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## Lee Palmer Elected To Head Local Outdoor Entertainment Association

At a meeting of the Outdoor Entertainment Association Monday night in the District Court Room, Lee Palmer, prominent Goodnight rancher, was elected to head the organization for the coming year. Pete Borden, local bootmaker, was selected as vice-president and Bill Todd, local furniture and appliance dealer, was chosen to serve the organization as secretary-treasurer. A complete list of directors will be selected at a later meeting this fall. The group voted to increase the number of directors from 10 to 15.

A financial statement for the past year was submitted to the group by Bill Porter which showed the annual celebration was a financial success as well as one of the best entertainments held here in recent years.

The financial statement which appears on Page 2, this issue of the Leader, shows a net profit for 1963 at \$3,195.99. The swimming pool total at present is \$3,329.63 and the over-all total of cash on deposit is \$6,470.56. Porter also reported there was no indebtedness against the grounds or arena. This is a very good record for the organization in face of the various obstacles and drought conditions which confronted the group this year.

Lee Palmer, the new president, stated that plans would get underway within the near future for an all-out first class celebration next year.

ON JULY 27, 1953 at 10 AM three years of conflict came to an end as Lt Gen William K. Harrison, Jr., chief UN delegate and Gen Nam II, Communist representative sign the armistice at Panmunjom. The uneasy peace came only after two years of painfully slow negotiation. UN forces and the world waited for 18 million words to be spoken at 575 regular meetings before terms were reached. "We have won an armistice on a single battleground," warned President Eisenhower at the time of the agreement, "not peace in the world. We may not now relax our guard nor relax our quest."

### Cotton And Feed Grain Performance

The measurements for cotton, feed grain and diverted acres are about 90% complete in the field and 75% complete in the county office. A firm ASCS-590, Notice of Acreage, will be mailed to each producer as soon as the measurements are complete in the office. Farmers who receive notice of excess cotton or feed grain or deficient diverted acres are reminded that they will only have 15 days from the date of their notice to adjust such acreage.

### County And Community Committee Election

The County and Community Committee elections will be coming up in September. Each community committee is responsible for establishing a slate of not less than 6 eligible nominees for community committeemen. Petitions signed by 6 or more eligible voters nominating persons for membership on the committee will be received at the county office at any time before August 23, 1963. Nominees must be eligible voters, willing to serve, and should be currently active farmers or ranchers, representative of the types of agriculture in this county. After the election of the community committee, a county convention will be held to elect the county committee. Delegates to the county convention will be the elected chairmen of the community committee. Present county committeemen are W. H. Cooke, III, Chairman, Horace A. Green, Vice-Chairman, Dennis R. Lindley, Member, Wm. R. Christal, First Alternate and David Bennett, Second Alternate.

### Greenbelt Directors Vote To Accept Crowell

The directors of the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority voted to accept the city of Crowell into the Authority, pending action by the Texas Water Commission (TWC) during a meeting held at Childress Thursday night.

The TWC will decide if Crowell may join the Authority at a meeting later on in the year. If the state body approves the action, Crowell will hold a separate election to vote in water contracts.

Jack Morris of the R. A. Underwood Company, Greenbelt fiscal agents, reported to the directors that the survey of the cities records has been completed and a complete report would be ready in about "two or three weeks" pending "a little more work on one or two towns."

The reports will be submitted when complete, to the TWC for approval, and then, if approved, will be submitted to the member towns city councils for approval and an election date to be called.

"Once all the work is completed, each city will then know the exact rate for the water and the election can then be called," Dr. S. H. Townsend, president of the Authority stated.

"We still feel the contracts will be ready for a vote of the people by the end of August," he said.

Paul Wellman again proves that writing about real people and real happenings can make more entertaining and better reading than out and out fiction. History does not have to be dull and boring. In fact since it is so important to all of us it should be made interesting and exciting. Writers like Paul Wellman are doing their part in pointing the way toward history that is as alive as today's news.

Although "Magnificent Destiny" by Paul Wellman is an absorbing novel its background is events from our past history. Quoting: "... Magnificent Destiny" is not just a story of events. It is the exciting human drama of people — the people who brought those events into being.

