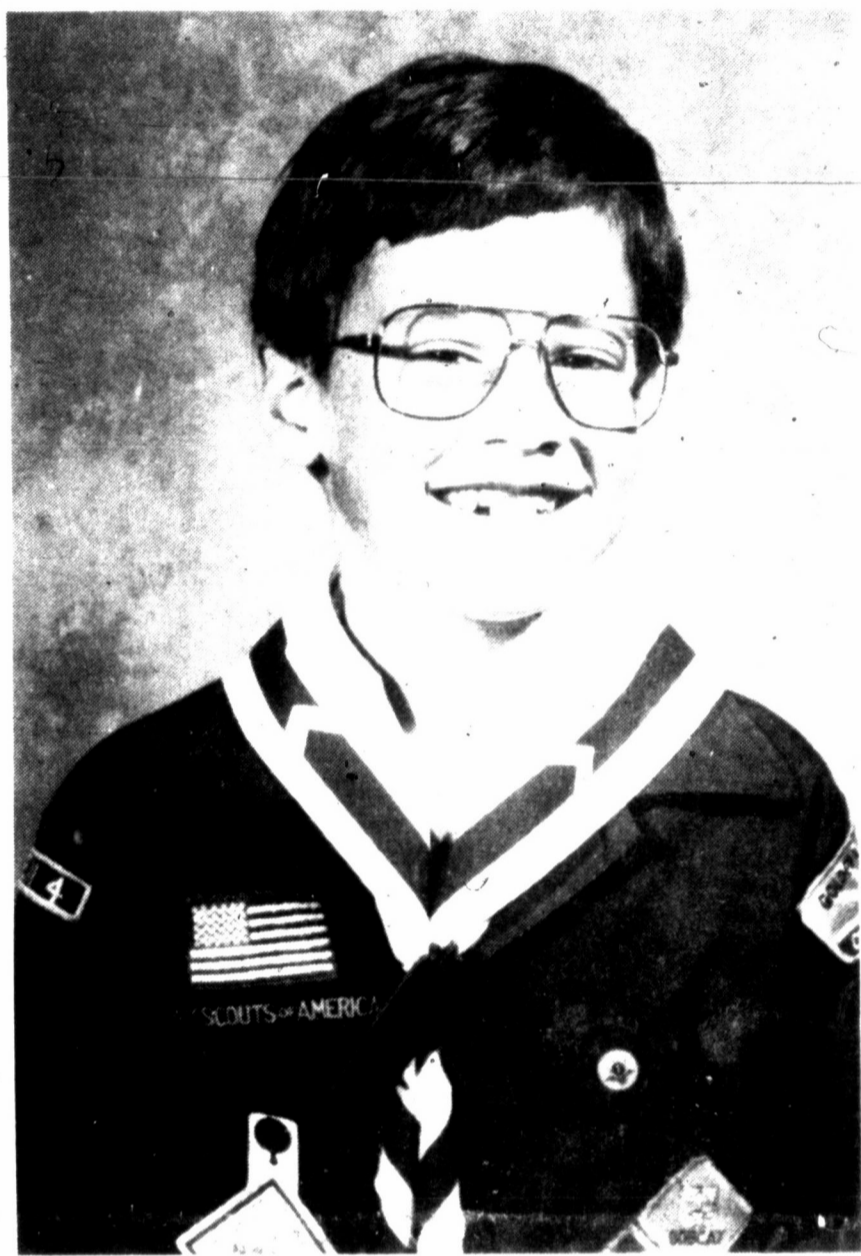

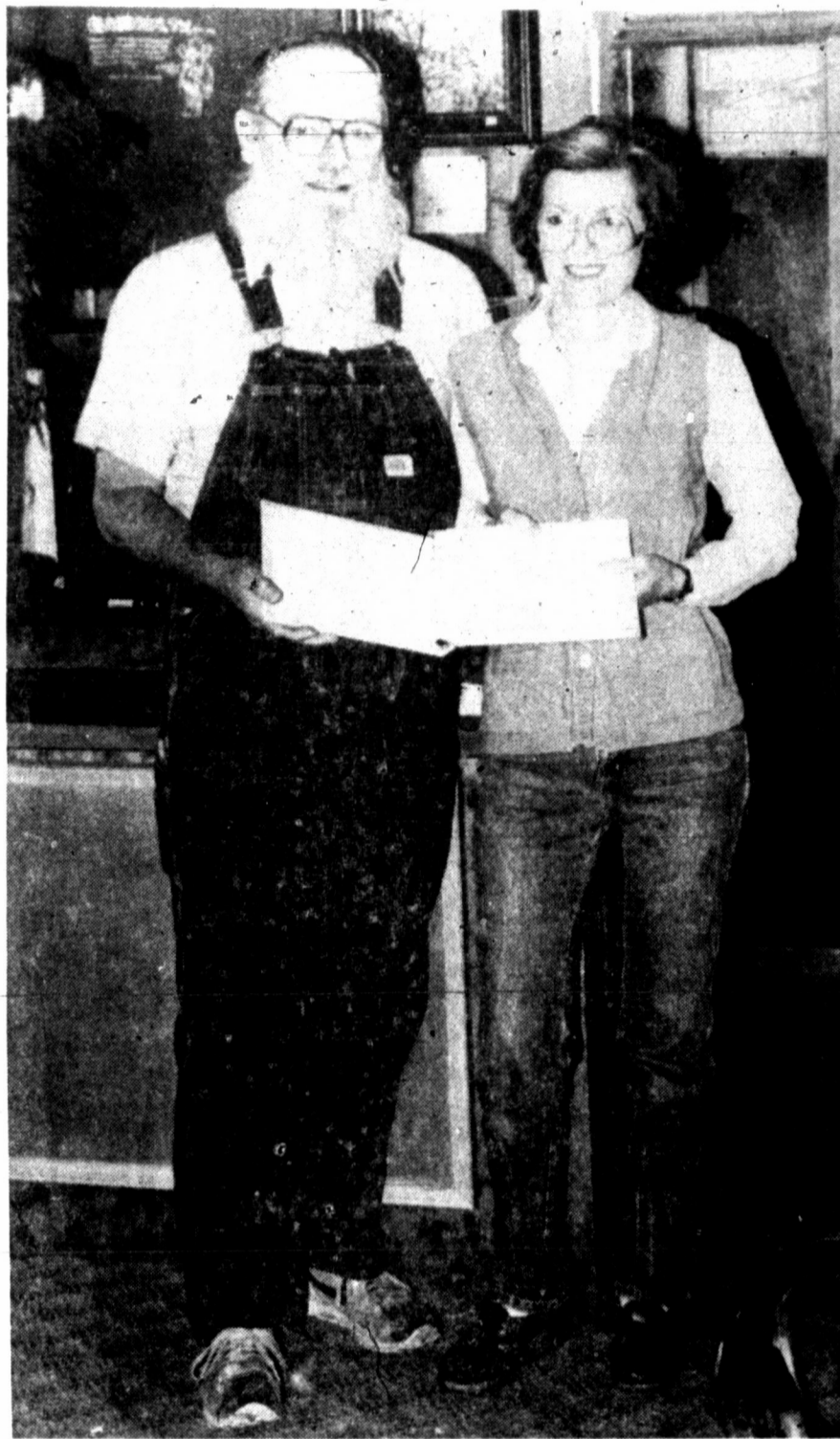
Les Beaux Arts Club Elects Officers

Hostesses for the afternoon were Dikki Howell and Dorothy White, who served twelve members and two welcome guests, Janice Weatherly and Helen Oakes.

