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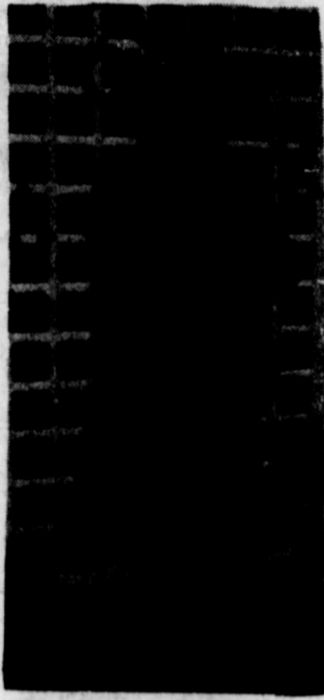


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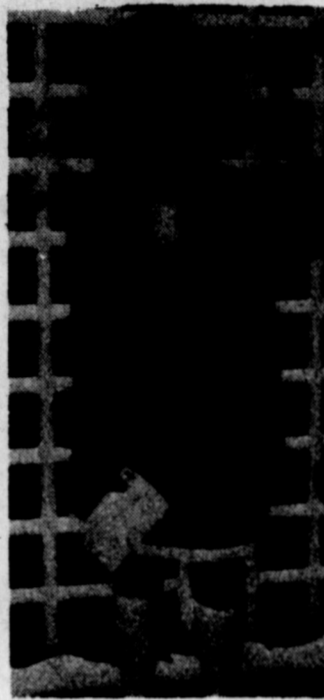

4-H Fashion show winners

Several 4-H'ers were named winners of the Donley County 4-H Fashion Show, July 20, at the Clarendon College Auditorium. Cherri Brown, County Extension Agent, presented special awards including "Best Model" to Deniece Richardson. Christina Leathers won in the Intermediate Daytime Non-tailored division. In the Junior Category, the winners were Audra

Hoggard-Daytime Non-tailored; Katrina Leathers-Active Sportswear; and Rogina Gray-Evening and Specialty Wear. Other 4-H'ers entered include Kari Shields-Daytime Non-tailored. Taylor-Ann Harbet was a blue ribbon winner in the PeeWee Division but will not go to the District Contest. Each of the category winners and the special award winners received \$10 prize

money donated by the Extension Homemaker Clubs in Donley County. The four winners in the Senior division at the District Show will progress to the

Texas 4-H Fashion Show, September 15-16, in Corpus Christi. Judges for the Fashion

Show were Deana Finck-County CEA and Nancy Bigby-Collingsworth CEA. Each of the five category

winners will represent Donley County at the Panhandle District I Fashion Show to be held July 29 in Amarillo.

GTE opens office

The advantages of a local telephone company business office will be available in Clarendon beginning August 4, 1982.

Jim Davis, operations manager for General Telephone, said the company will open a local service agency at Delores Crump's Art Studio, 311 South Carhart.

"The local service agency will have all the advantages of a business office, allowing customers to call billing or service personnel direct," Davis said. "In addition, customers will be able to save money by taking advantage of services offered through the service agency such as picking up phones which can be taken home and plugged into GTE Phone Mart jacks or returning phones when discontinuing service."

Davis said customers can use the service agency to:

- *Pay their telephone bill.
- *View a display and/or catalog to order telephone instruments.
- *Call the billing center direct concerning billing questions.
- *Call the business office direct to install, add or discontinue service, or for other service needs.

In addition, customers can use the service agency to:

- *Have telephone instruments tested to determine if they require repair.

*Bring phones for minor repairs. Phones can be replaced if Major repairs are necessary.

*Return phones when discontinuing service to avoid the charge to have the company send an employee to pick up the phone, or the cost of purchasing the phones.

*Pick up phones, take the phones home and plug them into GTE Phone Mart jacks to avoid the premise visit charge.

*Purchase miscellaneous equipment, including GTE Phone Mart jack charge and premise visit charge that applies if the company makes the installation.

*Purchase house wiring to do the wiring or repair of bad wiring to save the wiring charge and premise visit charge if the company does the work.

Davis said, "The local service agency gives customers a convenient location to allow them to take advantage of the cost-saving service available which allows customers to participate in the maintenance of their service. "As deregulation of the industry continues, there will be more and more changes to recover the costs of services from customers receiving the benefit of the service and the new service agency will give customers a convenient way to save and conduct business."

9 Complete EMS training

Eight Clarendon residents and one from Memphis successfully completed an EMS course at Clarendon College on July 20, 1982. The class, which began on June 1, consisted of 40 classroom hours of intensive emergency medical training in several areas including medical emergencies (stroke, heart attack, environmental emergencies, diabetes, etc.), bandaging and splinting, CPR, mechanical aids to breathing, childbirth, vital signs, patient assessment, multiple trauma, and many other subjects. In addition to learning how to diagnose medical problems and trauma, the students were also taught all of the necessary skills to treat these problems. At the conclusion of the class, the students were tested on three skills and were given a written test by the Texas Department of

Health. All of the students attained a passing grade and most scored extremely high on both the skills and written exams. These people will be certified for four years and will have to go through refresher training at that time.

