Health Hints for Today

INFLUENZA VACCINE recommendations from the Texas Department of Health are:

- 1) For all older persons, particularly those over 65 years, because of the risk of death during influenza outbreaks generally increases with age.
- 2) For all persons who are at increased risk of infections of the respiratory tract because of pre-existing conditions as:
 - a) Heart disease, acquired or congenital.
 - b. Chronic pulmonary dis-

order, as asthma, emphysema, or any impairment of the ventilatory system.

d) Severe anemia.
 e) Conditions that compromise the immune mechanism, as certain malignancies and chemotherapy.

Adverse reactions include:
 1) Local redness and soreness at the injection site of one to two days duration (in less than 1/2 of vaccinations).

2) Aching, low grade fever and fatigue for 1 to 2 days, is very infrequent and usually in children.

3) Immediate reaction with swelling of lips and immediate swelling of the injection site, due to allergy to eggs. Hence it is no recommended to those who develop distress upon eating eggs.

4) No severe reactions as those seen in 1976 as the Guillain-Barre Syndrome have been noted with the new vaccine.

DRUG COSTS can be decreased by asking your physician to prescribe generic drugs (which most of us do when possible). Drug companies produce generic brands of their high quality drugs whenever possible. Pharmacies will substitute a generic for a brand name drug when allowed to do so.

Medicare and Medicaid, however, are limiting their allowable drugs to single entity drugs. This is one reason your physician may prescribe one drug and recommend an over-the-counter drug to be taken at the same time. The worse example of this is in cough syrups. Since most cough syrups contain many compounds, they are being eliminated from the acceptable prescription list each month. (This is important because the "colds" of the past two months have been associated with a severe cough, and the good cough syrups contain many compounds, hence many are no longer allowed by Medicaid).

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DRUGS CAUSE CONSTIPATION

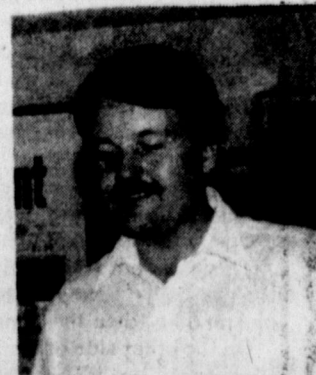
Although most constipation is probably due to insufficient fiber in the diet, some constipation may occur with use of certain drugs. Drugs taken for short periods of time as well as long periods of time may cause constipation. Both prescription and nonprescription products have been implicated.

Aluminum-containing antacids are a chief offender particularly among the elderly. To help prevent constipation, manufacturers often combine this medicine with magnesium hydroxide to reduce constipating effects.

Atropine-like drugs cause a reduction in the movement of the intestines and, hence, can produce constipation. Many of the drug products used to control stomach spasm are related to atropine and may cause constipation.

Antidepressants and drugs used to control Parkinsonism have side effects similar to atropine and, therefore, may also cause constipation.

Narcotic pain relievers such as codeine and morphine cause a reduction in movement of the intestines and frequently produce constipation. (Narcotics are sometimes used to control diarrhea due to this side effect.)



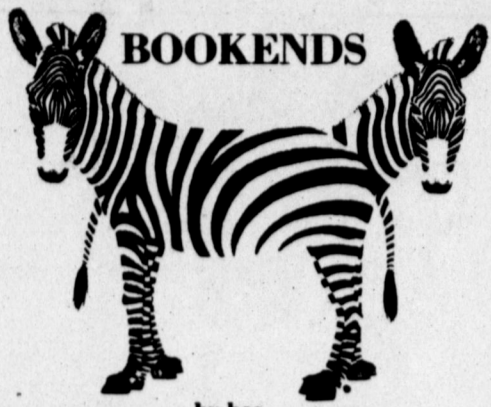

MISTRAL'S DAUGHTER by Judith Krantz, on and off the best seller list since publication earlier this year, may be described as merely a good book in comparison with her scintillating first novel, **SCRUPLES**, and her glittering star-quality second novel, **PRINCESS DAISY**.

No one today is as good a story teller about women, clothes, fashion, houses and designers, little shops, big stores, drop-dead parties, places to eat, Hollywood, TV productions and the horse, yacht and jet set. She is similar to a friend returning from a world unknown to yourself and relating all the things you have wanted to hear about, but didn't know anyone to ask.

Krantz, who lives in Beverly Hills, deserves all the good fortune that is coming her way. For years she practiced her craft by being a free lance writer for many of the national magazines. When her second and last son left home for college, she started her first novel. Her husband Steve, is a movie and television producer and encouraged her to write.

MISTRAL'S DAUGHTER is a novel about three women and one man. Three generations of women in one family loved Mistral, a genius artist who is oblivious to everything but his canvas, paints and brushes. The story begins in Paris in the Twenties. The French Impressionists, Chanel, New York City, Ford and Powers modeling agencies, fashion photographers, WWII, ancient Jewish ruins in France, tourist sites in France and Italy and Parisian high society are all in the book. The ruins and sites should have been omitted. The story definitely drags here and those readers use to the fast pace of the author's style begin to get really bored. One felt as though ruins and family roots and the French countryside were being force fed us since apparently the author spent a pleasant vacation there and was determined to put it all in her book. Fausse's anger at her father seems contrived. After all, she had accepted his actions towards her grandmother and mother without even a trace of ambivalence.

In an interview after **PRINCESS DAISY** publication rights to paperback and movie companies were sold for millions, Krantz said that she always wrote everything she knew in each book. She went on to say that she was completely drained of all thoughts and ideas by the time it was completed. Perhaps, she rested and napped a little in several places in the book while writing **MISTRAL'S DAUGHTER**, but two blockbusters and a boom in three years is plenty good.

Do check the book out at the library and read it. It is enjoyable and a good story. You may nap and rest right along with the author and snap to attention when she does.
