Only One Week Left To Register So You Will Have Privilege Of Voting

It is an absolute known fact that you have only one week left to register if you want to vote legally in upcoming elections during 1968.

Up until Wednesday morning, a total of 1816 had registered in Donley County. This figure is quite an improvement over this time last week but is still approximately 600 short of the estimated maximum for the county.

Assessor-Collector Bill Cornell announced yesterday that he would keep the tax office open until midnight Wednesday, January 31st so residents can register right up to the last minute.

Your vote can be very important in any of the upcoming elections. We have had elections in the past where 1 to 3 votes divided the candidates so your vote may mean the election or defeat of your favored candidate or election issue.

As a public service, the Leader is publishing the application blank for voter registration again this week. If you see that you can not get to the tax office, then read the form carefully and then fill it out correctly, sign and mail to Tax Assessor-Collector Lonnie "Bill" Cornell.

Clarendon College Bulldogs Take Two Wins Past Week

Saturday night the Clarendon College Bulldogs took on the Howard County Jayhawks in a rescheduled match at Bulldog Fieldhouse. The victory went to the Bulldogs with a 66-64 final giving them the leadership in the Western Junior College Conference race. Chris Peacock's layup cinched the win in the final two seconds of play. Byrd, Holloway, and Peacock reached into the two digit column with 24, 23, and 10 points respectively.

Monday night of this week the Amarillo Badgers of Amarillo College were hosted here and at the conclusion of the game the Bulldogs with a score of 70-62 remained undefeated in conference play. The Badgers outscored the bulldogs 27 baskets to 21 from the field but Clarendon overcame this deficit at the free throw line connecting on 28 of 38 free shots while the Badgers hit only 8 out of 17. Vidaurri led the CC team with 17 points. Cannon hit 16, Peacock 15, and R. Holloway 14. Clarendon now holds a 5-0 record in WJCC play.

Wednesday morning's Amarillo paper reported three Badgers fell from their roster via failure to make qualified grade points. These included Lynn Simmons, Bill Jordan, and Sal Sanchez, all top men on Coach Red Myers team.

The next home game for the Bulldogs will be February 3 at 7:30 p.m. when New Mexico Military Institute will visit the CC campus.

LOCAL STOCK PLACES AT AMARILLO JR. STOCK SHOW

Several 4-H and FFA Club members in Donley County placed their livestock in top brackets at the Junior Livestock Show held in Amarillo the first of the week. Complete results of the show were not available at press time, however.

In the Junior Steer Show 177 head of Herefords and 133 head of Angus were exhibited. Judging by Charles Smallwood of Canyon began at 8 a.m. Monday. The Grand Champion was an Angus shown by Debbie Terrell of Plainview. John Hermesmeyer's Light Weight Hereford placed second in his division.

Judging in the Junior Swine Show was by Euel Liner of Lubbock. There were 516 entries in this division. Raymond Walker of Gruver exhibited the Grand Champion, a Light Weight Hampshire. Jim Risley exhibited the Spotted Poland China Reserve Champion and Monty McAnear exhibited the Berkshire Champion.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon, January 23 at N. S. Griggs & Son Funeral Chapel in Amarillo with burial in Llano Cemetery there. Rev. J. D. Horton of Amarillo officiated.

Mr. Gerner moved to the Lelia Lake area in 1903 from Donnellson, Illinois and had engaged in the farming and ranching business except for a few years when he was employed as Bookkeeper for Col. Goodnight. He was a fluent conversationalist, well-read, and maintained an active interest in local, state, national and world affairs until his death. He was a member of the Lutheran Church.

Surviving are a sister, Mrs. J. Ernest Smith; 17 nieces and nephews. Nephews, Leo Smith and Harold Gerner live in the Clarendon area as does a sister-in-law, Mrs. Ed Gerner.

The Clarendon High School Boys' basketball team directed by Coach Carl Irlbeck won their first district game at Silverton Friday night by a score of 74-29. The Bronchos led each quarter throughout the game. At the close of the first quarter the score was set at 19-5 and Clarendon's lead was stretched to 36-10 by halftime. The third quarter ended with a 56-15 tally. Mike McCully, Bruce Bush, and Sandy Thornberry were high for the locals with 14 points each. Charles Louis hit 13. High for Silverton was Walker with 8 points.