Those who were recertified as Emergency Medical Technicians were Jim Mincey, Bill Hodges, Wayne Hardin, Wynona Mooring, Debbie Davenport RN, all of Clarendon and Jerry Burleson of Memphis. These six were previously certified EMT's and this course served as a refresher course for them.

Those certified as Emergency Care Attendants were Fay Vargas, Jo Dee Mincey, and Connie McAnear. These three ladies had never had any previous medical training and did exceptionally well in the class. Wayne Hardin had a perfect score on the written exam and Wynona Mooring, Debbie Davenport, and Jo Dee Mincey had perfect scores on their skills exam.

Clarendon is extremely fortunate to have all these fine people trained in emergency medical care and should be very proud of them. They all gave of their own time to attend these

classes. Instructors for the course were Paramedics Phillip Vargas and Pat Robertson.

Firemen train at A & M

The 1982 Texas Fireman's Training School is being held at the Texas A&M University campus, July 25-30. Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies and the Donley County Farm Bureau will jointly sponsor one fireman to the school.

Lloyd McCord, Sr. of Clarendon, who is a fireman with the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department, will study modern fire-fighting techniques and disaster operations, along with fire prevention

procedures at the school. All firemen and fire marshals attending the annual fireman's training school will participate in conferences conducted by the Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies. These include "Interest in Rural Fire Protection" by Ed Drake, TFB Insurance Companies director of administration; and "Preventing Rural Fires" by Ward Cross, former TFB Insurance Companies administrative assistant.

Bronco athletes meet Aug 4

Property to be appraised

During this week, property owners will receive a detailed notice of appraised market value of their property. The law requiring property to be valued equivalent to the current market has been with us for almost a century. The enforcing requirements are new but are state-wide through local appraisal districts.

The appraisal notices disclose the allowance of any exemption applied for by the property owner. Also disclosed is an estimated tax rate for each tax entity and an estimated amount of tax for 1982, if the levy is unchanged. Also shown is the tax amount charged last

year for a comparison.

The only part the appraisal effects is the market value and it must be accomplished by lawfully prescribed methods. The rate and tax amount is set by the locally elected governing body of each tax entity.

Should any property owner believe the market value should be changed and wants a hearing with the Board of Review, that person must file a specific written protest. Protest forms are available together with an information pamphlet at the appraisal district office in the Courthouse Annex.

Board of Review hearings will begin August 16, 1982.

Lone Star requests rate hike

Lone Star Gas Company has requested an increase in its city gas rate. The city gate is the delivery point at which a city distribution system receives gas from its supplier. This would involve 451 cities and outlying areas and more than 1.1 million bill-paying customers including towns in the Donley County area.

Texas' Railroad Commission has suspended the \$90 million natural gas rate increase for 120 days, the suspension order signed by Chairman Jim Nugent and Commissioners Mack Wallace and Buddy Temple.

In examining the proposed rate increase, the Railroad Commission will analyze Lone Star revenue and determine the reasonableness of the company's expenses.

Lone Star wanted the hike to begin August 2, but the hearing on the application has been set for September 14.

GTE to charge directory assistance

The Public Utility Commission of Texas approved \$46.8 million in new revenues for General Telephone Company of the Southwest during final hearings July 14 on the company's \$110 million rate filing.

The final order, officially signed July 19, issued by the commission will result in most customers receiving refunds ranging from 10 to 40 cents per month. The refunds are the result of the company placing new rates for most services in effect June 4 under state law, subject to refund of the difference between the June 4 rates and the final rates approved by the commission July 14.

The only changes from the June 4 rates are reductions ranging from 10 to 35 cents in all local basic service rates, and a five-cent reduction per month in some business rates for extended area service or toll-free calling to neighboring exchanges.

Customers who did not have increased rates under bond will not receive refunds. This includes customers in Denton, Kilgore and Del Rio, and one-party business customers in San Angelo, Bryan, College Station and Texarkana.

The rates placed in effect June 4 for services other than local basic service and -- in addition to these changes, new charges became effective July 14 for some services which were not placed in effect under bond June 4. These services include directory assistance charging, late pay charge for business accounts and returned check charges.

The charge for directory assistance will begin Aug. 1. Customers will have a monthly 10-call per line allowance with a 25 cent charge applying for each call that exceeds the allowance.

The late charge will begin for business customers Aug. 1. The charge will be a 5 percent fee for the unpaid balance if not paid by the date due as shown on the bill.