"It is primarily the story of two men — their relationship to each other — and to history. Their names are known, of course, to every schoolchild. But in this remarkable book you will come to know them as very hu-

man beings." "Andrew Jackson is one of the men."

"... Jackson's magnetic, dynamic personality, and his political brilliance enabled him — almost singlehanded — to take a vague concept — Manifest Destiny — and mould it into a lasting reality."

"The other hero of this book is the tall, strikingly handsome, chestnut-haired Sam Houston." "... You will learn Houston's fascinating personal story... why he waited so long before marrying, why he chose at length a blond Tennessee belle, eighteen-year-old Eliza Allen — a girl who came close to destroying Houston."

He was Governor Houston and a famous military hero when he married Eliza. When she left him he was broken a man who retreated to his own secret world of drink and Indian drugs and idleness... retreated, and disintegrated as a man, until he was saved through the love of an Indian girl."

There have been reams written about so much pressure being put on our young folks to win, no matter how or what

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PUBLIC NOTICE

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 16 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, in order to increase the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans Land Board to Three Hundred Fifty Million Dollars (\$350,000,000); providing for the issuance of such bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans Land Fund; and providing for the election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas, performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finance. One (1) of the members shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizens shall be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount, in such form, and under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Three Hundred Fifty Million Dollars (\$350,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund. Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest; shall be issued in such forms, denominations and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; shall be issued and sold at such times and at such places, and in such installments as may be determined by said Board; and shall bear a rate of interest as may be fixed by said Board but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds may not exceed four and one-half percent (4½%). All bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, be approved by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser or pur-

chaser, be negotiable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas; and all bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board, in order to prevent default in the payment of principal or interest on any such bonds, the Legislature shall appropriate a sufficient amount to pay the same.

"In the sale of any such bonds or obligations, the Veterans Land Board shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Endowment Funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Teacher School Funds.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund shall consist of any lands heretofore or hereafter purchased by said Board, until the sale price therefor, together with any interest and penalties due, have been received by said Board (although nothing herein shall be construed to prevent said Board from accepting full payment for a portion of any tract), and of the moneys attributable to any such lands heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board which moneys so attributable shall include but not be limited to the proceeds from the issuance and sale of such bonds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with such proceeds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with other moneys attributable to such lands, or rights therein, and any other moneys, rents, royalties, and any other pecuniary benefit received by said Board from any such lands; sums received by way of indemnity or forfeiture for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any such bonds to comply with his bid and accept and pay for such bonds; and the proceeds of any lands comprising a part of said Fund which are sold or otherwise disposed of for any such lands; and interest received from investments of any such moneys.

"The principal and interest on the bonds heretofore issued by said Board shall be paid out of the moneys of said Fund in conformity with the Constitutional provisions authorizing the issuance of such bonds; and the principal and interest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be invested in bonds or obligations of the United States until such funds are needed for such purposes.

"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund and not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such moneys as may be necessary to retire all of the bonds which portion shall be set aside and retained for the purpose of paying the interest on such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of reason of his anticipatory character.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 2. Every person subject to the payment of the poll tax who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this state one year next preceding an election shall be eligible to vote in the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces; and provided further, before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered if required by the Legislature, and the Legislature may authorize absentee voting. This Amendment shall take effect on December 1, 1963.

"Section 4. In all elections by the people the vote shall be by secret ballot. The Legislature shall provide for the numbering of ballots and make such other regulations as may be necessary to detect and punish fraud and to insure the purity of elections, and may provide by law for the registration of all voters. Should the Legislature enact a registration law in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such law shall not be in violation of the foregoing character."

"Section 5. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1963, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of reason of his anticipatory character."

"AGAINST the amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of reason of his anticipatory character."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1963, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of reason of his anticipatory character."

"AGAINST the amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of reason of his anticipatory character."