Clarendon girls played a close game with a final score of 27-32. At the end of the first quarter the score was tied 8-8 and at halftime Clarendon held a 1 point edge 13-12 but in the third quarter trailed 18-21. Tina Moore paced Clarendon with 14 points. Lee Ann McCracken followed with 13. Connie Martin was high for Silverton with 16 points.

Tuesday night Clarendon boys traveled to Phillips for a non-conference game. The first quarter ended with an 11-16 score in favor of Phillips but from that point on it was a hard fought battle all the way with a one point difference in each quarter. At halftime it was Clarendon 34-Phillips 35. In the third quarter Clarendon trailed again by one point, 48-49. The final score was 62-63. Charles Louis and Everett Monroe tipped in 16 points each and Jim Moore hit the basket for 14 points. Malone was high for Phillips with 13 points. This was a good game. Phillips is a Class AA ball club.

Friday night of this week Clarendon will host the McLean teams here for district games. The girls will start their game at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday night Wheeler will be entertained here. This, too, is district play with the girls again starting their game at 6:30 p.m. All fans are invited to come out and watch these two fine teams and give them support toward that district title.

The Donley County area, along with the entire state, received one of the best rains to ever be recorded here for the month of January. The moisture moved in Friday and the slow, drizzling rain fell throughout the week end to give us an official measurement here in town of 2.55 inches.

Hubert Rhoades reported 2.40 at Ashtola for the spell and other unofficial gauges over the area reported in excess of three inches. There was practically no run-off with the thirsty ground soaking the moisture up as it fell. This was the first moisture of consequence since last October.

Local farmers and ranchers are all wearing smiles, especially since the moisture fell as rain instead of snow at this time of year. If it had come in the way of snow, it would have been weeks before plowing operations could be resumed and ranchers would have been out a larger feed bill as well as the weight loss usually suffered when animals have to endure icy, freezing weather over a prolonged period of time.

The wide coverage of moisture should help stabilize the temperature and help prevent the blowing of dust.

**Social Security Checks To Be Higher**

One of the changes in the social security law signed by President Johnson January 2 will mean a benefit increase of at least 13 percent in the social security checks of about 90 men, women and children in Donley County, according to Travis C. Briggs, district manager of the Amarillo Social Security office.

Beneficiaries need not take any action to get the increase. It will be sent them automatically.

Area residents can expect the first increased check on Saturday, March 2nd.

Some social security beneficiaries will receive more than a 13 percent increase. The minimum benefit for workers retiring at 65 is increased from \$44 to \$55.

The average benefit payable to a retired worker, about \$86, will be raised to \$98. The average couple's benefit, now \$145, will go up to \$165.

The last increase in social security benefits amount to 7 percent and was effective January 1965.

About 3 out of every 10 beneficiaries receiving the increased check will be someone under 65, many the children of working fathers who have died.

With the increased benefit pay-

ments provided, the face value of social security survivor's insurance protection is increased to \$940 billion. Under the amended law, maximum payments to families now on the social security rolls will go up to \$322.40 monthly. In the future, the maximum payable to any one family can be as high as \$434.40 monthly.

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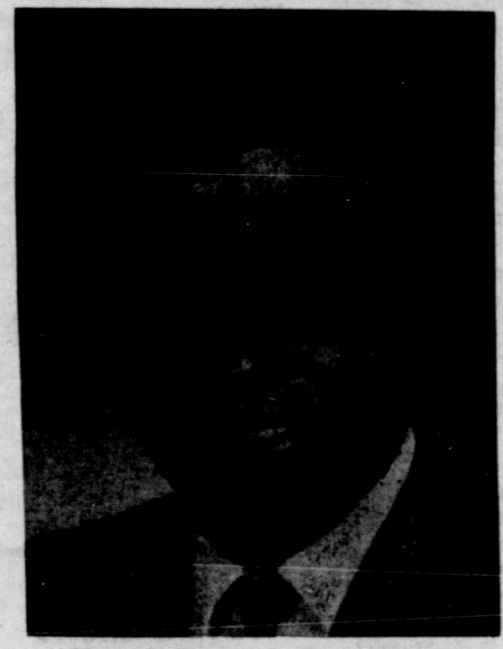
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Any way you look at it, 1968 shapes up as the most action-packed political year for Texas in more than a decade.

It will start with a wide-open governor's race in the Democratic primary perhaps the roughest since 1956. Also, there may be

some other close races for less exciting offices. And of course, the presidential battle will hold the November general election spotlight. If Texas Republicans make good their threat to field a strong candidate for governor, and it seems they will, there will be plenty of action on that front almost the year around.

