Clarendon Cleaners - a new business

Clarendon Cleaners, Clarendon's newest business opened Monday, July 11. James and Wilma Holloman and John and Nancy Barnett are the new owners and operators. They purchased the cleaners from The Donley County State Bank, after the former owner had closed the cleaners.

The Holloman's and Barnett's have worked for over a month getting all the equipment into top shape, cleaning, painting, paneling, installing new equipment or completely refurbishing the old equipment. They partitioned off the back, painted all equipment blue, insulated the pipes with white insulation, painted two walls white, and paneled the other two. They also painted the floor gray and gave the building a new and fresh look.

They bought a new Parker boiler, which will give them plenty of steam anytime they need it. They have changed the method of cleaning from naphtha to percoethylene which is an odorless cleaning agent, also the latest in chemical processing with Adco chemical fashion finish which revitalizes and puts luster and sheen back into garments. Clarendon Cleaners will be able to give you 3-day service, sooner in emergencies, with satisfaction guaranteed or your money back.

They also will operate the help-self laundry next door. This is a 24-hour laundry, open seven days a week. It contains 10 washers and 5 dryers and plenty of change is available during opening hours at the cleaners.

James and Wilma Holloman own a cleaning shop in Albuquerque, N.M. They did own two but sold one a few years ago to a son. Mr. Holloman has been in the cleaning business for 45 years.

John Barnett did work for Fish Construction Co. in Borger, before moving to Clarendon about a year ago. Mr. Holloman is teaching John and Nancy the cleaning business, and will stay in Clarendon until he is satisfied they can run the cleaners to his specifications.

They will have an alteration department, for the being Nancy Barnett will do the work, but later they will have someone else.

They plan on having a grand opening, Monday, July 18th. They wish to invite everyone to come by, inspect their new facility, have coffee, tea and donuts. They will be serving all day.

The cleaners will be open from 8 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Monday thru Friday and until noon on Saturday.

daughters, Jan and Tom Easter, Hollis, Oklahoma; Debbie and Bryan Leeper, Clarendon and Judy and Lori live at home.


New addition being built at high school

If you have driven by the Clarendon High School and Junior High, you have probably noticed some construction taking place. This construction began when school was dismissed for the summer. This new addition will house the Home Economics Department of Clarendon High School with two rooms being designated as a combined classroom and sewing room and a kitchen for their culinary projects. Along with the 1600 square feet Home Economics department, there will be a 600 square feet expansion to the library for added study area and the breezeway will be enclosed making a 250 square feet vestibule providing a place for students to stay before and after school when the weather is bad. The existing double doors entering the school through the breezeway will be brought out four feet and double doors will be placed at the entrance of the vestibule. The contractor for this project is Gail Binkley.

There are also local subcontractors being used in this construction. The estimated cost of the project is \$200,000.

The decision to build came when a committee from the Texas Education Agency reviewed the old building. They recommended that better facilities be provided because of the age of the building although the building was not condemned. It was decided that a new addition would be easier and more economical to maintain than the existing building as the new addition is being built onto the existing school. There are no current plans for the old building.

Registration for school is August 16 and classes start August 17. The cafeteria will be operational by then but the others will not. It is expected that the library will be finished within the first two weeks of school and the Home Economics rooms to be finished in the latter part of September.


Joni Eareckson Tada is well-known to the public as a best-selling author, a recording artist, an accomplished illustrator, as well as an actress.

At the age of seventeen, Joni was the victim of a tragic diving accident which left her paralyzed from the neck down. Her struggles with quadriplegia and depression were chronicled in the book, JONI, which sold over four million copies. A major motion picture of the same name starred Joni playing her own life. The film, as well as Joni's natural acting skills, were highly praised by audiences and critics alike.

Joni's experiences have given her an opportunity to reevaluate her faith, and her priorities in life. Some of these thoughts were revealed in her second best-selling book, A STEP FURTHER. And, to a much greater extent, they are brought into sharper focus in the film series, BLESSINGS OUT OF BROKENNESS.

This film series "offers hope and comfort to those who have personally experienced hurts -- broken homes, broken hearts, broken bodies and broken relationships."

In the four films, Joni discusses these topics: Why the Brokenness?; Where are the Blessings?; Mending Things; and, Healing and Heaven. Included are glimpses of Joni's personal life and her work with other handicapped individuals. These films demonstrate how each of us can play a special healing role in the lives of those around us who are experiencing brokenness.



10% withholding tax at banks delayed

Overwhelming public response is being credited for the delay and almost certain repeal of the unpopular tax withholding law on interest and dividends.

Treasury Secretary Donald

Regan granted a one-month delay in the scheduled start of the tax collection law and acknowledged that the 1982 withholding provision probably will be repealed. The law previously was due to

take effect July 1 but will now be delayed until August 1.

The law would require banks and other financial institutions to withhold 10 percent of interest and divi-

dend payments to promote taxpayer compliance and speed up tax collection.


Sharon Brown of the First National Bank of Amarillo is a member of the American Bankers Association Market-

ing Committee which was instrumental in organizing bank customers for a letter-writing campaign to their legislators.

The campaign was to inform the public and let them know about the tax," Brown said. "We also wanted to give them the opportunity to respond to their legislators."

"We didn't expect the response to be as great as it was, but we knew it would take a broad consumer response to get the bill repealed," Brown said. "I think it is important for the public to understand that if they will speak out, their representatives in Washington will listen."

Bank consumers have been against the tax withholding law because of the loss of income from interest taken from their accounts and because of what many perceive as a further encroachment by big government.

Bankers have been against the law because of the expense of additional paperwork and added pressure on computer operations. They also are concerned about strained customer relations as account holders realize the banks are withholding a portion of the interest.