"This Amendment being intended only to establish a basis for the treatment of the Veterans' Land Program, there is hereby proposed to the Legislature full power to implement and effectuate the design and object of this Amendment, including the power to delegate such duties, responsibilities, functions, and authority to the Veterans' Land Board as it believes necessary.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this Amendment, no such laws shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1963, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to increase the Veterans' Land Fund by \$150,000,000; said Fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1945; such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law"; and

"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to increase the Veterans' Land Fund by \$150,000,000; said Fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas and delivered to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1945; such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

"If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of the Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date set forth in said Amendment, and the Governor shall issue proclamation keeping therewith.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this state.

## AUGUST PLENTIFUL FOODS FOR TEXAS

COLLEGE STATION — Careful grocery shoppers can look to five plentiful foods as they plan summer-perfect menus this August, reports the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Summer vegetables and canned tuna are featured on the

official August list of plentiful, as determined by the U.S. Department of Agriculture in cooperation with growers and the food trade.

Also expected to be in supply that exceeds normal needs are watermelons, peanuts, and salad and cooking oils.

Supplies of specific summer vegetables will vary at different markets of the state. Generally, though, look for an abundance of tomatoes, sweet corn, green beans, beets, cabbage and lettuce. "Good buys" also will prevail on a number of in-season local vegetables.

Canned tuna joins the list because heavy inventories have caused concern among folks of the tuna industry. They're conducting a nation-wide promotion program that means economical purchases for consumers. Tuna is an ideal hot-weather meat, for sandwiches, salads, casseroles and other uses.

Watermelon supplies are expected to be at least as large as a year ago. Peanut foods, including peanut butter, are perfect summer snack items. Stocks of salad and cooking oils are about 700 million pounds larger than normal.

Wise shoppers can take advantage of the abundance of these plentiful foods by serving them often and generously. Lower prices and wider choice of quality usually accompany abundance.

**AUSTIN** — Gov. John Connally says Texas is making a lot of progress on civil rights without demonstration and disturbances. He urged Texans to avoid the trouble which is plaguing other states.

Roy Evens, secretary of Texas State AFL-CIO, indicated mass demonstration are needed in Lower Rio Grande Valley to improve working conditions of Mexican workers. Connally commented such statements are irresponsible and inflammatory.

Governor also rejected labor's appeal for a special session of the Legislature to abolish right-to-work law and enact state minimum wage, saying he saw "no need, emergency or desirability" for such a session.

Evans said labor's traditional role is to try to inflame people against injustice, and he intends to keep in trying to do that.

**QUICK CHANGE** — From one of the unpaid boss jobs to a \$16,500-a-year assistantship is the story of Dr. J. B. Copeland of San Antonio.

When the Legislature created the new job of deputy commissioner of the Health Department, Dr. Copeland resigned as chairman of the State Board of Health to accept the job of deputy commissioner. He had been Board Chairman for the past 10 years.

Governor Connally named Dr. N. L. Barker of Paris to replace Dr. Copeland. He reappointed Dr. Elmer Baum of Austin and named Dr. John M. Smith of San Antonio and I. D. Flores of Floresville, a pharmacist, to the Board of Health.

**APPOINTMENTS** — Connally made other appointments, among them: S. A. Kerr of Huntsville and

Dr. Joe A. Nelson of Weatherford, reappointments, and David A. Kimbell, Wichita Falls, to the board of regents of North Texas State University.

Sister Mary Brian Sherry of San Antonio and Mrs. Martha McClellan Davis, Beaumont, to Board of Nurse Examiners.

Dr. Richard T. Weber of Austin and Dr. James E. Makins, Lubbock, to Board of Dental Examiners.

Judge Otis Dunagan of Tyler, former Atty. Gen. Grover Sellers of Sulphur Springs and Judge James H. Moore, Nacogdoches, to the new 12th Court of Civil Appeals at Tyler.

Judge Stephen F. Preslar, McCamey, to the 8th Court of Civil Appeals at El Paso, replacing Justice Jim Langdon, whom he had named to the Railroad Commission.

who was administrative assistant to former Gov. Price Daniel, as Governor's press secretary, replacing Wilbur Evans, who went back to sports press relations.

Clay Cotten, longtime attorney for State Insurance Department, as State Liquidator to succeed C. H. Langdeau, who is retiring due to ill health.

**LOANS** — Frank Miskell of Austin, who headed up the Texas Legislature's studies on the loan shark problem, will be the administrator of the new law which regulates licensed lenders.

