In addition, camping facilities have been established throughout the United States which offer opportunities for boys to experience their world in all its glory - from simple camping to high adventure or underwater exploration. Many of these same camps are open to family camping throughout the year in order to encourage Boy Scouts, Explorer Scouts, and Cub Scouts to include their families in their camping adventures.

Cotton Producers Meeting

Donley County cotton producers are encouraged to attend a breakfast meeting on Thursday, April 27 at the Clarendon Community Building. Donuts, coffee and orange juice will be served starting at 7:00 a.m. and the meeting will start at 8:00 a.m. The breakfast is sponsored by the local girls in Donley County.

The boll weevil is still a big concern for many cotton farmers and this will be the main topic at the meeting. 100 boll weevil traps have been ordered for use by farmers to use to monitor boll weevil population at their fields. The traps will be issued at this meeting and farmers will receive training on how to use them at the meeting. Most farmers

should only need from 5 to 10 traps.

This also may be one of the most important years yet for farmers to consider a uniform late planting date since two late cold snaps should have reduced overwintering weevil numbers. With a uniform late planting date weevil numbers could be lowered to nonexistent levels. Getting farmer participation for later planting will be most important and this will be discussed at the meeting on Thursday.

Chamber Banquet April 20

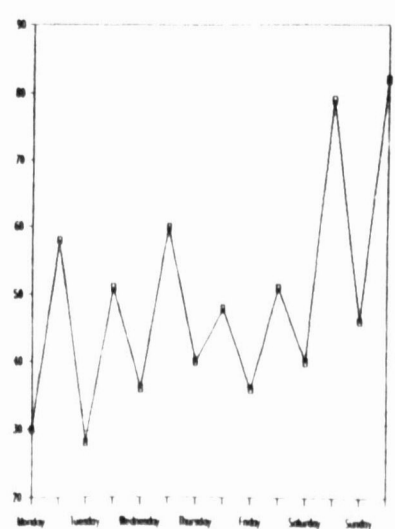

Special Handling for Liquids

Liquid medicines may be placed in the ear, nose, or throat, applied to the skin, or taken internally. Before taking or using any liquid medicine, check to see if there are warnings or labels with directions as to how to use the medicine. Be sure to store external-use-only liquids, which may be poisonous, away from small children. Many liquid antibiotics require refrigeration.

Some oral liquids need to be shaken well before they are used. Suspended particles may settle to the bottom of the container. If such liquids are not adequately shaken before use, the first doses from the container may contain a small amount of active ingredients, while the last doses could be highly concentrated.

Hold containers so that they are pointed away from you as medicine is poured out in order to prevent staining of clothes. Do not dip or leave cotton-tipped applicators in liquid containers. The cotton tip might contaminate the liquid.

If the liquid medicine is to be taken orally, measure doses accurately. Some liquids are dispensed with special measuring spoons or syringes. Discard outdated liquids by flushing them down the toilet.

THE HEDLEY HIGH School Owls Baseball Team for the 1989 School Year.

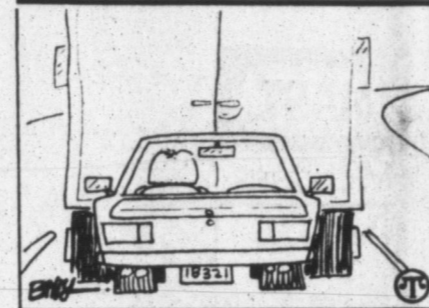
Hedley High Baseball Team

The Head Coach is Terry Collins and the assistant coach is Bryan Hill.

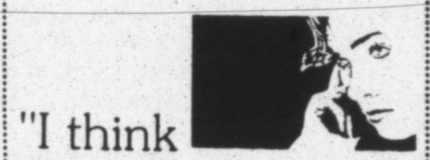

April Is Cancer Control Month



There's good advice...

relative risk is 60 times that of a nonsmoker. Research suggests that vegetables with high beta-carotene content may play a role in cancer inhibition. Vitamin E, found in nuts and grains, may also help reduce risk. But not smoking and avoiding passive smoke are so overwhelmingly major that the roles of diet and vitamins in preventing lung cancer become trivial.

The mammogram detects cancer long before it can be found with self-examination, making simple lumpectomy a likely cure.

The Do-It-Yourself Colon Test
The stool blood test is a simple do-it-yourself procedure for detecting blood, which may indicate colon cancer long before obvious symptoms appear. And the earlier the detection, the more the likelihood of a complete cure.

Several studies show that the stool blood test can detect two-thirds of colon cancers in the early, curable stage. Today only about fifteen percent of operative patients need a colostomy.

Save Your Own Skin
The National Institute of Health in Washington, D.C. says the incidence of skin cancer is rising. The ultraviolet rays of the sun should be blocked by a sunscreen that offers a sun protection factor (SPF) of 15. It should be standard equipment for anyone who spends time outdoors, whether it's a sunny day or not.

Kids are certainly no exception. A high percentage of total lifetime exposure to the sun's rays is achieved before age 21.

