Ag week to focus on problems of family farmers

Zeroing in on the economic difficulties of Texas family farmers and ranchers, Governor Mark White and Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower have issued a joint proclamation declaring March 18-24 "Texas Agriculture Week."

The observance will coincide with National Agriculture Week and with National Agriculture Day, March 21. Hightower said the Agriculture Department will be sponsoring a series of activities during the week. Plans include agricultural exhibits in the State Capitol rotunda, a March 19 Agriculture Fair in conjunction with the Austin-Travis County Livestock Show and Rodeo, a House/Senate cow-milking contest and a major farm policy statement by White and Hightower.

"This is not a celebration," White cautioned. "You don't celebrate when people are in trouble, and our farmers and ranchers are in serious trouble. This observance is to call to the public's attention the plight

of our family farmers and ranchers and, hopefully, to rally public support for steps we can take to turn things around for them, whether it's here or in Washington."

"This observance is not just for rural folks," Hightower explained. "It's for all of us. The food and fiber industry accounts for one out of every five jobs in Texas, in both urban and rural areas, and our farmers and ranchers are the biggest consumers in the state. When the farm economy is depressed--and it's certainly depressed now--it directly affects the economy of the entire state. We've all got a stake in reviving our farm and ranch economy, and it's not enough to sit around and wring our hands. There's a job to be done, and I'm especially pleased that the Governor is eager to work closely with us on turning things around for our family farmers and ranchers. And this proclamation is our invitation to all Texans to join with us in the effort."

A JOINT PROCLAMATION BY THE GOVERNOR AND THE AGRICULTURE COMMISSIONER OF THE STATE OF TEXAS

WHEREAS, our family farmers and ranchers are the most efficient and productive in the world, and

WHEREAS, the production, transportation and marketing of agricultural food and fiber is the second largest industry in Texas, generating \$37 billion a year and accounting for one out of every five jobs, and

WHEREAS, family farmers and ranchers are the source of our agricultural abundance, but are not presently receiving a fair return for their productivity, and

WHEREAS, current market prices for agricultural products actually are far below what it costs to produce those products, putting thousands of Texas farmers and ranchers in imminent danger of foreclosure, through no fault of their own, and

WHEREAS, every Texan has a direct stake in restoring prosperity to our family farm and ranch system so future generations also can benefit from the unparalleled output of these entrepreneurs,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that we, the Governor and the Agriculture Commissioner of the State of Texas, do hereby pledge our offices and our best efforts to the task of cultivating a new prosperity in the Texas farm and ranch economy, and to mark this pledge, we do hereby

