Rain and hail damages crops

Recent rains have begun to curse the area rather than sate the thirsty ground. Thursday of last week, area farmers suffered severe rain and hail damage to crops and homes. The Ashtola-Martin, the Brice and the Chamberlain areas suffered the brunt of the storm which dumped as much as 2" of rain Thursday and Friday. The hail was the real killer, however.

Ashtola residents reported that the hail lasted 35 minutes as was from marble sized to golf ball sized. Trees were totally stripped of their leaves, the tender cotton plants were flattened out and fields were standing in water.

Windy Valley had .80 inches Sunday, but 1 1/2" from the Thursday/Friday rains. The hail was pop-corn sized and damaged crops, but the cotton looks like it might come back if there are no more rains or hail. Sunday night wind damaged the fields because it blew so hard before it rained and kicked up the dust.

Levia Lake had suffered heavy flooding rains, but Thursday they received .90 and had no hail, Friday they got .60 inches and Sunday they had strong winds before they got .50" of rain. Herbert Shields recalls when he was a kid, he was hoeing cotton in the fields on July 4th. He could hear the sirens in the parade as he chopped cotton that had small bolls and blossoms on it!

Howardwick had 2 1/2" of rain since Thursday and little hail or wind damage.

Thursday evening, the highway department had to clear the roads of the hail that accumulated, creating a driving hazard for motorists not used to hail covering the

roads. The hail piled up on 287 and 70. The rain came so fast that it flooded the roads and the highway patrol was flagging motorists to wait until it could run off of the roads. Many cars reported severe hail damage and some windshields were broken out from the heavy, large hail.

The damage was spotty, the repaving job east of town didn't stop because all they had was some light sprink-

ling, yet south and southwest of town, crops were damaged, homes were damaged and trees were ruined.

County Agent Ronald Gooch said that Ashtola, Martin, Brice, Chamberlain and areas west and southwest of Clarendon are near-disaster areas. "The cotton was in the 3-4 leaf stage or just coming up. That is very unusual for this time of the

year, we are late getting it in because it has just stayed so wet," Gooch said.

"Most of the farmers may not replant cotton because it is just too late and the fields are too wet. Most have put down Treflan and Prowl which makes it just about impossible to put in another crop. "Some may try to put in a milo if they can get it down under the herbicide," Gooch said, "it would be a

gamble at that. The herbicide limits what crop could go in next and most farmers just haven't decided what they want to try."

Milo isn't a good money crop, neither is soybean, but any crop now is better than none at all.

The ASCS was not available for comment on disaster damage at press time.

Sheriff saves tax money

Sheriff Jimmy Thompson has begun a program a month ago that will save many thousands of Donley County taxpayers dollars in the long run. This program is to work the county jail "residents" during the day to earn their keep. The program is a state regulated program, but since our jail has been built and the inmates have filled the cells, Sheriff Thompson has decided to utilize their manpower on work projects.

The men have painted the outside and inside of the jail, planted grass in the west part of the jail plot, they keep the area clean and wash patrol cars, the inmates have moved and cleaned up the courthouse lawn, even discovering a sidewalk long ago grown over with grass. The men will be available to the city as well, cleaning up and taking care of the park, particularly in preparation for the forthcoming July festivities.

"These men will be available for any tax paying public works, Sheriff Thompson said "The city, county and

schools may ask for them to work on their buildings or grounds."

There is a deputy on duty to supervise the workers. Those inmates who are working off a court fine or short term sentence can work a day and have a day removed from their sentence. Felons will be working without that privilege, their time will not be shortened by the days they spend working.

The men are kept working six days a week from morning until early evening. They are currently doing painting inside the old courthouse building. There are now ten inmates who are being used in this work program. They benefit from this program as well as does the county taxpayers.

The men are outside, working, keeping busy, being constructive citizens and working off sentence time. They have reduced taxpayers money in the jobs they have done as well as by reducing the length of time they stay in the jail and are a burden to the taxpayers.

Two types of loans are available for producers that participate in the 1982 program: (1) A regular nine month loan is available, and (2) a three year reserve loan may be obtained. The basic county loan rate for a regular loan is \$3.54 bu. plus protein premium, minus storage charges and other grading discounts that will affect the rate.