E.L. "Buddy" Langley, president of General Telephone, said "We are glad the commission has recognized the need for additional revenues which are critical to our service improvement and modernization programs in Texas.

"But we are naturally disappointed they did not award more. We thought we had done a good job of explaining our needs and presenting a strong plea for our total need. While we did

not receive what we asked for, we will take what we received and make it go as far as possible."

Langley said the commission concurred with the company's proposal to bill only customers who have EAS or toll-free calling between exchanges for the additional investments required to provide the service, and to show those charges separately on customer bills.

"Some customers have misunderstood the change. It is a charge customers have paid in the past; however, it was not formerly shown as a separate charge on their monthly bills," he explained.

"If their statement shows, for example, a charge of \$7.90 for local service and \$5.50 for EAS, they would still be paying the same total of \$13.40 if the rates were not shown separately."

He said EAS was established prior to the commission assuming jurisdiction over telephone rates. It was made available when the community of interest was determined to include one or more neighboring exchanges.

The service was established in response to this public interest and local rates were increased to reflect the company's additional investment. The service is not an optional type of

service; therefore, all customers in an exchange have the service, if it is provided.

"When the state commission was established, investments and expenses were recovered statewide. Customers in an exchange without EAS paid the same rate as customers in a city of similar size who did have EAS. This resulted in customers without EAS paying rates that helped recover the costs of providing EAS to those who had the service," he continued.

General Telephone sought to have rates established wherein customers with EAS would pay the costs associated with this type of service rather than all customers statewide paying for those costs.

"The revenues required for local and EAS services were known, as were the minutes of use by customers for each type of calling--local and EAS. By basing rates on the corresponding minutes of use, we were able to determine what the local and EAS rates should be.

"Since this was known, the company felt it was in the public interest for customers to know what they are paying for the service."

Refunds with interest will be shown as credits on bills in the next few months.

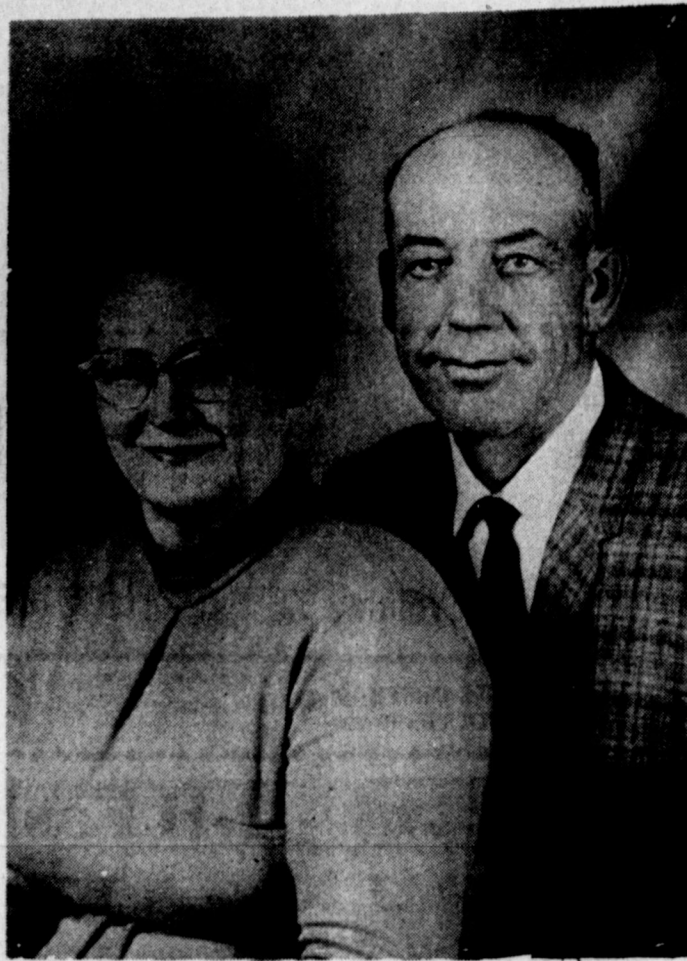

Horse show in Childress

The Childress County 4-H Horse Club is sponsoring a Youth Horse Show for local and area youth on Saturday, July 31. Any youth 18 years of age and younger is eligible to compete in the show which will be held at the Old Settlers Arena. A contestant does not have to be a 4-H Club member to be eligible to compete.

Bill Smith from Vernon will serve as judge of the show which will begin at 10:00 a.m. with the halter classes. The other classes and order in which they will be run are as follows: Showmanship, Western Pleasure, Western Horsemanship, Western Riding, Pole Bending, Pre-4-H Flag Race, Barrel Race and Stakes Race.

Competition will be divid-

ed into three age groups. These age groups are: 14-18 years of age, 9-13 years of age and 8 years and under. Ages will be determined as of July 31, 1982.