There is no way of predicting at this point whether U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough, Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, Secretary of State John Hill, former Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr, Dallas radio man Gordon McLendon, Houston attorney Don Yarborough or an unheralded dark horse will emerge the Democratic nominee for governor. Neither is it clear who the Republicans will put up to oppose

him. Congressman George Bush of Houston? Sen John Tower? An unknown?

While Texas national Democratic convention delegates obviously will be pledged to support President Johnson, state Republican leaders have not tipped their hands as to their favorite candidate for nomination.

Although the winners can't be picked in advance, red letter dates can be marked on the 1968 political calendar. Here are the main ones:

- February 5 — Last day for filing as candidate in primaries.
- May 4 — First primary election and party precinct conventions.
- May 11 — County party conventions.
- June 1 — Second primary election.
- June 8 — State conventions to pick Texas party leadership (executive committees) and write the state party platforms.
- November 5 — General election.

Remember that, to participate in any of the action, you must register (it's free) with the county tax assessor-collector or authorized deputy by January 31. Registration is simple and can be accomplished through the mail on forms provided by most newspapers.

**ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES**  
—State Welfare Department can pay medical aid directly to recipients of services or to physicians, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

- An anhydrous ammonia pipeline is subject to the jurisdiction of the Railroad Commission.

- A qualified agricultural engineering major can be licensed as a professional engineer.

- Cochran County Memorial Hospital District can pay expenses of sending needy persons to outside hospital facilities where it cannot discharge its full responsibility to provide adequate medical care.

- Requirement of newspaper advertisement (or posting) to take competitive bids does not apply to county expenditures for purchase of equipment for general use by the county, payable out

of current funds. Where the county wants to make a contract under competitive bidding requirements, bids must be stated in terms of gross price without "trade-in". However, county commissioners may ask for trade-in data and consider it in awarding the contract.

**TOURIST CONFERENCE SET**  
—A network of 10 Travel Trails showing how local communities can help themselves by promoting San Antonio's HemisFair '68 will be unveiled at the third annual Governor's Tourist Development Conference here January 17.

Trails were chosen from among nominations in 154 counties and state tourism people will be pushing these routes to out-of-staters visiting Texas and HemisFair. State will

erect "Travel Trail" markers and design and publish maps to guide and inform the tourists.

Two panels of travel experts will join Gov. John Connally in encouraging communities to step up their tourist promotion.

A total of 7,000,000 visitors are expected at HemisFair, says HemisFair's Chief Executive Officer James M. Gaines who will keynote the conference. Two afternoon seminars are planned on developing special attractions

and boosting them with publicity, photography and brochures.

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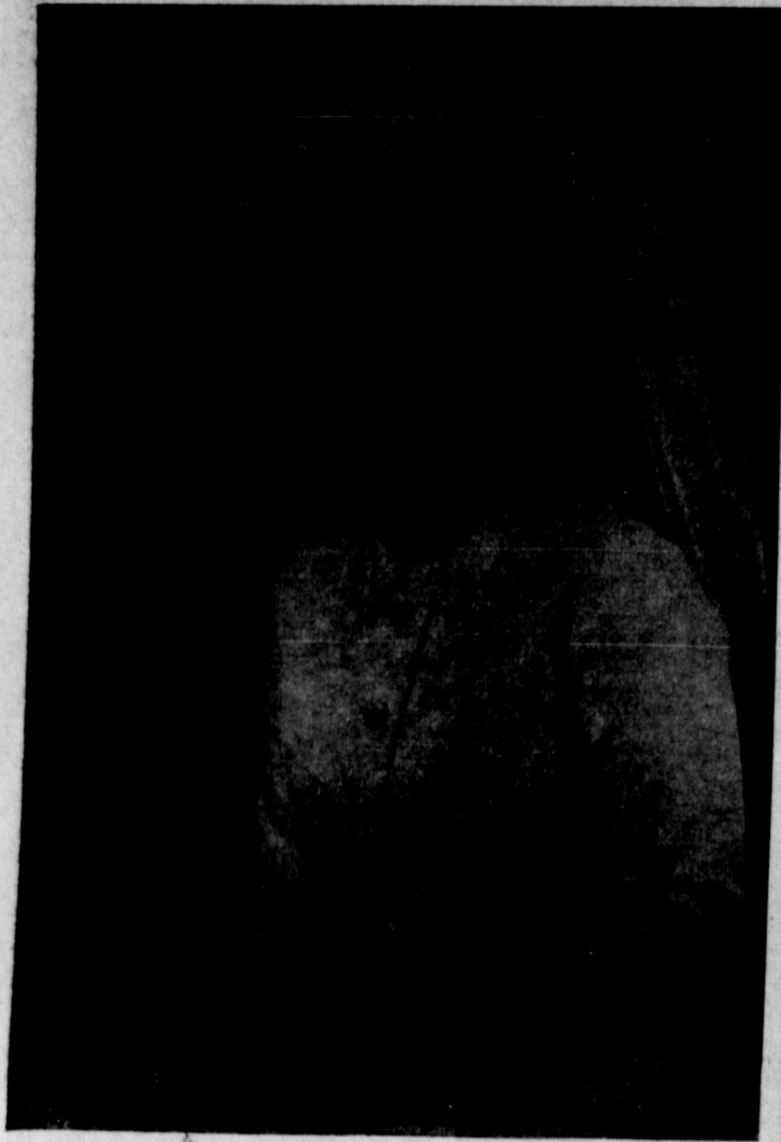