Miskell was chosen by the State Finance Commission to be the first Regulatory Loan Commissioner. He will assume his new duties on August 23.

**DRY AND WET** — Texas is spotted with drought and flood points.

Texas Water Commission found that reservoirs declined a little in June. They wound up the month 76 percent full, so there's room to store more floods when and if they come.

In general, Northeast Texas reservoirs are full, while those in South Texas are shrinking.

**ROADS** — Highway construction is one thing dry weather helps.

State Highway Engineer DeWitt C. Greer reported that contractors on state-federal projects completed \$24,073,319 worth of work during June.

But there's plenty yet to do. They hold contracts which total \$382,872,803 and another \$25,000,000 worth of contracts will be issued this week.

**DO FENCE THEM IN** — Texas Highway Department has endorsed the idea of building "median rails" on busy urban expressways.

Rails — heavy-duty fences which keep traffic from careening into opposite lanes — have been or will be installed on expressways around Houston, Fort Worth and Austin.

Also under development by highway engineers is a woven-wire mesh fence — similar to backyard chain-link jobs — to reduce headlight glare and to prevent pedestrians from crossing the freeways.

**OIL HOLDS UP** — Despite

recommendations by several major oil buying firms that Texas production be cut in August, the Railroad Commission held the line.

Production will continue at the July rate of 28.5% of capability of the wells. Independents praised the action.

**HIGHER EDUCATION** — Texas Committee on Education Beyond the High School has selected one of its members as paid executive director.

He is Dr. A. B. Martin, president of Amarillo Junior College. He will coordinate all staff work for the big study.

Committee has one year to finish its study and report to the Governor and Legislature.

**SADLER ACTIVE** — Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler continues to be much in the news.

Sadler disagreed with Governor Connally and Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr on seriousness of a state-federal dispute on re-claimed lands in the tidelands; swapped hot wires with ex-Sen. Bob Baker after Baker accused him of impeding Padre Island Seashore project; and insisted that Carr get Supreme concurrence on Carr's ruling that a new law reorganizing the School Land Board is valid.

**POLLUTION QUESTION** — Texas Water Pollution Control Board granted a permit to discharge thousands of gallons of "treated effluent" into the waters of Copano and Aransas Bays in connection with plans for a big new resort motel and marina at Lamar Townsite, Aransas County.

Objections voiced at public hearings led to the Commission's action in instructing backers of the project — American Liberty Oil Company — to extend the point of discharge 500 feet farther out into the bay area.

**STATE SCHOOL** — Dr. James Turman, Director of the Texas Youth Council, defended his council's action in either firing or retiring — Superintendent O. F. Perry of Gatesville State School.

Perry and his supporters claim too much interference from Austin, too little discipline of boys. Youth Council denies this, con-

tends policy differences caused the dismissal.

M. B. Kendrick was named to replace Perry.

**SHORT SNORTS** — Texas Game and Fish Commission, Department of Public Welfare, Board of Plumbing Examiners, Board of Professional Engineers, Board of Pardons and Paroles, Department of Agriculture, Department of Banking, and Building Commission are moving into the new John H. Reagan State Office Building.

Dr. Dorman Winfrey, Director of the Texas State Library, announced that the Val Verde County Library, recognized in December as one of the "Ten Best Small Libraries in the U.S.", also has been cited for its "top-flight public relations program."

Rep. Robert H. Hughes of Dallas will resign from the Legislature on September 1 to accept appointment as domestic relations court judge in Dallas.

**AFL-CIO LOSES** — A suit by State AFL-CIO leaders alleging improper lobbying activities by Texas Employment Commission members and four employees was dismissed in 53rd District Court at Austin.

Suit, filed last February, claimed TEC pushed 11 pro-employer bills in the Legislature. Judge Herman Jones said the union failed to prove its case.

Union said it would appeal the decision.

**COTTON** — Texas cotton farmers planted 670,000 fewer acres this year than in 1962, U.S. Department of Agriculture reports.

Decline amounted to 9.7% which is more than the national decrease of 9.0%. Reduction, made in compliance with the federal control program, would mean a cut of about 476,000 bales in the state's cotton production if yield-per-acre is the same as last year.

