Nora Holland was born with her twin sister Ora three years after twin sisters Dora and Cora were born to Joe and Dora Holland in 1895 in Hamblin. She moved with her family to Donley Co. in 1910 on the eve of the biggest snowstorm remembered. Older brothers Joe and Lee and John already had jobs and the house in readiness.

Nora and Cora, the late D.M. Cook and Dewey Clifford were on the Lelia Lake girls basketball team that defeated the Clarendon team easily. She met B.J. Leathers at a social get-together and married in the buggy in October, 1914. Bride and groom lived on the farm east of Lelia Lake where their only son, Don Leroy was born and reared. B.J. died in 1968 and later Nora moved into Clarendon.

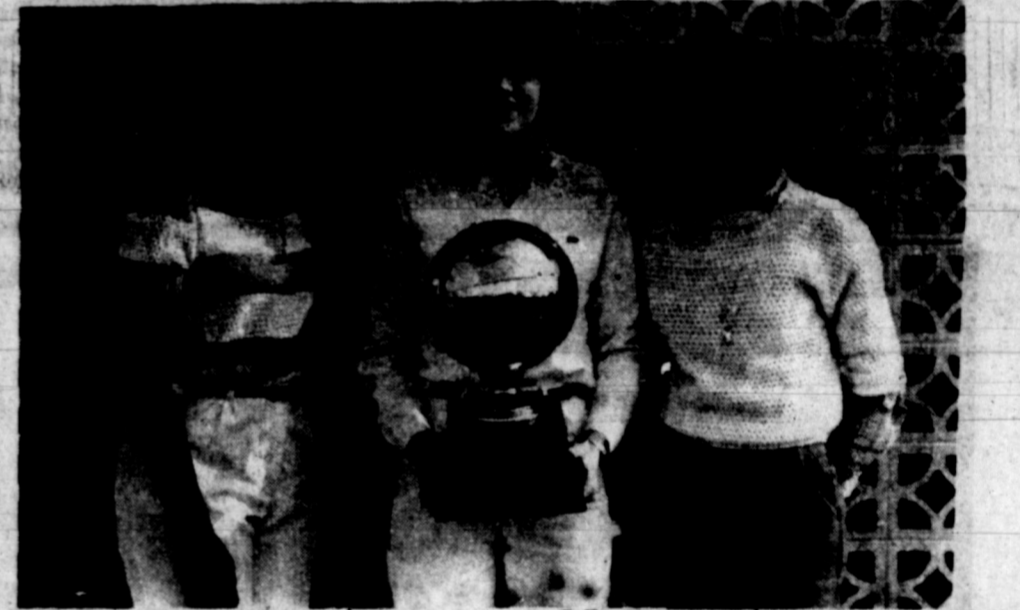
neighbors are invited to come and enjoy the meal and fellowship with us. At 6:00 p.m. Burt Groves will be preaching in the evening worship period.

Cotton Dust not linked with lung disease

A study just released by the National Academy of Sciences reports that there is not enough scientific evidence to link chronic lung disease to cotton dust exposure.

The conclusion was reached by a committee of 12 medical doctors and scientists headed by Dr. Jerome Kleinerman of Mt. Sinai Medical Center, NY after an

extensive review of medical data and other information.

According to Dr. Phillip Wakelyn of the National Cotton Council, the study panel could not find enough evidence to conclude that a worker who experiences temporary shortness of breath and chest tightness when exposed to cotton dust will suffer chronic lung impairment if he or she continues to be exposed to it.

ASCS advise on acreage reduction

A reduced acreage program has been announced for 1982. Reductions required are 15% for wheat and cotton and 10% for feed grains. Participation in each program is voluntary, but only farmers who take part will be eligible for target price protection and regular price-support or farmer-owned reserve loans. No direct payments will be made for the acreage reduction.

To participate in the program for a commodity producers must:

1. Sign up to participate BEFORE APRIL 16 at your ASCS office.
2. File an accurate and timely report of acreage for the crop.
3. Reduce the 1982 acreage of the commodity for harvest by the applicable percentage
4. Devote to a conservation use an acreage of eligible cropland equal to a percentage of the 1982 acreage of the commodity planted for harvest. This acreage must be cropland that was planted to a small grain or row crop in at least one of the past two years and must be protected from wind and water erosion in a manner approved for the county.

