

Ministerial Alliance Hosting Good Friday Service



U.I.L. Contests to be Held in Clarendon

Clarendon Junior High and Elementary School will host the 1989 University Interscholastic league Literary Spring Meet on Friday, march 17, 1989. Students from Quanah, Wellington, Shamrock, Canadian, Memphis, and Clarendon will compete in a number of academic contests.

Second and third graders will participate in Story Telling. These don are as follows: students listen to a story and then tell the story to a panel of judges.

the opportunity to enter Spelling Laura Finch and Personal Writing. For the Spelling contest, students spell sixty words pronounced at approximately 5 words per minute. In Personal Writing, contestants choose between two topics and write an essay expressing their personal opinions, thoughts, preferences, or experiences about that topic.

Picture Memory is a contest for fourth and fifth graders. Students study a collection of art prints and memorize the artist's name, the country he represents, and the name of his work. For the contest, students are shown seventeen pictures which they identify and give the information about the picture. All this must be spelled and punctuated correctly. For this contest, students are judged as a team.

Fifth and sixth graders are eligible for five different contests: Oral Reading, Spelling, Number Sense, Expressive Writing, and Listening Skills.

For Oral Reading, students select and prepare a poem to read for a panel of judges. Spelling requires students to spell 90 words given at the rate of five words a minute. contestants are judged as

For Number Sense, participants are given a test over a large variety of Math problems which are to be

solved mentally without the use of pencil and paper. The student who can solve the most problems correctly in a ten minute time period is the winner.

Expressive Writing requires students to select a topic and write an essay which attempts to get a message across to an audience. These essays do not have maximum or minimum lengths, but they are judged on how well ideas are developed and how well evidence is given to bolster the main points.

A new contest this year, Listening Skills is a contest in which students are read a variety of passage about language arts, fine arts, natural sciences, and social studies. Then they are given an objective test which measures their ability to identify main ideas and supporting ideas, draw conclusions, distinguish fact from opinion, etc.

Seventh and eighth graders have the following contest: Spelling, Expository Writing, Imprompter Speaking, Modern Oratory, Oral Reading, Number Sense, Calculator Application and Science.

For Spelling, students spell 120 words given at the rate of six words per minute. For Oral Reading students select and prepare a prose reading of about five minutes to present to a panel of judges. Number Sense at this level is similar to that contest described for fifth and sixth graders except that the problems are more difficult.

For Expository Writing, students select one of two topics and write a composition of an informative nature. They may us description or narrative writing to illustrate a point, but the essay has to be primarily expository in na-

Modern Oratory contestants present a five to six minute speech concerning a topic which they have researched and taken a position on. They have to document the sources of their ideas and deliver the speech with out notes.

In Impromptu Speaking a contestant draws three topics, takes one minute to select the one he wants, and then prepares for one minute to present a speech without notes.

Calculator Applications requires students to perform calculations involving addition, subtraction, multiplication, division, roots, and powers. In addition to straightforward calculation problems, the contest includes simple geometric

and stated problems similar to those found in recently adopted junior high math textbooks, previous contests, and League materials related to the contest.

Contestants in Junior High Science demonstrate their knowledge in three main areas: knowledge of scientific fact, understanding of scientific principles, and the ability to think through scientific problems. This last area is a cognitive challenge requiring students to use higher learning skills in order to arrive at a "solution" or understanding of a problem without having been exposed to that particular set of scientific facts and theories to which they are exposed.



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
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Three Boys In The Same Grave

I found all three of them there just like I'd heard--the three boys killed by the Indians at Proffitt in 1867.

Their grave stands at the back of the little country cemetery on U.S. 380 about 8 miles west of Newcastle in Young County. They were the first ones District 13 and Florene Leinen, there. They started the graveyard.

Now they are all but forgotten by everyone except for a handful of local residents and maybe a few historians like me. A crudely laid red brick wall surrounds the burial, and a tree grows up inside of it. At one side some iris plants rustle in the West Texas breeze. It's almost always peaceful there. How did the three boys end up in the grave together?

