The board opted for equipping one ambulance as a Mobile Intensive Care Unit and the other as an Advanced Life Support Unit or perhaps as a MICU provided a cardiac monitor/defibril-

## Rockets end playoff hopes for Bronchos

Last Friday night the Wellington Skyrockets, 6-1-1 on the season and undefeated in district play, invaded Broncho Stadium to meet the Clarendon Bronchos, 5-3 for the season and 1-2 in district. At stake was a playoff berth for the winner.

The game was one of the best of the season, as far as good hitting, execution, enthusiasm, and effort are concerned. An Amarillo sportswriter, who has seen numerous contests this season at all levels, said it was the best game he had witnessed all

Both teams played extremely well. When the dust cleared, however, it was Wellington that won the playoff entry and the game. The 21-17 score indicated how closely the teams were matched.

After stopping the Skyrockets on their possession and forcing them to punt, the Bronchos took the ball at their own 40 yard line and drove into scoring position. The first two plays from scrimmage earned no yardage for the maroon offense. but on third down junior Quarterback Dyron Howell hit senior Strong End Kelly Hill on a short pass for a ten yard gain and a first down. Hill made a spectacular onehanded grab on the play.

Then on another third-andlong situation, senior Fullback David Weatherton broke up the middle on a trap play for 20 yards. A quick pitch to Weatherton soon produced another big gainer. as the Broncho speedster was forced out of bounds.

The Bronchos were poised to score first, but "Lady Luck" smiled upon the Skyrockets again, as she has done often this season. The Bronchos jumped offside on first-and-goal, and then a dive play earned no gain. On the third play the home team fumbled a pitch and ended up back at the 20 yard line. where they tried a field goal. It was partially blocked, as the visitors survived the first threat and kept the game scoreless.

The maroon defense continued to control the explosive Wellington offense on the next series. Senior Linebacker John Smith stunted on first down and chased down a Skyrocket back fro behind on a sweep play. Then senior End Todd Muse made a solo tackle on another sweep play. A third down pass completion gained only 5 yards for Wellington when junior Cornerback Bryan Smith, substituting for injured starter Curly Weatherton, made a good hit on the receiver to prevent a first down. Wellington was forced to punt. Clarendon took the ball on





## A Moment for Meditation

By INEZ G. LAWRENCE 'Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel." Mk. 16:15

We have not been into ALL the world, but we have just returned from half way across the world. It was to preach the gospel too, and to share with the Brazilian people of Recife our faith. It seemed to be an impossible task for the one hundred and thirty-eight Texans from the Amarillo and Lubbock areas. For Recife has more than two million people. However, these Brazilians are very open to a personal commitment of their faith. Practical and personal christianity is very attractive to them.

We were welcomed by the Baptist leaders of Pernambuco state- Brazil has twenty-two states. Also the pastors and people of the thirty-two churches where we would work received us warmly. Some of the congregations are very small and extremely poor. Our assignment this year was in one of the smallest and poorest congregations. We were to visit as many homes as possible during the day in personal evangelism. My husband spoke nightly in the tiny church. The people came in large numbers. Many of them had to stand outside the packed building and listen to the loud speaker which was broadcasting the service to the whole neighborhood. The loud speaker would have been illegal in our country, but not in Brazil.


The whole country is struggling with inflation, but the poor are hardest hit of course. The American dollar was very strong and the people were eager to exchange their cruzeiras for American dollars. Fortunately for all the people there is

open street markets, but the pineapples and coconuts were the finest I have ever

Drinking milk from the green coconuts refreshes one more Coca Cola does in the oppressive heat. The most famous soft drink of Brazil, though, is the guarana. Everybody drinks it. The guarana fruit grows along the Amazon river to the north and is sent all over Brazil. It is bottled and tops Coca Cola in sales which is second in the country. The time was short and

the work most tiring. The days too, seemed longer there as the sun rises at 5:30 in the morning. However from sunrise on, we followed the clock and were lucky to get to bed by midnight each day. Nobody sleeps much in Recife if you are on a mission trip. But the people repaid us for our fatigue and lack of sleep. They responded in great numbers to our message and we formed deep friendships with them. Our concern now goes beyond their spiritual needs to their social and economic needs. There is a national election coming up in November which will affect millions of lives. The Baptists are celebrating their centennial year in Brazil, also in October. The poor are everywhere and the cities are crowded. Their schools run three shifts daily to accomodate the exploding population. There are slums which make our city slums in America almost look good. But there is wealth and big business also. The percentage is much smaller, however. It is a land of contrasts and Recife seems to mirror the entire country. Ninetyfive percent of the population is centered in ten cities near

the coastline of the country. the Bible commands.

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
One of the most painful conditions experienced by small children is infection of the middle ear. .. otitis media. Some children seem to be afflicted with many infections... even with repeated treatment. About half of all children will experience at least one middle ear infection by age one. Nine out of ten children will have a middle ear infection by age six!

The treatment of ear infection typically involves a variety of medicines. Antibiotics are given to destroy infection-producing bacteria. Decongestants help open the small passages that lead from the middle ear to the throat. These passages (Eustachian tubes) help relieve pressure within the ear...their closure is believed by many clinicians to be a prime cause of ear infection. And allergy is thought to be a common cause of closure of these tiny passages.

Pain relievers such as aspirin or acetaminophen are of value when taken by mouth. The use of ear drops containing local anesthetics may temporarily relieve pain but will not aid in removal of the infection.