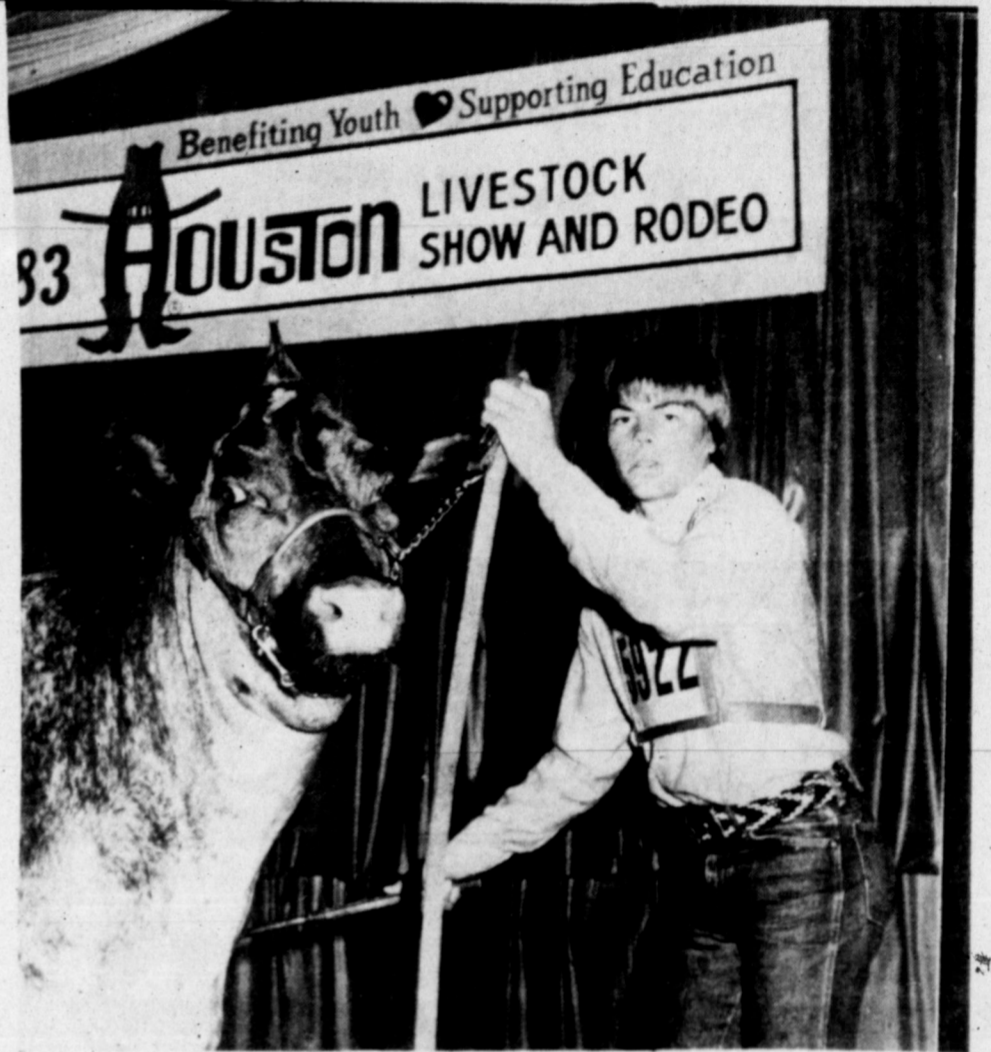
PROCLAIM the week of March 18 through March 24 to be

Do you need to vote absentee?

Voting is one of the world's oldest and most abused governmental privileges. Many feel that voting is a waste of time since their one little vote couldn't possibly do any good one way or the other. Many, on the other hand, feel that they can "stuff the ballot box" and swing the election outcome their way. Some practice voting as it has been given us by our government; one man, one vote. And it works.

Since many of our places are not contended this term, or perhaps there are only two running for one place, most folks around here tend to forego their Constitutional right and privilege and NOT vote. "Either one is fine with me," they are heard to mutter, "It's just too silly to come all of the way to the election location just to vote when either one is just fine." Bilge water!

Absentee voting for these elections at Howardwick will be conducted March 14 through March 29 at the Howardwick City Hall from 9-5.

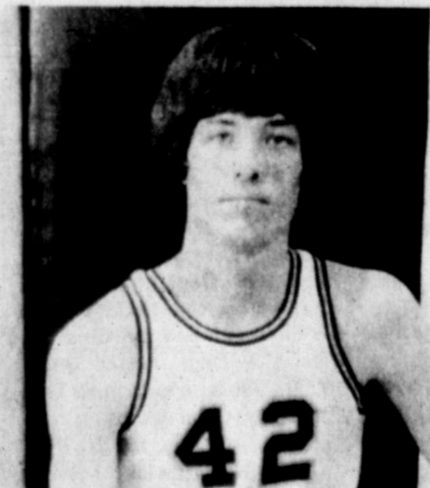
DONLEY COUNTY HOSPITAL BOARD

Crump named to all district

Ray Crump was one of ten boys named to the 1982-83 District 2-AA All District basketball Team. He led Clarendon in scoring with a 14.0 average. High high games were against Wellington (32 points) and Memphis (30 points).

Named to the Honorable Mention team were Clarendon senior Kelly Hill, a 6'3 post, and David Weatherton, a 5'10 guard. Hill led the team in rebounds with a 10.0 average, and Weatherton led in assists with an 8.0 average. Hill also scored 9.0 points per game, and Weatherton was the team's best defensive player.

The 1982-83 Clarendon Broncos finished the season with a 7-18 record. They won the Consolation Championship at the Claude Tourna-

ment and finished fourth in the district with a record of 4-6.

