Cotton crop slow coming in

2411 bales ginned this year

The three Donley County gins have only ginned 2411 bales of cotton as of Monday Dec. 6th according to reports from each gin.

Earl Shields, manager of Paymaster Gin in Lelia Lake reported he had ginned only

1203 bales and had only 5 bales on the yard. Due to the snow and rain the last two weeks, and bad weather all year, they will fall way short of the 6800 bales ginned last season, expecting only about 4500 bales this year. However, he reported that what cotton had been ginned was of an excellent grade, above average.

Farmers Co-Op gin manager Dewayne Strickland says they have only ginned 550 bales total as of Monday. They had ginned 8204 bales last year but figures to fall short of that total this season.

Cotton market activity slow

Trading in the Altus marketing Services Friday, December 4 was slow. Supplies were moderate; grower offerings of new crop cotton were light to moderate. Moderate demand was evident for low physical price cotton (up to 47.00 cents per pound). Light buyer demand for high strength cotton (25 grams per tex and higher) to fill nearby commitments elicited premiums of from 25 to 200 points. Prices were steady. Several hundred bales of old crop cotton, low grade, low mike, brought 45.00 to 47.00 cents/lb. A few hundred bales of grades 42 and 52, staples 31 and 32, base mike brought 200 points over the loan. Several hundred bales of grades 42 and higher, mostly 21s and 31s, staples 34 to 36, mostly base mike brought 150 points over the loan.

Grade 42, staple 32, mike 3

5 to 49 was quoted Thursday at 50.75 cents/lb. on the spot market in Dallas and 52.60 cents/lb. in Lubbock. The New York Futures Contract No. 2 for March closed Thursday at 65.16, down 31 points; July 67.17, down 53 points.

Cotton outlook worsens as supply builds, demand declines. The U.S. cotton outlook is being shaped by rising supplies and falling demand, according to the "Cotton and Wool Outlook and Situation Summary" released by USDA's Economic Research Service. Large beginning stocks and record yields are boosting supplies to the highest since 1967-68. Weak demand has pushed prospects for total use to the lowest since 1975. This combination of supply and demand changes is expected to raise stocks on August 1, 1983 to a 16-year high.

Search underway for Texas Rural Hero

The search is under way for Texas' rural hero of 1982. The Rural Heroism Award, sponsored by the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, is presented each year to some person judged to have performed an act of exceptional bravery during a time of crisis, according to Ben Bullard, Council president and assistant safety director of the Texas Farm Bureau.

March 1, 1983, is the deadline for entries to be received by the Rural Heroism Award Committee, Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, P.O. Box 489, Waco, Texas 76703.

The heroic act or human-life-saving deed must have occurred within Texas during 1982 and should be related to farming or ranching operations.

Nominations should include a written account of the incident and the names, addresses, and telephone numbers of all persons involved. Newspaper clippings and pictures should also accompany the nominations, if available.

The award will be presented at the Monday morning opening general session of the 44th Annual Texas Safety Conference and Exposition, April 25, 1983, at the Shamrock-Hilton Hotel in Houston.

Emergency life support helicopter visits Clarendon

Blown in from the west with the gale force winds Tuesday morning, the newly purchased \$550,000 Emergency Life Support Helicopter landed near the Medical Center Building for Mayor Shirley Clifford, members of the EMT team, and several other spectators to admire.

Dave Clark, Jackie Neal and pilot Bob Nash came with the chopper to answer questions and show off the hardware. Contained within the small aerospaceiale French-made helicopter is an EKG monitor, a defibrillation monitor, one stretcher (with capabilities in the future to include one more stretcher which will stack on top of the present one if necessary), all equipment necessary for intubation (management of an emergency airway), mast trousers (inflatable pants to help keep blood pressure up if there is extreme bleeding from the lower extremities), Sager splints, suction, medicines for most kinds of emergency needs, phones connecting both the nurse and the respiratory therapist to the hospital and connections for expandable capabilities.

