
#### Public hearing for needs of elderly May 27

Bourland says governments started when our tribal hunter ancestors made rules to divide up game, such as antelope, with the tastiest part - the liver - always going to the chief.

Since then rules have become exceedingly complet, but the leaders still get the best part of the take. As a consequence, all govern-

ments become corupt and end up serving politicans and bureaucrats rather than the people.

Inevitably economic depressions follow as the governmental apparatus swallow more and more income in non-productive services, and the state eventually collases. this is the lesson of history over and over, and the United States now seems to be going the same way, according to Bourland.

He proposes a bold, if idealistic solution: a non-violent revolutionary restructuring of our entire political system.He would have us follow the example of today's peaceful and prosperous Switzerland, which he believes is the states closest to a "pure" or direct democracy where power is in the: hands of the hunters, not the

tribal chiefs. He wants citizens to make laws directly as one vast legislature instead of delegating that power to elected representatives. The executive branch would be strickly limited to implementing the people's mandate.

This reform requires, of course, fundamental constitutional amendments to ensure popular control of all lawmaking and of national and local budgets. Direct democraey, he claims, is now technically possible for the first time in history through the use of television and computers whereby information is available to everyone and millions of votes can be promptly tallied on any

Whether you agree or disagree with Bourland, the issue of govern-mental reform and reduction of the bureaucracy is going to be with us a long time.

If you wish to learn more about what you might do to make governemtn more responsive to the people, get a copy of "Who Gets the Antelope's Liver?" The bok is written in an entertaing journalistic style that is easy



# Animal Oddities

There are more than 58 million hogs on farms in the United States, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The leading hog raising state? Iowa, with more than 14 million hogs. The leading horse raising state is Texas with more than 600,000 horses. That state raises the most beef cattle also, reports the Department of Agriculture, with over 13 million. The leading chicken raising state is Georgia, which raises over 441 million each year. Ar-kansas is a close second with more than 433 million broilers raised.

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Among the many items manufactured for the livestock industry in the United States are hog holders, ear punches, cattle prods, calf pullers, electric brands, tattoo inks and ear notchers. One pioneer in animal identification and grooming products is Stone Mfg. & Supply Co. of Kansas City, which developed a tattoo iron that is shaped like a pliers and easily held in one hand. Letters or nu-

merals are made of many sharp steel points which can be easily slid in and out of the face of the tool by loosening one screw. That com-

pany has announced the formation of a new company called "Stone of Denver, Inc.," which recently purchased real estate, buildings and metal fabrication equipment formerly owned by Franklin Laboratories. Along with the additional product line of electric brands, cattle prods and other instruments, the new facilities provide a closer shipping point for equipment going to the live-stock industry in the western states.

According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, in the year 1980 there were 60 million cattle on farms, 58 million hogs and about 18 million horses and mules. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, there are now about 2.7 million farm workers in the United States out of about 100.3 million employed Americans.

Regular use during "asthama season" can help prevent or reduce the intensity of asthma symptoms. Furthermore, the inhalers can be obtained from the pharmacies in one's hometown or the pharmacies in other cities when traveling. Individuals taking the tablet or liquid form of metaproterenol must still obtain prescriptions from their physicians to obtain these oral dosage forms.

also have to remember that the potential for additional fatalities during any holiday weekend is great and we must adjust our driving habits and attitudes accordingly."


A total of 58 traffic deaths resulted from accidents during the Memorial Day weekend in 1982.
