



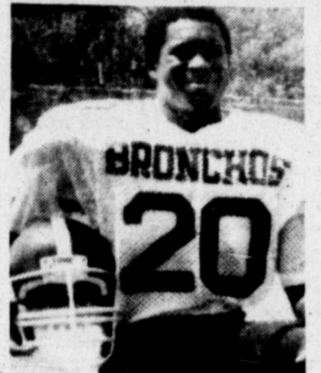

Stats shows Bronchos an impressive team

The Clarendon Bronchos were an impressive team as shown by their record of 8-1-1, and even their stats showed why they were so impressive.

As the season ended with Panhandle getting beat by Hamlin 26-13 after leading 13-0 at half, the all district selections were released and the Bronchos had several selected. An athlete on the elite team could be nominated by his coach or by another coach but the boys' coach could not vote for him.

Clarendon had only one unanimous choice, Rodney Smith, a junior fullback, led the team in rushing with 1398 yards on 143 carries for 15 TD and an average of nearly ten yards a carry.

Other first team selections were Arlis Thomas, punter, averaged 39 yards a punt but more impressive was the fact that he had only 18 yards in returns for the season. Arlis was also chosen as a first team defensive lineman and the kicker for the elite team.

Richard Gaines was chosen as a defensive back and the reason was 83 tackles, 2 fumbles recovered, 5 interceptions and 15 pass break-ups. In addition, Richard was the premier hitter in the very tough district.

Glenn Weathererton was chosen to the first team defense at a defensive back. Glenn had 59 tackles, 4 interceptions and 3 break-ups.

There were several chosen to the second team for the Bronchos.

Offensively, Arlis Thomas at a tackle; Johnny Gaines at a tight end; Dyron Howell at QB; Glenn Weathererton at a running back.

Defensively, Johnny Gaines at an end; Rodney Smith and Creed Wright at linebackers.

As the record of 8-1-1 was impressive, so is the fact that Arlis Thomas was chosen to three first team positions and a second team spot. A truly outstanding Bronco.

In addition to the first or second team choices, a player can be chosen honorable mention by receiving at least one vote in the balloting. **cont p. 8**

First Baptist Church "Alive in Christ" revival Dec. 4

The Alive in Christ Revival will begin Sunday, December 4 at The First Baptist Church in Clarendon with an evangelistic message by Michael Gott.

The revival week will begin at 7:30 p.m. Sunday and continue through December 9.

Few young men have had wide opportunity and experience in Christian Evangelism than Michael Gott. For the past decade he has averaged speaking nearly two times daily throughout the United States, Europe, and Africa. He travels an estimated 100,000 miles annually for the purpose of communicating the Christian message. He has lived in Great Britain and because of his concern for Christ's mission, continues to travel on a global scale.

Mr. Gott was chosen by the Evangelism Division of the Baptist General Convention of Texas as a speaker for the popular Youth Evangelism Conference. For several consecutive years he has been selected as an evangelist for city-wide "Meet Jesus" crusades sponsored by Texas Baptists. Mr. Gott was singularly chosen by the Baptists to lead Baptist sponsored nation-wide crusades in Scotland, East Africa and Finland.

It has been noted that probably no person in the world his age has traveled more widely and spoken more often in the Soviet Union than Gott. He has visited the USSR on four different occasions in the interest of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. He was involved in major world congresses on Evangelism in the last decade. These meetings were held for the purpose of uniting massive Christian witness designed to mobilize millions of Christians around the world to share their faith during the remainder of the century.

Gott is a graduate of two institutions of higher learning, earning a B.A. degree

from Baylor University and a Master's degree in Divinity from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. He also did postgraduate study in New Testament and preaching at the University of Edinburgh in Scotland, and he has plans for continued studies.

Regarding his own view of present world events Michael says, "These are exciting days to be alive, as an adherent of Biblical Christianity. I see God moving amid world events. The cataclysmic turmoil of our time involves not only a great challenge, but also a great opportunity for evangelism, and as we go into the world we must be both unquestionably rooted in the unchanging Gospel and realistically related to a changing world. We must dare to demonstrate God's love-in-action to a world searching for lasting values."

Michael, his wife, Jan, and twelve-year-old daughter Amy are native Texans and live in Jacksonville, Texas. He maintains offices in that same East Texas City.

