



Weekly, workers in all 24 highway districts note where flowers are blooming and, via computer, share the information with other highway department offices. Wildflower seekers can call department headquarters in Austin, one of the 12 Texas tourist bureaus, or the nearest district office, and talk to a person -- not a recording -- about where the flowers are.

The program, now in its third year, is one way the department tries to make driving a more pleasant experience for Texas travelers. Through vegetation management, landscaping, and propagation of native plants, highway department experts cooperate with nature to avoid erosion, minimize "highway hypnosis," and keep Texas highways some of the most beautiful around.