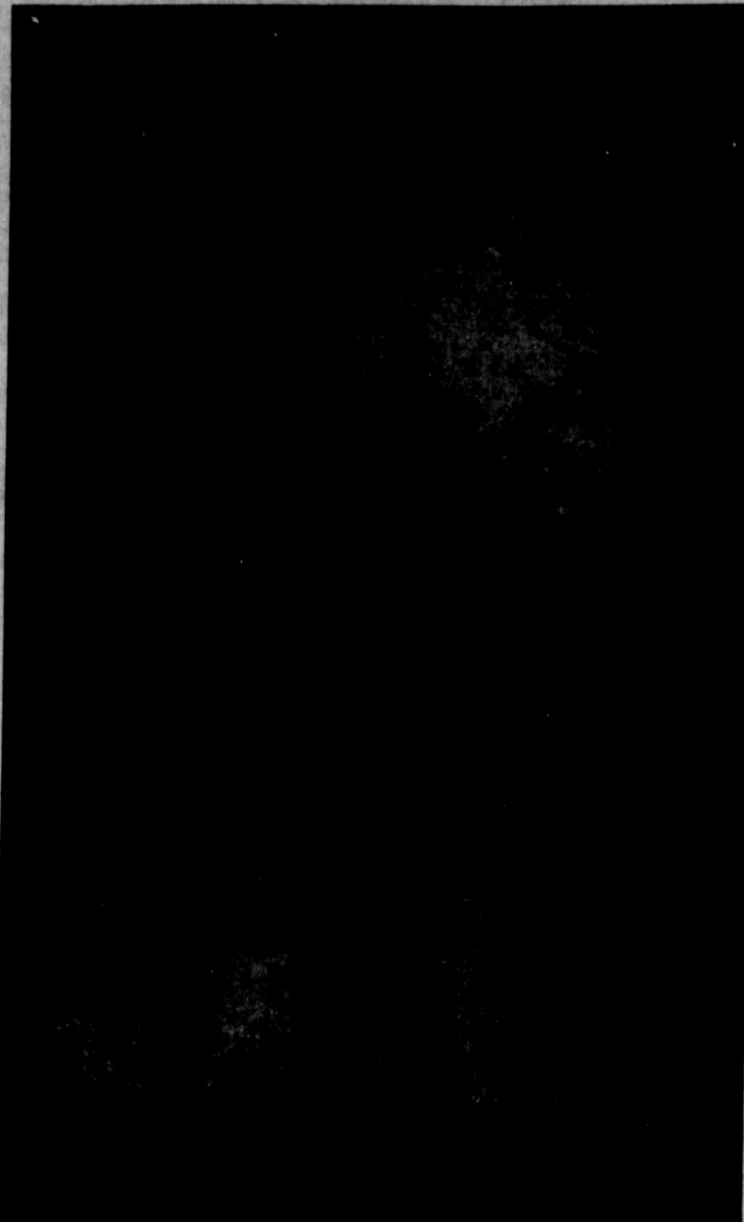

**SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS**

Diversion terraces have become very popular over the last few years and have done much to control water erosion on long gentle slopes. The purpose of a diversion is to divert water from areas where it is causing erosion to sites where it can be used or disposed of safely.

Diversion are often used where higher lying acres are damaging cropland, rangeland, pastureland or farmsteads, provided runoff water can be safely diverted without causing erosion. This practice may be used to divert water away from or into farm ponds.