The Reserve loan rate is \$3.99 per bu., plus protein premiums and minus any grading factor that will affect the rate. In addition, a 16.5c

per bu. storage payment per year will be paid. Interest will be charged for one year only, and the reserve loan may not be redeemed until the market prices reaches \$4.65 per bu.

Report Cotton, Grain Sorghum and conservation use acres

As soon as you have your crops planted, you need to come in and report. The State Committee moved the deadline up this year. The final date to report is August 1, 1982.

Report Disaster affected Crops

Even though the disaster program is no longer in effect, you should report any program crop that is lost due to a natural disaster, if the crop will not be replanted to the same crop. The reason for this report is to protect the farm history and make the crop eligible for any possible deficiency payments that might be made.

Measurement Service

If you are having trouble measuring your crops or conserving use acres, we can measure the acreage for a nominal fee.

A tolerance of 5 percent applies to dryland and irrigated separately, so be sure and measure accurately.

Crop and Livestock Report
Each farmer and rancher is urged to fill out carefully and

return to Austin if you receive one. Questionnaires are confidential and used only for State and County estimates.

Eligibility for participation in all programs administered by ASCS is established under law without regard to race, color, religion, sex, handicap or national origin.

This club is really progressing well and promises to represent Donley County proudly and respectfully at both in and out of county activities.



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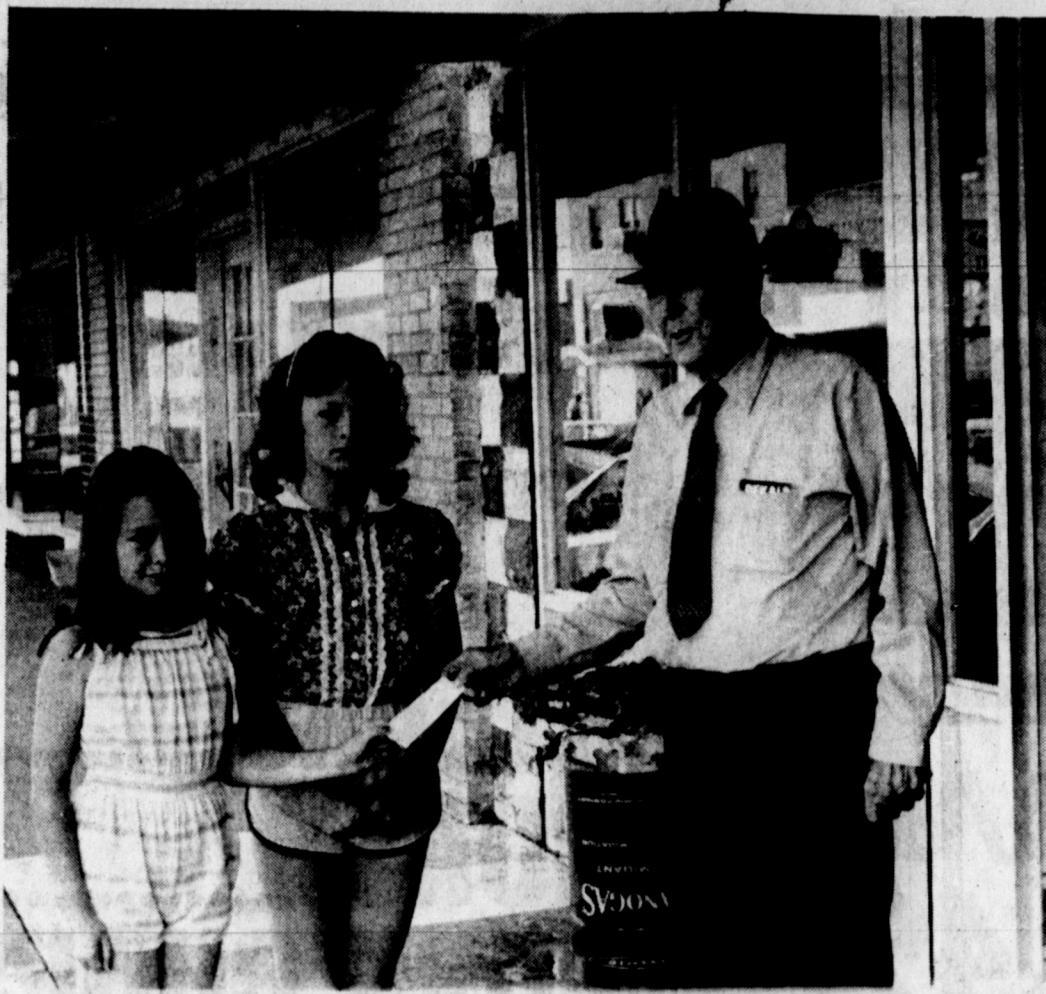

