INDEPENDENCE DAY 1983

As night falls on the Fourth of July in thousands of communities across the nation, a kaleidoscope of fireworks will illuminate the darkened skies.

These spectacular presentations, often changing color and form as we watch and producing realistic imitations of "bombs bursting in air," border close to fantasy.

Such displays are highly imaginative in concept, and in turn, stir the imagination of many who watch them.

The purpose of these events, as we know, is to celebrate the 207 years in which the United States has stood as the bulwark of liberty. Independence Day marks the climax of the annual 21-day Honor America campaign sponsored by the American Historic and Cultural Society, Inc. The 21-day tribute corresponds to the traditional 21-gun salute accorded to a head of state.

The magic of the fireworks engenders some imaginative opinions. In the life span of our republic some painful episodes have occurred which kindled the notion that possibly our citizens have too much liberty. Benjamin Franklin anticipated such ideas when he wrote, "They that can give up essential liberty to obtain a little temporary safety deserve neither liberty nor safety."

But the liberty we love definitely entails responsibility. What most of the Founding Fathers fought for was a disciplined, moderate, law-respecting freedom.

"Liberty exists in proportion to wholesome restraints," Daniel Webster noted.

This current year marks the 200th anniversary of the formal ending of the Revolutionary War, achieved by the signing of the Treaty of Paris with Great Britain in 1783. The American signers were Franklin, John Adams and John Jay. In that great conflict the infant nation learned the importance of having a staunch ally—the French.

Coincidentally, that same year saw the initiation of manned flight. After Franklin had viewed a balloon ascension in Paris, a skeptic challenged him with a question about the usefulness of balloons. The printer-scientist-diplomat replied, "What good is a baby?"

As the first president of the United States of America, George Washington's views harmonized with those of the other Founding Fathers. Washington sought to remain aloof from partisan political struggles, but he did not always succeed. But he fully realized that liberty could not long survive without prudent limits.

Out of his experience he offered a piece of sound advice to his fellow countrymen.

"Be Americans," he counselled. "Let there be no sectionalism, no North, South, East or West. You are all dependent on one another and should be one in union. In one word, be a nation: be Americans and be true to yourselves."

Still under the spell of those dancing fireworks, let us consider the import of those words. Undoubtedly your ideas may differ strongly from your neighbor's on certain problems. But heed Washington's counsel and seek to heal your differences amicably.

As the first president said, "Be Americans." □

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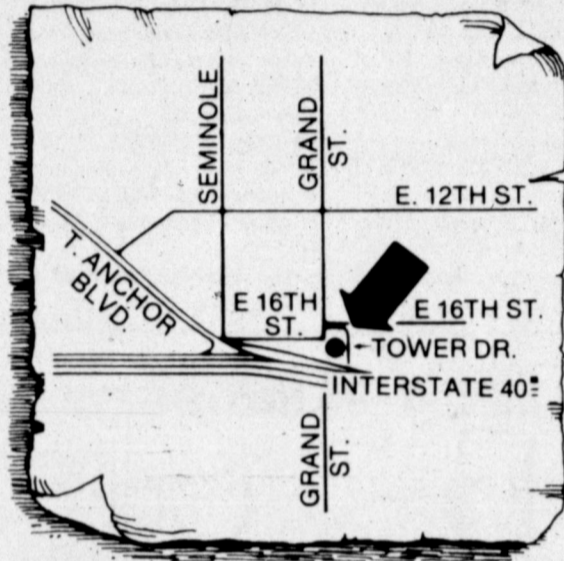

CUBS BASEBALL TEAM



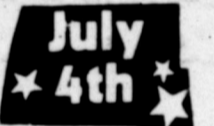
Range Tour

The next stop on the tour was at the Jerry Waggoner Ranch north

of Hedley where shinoak control was observed. From there, the tour headed to the Martinez Beefmaster Ranch where Bert Hernandez, Range Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service discussed planned grazing systems. While at the Martinez Ranch, Tim Fitch, foreman, explained their Beefmaster breeding program. Animal nutrition and management were discussed as well as the short duration cell grazing system on the Mar-

tinez Ranch. The program was followed by a Bar-B-Q lunch furnished by Elanco Range Products. The range tour was then concluded in Gray County where more goldaster control was seen.