The story goes back to the summer of 1867, when they were tending cattle on Elm Creek, then on the fringe of white settlement. They were Patrick Euell Proffitt, Rice Oarlton, and Reuben Juhnson, all of them teenagers. They were working as cowboys on the FitzPatrick Ranch.

On July 17, 1867, the three boys went to work branding cattle in the valley of Elm Creek. The area had been the scene of a devastating Indian raid only three years before. Maybe they felt safe from attack, thinking that the ter warriors wouldn't descend on the same valley a second time. Whatever the case, they unwisely left their guns on their saddles and allowed their horses Highway Patrol, Department of to graze while they worked.

Without warning a Comanche war party rode into view. The three boys on safety. This is one of our yearly made for their horses-and their firearms-but they weren't lucky enough to requirements.

The Comanches cut them off from their guns and horses. Without defense, the three young men were shot down by the warriors, who scalped them and left them where they fell.

Local settlers buried the three boys near the place where they were Wilkerson for the lovely refreshattacked, placing all three of them in the same grave. Their burial became ments they brought February 27. the site for other graves in the years that followed, becoming the cemetery for what grew into the town of Proffitt.

The nearby town bearing the same name as one of the ill-fated teenagers was founded by the dead man's brother, John W. Proffitt. It prospered for a number of years before declining to become a scattered rural community.

Since the deaths of the three young men, descendants of their families and members of the local community have tended their grave. In 1966 historically minded citizens of Young County placed a new marker at the grave, which briefly tells the story of the three deaths.

When I opened the gate to the cyclone fence into the Proffitt Cemetery to look for the victims of the Indians that I'd heard were buried there, I didn't know what to expect as I wandered among the tombstones. Then, when I found the low brick wall around the burial, somehow my mind went back to that hot day in July 1867--the sorrow of the families, the desire for revenge, and the blood from the three boys that still nourishes the tree that grows from their grave.

After the Fort Worth Stock Show, many Donley County 4-H'ers came back a little disappointed in the outcome. But, they picked themselves up, worked harder, and it payed off for many of them at the Houston Stock Show.

In the market steer division, Scott Myers placed 5th with his Red Angus, Buddy Howard placed 7th with a Shorthorn steer, and Chad Campbell placed 10th with his Hereford.

In the market lamb division, Buddy Howard also placed 13th with his light weight medium wool lamb. This may be Donley County's first lamb to place at Houston, according to some.

In the market swine division, Donley County 4-H and Clarendon FFA managed to get eight pigs out of 13 past the sift at Brenham for a chance to compete at Houston. There were approximately 3,500 barrows at Brenham and around 1300 got to go to Houston after the sift. Clarendon FFA member, Todd McAnear, was the only one that managed to place a barrow at Houston with his light weight Duroc placing 16th.

Donley County 4-H member Monty Joe Adams placed a Tom in the Market Turkey Division, which is very tough to do raising them this far north.

Major stock show trips are often the highlight of 4-H animal projects, and is what most 4-H'ers are shooting for, and placing at a major stock is just the icing on the cake. But there is more to 4-H projects than a blue ribbon.

4-H projects offer youths opportunities for "critical thinking".

Through planning and carrying out a project, youths learn to apply critical thinking skills to real-life problems.

For example, in a project involving raising any animal, a youngster

must do the following: 1-Compare and contrast animals as the basis for deciding which to keep or cull, to breed or to buy. Basic training of this nature is done in livestock judging. 2 - Identify characteristics of individual animals that qualify or disqualify as certain breeds or species. 3 - Learn nutritional ration ingredients needed for health and growth and identify animal parts and their functions. 4 - Use previous experience and subject matter learned to recognize health problems and courses of action -needed. 5 - Identify errors through recognizing and correcting mistakes. 6 - Identify the main idea and generalize from the particular animal project to the entire food ecosystem as the youth determines profit or loss at the market price.

A 4-H project can do much more than teach a child how to show and compete. It can, in fact, teach critical thinking skills which can be generalized to every area of a young person's life.

National Agriculture Day, set to honor the nation's food and fiber providers, will be observed March 20.


According to Tim Trimble, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, business and consumer groups will join in honoring farmers and ranchers on that special day.






Program on Drug Abuse to be Held at Hedley
