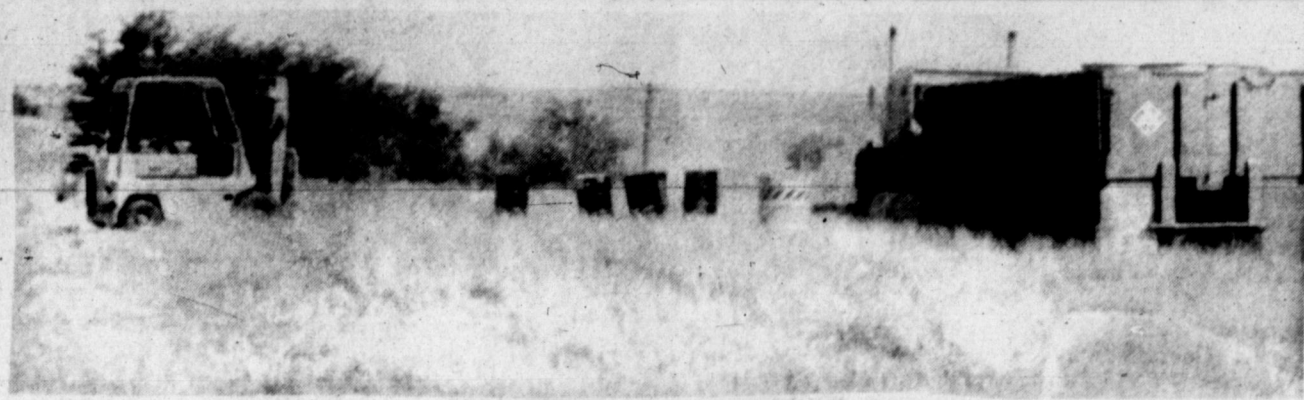

## Authorities handle potential explosive situation

Saturday morning at 12:30 the driver of a chemical truck from Pierpoint, ND stopped at the Kerr-McGee station to go into Allsup's for coffee. He made a routine check of his load and discovered that two barrels seams had begun to leak.

The driver of the rig was Robert Crocker of Dayton. He is the owner and operator of the truck which he has leased to Ormston Transportation out of Houston. The chemicals came from the Killdeer, ND Benz Oil Co. and was being transported to the AMACO plant in Houston.

As per instructions on his manifest, the driver called the 24 hour number in Washington, D.C. for instructions from the Environmental Agency offices. Within a short period of time, information is supposed to come to the driver on what to do and how to handle the situation. However, it was several hours before authorities here even knew what type of chemical was spilling. When the instructions did arrive, the Volunteer Fire Department, the highway and sheriff's department and the ambulance were all standing by. The chemicals,

it turned out, were highly flammable. Traffic had been re-routed around the site to avoid possible contamination or ignition of potentially dangerous chemical fumes. Because of this precaution and

other extra measures to keep people and vehicles away, a possible accidental ignition of the chemical was avoided. A cautious driver, organized local authorities and the time of day all added up to an uneventful accident.

Any profit earned from the Bingo games will be returned to the Community in Lions Club projects.

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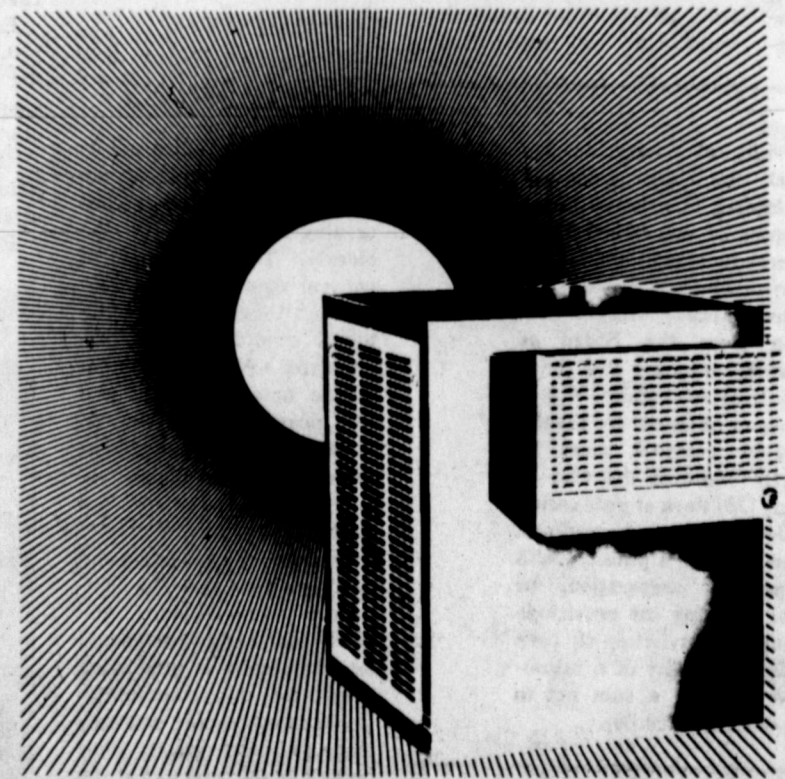

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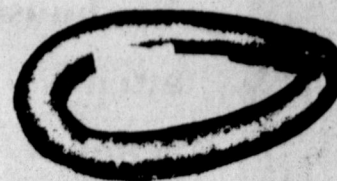

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# Home Town man publishes book

George Bourland grew up in Clarendon, attended high school, and Clarendon college, then went on to graduate from the Navy Academy. He has lived on Guam since World War II. George and his wife Petey has two daughters.