Producers who have already reported crop acreage for All-Risk Crop Insurance can adjust the report if they participate in the acreage reduction program.

Producers have just until April 16 to sign up in the 1982 acreage reduction programs for wheat, upland cotton, corn/sorghum and barley/oats. Deciding NOT to sign up is an IRREVERSIBLE decision. It means that you will be INELIGIBLE for loans and purchases, the farmer-owned reserve, if authorized, and possible deficiency payments for that crop. After April 16, you CANNOT change your mind and become eligible. However, if you sign up in the program, you preserve your

All-Risk Crop Insurance

With the elimination of disaster provisions in current farm legislation, farmers have no public protection for their 1982 crops unless they sign up soon for all-risk crop insurance.

In past years, farmers had the federal disaster assistance program which shared some of the risk of a crop loss at little or no cost to the farmer. Now, however, they must take action, such as purchasing crop insurance, if they want to reduce their exposure to production risk, says an economist with the Texas A&M University system.

Many agricultural lenders are already insisting that farmers review their risk exposure before establishing annual lines of operating credit, so risk management is a key consideration.

A good starting point for farmers considering all-risk crop insurance is to find out the premium schedule for his crops and farm classifications from an insurance representative. But, do not delay; some of the closing dates for '82 spring crops are close at hand.

HOW TO CUT VETERINARY BILLS!

If you've got animals around your place, they're bound to become ill now and then. So, veterinarian Randy Kidd has given us a few hints to pass along to help you cut down on expensive vet bills.

First of all, there will often be a considerable gap among fees various animal doctors charge for the same services. Ask neighbors, or someone else who's raising backyard livestock, "who's worth it and who ain't".

Many times, a vet may be esteemed for some specialty. Your laying hens, hutch rabbits, or milk goat may call for the services of one "all purpose" vet. But, if one of your prize Airedales gets sick, you might take it to a small animal clinic in the city which has better facilities.

You can save still more time by having the patient ready before the vet arrives. Don't wait until he or she knocks on your door to chase down the animal. If you can, put the critter indoors and have a good light available. . . have a halter ready, too. And remember to provide warm water so the vet can wash his or her hands. In other words, you should try to be prepared with whatever equipment might be needed for any development.

It's also a good idea to have your livestock records on hand. A listless dog - with a high fever and no appetite - that's already been vaccinated for distemper, for example, might be diagnosed differently than would such a beast that hasn't had the vaccine.

When the cause of an animal's trouble isn't immediately apparent, learn how to take its temperature regularly and keep a record of it until the vet arrives - or till you get the animal to the clinic - so you'll be able to tell the doctor whether it's steady, rising, or falling.

Finally, make the beast as comfortable as possible, and avoid causing it any more stress than is absolutely necessary. Be ready to assist your patient in any way you can.