Revival music will include Mitch and Melinda Manning from Marshall, TX as well as the Clarendon Baptist Church choir.

Melinda is a 22 year old housewife. She is a graduate of East Texas Baptist College with a B.S. Degree in Elementary Education Specializing in music. She has had many opportunities to represent our Lord in concerts, churches and personal appearances.

Mitch is 23 years old and presently is minister of music and youth at Bel Air Baptist Church in Marshall, TX. Mitch is a Senior Religion and Sacred Music student at East Texas Baptist College. He had been in school one year when he was given an opportunity to sing professionally with the contemporary Christian group "Eternity". Since then, Melinda and Mitch have served in churches and

Evangelism as God has led. The Lord has blessed greatly in opening over 400 opportunities in 35 states.

Girlstown in dire financial need

Only 25 days left til Christmas, most of us are busy baking, cleaning and shopping for our families. There are 82 girls in the four campuses of Girlstown, U.S.A. which circumstances beyond their control prevent them from staying in their natural home, who are faced with just existing, less alone looking forward to Christmas gifts.

Last year, the people of Donley County opened up their hearts to these young girls, with the help of Molita Greer and Elmonette Bivens each girl received an extra gift.

This year, The Clarendon Press has learned that Girlstown U.S.A. is in dire financial need.

It takes a budget of \$107,914.00 per MONTH for the four campuses of Girlstown, which are located at White Face, Borger, Austin and Lubbock to survive. All the finances are handled through the White Face Campus.

It takes \$7,703 a month for groceries, that does not include \$7,184 it takes for soap and cleaning aids for the girls laundry, bathing and keeping their quarters clean. Each girl does her own laundry. It takes \$1,775 a month for medical expenses, that is after the doctor has donated his service, as most of them do.

Thanks to Molita Greer their clothing expense has come to only \$233 a month. The citizens of Donley County have helped her to either make or gather up a 4-horse trailer full of clothing items about every two to three months. This Christmas, as they do every Christmas, the area Lions Club raised enough money to buy each of these girls a pair of shoes and a new coat.

Last summer the homes had to borrow \$150,000 to keep going, as there is less money donated to the homes in the summer months than any other time. They are trying to pay that note off along with raising the \$107,914 per month it takes to operate the four homes.

While you are shopping for your family, why not buy an extra gift for one of these girls, and donate \$5, \$10, or \$25 along with it or what ever you can spare will be greatly appreciated and desperately needed.

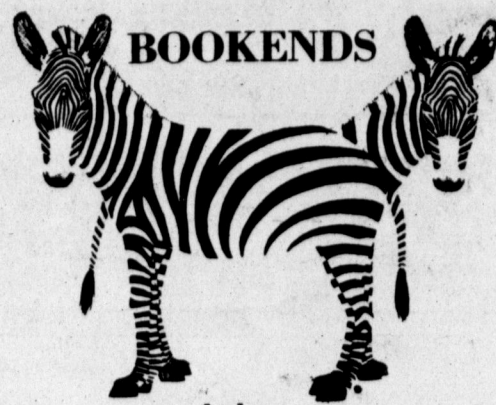

It takes good investigating by a reporter to be a good one, and Phelan should know. He has covered many of the big stories for Saturday Evening Post, Forbes, Fortune, Playboy, Penthouse, True, Cosmopolitan, and the list goes on and on. Phelan's book should be a textbook for journalism schools or those interested in a career in reporting. It is good reading for anyone.

Some of Phelan's stories are The Clifford Irving Hoax, Big Pearl, Jim Garrison v. Clay Shaw and My Life with Howard Hughes.

If a little shock treatment is needed to jolt you out of the doldrums caused by turkey holidays complete with family parade, there is a book in the library just for that. A Cry in the Night by Mary Higgins Clark will jerk the reader to attention and keep you on the alert to the very end. Spine chilling suspense is created by spellbinding storytelling, not by blood and gore.

Other books by Higgins are The Cradle Will Fall, A Stranger is Watching, Where are the Children?, and Aspire to the Heavens. This latest book tops the list and very definitely places the author at the top of the mystery writers.

Jenny is a divorced mother of two daughters and works at an art gallery in New York City. She meets an artist there and in a week's time they decide to marry. Happiness turns into horror and terror and Jennie fears for the life of her children. Fearful suspense keeps building and to put the book down is impossible.