On a normal run, the helicopter could carry an RN and a respiratory therapist as well as the pilot. They can, at this time, only return with one patient. The team is sent out if there is a life-threatening situation where time is of the utmost importance and where the local EMT team cannot transport the victim quickly enough to save lives. The EMT will determine the need for the copter and call in and within 5 minutes after receiving the call, the copter will be in the air with an ETA of 25 minutes. Within less than an hour, a victim could be in the emergency room at either North West Texas Hospital or St. Anthonys Hospital.

Several Amarillo Foundations are set up to assist needy patients who must utilize this life-saving service but who might not be able to afford it. Also large companies such as Levi have funds set up to help patients afford this service.

Bob Nash is one of two pilots assigned to the 24 hour pilot watch. He has 30 years of flying experience, 24 of that time with helicopters. "I have 12,000 air hours total

with 7,000 hours in the helicopter," Nash said. The helicopter stays 1 week at St. Anthonys, 1 week at NWTX.

with a pilot on 12 hours and off 12. "There will soon be a third pilot," Nash said, "and then it will be 12 on and 24 off."

This helicopter service is on a three month trial basis to see if the expense of it can be justified. If not, the service may be terminated.

Clarendon's fine EMT program, headed by Pat Robertson and Phil Vargas boasts eight EMT's and three ECA's (Emergency Care Attendants). The EMT's other than Robertson and Vargas are: Delbert Robertson and Edie Robertson, Wanona Mooring, Bill Hodges, Jim Mincey and Wayne Hardin. The ECA's are: Connie McAnear, Faye Vargas and Jodi Mincey.

These people are part of a vital, well-functioning life-saving team, but when there is a high risk, too many casualties or a critical time factor involved they will call in the helicopter at their discretion to save their patient.

Varsity teams compete in Spearman

In the first round of the Spearman Tournament last Thursday, the two Clarendon High School varsity basketball teams met defeat. The girls played another very close game but fell to Gruver in the last minute, losing 34-31. The boys held a halftime lead of 20-16 in their contest with Canadian, but faltered in the second half and lost 42-28.

The Lady Broncos were led by Senior Forward Dena Green, who scored 8 points, and by Junior Forward Linda Weatherton, who scored 7 points and got 8 rebounds. Junior Post Connie Garman had 13 rebounds, tops in that category.

The boys led Canadian 11-8 and 20-16 the first two quarters and were down only 26-24 at the end of the third period. But they ran out of gas in the final period as the Wildcats outscored them 16-4 to produce the final 42-28 result. The highest Bronco scorer had only 7 points. That was Junior Post Arlis Thomas. Senior Forward Ray Crump had 6 points and 10 rebounds, while Senior Forward Kelly Hill had 3 points and 13 rebounds.

In the second round of the tournament last Friday, December 3, the Lady Broncos met and defeated Borger for their first win of the season. The score was 38-35. Clarendon trailed the first three quarters but showed good poise to come back and defeat the 4A team. Junior Post Gina Spier led with 9 points, followed by Junior Forward Linda Weatherton with 8 and Senior Forward Dorothy Braddock with 6.

In the night's last game the boys' team also played well. In their best performance thus far in the season, the Broncos fell to a big and tough Gruver team by the score of 52-48. Though starting a front line averaging 6'3" the maroon team gave up size at almost every position, but they still seized 35 rebounds. Senior Forward Ray Crump had 10 of them and Junior Forward Johnny Gaines had 8.

The Broncos trailed 29-22 at halftime but scored 20 points in the third quarter with an effective press and fast break to take a 42-41 lead going into the final period. But Gruver held on to win, aided by the 23 fouls called against Clarendon (compared to only 4 called against Gruver for the entire game). Clarendon outscored their opponent from the field, but was awarded only 4 free throws compared to the 24 that Gruver shot.

The Broncos were led by Crump and Senior Guard David Weatherton with 12 and 8 points, respectively. In Coach Wright's grading system, which takes into account shots made and missed rebounds, fouls, assists, steals, turnovers, and defense, the two seniors both scored 22 "performance scores" which is considered outstanding.