**POLL TAXES** — Folks who are past 60 and living in towns with 10,000 or more population should get their poll tax exemptions on October 1 or as soon as possible thereafter.

Exemptions for those over 60 are free under the old law, which will be in effect at least until November 9. That's the date for the vote on repeal of the poll tax as a voting requirement.

If Texans vote FOR the repeal, those over 60 who live in towns above 10,000 population then will have to pay a 25-cent registration fee. Ditto for all voters under 60.

Those past 60 who live in rural areas or in towns under 10,000 population will not be affected by the changes. They can vote without paying under both the old and the new law.

The attorney general informed tax assessor-collectors that they must accept the \$1.75 poll tax payments, starting on October 1, from those who insist on paying rather than waiting to see if the charge will be cut to 25 cents by the November 9 vote.

**DISTRICT ATTORNEY** — Governor Connally has appointed Calvin (Pete) Burnett of Crane to replace Dan Sullivan as district attorney of Andrews, Crane and Winkler Counties.

Sullivan resigned to head up Sen. Ralph Yarborough's state office in Austin.

**FINAL MEETING** — At the Game & Fish Commission's last meeting, the eight remaining commissioners were presented with engraved plaques by the 2,700-member Bayshore Rod, Reel and Gun Club. Executive Secretary Howard Dodgen then presented them with gold-framed certificates for their service on behalf of the department's staff.

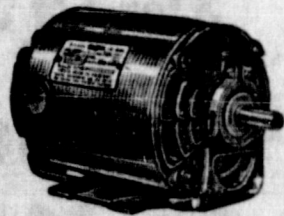

#### The House Should Participate In Treaty Ratification

The House of Representatives has no formal role in the making of treaties. In this aspect of United States foreign relations, the Constitution made the Senate and only the Senate a partner of the President. The Constitution declares that the President "shall have Power, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, to make Treaties, provided two-thirds of the Senators present concur . . ."

One of the hundred separate dramas unfolding now on Capitol Hill is the preparation by the Senate to exercise this historic responsibility. Senate hearings have begun on the treaty pledging the United States, the Soviet Union and Great Britain to ban nuclear weapons tests in the atmosphere, in outer space and under water. The crucial question, whether or not the Senate will ratify the treaty, will follow the hearings.

Members of the House of Representatives are sitting in on the Senate hearings; my House colleagues who are members of the Joint (Senate-House) Committee on Atomic Energy are joined with Senators serving on that committee and members of the Senate Foreign Relations and Senate Armed Services committees in receiving testimony concerning the treaty. Meanwhile, Secretary of State Dean Rusk came to the House side of the Capitol to brief the House Foreign Affairs Committee. Although it is somewhat unprecedented for House members to be included to this degree in the treaty process, the Constitutional power remains confined to the Senate.

I have long held that the House of Representatives should be empowered to participate in the ratification of treaties. As a legislative body more directly responsive to the will of the American people — its 435 members being more closely in touch with the folks at home than are the 100 Senators — the House of Representatives should be able to take part in treaty decisions. Treaties in the nuclear age can commit a nation to a life-or-death course; the full legislative course should run, with decisions by both House and Senate, before the United States should be pledged to international agreements.

Last year and again on January 28th of this year, I introduced in the House a resolution proposing a Constitutional amendment to provide for the advice and consent of the House, in addition to that of the Senate, in ratifying treaties — all treaties. So far, the resolution has yet to be cleared by the Judiciary Committee for a decision by the full House.

I hope that the current nuclear test-ban-treaty situation will help provide a spur to action on the resolution I introduced. I am convinced that the attitude of the people of the United States concerning the proposed treaty would be more accurately reflected by a vote of the House

than by a vote of the Senate.

The wording of my proposed amendment to the Constitution, as expressed in H.J.Res. 205, is as follows: "No treaty with respect to which the advice and consent of the Senate is required by section 2 of article II of this Constitution may be made without the advice and consent of the House of Representatives." The amendment would not alter the existing Constitutional requirement that "two-thirds of Senators present concur." It would add the requirement that for ratification to be completed a majority of members of the House present at the time of the vote give their approval to the treaty terms.