The Anti-Cancer Diet
A diet low in fats and high in fiber, including fresh fruits and vegetables with natural vitamins A and C, can cut the chances of getting several common cancers including those of the breast and colon.

Cancer risk is also reduced by maintaining moderate weight and being moderate in consumption of alcoholic beverages and salt-cured, smoked or nitrite-cured foods.

Eating cabbage, broccoli, brussels sprouts and cauliflower appears to inhibit cancer growth.

The American Cancer Society reports that following dietary guidelines can cut chances of getting cancer of the breast, colon, prostate, stomach, lung, esophagus, bladder, and throat.

There are few words which bring more fear and dread than "CANCER". Though most forms are curable through early treatment, to many people the name of this disease is almost synonymous with death and disfigurement.

Because these are unpleasant thoughts, the most common action taken to prevent cancer is... no action at all.

We don't hesitate to buy life insurance to protect our families. We buy auto insurance to protect our cars, and fire insurance to protect our homes. At the same time, many of us refuse to think about the no-cost health steps we can take which will help to insure that we will continue to have full and healthy lives.

When it comes to preventing cancer, no action is an action in itself. No attention to diet; no attention to health checkups; no attention to stop-smoking material — they all increase the chances that our lives will be changed significantly and permanently.

These are some things we should think about, especially during Cancer Control Month.

Lung Cancer Is Preventable
This leading cause of cancer deaths is largely preventable, according to studies at New York University Medical Center and elsewhere. The keys to prevention are in not smoking and not exposing yourself to other people's smoking.

Lung cancer accounts for about 70 deaths per 100,000 men annually in the U.S. and now exceeds breast cancer as the leading cause of cancer deaths in women, 45 per 100,000.

The more you smoke, the greater your risk is. A two-pack-a-day smoker's



Men and women of all ages can take steps to cancer prevention.


Mammograms save lives
Breast cancer is second only to lung cancer as a killer of women. And the number of cases per year is on the rise. The American Cancer Society says, however, that almost all cases found and treated before they spread can be cured.

Mammography is a major advance in reducing breast cancer deaths, but even high-risk women fail to have regular mammograms for two reasons.

First is fear of the radiation involved. This should no longer be a factor. Today's low-dose X-ray machines and fast films have dramatically cut the amount of radiation used.

Second, fear of the disease leads to neglect of self-examination and lack of medical checkups, including mammograms. Some women just refuse to think about breast cancer, but this is a mistake. Virtually all authorities recommend that women 40 to 49 should be screened every one or two years, and women 50 and over should have a mammogram annually.

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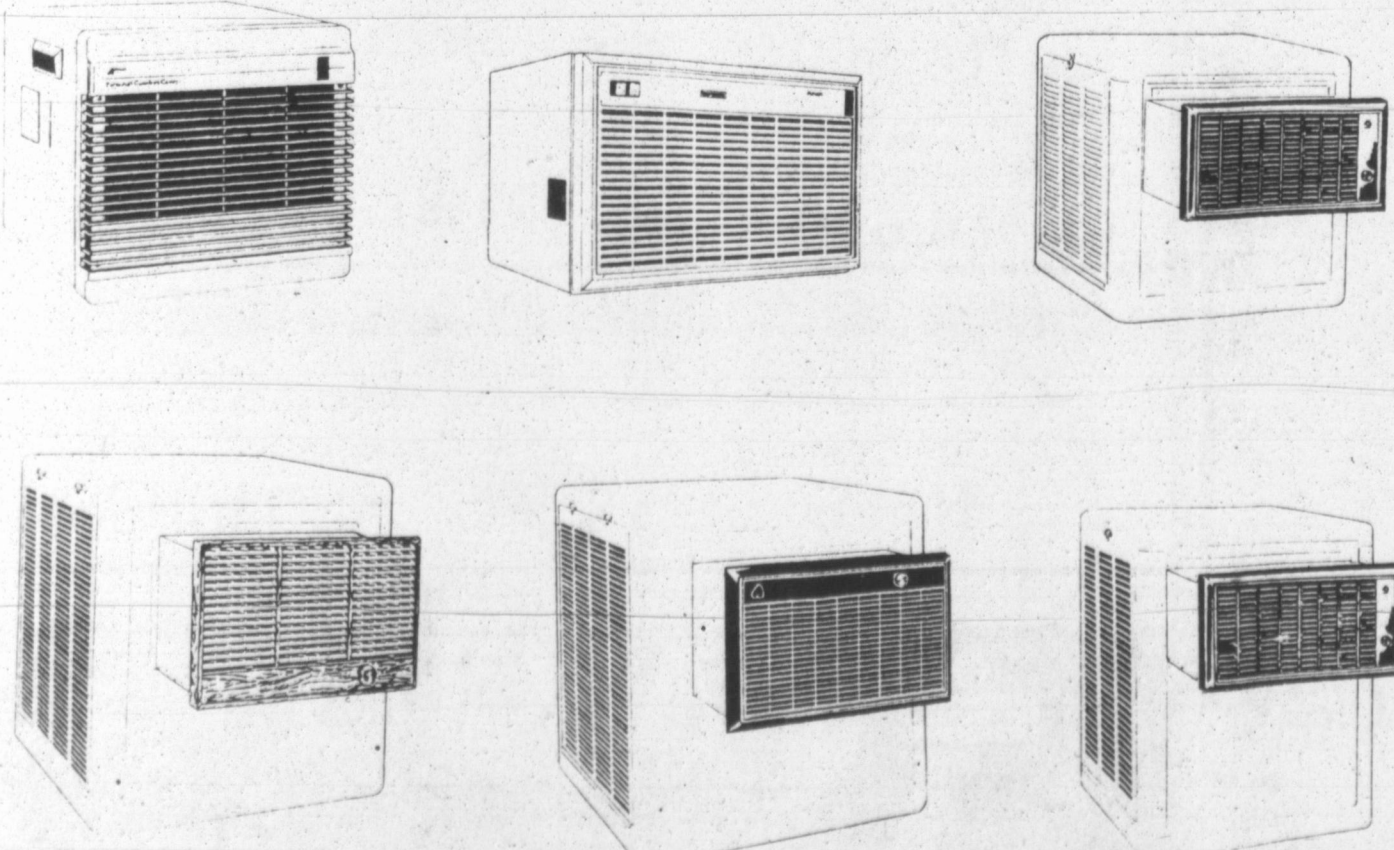

