Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL
AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED
ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE
HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963.
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION

NO. 1 proposing an arendment to Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF

ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution to the State of Texas be amended to read, respectively, as follows:
"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have ratianed the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citisen of the United States and who shall have resided in this state one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces; and provided further, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered if required by law to do so. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. This Amendment shall take effect on December 1, 1963.

"Section 4. In all elections by the people the vote shall be by secret but lot. The Legislature shall provide for the numbering of ballots and maisuch other regulations as may necessary to detect and punish frame the people of the people of

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF
TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 49-b. Article III of the Constitution of Texas,
be amended so the same will hereafter read as follows:
"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior
Amendments to this Constitution,
there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas

Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation to the same extent and in the same manner as are purchasers of lands dedicated to the Permanent Free Public School Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by said Board in such quantities, on such terms, at such prices, at such rates of interest and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law to Texas veterans who served not less than ninety (90) continuous days, unless sooner discharged by reason of a service-connected disability, on active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard or Marine Corps of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1955, and who upon the date of filing his or her application to purchase any such land is a citizen of the United States, is a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and has not been dishonorably discharged from any branch of the Armed Forces above-named and who at the time of his or her enilament, induction, commissioning, or drafting was a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law.



Union said it would appeal the decision. COTTON - Texas cotton

farmers planted 670,000 fewer acres this year than in 1962, U.S. Department of Agriculture reports.

Decline amounted to 9.7% which is more than the national decrease of 9.0%. Reduction, made in compliance with the federal control program, would mean a cut of about 476,000 bales in the state's cotton prosame as last year.

POLL TAXES - Folks who are past 60 and living in towns with 10,000 or more population should get their poll tax exemptions on October 1 or as soon as possible thereafter.

Exemptions for those over 60 are free under the old law, which will be in effect at least until November 9. That's the date for the vote on repeal of the poll tax as a voting requirement.

If Texans vote FOR the repeal, those over 60 who live in towns above 10,000 population then will have to pay a 25-cent registration fee. Ditto for all voters under 60.

Those past 60 who live in 10,000 population will not be arfected by the changes. They can vote without paying under both the old and the new law.

The attorney general informed tax assessor-collectors that they must accept the \$1.75 poll tax payments, starting on October 1, from those who insist on paying rather than waiting to see if the charge will be cut to 25 cents by the November 9 vote.







AUSTIN, Texas, July 31, 1963 -More than two-thirds of the Texas highway system will come under the new 70-miles-per-hour daytime maximum speed for passenger cars which becomes effective August 23, the Texas Highway Commission revealed today.

Under the speed control law passed by the Legislature this spring, all highways not zoned down by the Commission will automatically go to the new 70mph speed August 23. This means state-maintained highway sys-

a Minute Order which zoned some 18,640 miles of the highway system at a maximum of 60 miles per hour daytime and 55 miles per hour at night for pasa 70-miles-per-hour maximum.

The Commission's action followed a series of engineering traffic studies conducted throughout the state by the Highway Department's 25 highway districts.

A large percentage of Texas' vast Farm to Market Road System will come under the 70-mph maximum, although some of these roads (and some of the Clyde Gilbert. older primary routes) will be restricted to the lower 60 mph maximum where conditions war-