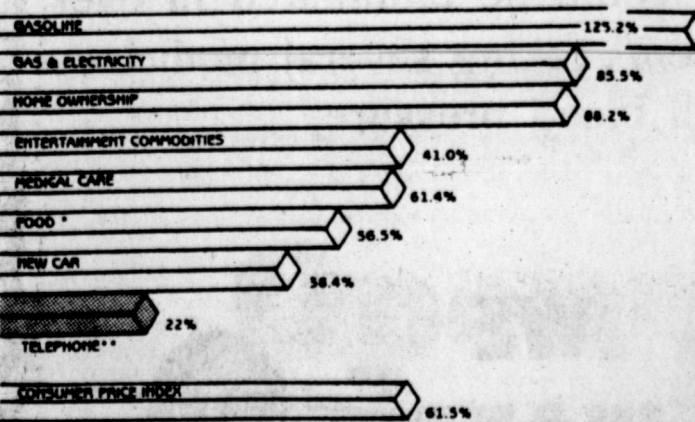

Texas cities get \$35.5 million

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$35.5 million to 966 Texas cities as their share of the one-percent city sales tax for June.

"These monthly rebates are keeping ahead of last year's payments," Bullock said. "With 1982 half over, they are nearly 14 percent higher than the amount we had paid by this time last year."

Clarendon's net payment this period was \$4,377.57, making a total payment to date of \$39,654.22, up from last year's payment of \$34,752.47 a 14 percent change.

Hedley received no payment, and Howardwick received no payment for this period.

Check your license requirements

You need a license to drive a motor vehicle, work in certain jobs such as beautician, barber, or in the medical field, to fish and to hunt. You also need one to trap.

Anyone going after the main ingredient in baked 'coon or 'possum and sweet 'taters needs to have a trappers license, but such furbearers may be possessed only in the open season during December and January. Although they may be hunted by holders of a trappers license during the rest of the year, their pelts and carcasses may not be in possession of the hunter.

Hunting bobcats, rabbits and coyotes may be done year 'round but the hunter needs a valid hunting license if hunting in a county other than his county of residence.

Pelts and carcasses may be possessed any time, but bobcat pelts may not be sold without a special tag from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and pelts may be tagged only during a designated tagging period.

Taking freshwater mussels or clams for any purpose requires a special \$10 license.

Be sure you are covered in any activity before the game warden corrects your error. Call Gary Hunt to ask about seasons, tags, licenses, restrictions BEFORE you go after your prey.

WATCH YOUR STEP

High blood pressure is commonly treated using a "stepwise approach". The first step is use of nondrug measures such as restriction of salt in the diet, moderate exercise, and weight control. Quite often, this step is all that is needed to control high pressures. Throwing away the salt shaker is recognized as very important in this regard.

If non-drug measures do not provide control, a number of drugs may be added in stepwise fashion. The first drug added is usually a diuretic or, rather, "water pill". Almost 40% of people having high blood pressure respond to diuretics and need only take a single medication.

As the next drug step, a medicine that inhibits the actions of the nervous system (antiadrenergic) is added to the diuretic. Drugs in this category include reserpine, methyldopa, propranolol, and clonidine.

The third line drugs that are added to the above are the vasodilators...drugs which relax the blood vessels. Examples include prazosin and hydraloazine.

Are so many drugs always needed? Not according to researchers at George Washington University Medical School. They found that one drug could be eliminated in over half of 51 patients taking several medicines to control high blood pressure.

 - Use a piece of fruit to top off a dessert or drink.
 - Cubes of bright-colored gelatin can be used instead of fruit.
 - Mint sprigs or leaves add color and flavor (be careful about what type of leaf you use, some are poisonous).
 - Grape or ivy leaf under a fruit cup makes an attractive cooling setting.