The range tour was co-sponsored by the Donley and Gray County Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

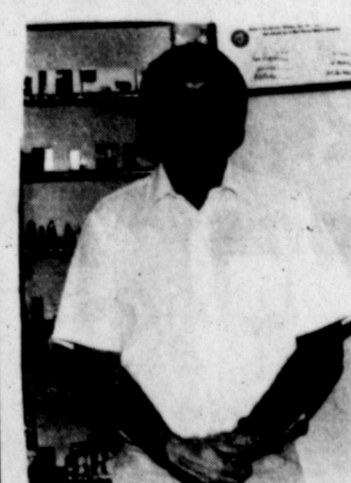

COUNT THE DAYS

Sometimes prescriptions are written for an amount of medicine that it to be taken for a specific number of days [for example, a 10 day period]. Such medicines may be dispensed with an auxiliary label stating: "Finish all this medicine unless otherwise directed by prescriber." By the way of contrast, some medicines should be take only when needed and not for a specific number of days [for example, cough suppressants or pain relievers]. And some prescriptions are prescribed to be taken indefinitely [such as medicines for high blood pressure or diabetes].

An important group of drugs that should be taken for a specific number of days is the antiinfective agents...also known as antibiotics. They are usually taken for a week or more, depending on the type of severity of infection. But individuals will often begin to "feel better" and stop taking antiinfectives after only a few days of use. When discontinued prematurely, antiinfectives will not provide their full benefit. Infections may "rebound" and last days or weeks longer than necessary.

When receiving a new prescription, it is wise to ask your pharmacist whether you should take your medicine when needed, indefinitely, or if you should "count the days."

June has been designated as Dairy Month by the milk industry. Dairying is that branch of agriculture which is concerned with producing milk, butter, cheese and other milk products. Milk was designed by nature for nearly complete food nutritionally, as its nutrients

are most perfectly balanced. Dairy products are one of the most widely used foods and accounts for over 15% of the food consumed annually in the United States. The dairy industry began in America when the Colonist arrived at Jamestown in 1607. Today, the milk in-

dustry is found in every city and town in America and approximately one third of the farms.

There are three factors which distinguish the milk industry from other industries. First, milk is highly perishable, second, milk production and milk consumption are not balanced, third, cows must be milked twice a day, every day of the year. It is estimated that each person in America consumes 550 pounds of milk a year. Approximately 445,000 families earn all or part of their living from dairying. The Danny Dunn family is no exception.

Danny was working as a maintenance engineer at the Kilgore Childrens Center in Amarillo in 1977. His father, who had worked for Borden's over 20 years, offered Danny and his wife, Billie, an opportunity to start a milk route. This was the chance Danny had been waiting for, as he wanted to go into business for himself, as an independent distributor.

The Borden company brings fresh milk three times a week to the Dunns on Monday, Wednesday and Friday by transport from their plant in Amarillo. Danny gets up at 4 a.m., unloads his empties from the day before, makes ready for the

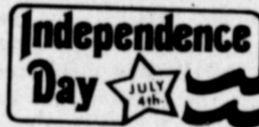
days supply. Dunn started out with only one route, today, he has three routes. Billie ran one of the routes until they hired their brother-in-law, Duane Osburne, who lives in Hedley.

Danny makes deliveries in Clarendon three days a week and Memphis three days a week. He leaves home at 5 a.m. and returns about 5 p.m. "Duane has the hard route," Billie explained, "his route goes to Paducah, Matador, Turkey, Quitaque and Silverton three days a week. The other three days he makes deliveries in Groom, White Deer, Skellytown, Panhandle, Conway and Claude.

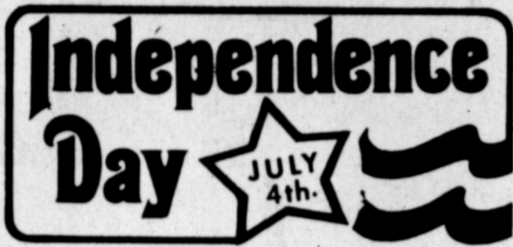
The Dunns biggest loss is caused from spoilage. If it can be pinpointed to the Borden Company, they will accept the loss. But, if it can't, then Danny and Billie Dunn has to take the loss. They have a man in Clarendon that picks up this spoiled milk and feeds it to hogs. In return, he sometimes furnished them with bacon or sausage.

The Dunns have two children, Addriane and Jason. They attend the Clarendon Church of Christ.

Billie said, "We love Clarendon, and really enjoy living here, so much more than in Amarillo."