Also impressive were Junior Guard Richard Gaines Senior Guard Brett Bryant,

18-15, 21-20 by quarters), but was outscored 12-2 in the final quarter.

In the evening's finale, the boys' varsity team lost their game by the score of 52-37. Costly turnovers and cold shooting (only 22% on field goals) ruined hopes of the season's first victory. Senior Forward Ray Crump hit a respectable 40% on his shots (8 for 20 from the field) and 80% from the line (4 of 5 free throws) for a game-high 20 points. He also had 11 rebounds. Senior Forward Kelly Hill led in rebounds with 13, but suffered through a 1 for 13 shooting night.

Overall, it was not a good night for the Broncho teams (JV girls excepted). But the players and coaches are confident that things will begin to look up soon.

Resurfacing bids open

Bids for resurfacing more than 105 miles in eight counties in the Childress district are to be opened Dec. 7-8 by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation (DHT).

Surface cracks, caused by traffic and weather, will be seal coated to prevent water from penetrating the roadbed. During winter's freeze-thaw cycles such penetration can cause pavement failure. The work will also improve skid resistance.

Navy Reserves swabs Girlstown teeth

Members of the Navy Reserve medical department, a naval version of the M.A.S.H. unit, made a trip to Girlstown in Borger November 20, 1982 to present a dental hygiene program to the 13 girls and their leaders.

Commander Carr, a dentist from Amarillo, Commander Moffett, an RN attending WTSU, Lt. Shadbolt, an anesthesiologist, Chief Petty Officer Katie Dvorak from Clarendon, HMI Pickett, a respiratory therapist, HM3 Stalter, Amarillo city employee, Hospitalman Queen, a new transplant from Tennessee, and DT2 Childs, a nursing home employee all spent Saturday morning at Girlstown.

They took a 35 mm movie about brushing and oral hygiene to show the girls. Each girl was given an eye test, blood pressure check and an oral examination to check for cavities or other abnormalities.

Then, each girl was given a disclosing tablet, a harmless red dye which discloses the bacterial plaque which forms on teeth and can cause decay and gum disease. Each girl was given a toothbrush, compliments of the Naval Enlisted Reserves Association, and shown how to properly brush away the red colored plaque.

In appreciation, the wonderful girls, ranging in age from 9 to 17, gave each of the sailors a tour of their campus and their cottages. They take great pride in their rooms and individual achievements. Then they prepared a delicious meal for all of the sailors.

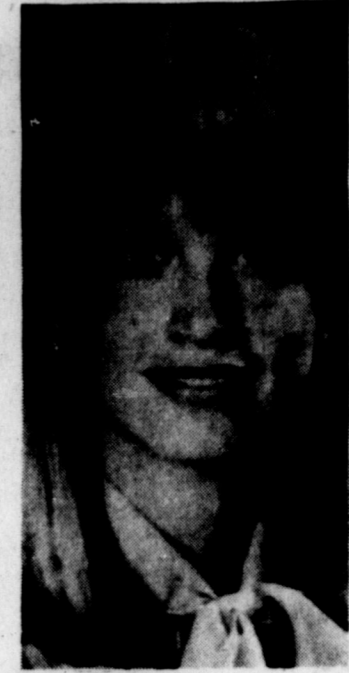
During the business meeting the Christmas donation for the Girlstown was taken. After the business meeting the group went to the First Methodist Church for the program.

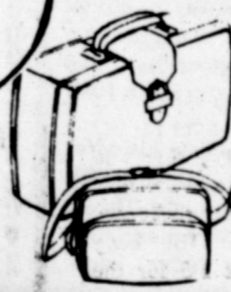

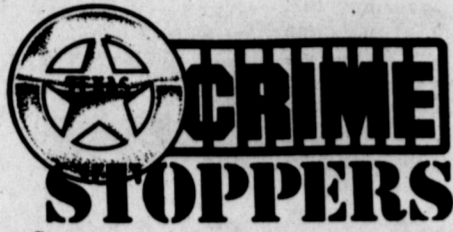

WT Utilities rates go up

West Texas Utilities Co. rates will increase early next year by an average of 4.7 per cent as result of a settlement agreement reached this past week.