More lefthanded people need to read this book. Righthanded readers have gripped it so hard that there is a permanent sway to the right in the spine of the book.

ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CLARENDON, TEXAS, ZONING FOR TRAFFIC AND RATE OF SPEED THEREIN, ON F.M. HIGHWAY 2362 FIXING A PENALTY THEREFOR; DECLARING WHAT MAY BE A SUFFICIENT COMPLAINT IN PROSECUTIONS HEREUNDER; WITH A SAVING CLAUSE REPEALING CONFLICTING LAWS AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF CLARENDON

Section I
It is hereby determined under the basis of an Engineering and Traffic Investigation that the prima facie maximum speed limit on those portions of F.M. Highway 2362 routed in the City Limits of Clarendon is as hereinafter stated, which prima facie maximum speed limit shall be effective at all times and signs will be erected giving notice of the prima facie maximum speed limit so declared, to-wit:

Speed Zone
F.M. Highway 2362
For Westbound Traffic:
Beginning at station 658+57.2 said point being the intersection of F.M. 2362 and F.M. 2162 in Clarendon, to station 638+19, a distance of 0.386 miles, a prima facie maximum speed limit of 30 miles per hour.
From station 638+19 to station 643+77 a distance of 0.202 miles, a prima facie maximum speed limit of 20 miles per hour, when school zone beacons are flashing.
From station 643+77 to station 627+63 a distance of 0.200 miles, a prima facie maximum speed limit of 40 miles per hour.
From station 627+63 to station 617+05 a distance of 0.200 miles, a prima facie maximum speed limit of 45 miles per hour. Station 617+05 being the west city limits of Clarendon.

For Eastbound Traffic:
Beginning at station 617+05, said point being the West City Limits of Clarendon, to station 627+63, a distance of 0.200 miles, a prima facie speed limit of 45 miles per hour.
From station 627+63 to station 638+19, a distance of 0.200 miles, a prima facie speed limit of 40 miles per hour.
From station 638+19 to station 654+45.5, a distance of 0.202 miles, a prima facie speed limit of 20 miles per hour when school zone beacons are flashing.
From station 654+45.5 to station 658+57.2, a distance of 0.386 miles, a prima facie speed limit of 30 miles per hour. Station 658+57.2 being the intersection of F.M. 2362 and F.M. 2162.

Section II
That the driving or operating of any motor vehicle on or along any portion of any public street of this city at a rate of speed that is greater than the maximum rate of speed for said portion of said street, as fixed by this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor which is named "The Offense of Speeding", and that the said offense is punishable by fine in any sum not to exceed Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00).
That the use of the word "Speeding" shall be sufficient to designate the said offense, and shall mean that a motor vehicle has been driven upon a public street, at a greater rate of speed than that fixed by City Ordinance for the street and for the zone thereof, that such motor vehicle was so being driven upon, if zoned.

That in prosecutions under this ordinance, for the offense of speeding the complaint, if in other respects sufficient in form, shall as to the portion thereof seeking to acknowledge the offense, be sufficient if it in substance alleges that the defendant did while driving a motor vehicle in said city commit the offense of "Speeding".

Section III
That should any section or any portion of any section hereof be decreed to be void, the invalidity of such section or such portion thereof shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance; and that each section and each portion thereof not decreed to be invalid shall remain valid and enforceable.

That all ordinances and parts of ordinance that are in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

That the fact that prompt action should be taken in the regulation of traffic, on the streets of this city, in the manner provided for in this ordinance creates an emergency requiring that the rules that provide that an ordinance shall be read at three separate meetings of the City Council before final passage, be suspended; and that the said rules are hereby suspended, and this ordinance is here and now passed, and that it is ordered that it take effect from and after its passage and publication.