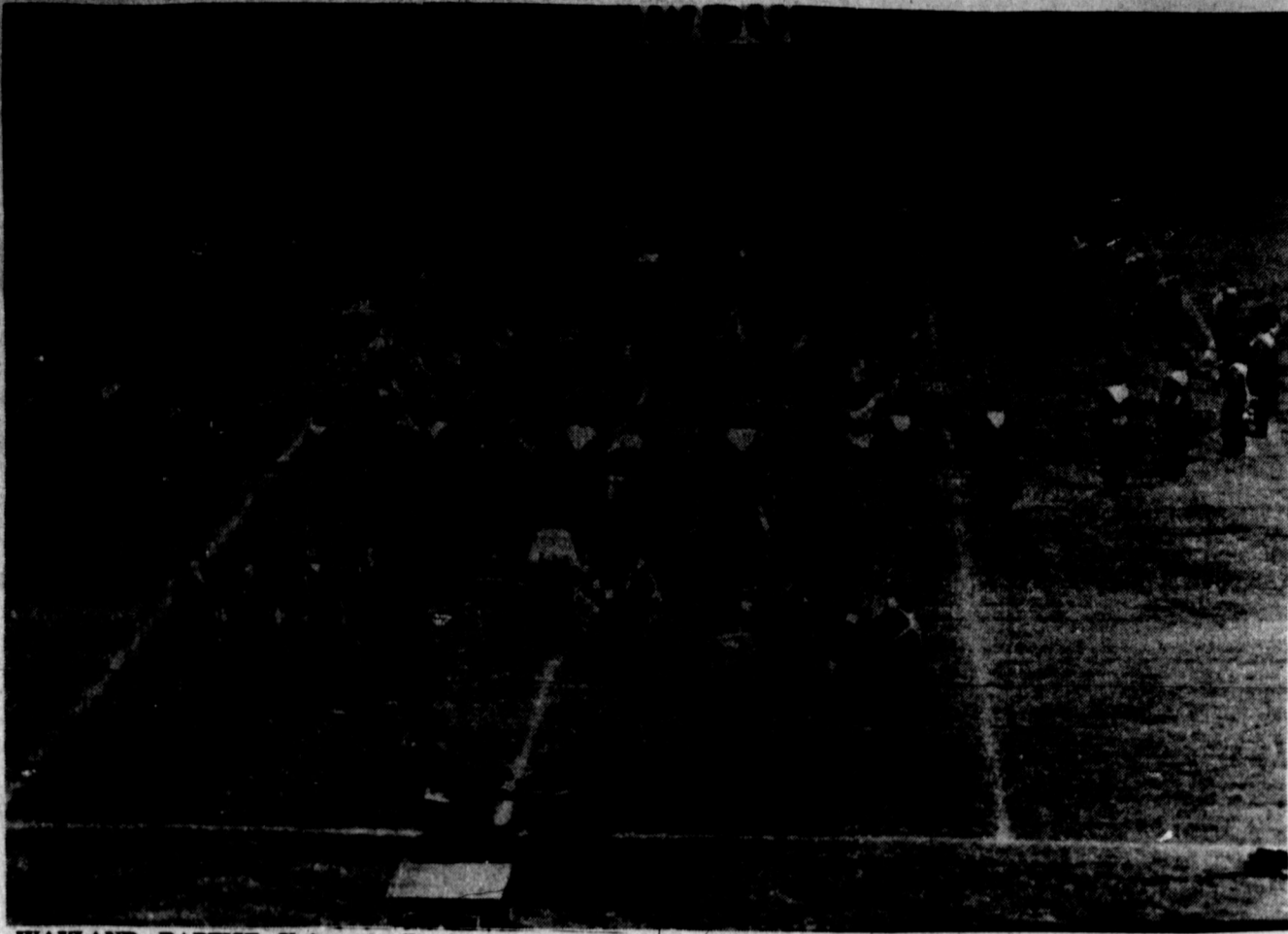
Vaccinations, worming, and normal births are typical things that, with practice, the successful animal lover should be capable of managing without professional aid. And, of course, a good veterinary guide is a must in any backyard homesteader's reference library.

Prevention, though, is still the best medicine. It's important to give your charges good food, exercise, and lots of sunlight. Provide a dry, clean place for them to sleep. . . keep their food and water pans washed. . . and rotate your pastures or keep their quarters clear, so the creatures won't walk in manure or have only ground-level grass to eat.

No matter what you do, though, you're still going to need the help of a vet from time to time. And, when you do get that bill, be satisfied in the knowledge that you did all you could to help your animals, and to keep the cost to a minimum.