WTU and all parties involved, including the Public Utility Commission staff and the Texas Municipal League, agreed on a retail revenue increase of \$10.2 million annually. WTU had proposed an increase of \$20.4 million.

The main difference between WTU's request and the amount allowed is the rate of return on common equity. WTU had sought 18 per cent and received 16.25

per cent, which is about the same percentage granted in WTU's last rate settlement last February.

"It is obvious that as result of this settlement we'll have to ask for another increase sooner than we had hoped," said Jerry Chambliss, WTU local manager.

He said WTU management has indicated that a new rate case may be filed as early as April of 1983. The new rates are scheduled to go into effect Jan. 7 unless the PUC changes the date.

Effect on monthly residential bills, including both the base rate and estimated fuel cost charges, would be as

follows:

For 600 kilowatt-hours--\$45.76 at 7.63 cents per kilowatt-hour, compared to \$43.39 at 7.23 cents per KWH under the present rates.

For 1,000 kilowatt-hours--\$71.98 at 7.20 cents per kilowatt-hour, compared to \$68.30 at 6.83 cents per KWH under the present rates.

Residential rates vary, depending on whether the home has electric water heating, or a combination of both, but the average increase for the residential customer classes will be 4.96 per cent. The increase for commercial customers will average 5.55 per cent and the increase for large power customers would average 2.95 per cent.

Gas Tax

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Tuesday President Reagan's suggested 5-cent-per-gallon gasoline tax increase would leave "Texas on the short end of the stick again".

The Comptroller explained a federal hike would preempt the talked-about increase in Texas' state gasoline tax, which has been at the same nickel-a-gallon level for the past 25 years.

"This is going to cost Texans \$480 million a year," Bullock said. "This is money the Texas Legislature won't be able to spend if it's needed because we'll be shipping those dollars out of state."

"Historically, we Texans have only gotten about 70 cents back for every dollar in motor fuel taxes we have sent to Washington. We've got roads and bridges right here at home that need to be repaired. We could raise the money to pay for this work here in Texas if Reagan would live up to his word to get the federal government off our backs."

the President's top economic advisor, Martin Feldstein, has said the President's proposal will cost more jobs than it would create.

The Texas Highway Commission has proposed increasing the Texas tax by the same nickel per gallon as suggested by the administration.

"We are being undercut by the federal government. If this proposal gets ramrodded through Congress, Texans can look forward to higher taxes and deeper potholes while their hard-earned money creates a piddling number of jobs somewhere else," Bullock said.