ORDINANCE

SUSPENDING THE PROPOSED EFFECTIVE DATE OF WEST TEXAS UTILITIES COMPANY'S STATEMENT OF INTENT TO INCREASE RATES AS SET OUT IN THEIR NOTICE OF JUNE 10, 1983, FOR FURNISHING OF ELECTRICITY AND ELECTRICAL SERVICE WITHIN THE CITY OF CLARENDON, TEXAS

WHEREAS, in accordance with Article 1446c, Section 43, V.A.C.S. on the 10th day of June, 1983, West Texas Utilities Company filed its Statement of Intent to change rates effective July 16, 1983; and

WHEREAS, the City Council was of the opinion that the request required further detailed study than could be completed by July 16, 1983; and

WHEREAS, the City Council did, as authorized under the provision of Article 1446c, suspend the effective date of said proposed increase for a period of one hundred twenty (120) days and the City Council believed that such suspension was necessary to allow it to fully and fairly review this matter;

WHEREAS, the City Council is also authorized to extend the suspension period for an additional thirty (30) days and the City Council believes that such additional time is needed for further detailed study;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLARENDON:

SECTION 1 That the request for change in rates as specified in the Statement of Intent to become effective on July 16, 1983, is hereby suspended for an additional thirty (30) days making the period of suspension the maximum period of one hundred and fifty (150) days in place of the initial suspension of one hundred and twenty (120) days.

SECTION 2 If for any reason any section, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase, word, or provision of this Ordinance shall be held invalid or unconstitutional by final judgement of court of competent jurisdiction, it shall not affect any other section, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase, word or provision of this Ordinance for it is the definite intent of this City that each of such be given full force and intent for its purpose.

SECTION 3 This Ordinance and the terms herein shall be and become effective from and after the date of its final passage.

SECTION 4 That all Ordinances, Resolutions or parts of Ordinances or Resolutions in conflict herewith are repealed to the extent of such conflict.

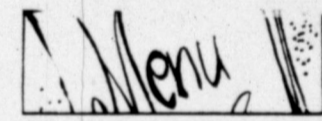

Dr. Don D. Curtis, president of the Board of Directors, The Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center announced today that \$6,000 has been pledged by The First Bank & Trust in Clarendon to the Endowment Fund for the Center. Many donations are made in memory of friends and family, Ms. Van Petten said. "When the bank notifies us of a memorial gift, we send a letter to the family of the individual the donation will honor, and of course, send an acknowledgement to the donor."

More than 2,000 patients have received treatment at the outpatient treatment facility since it opened. Before that, cancer patients often traveled to Houston, Dallas or Oklahoma City for treatment. Often this meant a drastic change in their lifestyles, Ms. Van Petten said. "Besides the medical and psychological trauma, they experienced additional economic burdens as well. Many had to sell their homes or businesses."

"Citizens of this area have spent millions of dollars traveling elsewhere receive treatment, and the emotional cost of this kind of disruption to patients and families is

impossible to calculate," she said.

The \$10 million facility, located in the Medical Center complex in West Amarillo, was built entirely from private donations. No money was borrowed and no government funds were used.

"Now that the doors are open, we need continued financial support to pay for expanded patient care, research, and educational programs," Ms. Van Petten said.

In addition to basic treatment, the Center provides a wide variety of supportive care, including the services of social workers, pastoral counselors, pharmacists, and nutritionists.

The Center is dedicated to the concept that the whole person must be treated, and that includes emotional, spiritual and financial needs as well as physical," Ms. Van Petten stressed.

"We do no deny services to anyone," she added. "And it should be noted that the destitute are not the only ones who are unable to afford medical bills for cancer treatments."

"When you consider that one chemotherapy treatment may cost several hundred

dollars, cancer treatment is priced out of reach for many people. It's not unusual for cancer therapy to cost about \$20,000."

"There are several reasons why the Endowment Fund is beneficial to both the community and the Cancer Center," Ms. Van Petten explained. "The money contributed to endowment stays in the community to provide fund for local loans, and individuals have the convenience of making a contribution to a worthwhile regional institution organization simply by going to their local bank," SHE SAID.

"Also, many people would rather do business at home with their own banker," she said, "and the Endowment Fund reminds people that the Harrington Cancer Center is daily serving the needs of their friends and neighbors."

New cotton stripper introduced

And an optional basket compactor and dump control makes it easier to fill and unload. The 740 comes with a 4-row header that's adjustable for 36- to 40-inch rows. This head can be equipped with an exclusive short or long

modular cross-auger extension to let the 740 strip on five 40-inch rows and most popular skip-row patterns. The 740 utilizes the same exclusive low-profile units as the John Deere 7440 self-propelled stripper.