Participation by the House of Representatives in treaty-making would give the nation an additional guarantee that the United States not enter into unwise international agreements.

My own committee assignments in the House have kept me extremely busy recently. During the week of July 15-19, I presided over morning and afternoon sessions of the Communications and Power Subcommittee of the House Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee as it delved into the matter of current broadcast editorializing practices. During the week of July 22-26, I presided over meetings of the Irrigation and Reclamation Subcommittee of the House Interior and Insular Affairs Committee looking into water resources matters and at the same time joined the full Commerce Committee in hearings conducted on the joint resolution aimed at averting a nationwide railroad strike. These latter hearings continued this week. As soon as the Commerce Committee has made a disposition of the railroad issue, I expect to call the Communications and Power Subcommittee back into session to resume hearings on editorializing on radio and television — with emphasis on voluntary testimony from broadcasters themselves.

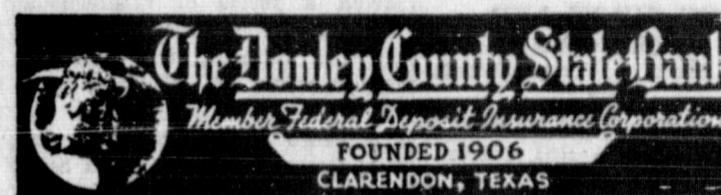

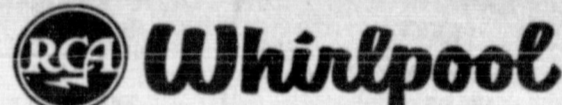

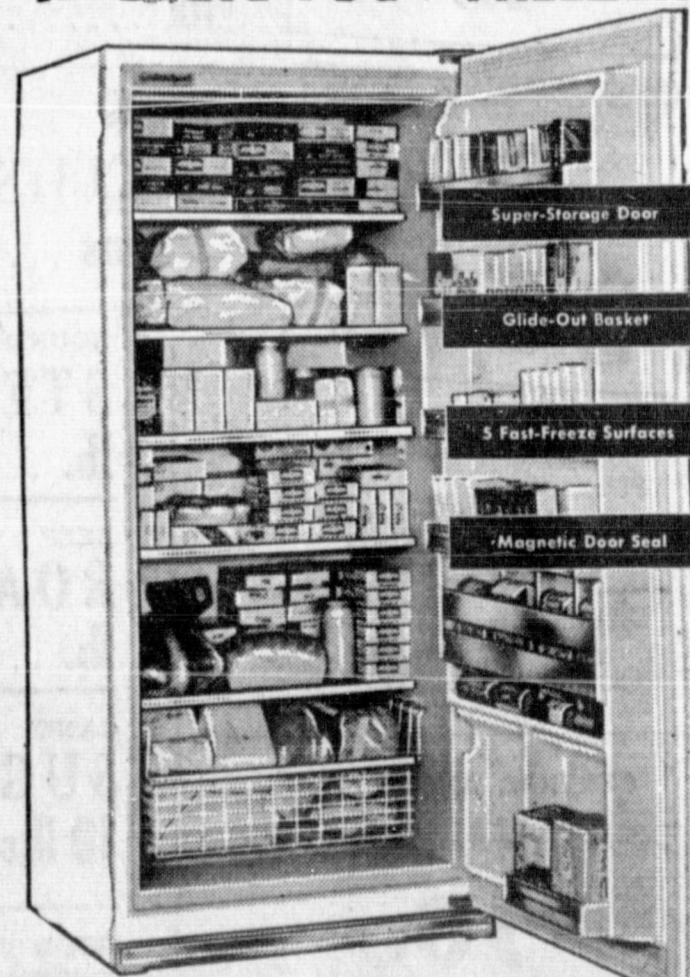

### New Speed Limit To Go Into Effect

AUSTIN, Texas, July 31, 1963—More than two-thirds of the Texas highway system will come under the new 70-miles-per-hour daytime maximum speed for passenger cars which becomes effective August 23, the Texas Highway Commission revealed today.