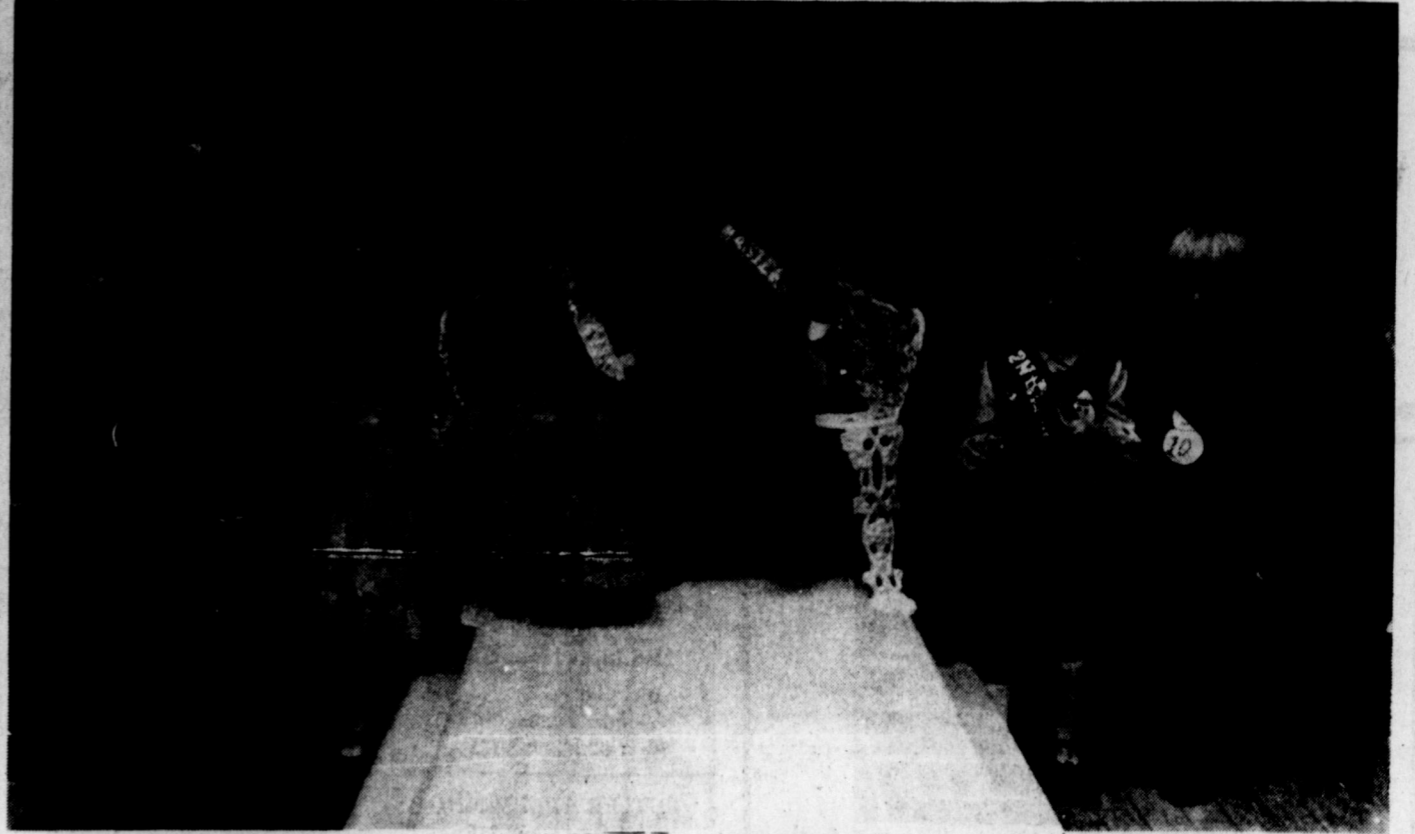

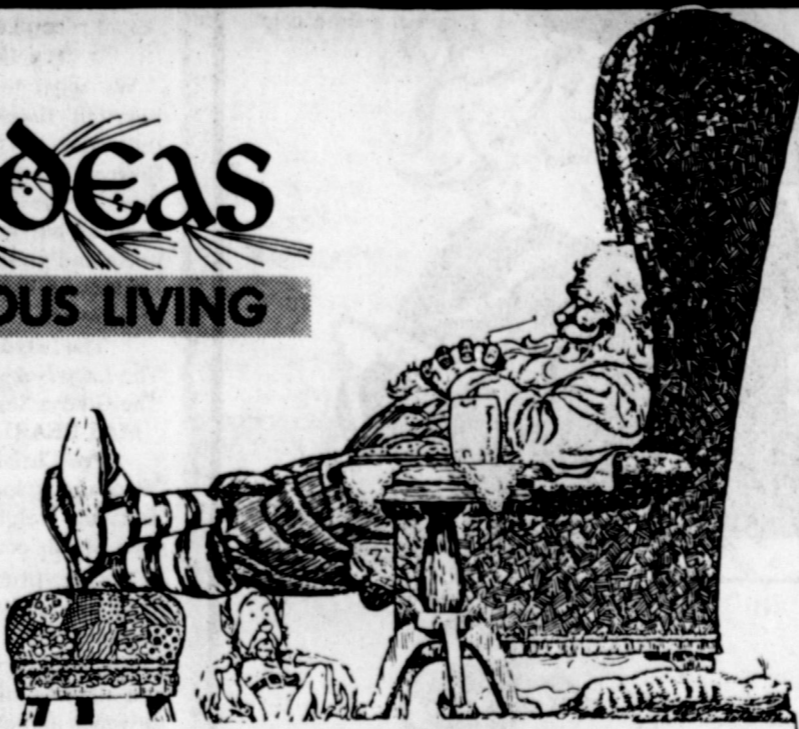

Accurate records for taxes

When the time comes for filing a federal tax return, good records can mean the difference between filing an accurate return or an inaccurate one, the Internal Revenue Service says. Also, good records can ensure that taxpayers take all the deductions and benefits to which they are entitled.

Taxpayers are not required to use a specific recordkeeping system. However, receipts, cancelled checks, bills, old returns, and other written documents are essential in proving expenses. Tax records should be kept at least three years after the return is due or filed, or two years after the tax was paid, whichever is later.

An exception to the three-year retention rule is a property transaction, such as the purchase of real estate. These records should be kept for as long as they are helpful in determining the basis of original or replacement property.

More detailed information about recordkeeping appears in the free IRS Publication 552, "Recordkeeping Requirements and a List of Tax Publications." Taxpayers can obtain the free publication by mail by using the handy order blank contained in the tax package or by calling the IRS Tax Forms/Information number listed in the local telephone directory.

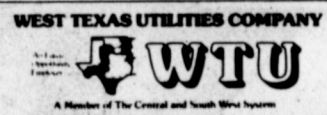

Oil and Gas Production