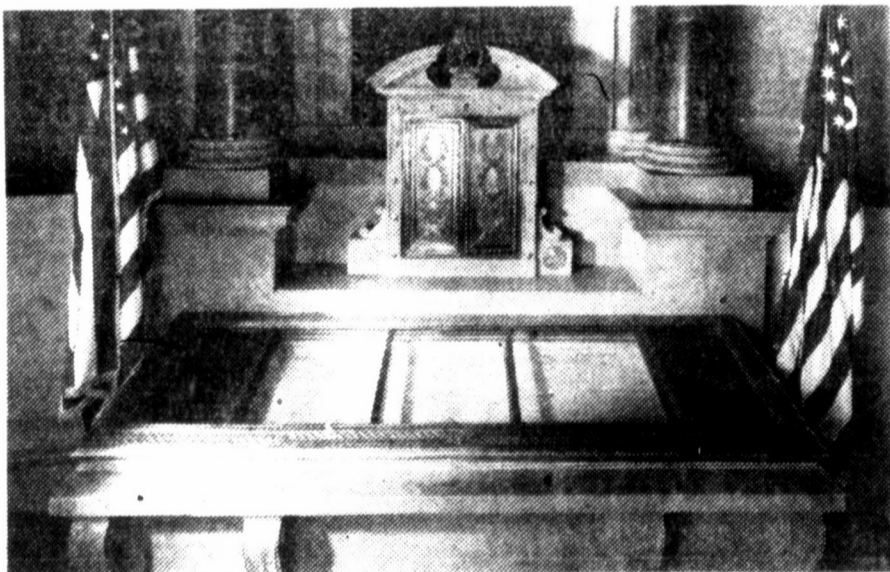

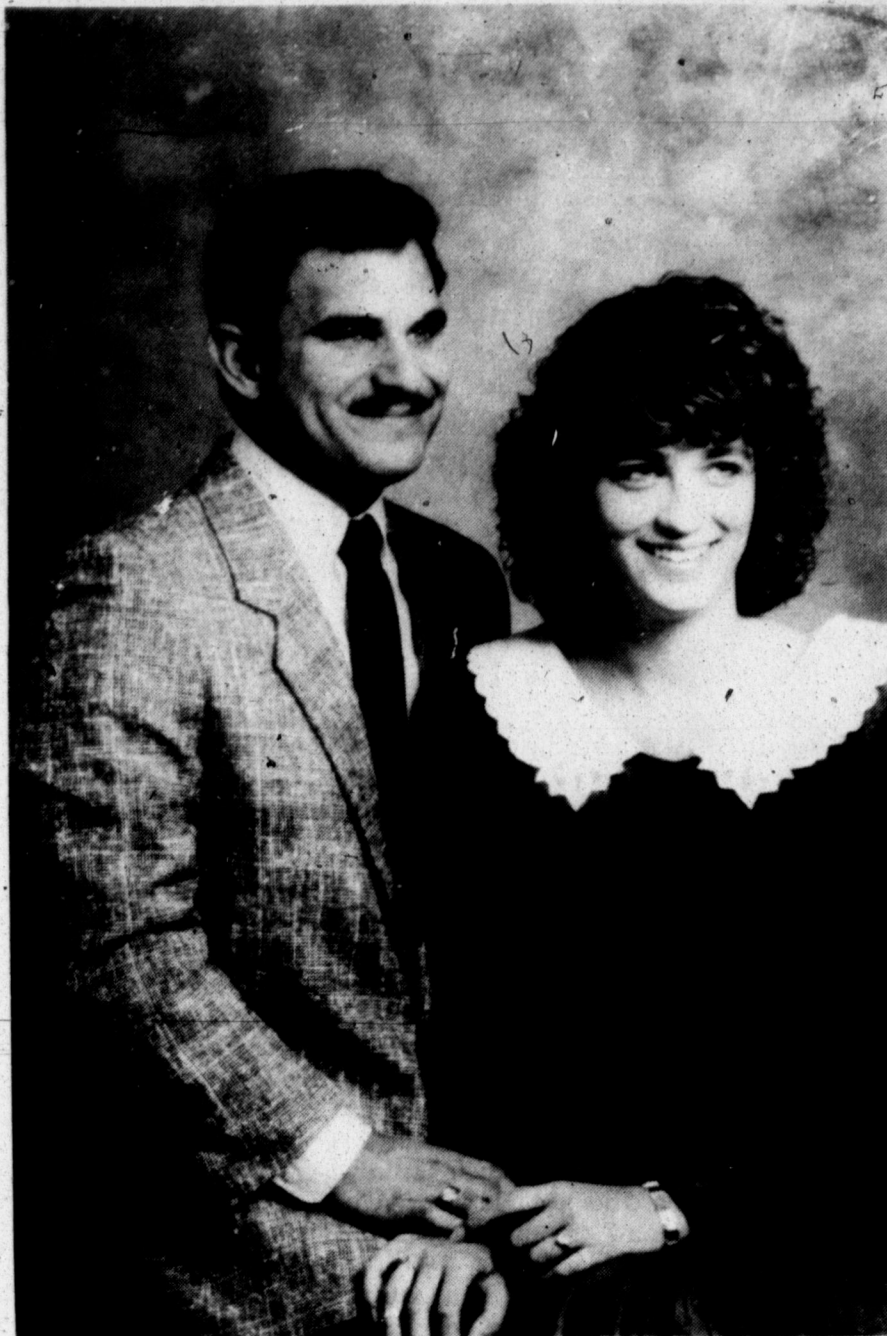

William Clarence Ragan

1902-1989

Somehow, Granddaddy was always there when we needed him. To us, he was the Lone Ranger, Cal Farley, and Superman rolled into one person. There wasn't much he didn't know how to do, and we clung to every word he said.

Everything Granddaddy did was with his heart as well as his mind. He always had the "never give in, or never give up" attitude. He lived at a time when this type attitude was what it took to stay alive. We are thankful that he lived at a time such as this, because he taught us the basic moral values that were drawn from God's Holy Word; the Bible.

To list all the different jobs he had, and the things he taught us would fill several pages. We will list some of the things he did: he worked as a boy fishing in the Brazos River, hunting and trapping to help his family as well as general farm chores and work in the fields; he worked with his Uncle Cisero Kelly at Waco as a carpenter and bricklayer; he drove a freight wagon from Palaska to Memphis; he helped lay the brick for the main streets in Memphis; he worked as a cowboy many times (most remembered 1923-24 on a ranch north of Goodnight). He rode the train and hitchhiked many times back and forth from Waco to West Texas to pick cotton; he worked in the oil field when Borger was a boom town. He worked as an inspector for North American Aviation, building airplane wings during World War II. He worked for Texas Highway Department grading and building roads and was a guard for convicts who worked on the roads. He drove a milk truck for G. W. Bradshaw. Most of all, he loved farming and raising cattle.

Granddaddy always believed in helping other folks that were less fortunate, right down to sharing his last biscuit with a stranger during

the depression. He loved to be kind to others, especially children.

What he taught us two grandsons and the kind and loving way he taught us will never be forgotten. We owe everything we know to him. He was a deadly shot with a rifle, handgun, and shotgun. When he taught us this skill he also taught us the safety and responsibility that went with it as well as a conservation appreciation for nature. He thought every boy should learn to love the Lord, to shoot and be safe with guns, and to learn to work hard.

Whatever task we took on, from breaking a horse to sewing the cover back on a baseball, he was there to show us how to live.

If he could say it, he would say "Take time to love and teach a child how to live."

Granddaddy tried to pattern his life after that of Jesus. We got a first hand, living look of what it meant to be a Christian. We respected him and loved him. We will miss him. We were very fortunate indeed!
