Todd Morphis 6'1" 170 lb wing back and safety. In the front people, Kevin Cheek 6'2" 200 lb TE-DE; Brad Bennett 6'2" 255 Tackle; Edward Viouette 6'0" 225 lb Center-DE; Milton Shiver 6'1" 195 lb NG-Offensive Guard. These young men move extremely well for that size and the young, smaller Bronchos are going to have to throw the ball a lot more than last week against Canadian in order to make up the difference in the

two teams.

The coaches comments, "Kress has a large, very aggressive team of returning regulars, in addition to size, they have good skilled people - QB, running backs, receivers. This will be the

one of the best teams we will face this year. They are a great deal better than Kress has been in the past several years. New Deal was very fortunate to beat them. I hope we can do as well as New Deal did against them. Coach Land is doing an outstanding job."

Canyon museum trying to locate Texas newspapers

"We are working to preserve an important aspect of the cultural and historical heritage of Texas," is the way Bobby Weaver, director of the Texas Newspaper Project, explains his role. Weaver and his staff at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum in Canyon are trying to locate the files of all newspapers ever published in Texas. It is estimated that Texas has produced over 6,000 newspapers since the Gaceta de Tejas appeared at Nacadoches in 1813, but there is no accurate accounting of the numbers that were actually published, nor is it known where most of them are stored. The project staff is very interested in locating private collections of Texas newspapers. Mauro announced lease sale

Texas Land Commissioner Garrv Mauro announced the School Land Board will offer over one million acres of public lands for lease at the October 4 semi-annual lease sale.

"This will be the largest offering since October, 1980. We will offer 1,045,957 acres including tracts in uplands, riverbeds, bays and inlets and in the Gulf of Mexico," Mauro announced. Mauro serves as Chairman of the School Land Board.

A total of 1,423 tracts will be listed in the October sale for the production and exploration of oil and gas. An additional 10 tracts totaling 3,800 acres will be offered for the exploration and production of sulphur.

The areas offered in the October lease sale are as follows: Uplands - 48 tracts, 12,181 acres; Riverbeds - 75 tracts, 6,246 acres; Bays and inlets - 616 tracts, 314,156 acres; Gulf of Mexico - 684 tracts, 713,374 acres.

All bonuses and royalties paid on public school lands are placed into the Permanent School Fund. The fund currently totals over \$3.8 billion.

"Money earned from the leasing of our public lands goes directly for the education of the school children of Texas. Last year, this fund provided over \$600 for each public school student in this state. This is money we do not have to raise from additional taxes for our public school system," Mauro said.

Red Cross makes appeal for funds

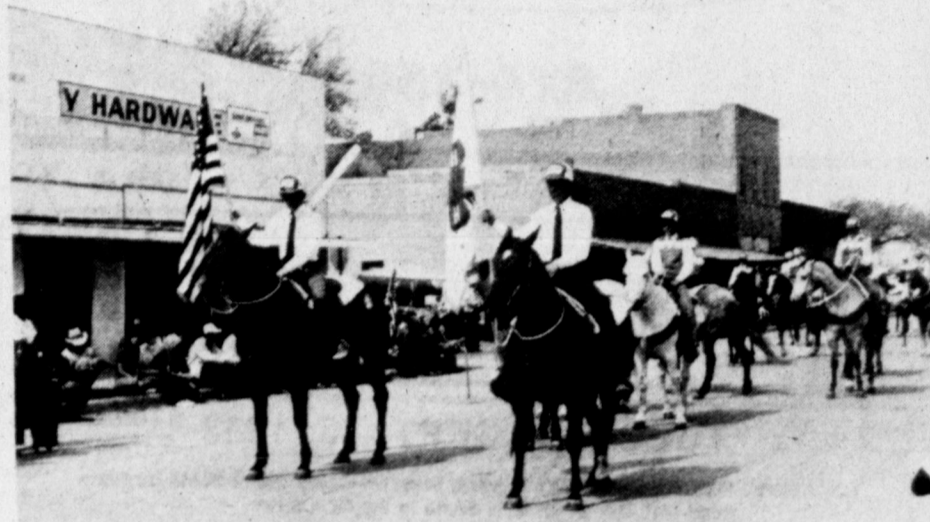
The American Red Cross has launched an emergency appeal for funds to assist the victims of Hurricane Alicia in the Gulf Coast Area, and the Donley County Chapter is appealing directly to our county residents for funds to help in this emergency. Due to the size of the relief efforts, a Texas Disaster Campaign goal of \$2 million has been established.

According to reports received from Red Cross Disaster Headquarters in Houston, damage is extensive with 12,524 dwellings affected. Red Cross has had as many as 109 shelters opened since the hurricane hit the coast, and 22,650 persons have been given temporary shelter. Latest Red Cross survey figures place the number of dead at 17 with 3904 injured and 23 still hospitalized.

2800 Red Cross volunteers are serving with 194 Red Cross staff to supply the needs of victims. Presently 37,000 meals are still being served daily as compared to 201,733 daily at the peak of the emergency. Over 62,500 victims and emergency workers have received mass care from Red Cross in the form of food, shelter, clothing and medical care.

Todd L. Knorpp, Chapter Chairman, said that all contributions will be used to help our fellow Texans who are in need due to this hurricane. He urges all county residents to come to the aid of the many desperate families there.