Railroad Commission Chairman Jim Nugent announced that Texas oil and gas wells produced 510,706,037 Mcf of gas in August 1982, down 11.76 percent from field runs a year earlier.

Marketed gas production totaled 419,491,249 Mcf and reflected a 13.99 percent decrease from the August 1981 volume. Marketed production is the total gas to transmission lines, carbon black and plant fuel and lease use.

Gas exported from Texas in August totaled 219,814,908 Mcf. Exports of Texas-produced gas in August totaled 160,106,885 Mcf, and reflected a 6.57 percent decrease from the year-earlier month.

Texas gas production in August came from 230,114 oil and gas wells. In July 1982, Texas wells produced 506,537,897 Mcf of gas. Marketed gas production in July totaled 415,675,290 Mcf. July exports of Texas-produced gas totaled 155,682,104 Mcf.

Through the first eight months of this year, Texas produced 4,094,887,655 Mcf of gas. For the same period, marketed gas production totaled 3,411,957,583 Mcf.

Texas crude oil production totaled 70,546,688 barrels in September.

The figure compares with reported August production totaling 73,062,071 barrels and September 1981 production of 72,985,325 barrels.

Texas oil production averaged 2,351,556 barrels daily in September, down from 2,357,486 barrels daily in August and down from 2,432,844 barrels daily in September 1981.

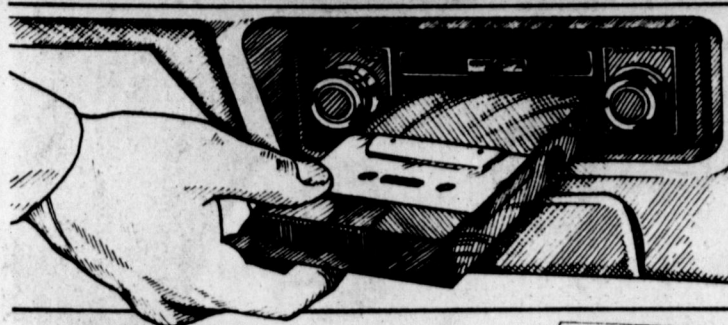
The September allowable totaled 91,590,346 barrels.