Under the speed control law passed by the Legislature this spring, all highways not zoned down by the Commission will automatically go to the new 70-mph speed August 23. This means that some 41,500 miles of the state-maintained highway system will be allowed to come under the higher maximum speed.

The Commission today passed a Minute Order which zoned some 18,640 miles of the highway system at a maximum of 60 miles per hour daytime and 55 miles per hour at night for passenger cars, effective August 23. These highways will be restricted to the lower speed limit because engineering studies indicate they are inadequate to accommodate a 70-miles-per-hour maximum.

The Commission's action followed a series of engineering traffic studies conducted throughout the state by the Highway Department's 25 highway districts.

A large percentage of Texas' vast Farm to Market Road System will come under the 70-mph maximum, although some of these roads (and some of the older primary routes) will be restricted to the lower 60 mph maximum where conditions warrant.

### REGULATORY DISTRICT SEASONS AND LIMITS

AUSTIN — At the last regular meeting of the Texas Game and Fish Commission, held July 12, in the John H. Reagan Building in Austin, seasons and bag limits for all counties under regulatory authority were established, according to H. D. Dodgen, executive secretary for the Game and Fish Commission. No major changes were made in the seasons and bag limits, except that the whitewing season was eliminated and the bag limit on doves was reduced to 10 per day and 20 in possession. Wild aoudad sheep were added to the list of protected game animals. Perhaps the most important change was advancing the quail season in most counties under regulatory authority to November 16 through January 31.

Following is the list of the bag limits and seasons on the major game species in the various regulatory authority districts.

**PANHANDLE DISTRICT** (Armstrong, Bailey, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Childress, Cochran, Collingsworth, Cottle, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Floyd, Gray, Hale, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lamb, Lipscomb, Moore, Motley, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher, and Wheeler counties.)

Antelope in Dallam, Hartley, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Oldham, Potter and Roberts counties: open season shall be September 28 through October 1 by permit only. Bag limit one antelope per season. Deer — open season November 16 through November 29. One buck per person or by permit only, one antlerless deer may be taken on areas to be designated by the Game and Fish Commission. No person may kill or possess more than one deer taken in Panhandle District. There will be an

open season on aoudad sheep for the first time in the history of hunting in Texas. This season will be December 13, 14, and 15. Bag limit, one sheep per person by permit only. The Game and Fish Commission shall designate the number of aoudad sheep to be harvested at a later date. Squirrels — May 1 through July 1 and October 1 through December 1. Bag limit, five per day or in possession. Ringneck Pheasants — open season December 1 through December 7 in the counties of Dallam, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Robertson and Sherman. Bag limit, two cock pheasant per day and four in possession after the first day. Quail — open season November 16 through January 31. Bag limit, 12 quail per day, possession limit 36 quail. Turkey — open season November 16 through November 29. Bag limit, two turkey gobblers per season.

Regulations for the taking of migratory game birds will be prescribed by the Game and Fish Commission in a separate publication at a later date. At the present time, the Commission is preparing a map which will enable hunters throughout the State to understand and interpret the regulations for taking the various species of game during the coming hunting season. As soon as this map is available, it will be sent to the Commission's regional offices and to the licensed deputies where hunters and fishermen can pick them up at no charge, according to Dodgen. Other publications are now being prepared by the I&E section of the Game and Fish Commission, for distribution to the public, and as soon as these are completed they will be made available to hunters and fishermen. ### Grass Seeding - Mowing Cover

In seeding grass there should always be a cover of some kind to seed into. This protects the grass seedling from wind erosion and allows more stability of the seed. Seeding into rye or grain sorghum, the plant should never be allowed to mature to offer competition to the seeded grasses. Thus, the cover should be mowed before seed maturity and followed the next spring with a seeding of adapted grasses.

Seeding into johnsongrass or sorghum alnum cover, the plants need to be mowed twice before seeding native grasses. The first time should be in June or July when the plant is actively growing and has a minimum of root reserve. This should be followed by September mowing about boot stage of the seedbed just before the plant puts the reserve back into the roots. This will put the plant at a low reserve and it will not offer the seeded grasses as much competition after seeding.