GAZPACHO

- (cold vegetable soup)
- 2 1/2 C diced peeled tomatoes
1 1/2 C finely chopped green pepper
3/4 finely chopped onion
1/2 C thinly sliced celery
1/2 C finely chopped peeled cucumbers
1 can (12 oz) cocktail vegetable juice
1/2 C beef consommé
1 clove garlic, crushed
1 tsp sugar
1/2 tsp salt
1/2 tsp pepper
dash of hot sauce

Combine all ingredients and chill well. Serve in well chilled mugs or bowls, garnish with sprigs of parsley.

CURRIED EGG SALAD AND HOT DOGS

- 1/4 C mayonnaise (NOT salad dressing)
1 tsp prepared mustard
1/2 tsp dried minced onion
1/2 tsp curry powder
6 chopped hard cooked eggs
4 large hot dogs, heated
4 French rolls, split and heated
- Combine mayonnaise, and seasonings with eggs. Mix gently and chill until serving.
- Spoon 1/4 C egg salad mix into each roll, top with heated hot dog.

Bagworm pickin' time

Bagworm damage to evergreens such as arbovitae, cedar and other shrubs is being found now, says County Extension Agent Ronald Gooch.

Evergreens should be matched carefully at this time of year, especially if old worm bags are found on the tree. Wingless females crawl out and die after laying eggs inside the bag. In this case, each bag may contain hundreds of eggs which hatch into tiny larvae.

The newly-hatched larvae immediately start to make bags by chewing off small pieces of the tree. Young worms carry the bags wherever they go. The larvae can be killed with insecticides applied when the bagworms are still small. Chemical controls are ineffective when

worms are full grown. Chemicals suggested as controls include Sevin, Malathion or Toxaphene. The insecticide applications should be applied at 7 to 10 day intervals until the bagworms are eliminated. Directions on the container should be followed carefully, the county agent emphasized.

The feeding worms, when infestations are heavy, will remove the foliage and bark from all or parts of a tree or shrub, resulting in death of the plant or the heavily infested parts. If control measures are started too late, hand pick and burn the bags, because the worm goes through the winter in the egg stage within the bag, said Gooch.

Community vegetable market idea

Thoughts of fresh fruits and vegetables at a reasonable price appeals to most of our palates as well as our pocketbooks, especially now when making ends meet is somewhat more difficult than it used to be.

On the other hand, weekend gardeners who wind up with more produce than their families can use generally would rather see it go to a good cause than watch it spoil.

Both of these elements have brought a rejuvenation of the local community market concept.

There are three major criteria for this type of market, produce growers who are interested in selling, an easily accessible facility and consumers interested in buying fresh farm produce.

In the summer, many people buy vegetables in hamper lots to use in home canning and freezing. Therefore, growers should have various quantities of fresh produce available. In addition, homemade cakes, bread, cider and any other items may be sold.

One difficulty for a

community in establishing a market is that it's sometimes hard to identify growers. Those who would be willing to participate are the small, weekend gardeners rather than the established, big-time producers.

Community markets also have social aspect. This enables people to get together and drink coffee and chat as well as carry on their business.

Research conducted following a measles outbreak in Buffalo, New York, has influenced many physicians to recommend that parents delay immunizing their children until after the infant's first birthday.

According to a recent broadcast sponsored by the Columbia-Presbyterian Medical Center and The Prudential Insurance Company, health officials in Buffalo found that the majority of the afflicted children studied had been immunized before their first birthday.

Dr. Richard Judelson, Erie County communicable disease control officer, said, "Children who receive the vaccine before 12 months of age were at a three-times greater risk of contracting measles. The ages between 13 and 14 months were gray areas. Our final conclusion, therefore, was to immunize children at 15 months of age."

Dr. Judelson explained that the blood of children less

than a year old still contains measles antibodies passed on by the mother during pregnancy.

"Most women in the United States are protected against

measles," said Dr. Judelson. "Those antibodies go into the baby and stay with the infant from six to as many as 15 months. If the mother's antibodies are still present in

the child, the vaccine virus is neutralized. We recommend waiting to immunize for 15 months, so those antibodies will have fully disappeared."