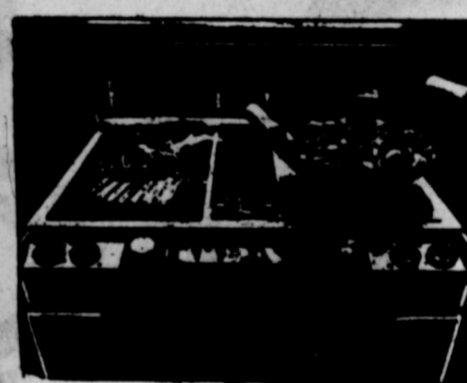

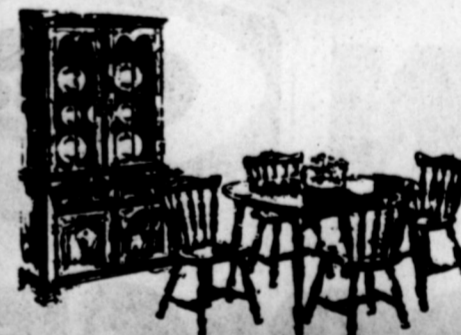

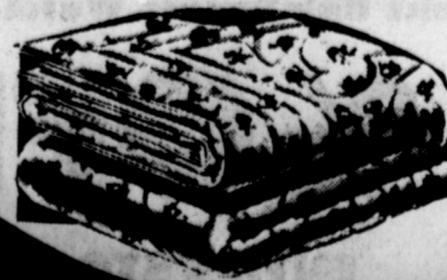

Deregulation of your telephone ...how will it affect you

Deregulation. What does it mean to the nation's telephone industry — and the customers it serves? All of the hows, whys and maybes are not determined, but here are answers to some often-asked questions.

Q. What is deregulation?

A. Simply, it's the process of removing state and federal controls from many services provided by the telecommunications industry. It means customers can select equipment and services in a competitive market without regulation by a regulatory commission.

Q. When does it happen?

A. Deregulation isn't new. Federal Communications Commission rulings over the past three decades have allowed some competition in terminal equipment (telephones, multi-line systems, etc.) and in long-distance services. But deregulation surfaced as a major public issue when the FCC mandated total deregulation of new terminal equipment, effective January 1, 1983.

Q. Why does the FCC want the telephone industry to be deregulated?

A. The FCC believes competitive markets are most efficient. Deregulation — and competition — will encourage new services and open more options to customers.

Actually, the FCC is but one of the driving forces behind deregulation. Congress, the Justice Department and the Reagan Administration (like others before it) all are eager to deregulate the American telephone business.

Q. What is GTE's position regarding deregulation?

A. GTE feels that deregulation ultimately will benefit all concerned. Competition is the American way and GTE expects to compete aggressively.

Q. Just what services will continue under regulation?

A. After January 1, the basic local and long-distance switching networks will continue to be regulated. So will all in-place equipment on customer premises. New equipment will be excluded from regulation, as will "enhanced" services, which combine basic service with computer processing to provide additional, different or restructured information.

Q. How does this affect customers?

A. The big change is in lease and purchase arrangements for telephones, multi-line systems and other equipment in a customer's home or business.

After January 1, existing customers may continue to lease their phones from General Telephone. In addition, they have the option of purchasing phones — either from General Telephone or another supplier.

New customers also will be able to buy phones anywhere they choose (including General Telephone). Cost of equipment purchased by customers will be determined by the marketplace — not regulatory commissions. Lease options also will be available to new customers, but again will be determined by the marketplace — not the regulators.

There's another important point. By definition, anyone who alters existing service will be classified as a new customer. People who move from one residence to another — even though both are served by General Telephone — would be considered new customers under deregulation guidelines.

Q. Will all customers be affected by deregulation?

A. No. The FCC's order applies only to single-line service. Customers on multi-party lines may continue to lease phones from General Telephone with all the traditional services. For a period after deregulation begins, party line customers may have some options that will not be available after January 1, 1983 to single-line customers.

Q. Will it affect the cost of telephone service?

A. Deregulation will have an impact on virtually every aspect of the telephone industry — including cost. It should result in lower prices for some services and higher prices for others. The net effect of deregulation — and the competition it creates — is that each product or service provided by General Telephone must pay its own way, without subsidies from other segments of the business.