F.O. Hodges returns from trip

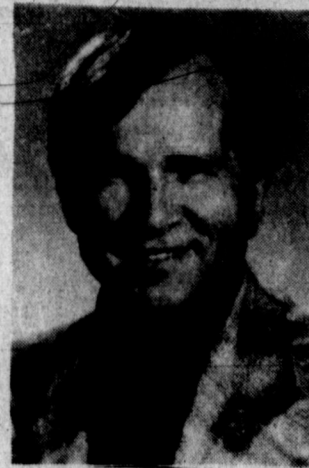

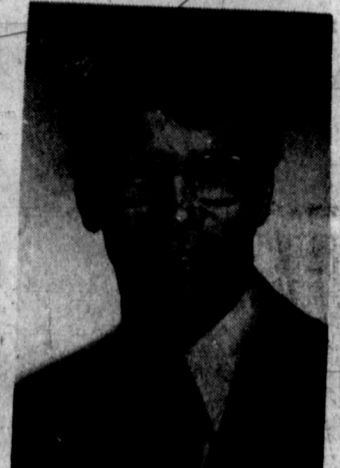

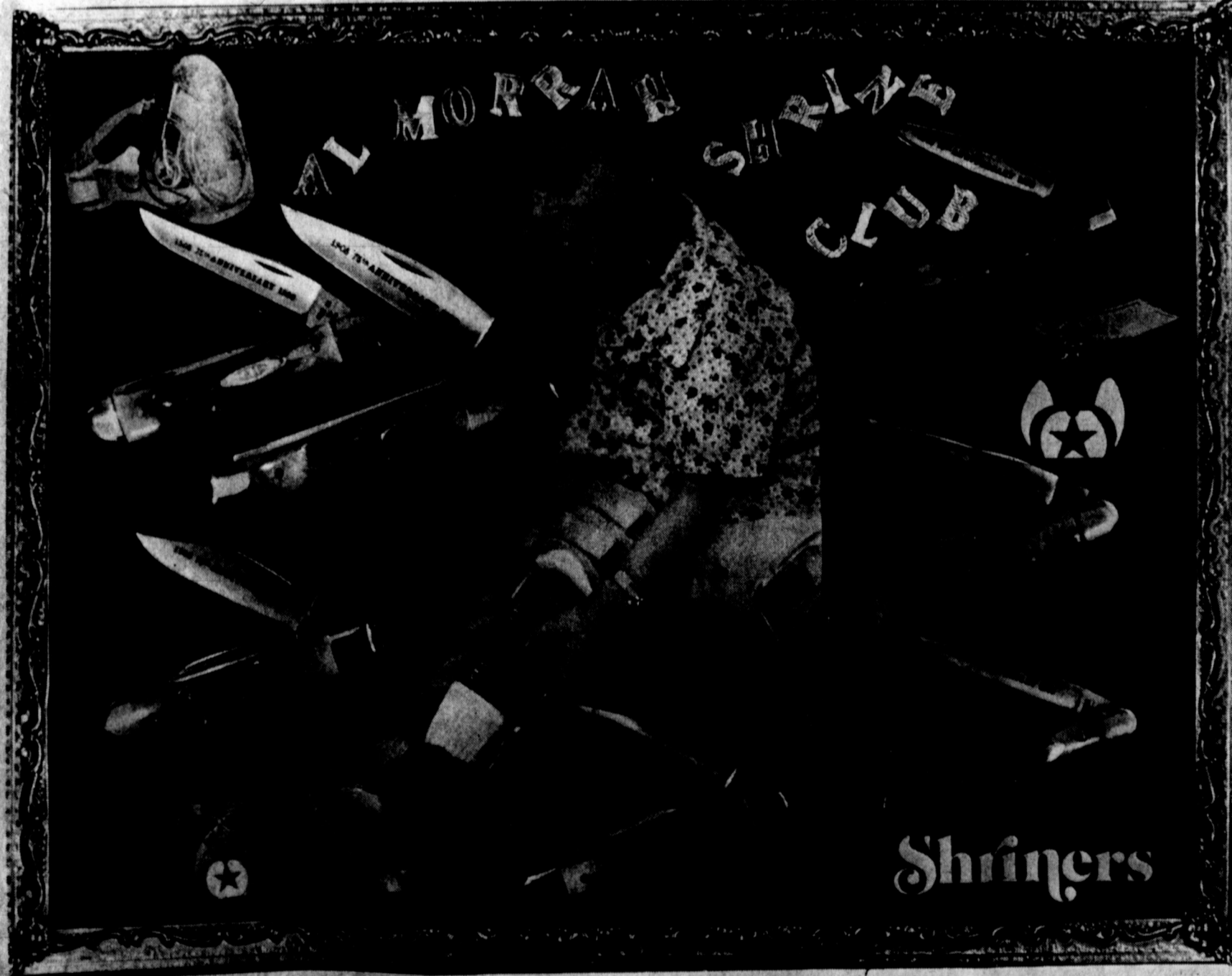

Selective Service System continuing

The Selective Service System is continuing to make available for public inspection lists of registrants and their tentative local board assignments. This is in keeping with the intent of Selective Service that it procedures be open to the public.

