Local Youth To Collect For CROP Sat. Nite

Local young people of six different churches will be among thousands of CROP workers in the state Saturday night "Halloween" making the door to door call seeking "treats" for needy people abroad. CROP is the Community Resources Program of Church World Service and collect food, fiber and cash in communities throughout the United States for the World relief programs of the churches.

Rev. Bob Ely, pastor of the Methodist Church and local chairman, reported that local youth would meet at the Methodist Church at 5:30 Saturday afternoon to make the house-to-house canvass and are to report back to the church after the drive is made. You are asked not to give to a person unless the solicitor is identified with the CROP orange-yellow identification tag bearing the "Freedom from Hunger" symbol.

DELUGE OF RAIN AND HAIL HIT AREA SAT.

Clarendon's rain total climbed Saturday afternoon and night when a 2.10 deluge of rain and hail were recorded. This was one of the more washing rains of the year and more high water was in evidence.

Hail was reported spotted over most of the county but damage was not reported very heavy although farmers lost quite a bit of open cotton. Ranchers were happy to see the downpour as surface tanks were filled in many instances. The moisture was of great help to the winter grain crop and prospective winter pasture.

EX-STUDENT QUEEN TO BE ELECTED

Honor classes at the annual C.H.S. Homecoming this year will be those of 1910, 1920, 1930, 1940, 1950, and 1960 and as has been the custom in the past, a Homecoming Queen will be elected from candidates representing each of these classes.

All indications point to a big turn-out for the general election which will be held nation-wide Tuesday, November 3rd. Up thru Wednesday morning, P. C. Messer, County Clerk, reported 80 absentee ballots were cast which is a sizeable amount for this time of the year. He is reminding everyone that Friday is the last day to cast an absentee ballot.

Mr. Messer also pointed out that the voting places in the county would be the same as usual for the exception of here in town where residents of the west side of town will vote at the Court House and residents of the East side will vote at the Youth Canteen.

According to results of a local political poll and previous presidential elections, Donley County, in all probability, will go strong Republican again this time. In the past three presidential elections, the County went Republican with a landslide for Eisenhower and in the last Presidential election Nixon polled 941 votes to Kennedy's 753.

The results of the local Republican Committee poll of 73 percent of the county Monday and Tuesday nights, the remaining 27 percent to be polled Wednesday, the results showed 43% for Goldwater, 36% for Johnson and 21% undecided; In the poll for United States Senator, George Bush received 56%, Yarborough 32% and 12% were undecided; in the poll for Congressman, Walter Rogers received 43%, Bob Price 29% and 28% were undecided.

This indicates further that there will be lots of people voting the split ticket. If you are not voting a straight party ticket, you may vote for any candidate of any party you wish and the ballot will be counted just as long as you mark through the names of all other candidates running for the particular office in other columns on the ballot. If you are voting a straight party ticket, be sure to mark through from top to bottom, all other columns on the ballot.

In addition to public offices, Texans will be voting on three constitutional amendments.

If you are a qualified voter, be sure to go to the polls next Tuesday and cast your ballot.

## SAFETY HINTS ON COTTON PICKERS

Safe operation of a mechanical cotton picker means following a few simple precautions, says Beverly G. Reeves, cotton ginning and mechanization specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Taking the picking drums out of gear before getting off the picker is the first rule. Service and adjust the picker head only when it is out of gear, advises Reeves, and remember to replace all safety shields when it is necessary to remove them. Also, lock the basket in the dump position when servicing the engine.

When turning at the ends of rows, raise the picking unit to its highest position but do so only at half throttle or less, recommends the specialist.

Since cotton pickers have a high center of gravity and turn over easily, extreme care should be used when operating or turning the picker near ditches. Reeves points out that step downgrades, such as ramps used to load or unload the machine, should be approached by backing.

Avoid applying the brakes quickly while traveling on roads. A mechanical picker is a heavy machine, explains the specialist, and is hard to stop.

These simple suggestions have been proved by manufacturers and in the field, says Reeves. A few minutes devoted to safety can protect the cotton picker as well as the operator.