For example, revenues from various optional services have traditionally subsidized the cost of providing basic local service. That ensured basic telephone service was affordable to nearly everyone. But competition will force prices to more closely reflect the true cost of any service. Local rates probably will rise; others may decrease. Either way, customers will be asked to pay for the cost of the services they use.

Q. So what are the benefits to the consumer?

A. With deregulation comes competition. With competition comes the suppliers' desire to provide customers with what they want, when they want it, resulting in many options, introduction of new technology and keeping costs at the lowest possible level.

Q. Won't there be a lot of people who will be unable to afford a telephone?

A. GTE expects to help customers meet increases in telephone rates by phasing in certain options for flat rate pricing, including Usage Sensitive Service (USS) which is a measured service.

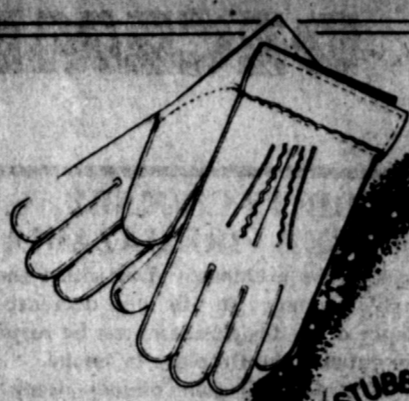

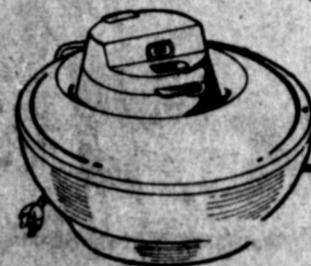

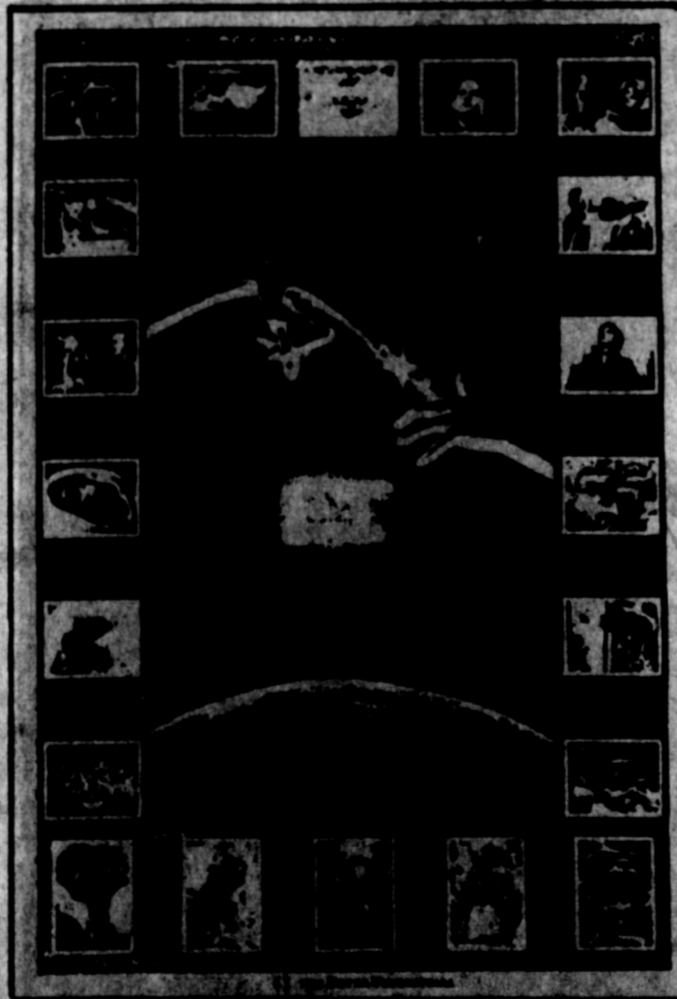