The list may be viewed at the County Courthouse. The lists cover registrations processed through September 30, 1981, and include men born in 1960, 1961, 1962, and 1963.

Local board assignments are arranged by ZIP code based upon the registrant's permanent address.

The requirement to register applies to U.S. citizens, and to aliens residing in the United States, born on or after January 1, 1960. Men born in 1960 and 1961 were scheduled to register during July 1980; men born in 1962 were scheduled to register in January 1981; those born in 1963 were scheduled to be registered during 1981. Men born in 1964 are required to register within 30 days of

their 18th birthday. They may do so at any U.S. Post Office.

On January 7, 1982, President Reagan announced his decision to continue peacetime Selective Service Registration. In announcing his decision, the President declared a grace period during which late registration would be accepted without penalty. That grace period extends through February 1982.

Anyone who was scheduled to register previously but has not yet done so is encouraged to register immediately at any U.S. Post Office in order to avoid any possible penalty.

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TAXPAYERS' RIGHTS.

Don't overpay your Property Taxes.

The Texas property tax system provides certain rights and remedies for property owners. The law also offers tax relief measures to qualified taxpayers. But they do not go into effect automatically; you must apply for them by May 1. To help you understand your rights as a taxpayer, the State Property Tax Board has prepared a free pamphlet, *Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities*, available from your new county appraisal district or local tax office. The publication will help you understand the types of exemptions that are available and what you must do to obtain them if you qualify.

Rendition
One way to assert your rights as a taxpayer is to render your property. This means filling out a rendition statement at the appraisal district office, telling tax officials what you believe the value of your property should be. When you render, the appraisal district or appraisal review board must officially notify you if the value of your property is increased over the amount you rendered.

General Homestead Exemption
If you qualify for a residence homestead exemption, you are entitled to a \$5,000 exemption off the appraised value of your home for school tax purposes, and a \$3,000 exemption for the portion of county taxes levied for farm-to-market roads or flood control. Some jurisdictions may offer an additional exemption of a percentage of the value of your homestead.

Exemptions for the Elderly
If you are 65 or over, you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 exemption off the appraised value of your residence homestead for school taxes. And, when you apply and qualify for this exemption, the school tax bill cannot increase on your home, unless you make additions or improvements to it.

Disabled
If you are disabled and qualify for the residence homestead exemption, you are entitled to an additional exemption of \$10,000 off the appraised value of your home for school taxes. Other taxing jurisdictions may offer optional exemptions. All jurisdictions offer an exemption for certain disabled veterans on one designated property.


Farmers and Ranchers
If you qualify, your agricultural or open-space land may be taxed at its productivity value instead of market value. Certain farming implements and machines may also qualify for exemption.

Tax exemptions and special valuations are not effective automatically. Applications should be made this year before May 1 to your new county appraisal district, or to local tax offices in appraisal districts which have postponed implementation. Check with the appraisal district or local tax offices to find out where to apply for tax relief.

While late applications for exemptions may be accepted in some instances, the burden and expense of proving a good reason for filing late rests on the taxpayer. You can avoid any inconvenience and fully protect your rights and access to remedies as a taxpayer by applying for exemptions and rendering your property before May 1.

Ask for a free copy of *Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities* at your appraisal district or local tax office. Or contact the State Property Tax Board in Austin.

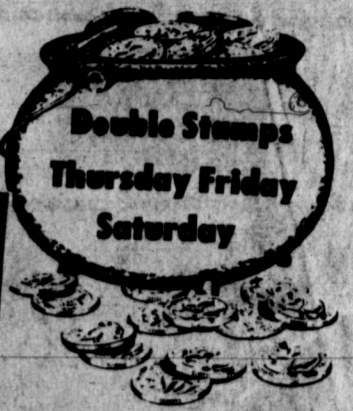