He dedicated this book to Coach John G. Hutton, a former football coach in Clarendon. Coach Hutton married the former Josephine Murphy, sister of Evelyn Murphy Moore of Clarendon. Coach Hutton and Josephine live in Lubbock.

Friends will remember George as the son of Mac Bourland, brothers, Fred and Dr. Jimmy Bourland, sisters Lotta Bourland Davis and Neva Bourland Baldwin. George and his wife are in the states to attend a family reunion in Lampasas, Texas, at the home of his sister Neva, the first week in June.

This is a copy of the book review which was written by Robert F. Rogers, University of Guam and published in the Guam News Paper. It is not every day, every week, or even every year that someone on Guam writes a book. It is even rarer that such a book concerns the entire United States instead of just local island matters. Such a book, with the

intriguing title, "Who Gets the Antelope's Liver?" is now on sale at Guam's bookstores. The author is George Bourland, a local businessman. He examines an issue which concerns everyone of us: what can be done to make government better serve the average citizen - who is being smothered by laws, taxes, and debts - instead of primarily helping politicians and special interest who get rich at taxpayer's expense?

To answer that question Bourland surveys a broad spectrum of governments throughout history all the way from ancient Egypt up to the present day United States. Bourland says governments started when our tribal hunter ancestors made rules to divide up game, such as antelope, with the tastiest part - the liver - always going to the chief. Since then rules have become exceedingly complex, but the leaders still get the best part of the take. As a consequence, all govern-

ments become corrupt and end up serving politicians and bureaucrats rather than the people. Inevitably economic depressions follow as the governmental apparatus swallow more and more income in non-productive services, and the state eventually collapses. This is the lesson of history over and over, and the United States now seems to be going the same way, according to Bourland.

He proposes a bold, if idealistic solution: a non-violent revolutionary restructuring of our entire political system. He would have us follow the example of today's peaceful and prosperous Switzerland, which he believes is the states closest to a "pure" or direct democracy where power is in the hands of the hunters, not the tribal chiefs.

He wants citizens to make laws directly as one vast legislature instead of delegating that power to elected representatives. The executive branch would be strictly limited to implementing the people's mandate.

This reform requires, of course, fundamental constitutional amendments to ensure popular control of all lawmaking and of national and local budgets. Direct democracy, he claims, is now technically possible for the first time in history through the use of television and computers whereby information is available to everyone and millions of votes can be promptly tallied on any issue.

Whether you agree or disagree with Bourland, the issue of governmental reform and reduction of the bureaucracy is going to be with us a long time. If you wish to learn more about what you might do to make government more responsive to the people, get a copy of "Who Gets the Antelope's Liver?" The book is written in an entertaining journalistic style that is easy to read.

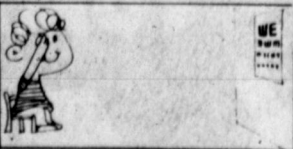

The proposal to the City from Southland Properties, that they will make a payment of \$10,000.00 to be used to expand the present fire station instead of building another fire station in Nocona Hills as they had planned to do in exchange for a letter stating that the City does release them from any further responsibility of building a fire station in Nocona Hills, was accepted. The City feels that better fire protection can be given by consolidating the fire department at the one location.

Panhandle Steel Buildings' bid on the construction of the fire station addition was accepted. This addition will double the size of the fire station.

The City has recently purchased a maintainer, a roller, a dump truck, a flat bed trailer and a back hoe with a front end loader. Extensive work on the streets is planned for this year and this work has been started. The new street name signs will be put up soon, the community building will be painted and a boat dock will be built at the boat ramp area.

Southland Properties is deeding lots #7 through #13 Nocona Hills and lost #320 through #332 Cherokee to the City. They are leasing the swimming pool from the City and will be operating it this summer.

The Howardwick City Council met in emergency called session at the City Hall on Saturday May 21. This meeting was called because of the urgent public necessity that a decision be made immediately to solve the water drainage problem between Janny Drive and Olita Drive and between Sherwood Drive and Swanson Street. Those present were Mayor Lee Roy Jackson; Aldermen Charlie Boren, Stony Craft, Waldon Moore and H.L. Tipton; Secretary Connie Milam and five guests.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Lee Roy Jackson and the invocation was led by A.J. Bureson.

son, more motorists will be exposed to highway driving hazards," Adams said. "Feeding the traffic laws, wearing seat belts, and staying alert for drunk drivers is the best defense for avoiding an accident."

The DPS director requested the assistance of Texas drivers in minimizing traffic deaths. "Statewide traffic fatalities are now about 13 percent below the number for the same period last year," Adams pointed out. "But we

also have to remember that the potential for additional fatalities during any holiday weekend is great and we must adjust our driving habits and attitudes accordingly." "A total of 58 traffic deaths resulted from accidents during the Memorial Day weekend in 1982. "Troopers will be on the lookout for hazardous violations over the Memorial Day weekend in an effort to prevent accidents and we do not intend to relax our efforts