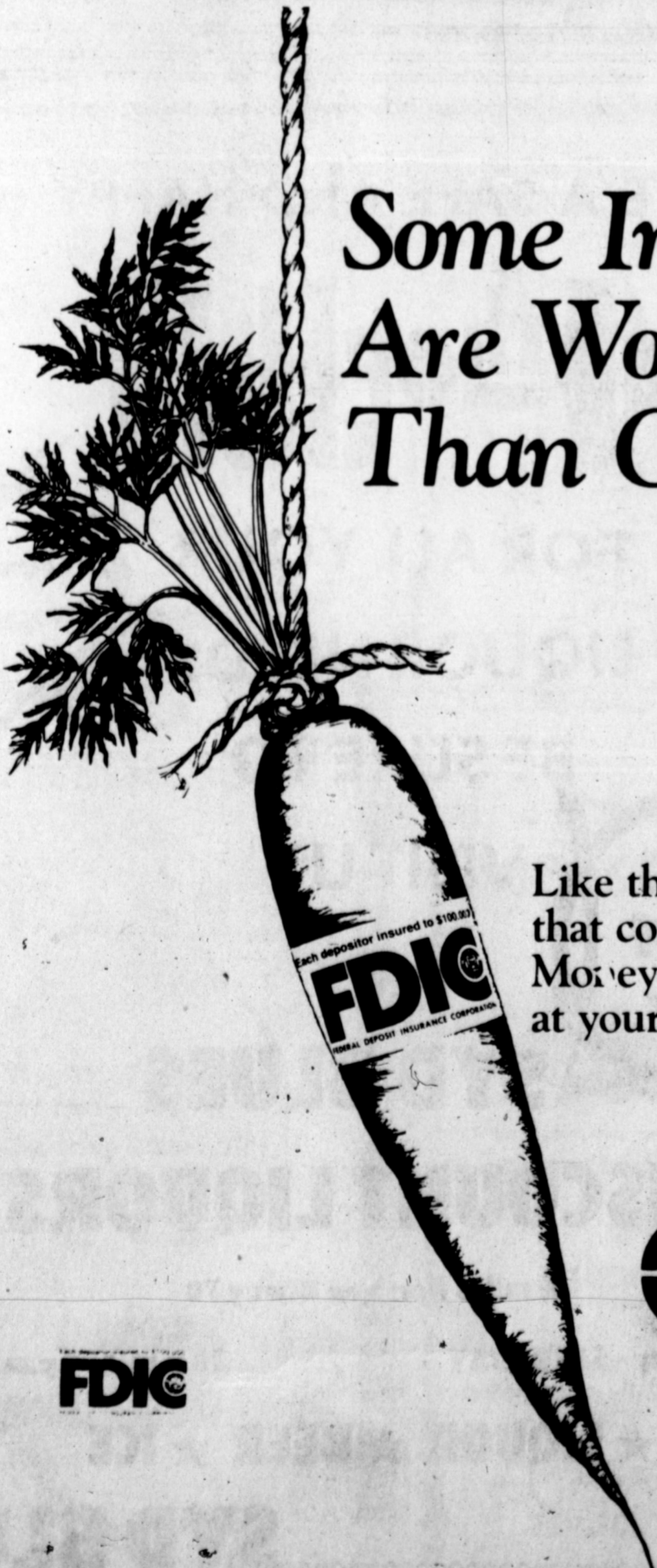

Lone Star files Rate Increase

Lone Star Gas Co. Manager, Mark Winsor, filed an application for a rate increase which would raise the average residential customer's monthly bill in Clarendon about \$2.30 in the winter and \$ (.30) in the summer.

Based on Lone Star's rate application, a residential customer who uses an average of six thousand cubic feet of gas a month paid \$33.84 for gas service in the winter. Under the requested rate, that same customer would pay \$36.14.

Commercial gas customers' rates would also increase under the requested rate schedule.

"Our customers are accustomed to dependable natural gas service," says Winsor. "This rate increase is necessary to continue a high

performance level and for other necessary expenses, such as maintaining and improving the local pipeline distribution system, which are vital to dependable service."

Lone Star's last rate increase in Clarendon became effective October, 1981.

"Since that time, every business, including Lone Star, has experienced increased operating expenses," says Winsor. "And, of course, unlike other businesses that can raise their prices as expenses go up, we must apply to the city council for a rate increase. No one likes rising prices, but any business must earn enough money to meet operating expenses and still achieve a reasonable profit. Even though our expenses have gone up, Lone Star still

has one of the lowest average operating costs per customer when compared to any of the other major gas utilities in Texas."

Immunization

Clinic

Donley County Community Action Corp, 300 S. Sully, Clarendon will hold an immunization clinic offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases. This is scheduled for July 25, from 10-2. This will provide protection against polio, diphtheria, lock jaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella and mumps. There will be no charge.