Some 23 local businesses and individuals will be sponsoring tack, trophies and belt buckles as awards for the show. Trophies will be presented to the first 5 winners in each class. First place in each class will receive a nylon halter. The high point individual in the two older groups will receive belt buckles.

The chart was prepared by Cotton Incorporated from data obtained from the Market Research Corporation of America, which monthly polls 7,500 U.S. households to scientifically measure what textile products consumers are buying.

Wheat insurance applications due

Wheat growers interested in All-Risk insurance for their 1983 crops should contact their insurance agent as soon as possible, according to F.W. "Ted" Crouch, Jr., All-Risk Insurance Field Operations Director.

Although the deadline to obtain wheat insurance isn't until September 15, Crouch suggests three reasons why growers should begin making their plans now. First, early consideration will provide additional time to develop a program of insurance coverage that best meets the individual policy-holder's needs.

Secondly, it can be useful to farmers to have their insurance arranged before they visit with their lenders about production loans.

Insurance helps to minimize the uncertainty involved in the year-ahead cash flow projections that many lenders today require.

Third, an early application allows additional time for growers to verify yield records that may enable them to qualify for increased insurance protection.

Crouch points out that the expanded and revised wheat insurance program now in effect provides a variety of ways for producers to tailor their coverage to their needs for insurance protection and to their budgets. For example, policies offer a choice of production guarantees as well as a choice of indemnity payments for each bushel of loss.

Pampa Army Field celebration

Forty years ago, the Pampa Army Air Field opened during WW II. This anniversary will be celebrated August 6th and 7th in Pampa. This will also be the 10th reunion of the civil and military personnel of the air base.

Dedication of an official historical marker will be held at the air base site at 2:30 p.m. August 7th. The marker will be located 11 miles east of Pampa on Highway 152. State Representative Foster Whaley will give the dedicatory address. Master of Ceremonies will be Fred Brook who served at the base during WW II. Air Force officials will also participate in the ceremonies and the unveiling of the marker.

The marker is a 27" x 42" Official Texas Historical Marker with post. It reads: "In the early 1940's Pampa Mayor Fred Thompson and a delegation from the city's Chamber of Commerce traveled to Washington, D.C. to promote this area as a possible site for a military base. Attracted by the terrain, climatic history, available land and community response, Army officials chose this site for the establishment of an installation to train pilots and support personnel for WW II.

"Construction of the Pampa Army Air Force base began in June 1942, under the direction of the Tulsa, OK office of the Corps of Engineers. Overseeing the initial stages of the operation was Col. Norman B. Olsen. Temporary offices were set up in the Rose Motor Co. and Culbertson-Small buildings in town. Col. Daniel S. Campbell became the commanding officer in September 1942, and within two months the first planes and aviation cadets had arrived.

"The Pampa Army Air Force base closed September 30, 1945, after just three years of operation. During that time, 6,292 aviation cadets and 3,500 mechanics were trained. The base's safety record was one of the best in the U.S. Training Command during WW II. Despite a brief history, the

base had a dramatic impact on the development of the Pampa area."

Registration for the reunion will begin at 9 a.m. Saturday at the Coronado Inn. A business luncheon will be held at noon at the Coronado Inn, followed by the dedication program at 2:30 and a banquet at the Inn at 7 p.m.

The symptoms of mental illness range in severity from mild to disabling, affect at least 15 people in 100 and create emotional, social and financial problems for the person affected and the person's family and friends.

"Deep anxiety, which is a state of constant fear-an inability to concentrate or a feeling of impending doom."

"Depression that takes hold and is followed by withdrawal from friends, a loss of confidence, a feeling of helplessness."

"Poor work performance-dramatic changes in behavior and performance at work or school."

"Hostility and aggression toward others-inappropriate expression of anger."

"Physical violence in the family."

"Hallucinations-hearing voices or seeing things that are not there."

Some problems, such as chronic bed wetting, and some physical ailments, such as allergies, asthma or headaches, are not usually thought of as signs of emotional disturbance, but they, too, can signal a need for psychological help.

Seek help when symptoms occur. "One of the most widely accepted sources of quality mental health care is a community mental health clinic," said Ponder, "and the Clarendon Family Services Center, a service of the Amarillo Mental Health Retardation Regional Center, offers a full range of mental health outpatient services and provides necessary information and referral for severe problems requiring hospitalization."

Ponder emphasized that the individual's right to privacy is of utmost importance to Center staff, and many laws protect the right of the client to confidentiality.

He added that fees are based on a sliding scale according to the client's monthly income and number of dependents, and insurance policies sometimes help cover payment. Services are always available, however, regardless of ability to pay.

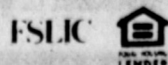
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1982 McAnear Reunion
