A weed-cating fish, the white amur, is expected to reverse the spread of water weed that has clogged almost half of lake Conroe's 20,000

acres. Hydrilla, the exotic waterweed, grows at a phenominal rate and is a hazard to motoring. swimming and makes it difficult for fish to breathe. It is also easily transplanted from lake to lake on the propellors of motors.

The white amur, used as a food fish in the Far East, should be compatible with game fish. Since it is not competitive for food and helps improve the environment needed by game fish and fishermen, it is hoped that fishing, boating and swimming will be imporved. Greenbelt's crappie.





# **Cotton growers** meet at Childress

#### REPORTER NAOMI GREEN \$100,000 per line. Lamesa

Cotton growers of the area assembled at Childress to hear speaker. Charles Chinnes from Cotton Council Jessie Moore from USDA grading office and Weldon Murray, Texas and Oklahoma Cotton Growers Assoc. last Thursday.

The good news is that Lamesa has, through gover-nment grants and private investment, succeeded with twelve HVI testing machines in aiding farmers of that area to more correctly class and evaluate their cotton. This gives them an advantage in marketing to the mills if their cotton has the qualities mills need.

Approximately 5% of cotton graded nation wide is graded by machine. Presently machines are used to arbitrate between cotton buyers and the mills when there is a difference of opinion over contracts.

When asked if the HVI machines would speed the return of grade cards the answer was "Nothing will improve the efficiency of the Altus grading office if we have another season of uninterupted harvest and ginning weather. The office ran two shifts of eight hours while gins were running 24 hour shifts."

Midwestern State University, which was a beneficiary of the old tax, filed a suit to force the state to collect the tax at its pre-1979 level. 