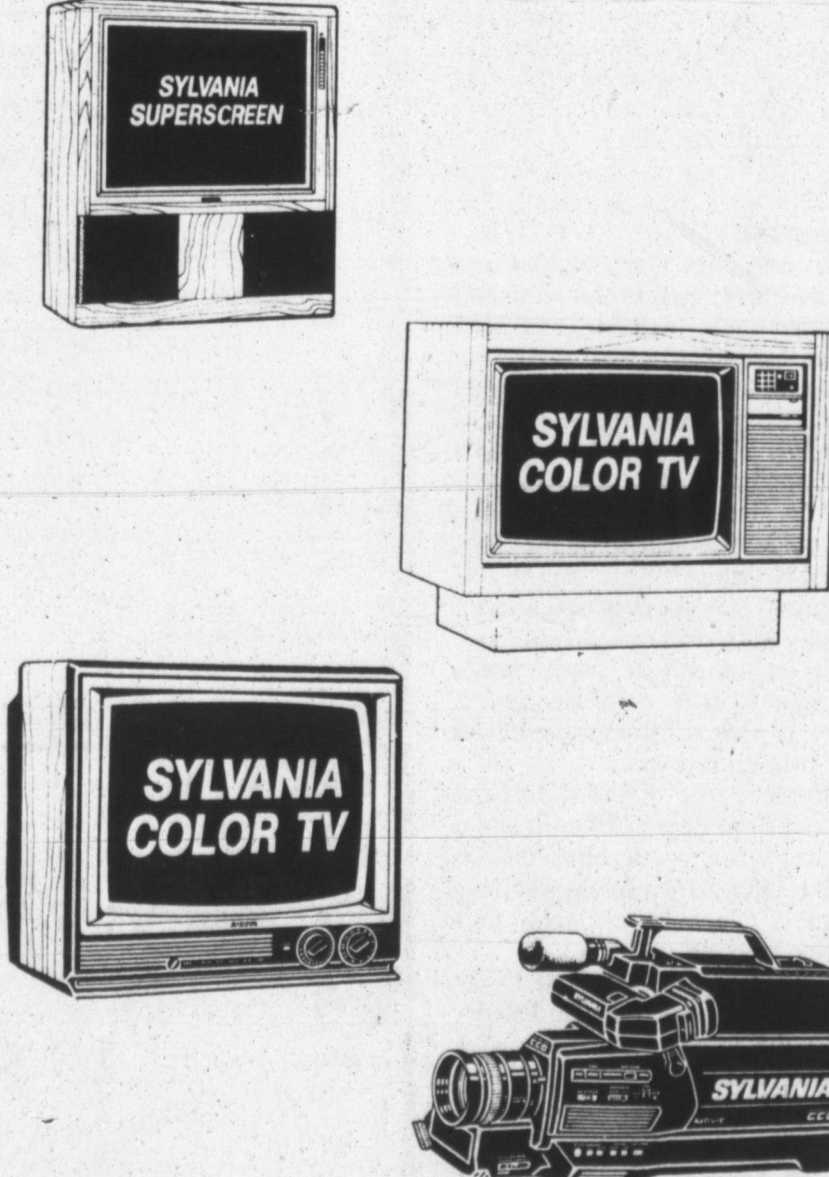

What absolute nonsense.

Want to guess some more?

How about "cts." Does this mean Cents? Cents? Cans? Cats? Cranes?

How about "BR." Does this mean Branch? Bankruptcy? Bedroom? Bathroom? Brokerage?

How about "MI." Does this mean Miles? Minutes? Michigan?