Kerry Dambaugh, an employee in Jack Hightower's Washington office, agreed that public response has been the major factor in the repeal of the tax law. Hightower has received 13,500 letters from his constituents in the 13th Congressional District.

Dambaugh said the one-month delay in the start of withholding also came about because the public is still confused about what would happen if the law went into effect. The delay would allow time to clear up public confusion, she said.

Hightower co-sponsored the bill in the House of Representatives to repeal the withholding law and has been in favor of repealing the law since its passage, Dambaugh said.

Brown said she believes Secretary Regan instituted the one-month delay also because of public pressure about the expense the Internal Revenue Service is incurring as they prepare for

the new tax—a tax which may never go into effect.

The House voted 342 to 41 last month in favor of a plan to repeal the withholding law outright, and President Reagan had pledged to veto the measure despite its widespread grassroots support.

The Senate voted 86 to 4 in favor of a separate plan to repeal withholding, but the measure includes several other tax programs in addition to the repeal. The bill has been sent to the House and it is expected that the measure will be sent to a joint House-Senate conference committee where legislative differences will be ironed out.

Dambaugh said she believes if the President vetoes the repeal passed by both House and Senate, then Congress will still have enough support to override the veto.

Now with an extra month to work, bank lobbyists are waiting to see whether the House and Senate can resolve the differences between their respective repeal bills.

Industry consensus is that the withholding law will be repealed within the next few weeks. The withholding tax battle is not over, and consumers should watch for developments.


The economic recession, by reducing job opportunities, has prompted more veterans to apply for vocational rehabilitation training benefits.





Extensions available for VA
education benefits

Some Vietnam-era veterans may obtain extensions of eligibility for Veterans Administration education bene-

fits. Public Law 97-306 now allows the VA to extend the eligibility period of certain Vietnam-era veterans (August 5, 1964-May 7, 1975) beyond the usual 10-year

delimiting date. The extension may be granted to veterans who still have some months of entitlement to VA benefits remaining, but who have been discharged for more than 10

years. Eligible veterans who don't have a high school diploma, or the equivalent, may receive an extension to attend that level of training. However, only tuition and fees are paid for high school

or GED training. Further, unskilled veterans may receive an extension in order to pursue vocational, apprenticeship, or on-the-job training. But extensions cannot be granted for veterans to pursue university or college-degree programs.

A previous law provides extensions to veterans who were determined to be unable to enter education or training during their original 10-year eligibility period

because of physical or mental disabilities. Those veterans may receive an extension equal to their period of disability.

Extensions under that earlier law may include those for university or college-degree programs.

Consumer Update

Texas telephone customers soon will experience major changes in the way their telephone services are provided, and how much they must pay for these services.

New regulatory philosophies and technological advances have created a more competitive environment in the telecommunications industry, with numerous companies emerging to offer alternatives to traditional services, especially long distance services.

Most of the changes stem from new rulings by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) and the antitrust agreement between the U.S. Justice Department and American Telephone & Telegraph Co. (AT&T).

Some of the changes we expect have not been finalized yet. But because these changes ultimately will affect every telephone utility ratepayer in Texas, the Public Utility Commission began an investigation and review of the FCC rulings and the antitrust agreement in May 1983.

For nearly 50 years, the offering of basic telephone service at an affordable price to

everyone who wanted it (known as universal service) has been a national goal. The current high level of universal service in Texas and the United States is due largely to a traditional pricing approach where part of the cost of accessing basic telephone service is paid by long distance users.

Today AT&T operating companies (including Southwestern Bell), AT&T's Long Lines Division, and independent phone companies provide local and long distance services in a single network. Through this structure, some costs of providing local phone services are covered by the sharing of long distance revenues.

Local phone companies operate facilities enabling their customers to call across town or across the country. Local or in-state calls are handled by the local phone companies. Out-of-state calls are handled by the AT&T Long Lines Division and local companies, with these costs shared by the local and long distance companies.

Money collected for long distance is used to support basic service. The money is collected through an internal process known as the Bell System's "Division

of Revenues." The internal revenues transfer was developed at a time when AT&T operated as a monopoly and provided most local and long distance services.

One result of the antitrust agreement between AT&T and the Justice Department is that Southwestern Bell and other local operating companies will lose the long distance revenues from the "Division of Revenues" arrangement. Southwestern Bell will not be permitted to offer long distance type service statewide as it does now. They will compensate for this revenue loss at least in part by

charging to connect long distance carriers to the local telephone network. Billing for this process will be known as an access charge.

Southwestern Bell is expected to use changes brought on by FCC rulings and the coming divestiture of AT&T as partial justification for a record rate increase it will seek from the PUC. In reviewing this and other requests, the Commission will work to protect the interests of the ratepaying public, and to explain any changes to the public as they occur.

We'll take a closer look at access charges in our next report.

Q: My husband beats me, curses me and calls me filthy names. I'm scared if I report him, he'll lose his job. I have suggested he go to a counselor, but he just becomes violent. I need some help.

A: If you are serious about interrupting this behavior, there are laws that will help you. You must, however, be prepared to separate by going to a Battered Women's Shelter or by seeking divorce. There are no agencies that can enter your home and stop the beatings; you must leave and take action yourself.

To help you make a decision, there are mental health centers for counseling or your attorney will be able to refer you for help.

Q: In the divorce settlement of community property after ten years of marriage, what rights does the wife have to the husband's railroad retirement pension fund?

A: The duration of the marriage does not affect my answer, because the Supreme Court has ruled that the funds due a worker under the railroad retirement program cannot be attached for the benefit of a divorcing spouse. In the 1979 Hisquierdo case, the Court also held that there could not be an offsetting award to the non-employee spouse to compensate for the retirement.

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
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