Two starters return for next year's team. They are 6'3 post Arlis Thomas and 5'11 forward Johnny Gaines.

The "sixth man" also returns; he is 5'10 guard Richard Gaines. Lettermen Doug Walker, a 5'7 guard, and Rodney Smith, a 6'0 forward also return next year.

Residents of the Clarendon area will have an opportunity to influence the course of alcoholism treatment programs in the Panhandle during a hearing scheduled for Monday March 21 in Clarendon. The hearing will be held at 10:00 in the Donley County Courthouse.

During the hearing, representatives of the Amarillo Council on Alcoholism and the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission will explain programs and answer questions from the audience. Clarendon is the site for one of the hearings because it is also the location of one of the Amarillo MH/MR's Regional Family Service Centers. The family service centers provide referral and follow-up support to the Panhandle Alcoholism Recovery Center.

Don Pipes, representing the alcohol council, will explain the need for area councils on alcoholism. Because Pipes' council is responsible for all client intake and referral for alcoholism programs in the region.

Olives and olive oil are precious trade commodities in the lands east of us. But olive oil can do more than come between the food and the pan. Pure olive oil has no cholesterol and adds a fine, light, yet distinctive flavor to foods.

STEAK ROLLITINI
1/2 C plus 2 TBS olive oil
1/2 C red wine vinegar
1 tsp dried thyme
1 tsp dried basil
2 bay leaves
salt and pepper to taste
1 3 lb round steak, cut and flattened to 1/4" thick
1 C dry bread crumbs
1 egg
1 C chopped spinach
4 oz. sliced mushrooms
3/4 C chopped onion

4 carrots halved and sliced into 1" lengths
4 oz Italian salami, chopped
4 oz Mozzarella cheese, shredded
2 C tomato sauce
Combine vinegar, 1/4 C oil and seasonings; pour over meat in shallow bowl. Let stand 2 hours or more to marinate. Mix 1/2 C oil with balance of ingredients except for tomato sauce, and spread on marinated meat. Roll and tie with string.

In oven-proof skillet or Dutch oven, heat remaining oil until it bubbles, brown rolled steak, about 5 minutes. Add sauce and reserved marinade; bake at 350 until tender, about 1 hour.
CHICKEN OLIVETTE

1 C ripe olives
1 C dairy sour cream
1/2 C milk
1 1/2 C grated Swiss cheese
2 TBS chopped pimiento
1 TBS instant minced onion
1/2 tsp salt
1/2 tsp nutmeg
1/8 tsp nutmeg
1/8 tsp pepper
4 oz noodles
1 pkg chopped frozen broccoli, thawed
2 C cubed cooked chicken
1/2 C bread crumbs
2 TBS melted oleo

Cut olives into large wedges. Mix cream, milk, cheese, pimiento, onion, salt nutmeg and pepper. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly until cheese melts. Cook noodles according to package instructions or until just tender; drain. In 1 1/2 qt baking dish, gently mix noodles, ripe olives, broccoli, chicken and cheese sauce. Toss bread crumbs in melted butter, sprinkle on casserole.

UP FOR ADOPTION

Drugs used to treat the so-called "rare" diseases such as Lou Gehrig's Disease, Huntington's Disease and Cystic Fibrosis are often called "orphan drugs" because the cost of developing, testing, and marketing usually outweighs anticipated profits. There simply aren't enough people who need these drugs to make it worthwhile for drug manufacturers to produce such medicines.

With drug development costs now averaging over 50 million dollars, companies have been slow to adopt these needed agents. Congress has recognized this problem and recently passed a bill which will give tax credits and tax deductions to drug companies to cover part of the costs of orphan drug testing. In addition, a federal grand program will be put into place to stimulate further development of new orphans.

Another feature of the ORPHAN DRUG ACT will protect marketing rights of companies who test naturally occurring substances that have, in the past, been difficult, if not impossible, to patent. The signing of the ORPHAN DRUG ACT into law during January may increase the number of drug orphans. Hopefully it will also reduce the number of drugs that are UP FOR ADOPTION.