This practice is eligible for cost-share assistance through the ACP program and the Great Plains Conservation Program. We of the Soil Conservation Service are available to give you assistance in the planning and layout of this practice.

**3 RURAL ACCIDENTS IN DONLEY CO. FOR DEC.**

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated three accidents on rural highways in Donley County during the month of December, according to Sergeant J. W. Wilson, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in two persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$1,701.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the calendar year of 1967 shows a total of 49 crashes resulting in three persons killed, 25 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$51,778.00.

When the final fatal traffic accident reports are tabulated for 1967 it is estimated that the death count for Texas is expected to be 3,340 or about two per cent less than the all time high of 3,406 traffic deaths in 1966. If this pro-

ves true, then, it will be the first reduction in traffic deaths since 1960.

**AREA RURAL FAMILIES ENJOY BETTER HOUSING THRU FHA LOANS**

More than 67 rural people in Armstrong, Donley and Gray Counties have new or vastly improved homes as a result of \$157,210.00 in insured loan funds advanced through the Farmers Home Administration in the past two years, Claude Moore, local County Supervisor of the supervised credit agency, reported today.

Approximately \$83,000.00 was advanced in 1967.

The rural housing program was greatly expanded in 1965, when, as part of President Lyndon B. Johnson's effort to strengthen rural America, the financing of the loans was switched from federal to private sources. Practically all of the rural housing funds now come from private sources on an insured basis.

Of the amount loaned during the past two years, senior citizens, 62 years or older, received \$24,110.00.

The construction that took place as a part of the credit program provided 2672 man-days of employment for local carpenters, plumbers, electricians, and masons.

In addition, the housing funds circulating through the three counties gave the local economies a \$1,100,470.00 boost.

**UNCLE SAM'S SINGLES SERVICE**

(Editor's Note: This is one of a series of short articles on the draft law and its rules and regulations.)

How does a draft board consider a man's case when it comes before the board?

The members sit around a table, and the file containing the man's papers is placed before them. The board asks the following questions, and when information in the file indicates an affirmative answer to one, the board votes to classify him as indicated in parentheses.

Is he on active duty in the military service? (I-C) Is he a conscientious objector working in an approved civilian job? (I-W) Is he too old for service under the law? (V-A)

Has he completed sufficient service under the law? Is he a "sole surviving son" under the law? (IV-A) Can it be determined at the board level whether he is physically, mentally, or morally unfit for service? (IV-F) Is he a minister of religion or a divinity student? (IV-D)

Is he subject to exemption as an alien? (IV-C) Is he a public official deferred by law, (IV-B) Is he subject to a deferment for

dependency? (III-A.)

Is he a member of the armed forces reserve or a student taking military training? (I-D) Is he a college student deferrable under law and regulation? (II-S) Is he entitled to farm or other civilian job deferment? (II-C and II-A, respectively.)

Is he physically or mentally qualified only in time of war or national emergency? (I-Y) Is he a high school or college student deferrable by law under certain circumstances? (I-S) Is he one of two types of conscientious objectors who are recognized? (I-O and I-A-O)

If the evidence in the man's file indicates to the satisfaction of the local board that he is eligible for none of these, then the man is considered available for military service. (I-A.)

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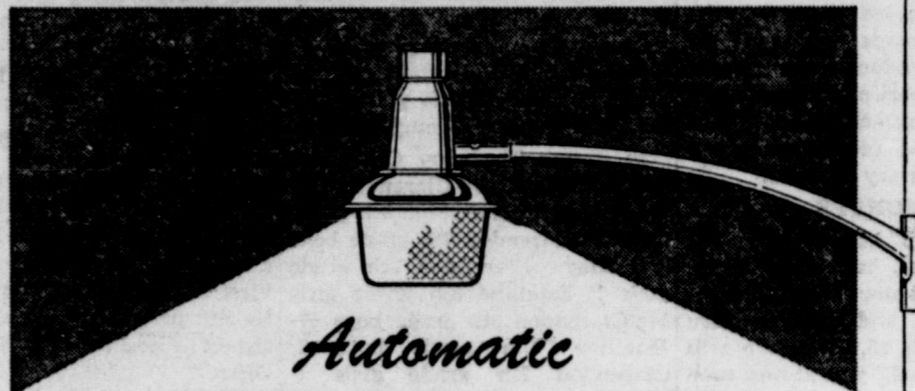