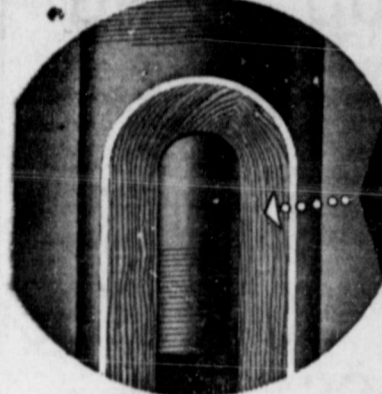

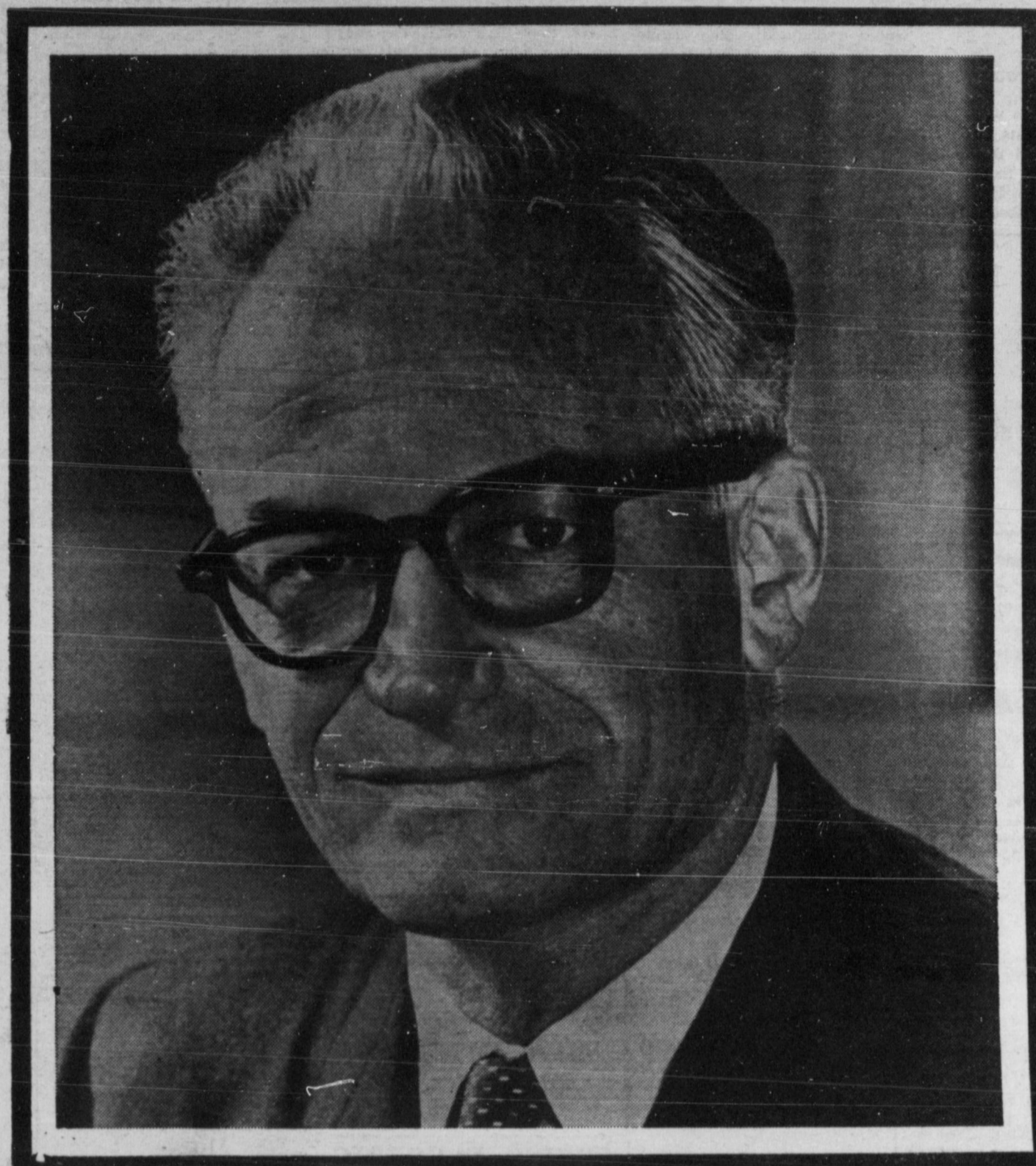

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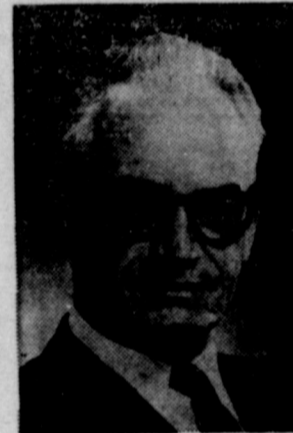
