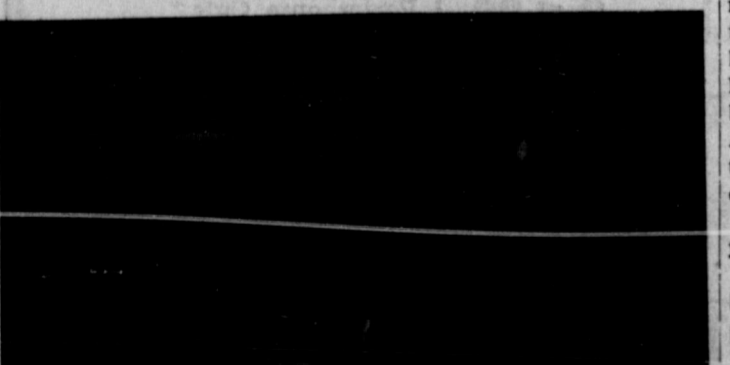

NEWS FROM CITY HALL

The fiscal year for the city ended September 30th. We will have a bank balance of \$161.62. We do have the money on deposit to pay all of our indebtedness except the Greenbelt.

Six months ago we projected a \$20,000 surplus at the end of the fiscal year. We considered expansion of services, paved streets, an airport, even reduced fees, all to be provided with no increase in taxes.

In May the Greenbelt Cities met with representatives of the Texas Water Development Board. The resulting agreement was that each city would pay its pro-rata share of the bonded indebtedness until the first of the year. This, the City of Clarendon did until the \$20,000 surplus was depleted. The past two months the city has simply paid for the water used.

In a similar meeting with the Water Development Board September 12th, all cities were notified that payment of the bonds were to be made by the cities even if it were necessary to hold an election and authorize the Greenbelt as a taxing agency. The member cities not desiring another tax agreed to pay for the cost of the water at such a rate as to retire the bonds as they came due. Based on the payment due in July, 1969, the cities are being charged 75c per 1,000 gallons retroactive to September 1.

The Aldermen of the City of Clarendon propose that we increase the minimum 50c from \$1.50 to \$5.00 and charge 90c per

1,000 gallons after the first 2,000 gallons minimum. This will be a small increase for those on limited incomes who rarely use 2,000 gallons. It will place the burden on the large water users. In simple words, after 2,000 gallons (the minimum) the more you use, the more you pay. Little effect of this rate increase will be noticed until next summer by any of us.

The forthcoming budget for the year has been cut dramatically. There is little reserve for streets, water or sewer main extensions or other public services. We are operating with a minimum number of employees, cut questionable expenses, deleted most proposed new projects and it is questionable that we can stay within the budget.

The tax rate and the property valuation will be essentially the same this year as last year. Since funds are on deposit for all indebtedness except the Greenbelt, \$1.35 of the \$1.45 per \$100 valuation will go into the general fund from which we pay the Greenbelt, the 10c going into the Adair Hospital Fund as required by law. The city aldermen decided that if further taxes were necessary to purchase Greenbelt water, a sales tax would be preferable to increasing property taxes. If such a tax becomes necessary, it would seem more fair and just, allowing less of a burden on the property owner and the large water consumer.

The above is the financial picture of Clarendon today. In contrast, six months ago we could have planned \$100,000 paving issue paid off in five years, an \$80,000 airport paid in one year (with aid of \$60,000 in federal and state grants), a current assessment of property valuation in conjunction with other taxing agencies and resulting lower tax rate paid in less than one year.

May I brag to you about your city aldermen. They have worked hard to represent each and every one of you. They have arrived at the best solution possible for their city after many hours of worry and discussion. There is no salary that you could offer them for the work that they have done. Maybe that is why I like the Aldermen of Clarendon better than the City Council of Amarillo. Our aldermen are motivated by consideration of their city, not the salary.

Say "THANKS" when you see your aldermen.

Clarendon Country Club Receives Over \$200,000 for New Facilities

Clarendon Country Club Members were jubilant Friday as Club officers deposited over two hundred thousand dollars in a construction account at a Clarendon bank.

The funds will be used for further construction on the new eighteen hole championship golf course and to erect club buildings and other facilities. Contracts were signed with Gail Binkley, Amarillo contractor, for two buildings and with Moser Construction Company of Amarillo for swimming pool. Golden Spread Irrigation Company of Memphis and Amarillo will be awarded the contract for system of underground irrigation of club grounds.

Decision to build new facilities for the fifty year old club was made about one year ago, and 170 acres of land was acquired north of Clarendon on Highway 70, and includes extensive shoreline on Greenbelt Lake. Main club buildings will be surrounded on three sides by water as construction is on a peninsula which slopes into the lake.

The golf course should be unusually beautiful because of the layout along the shore of the lake, and with the natural slope of the terrain ideal for the seven thousand yard course. Soil is rich farm land, and full irrigation will include five sprinkler heads on each green, four on each tee, and a double row of sprinklers on fairways. Much of the dirt work, including green construction, has already been done.

Election Oct. 8 For S&WCD Supervisor

The election of a Soil and Water Conservation District supervisor for Zone 5 of Donley County will be held at the Chamberlain Community Center October 8 at 7:30 p.m.

Zone 5 is the area of the county east of highway 70 and south of highway 287. All S&WCD co-operators within this zone are invited to participate in this election.

A S&WCD supervisor is elected to a 5 year term. There are 5 supervisors in each district with the terms rotated so that there is an election each year. The zone position has been held by J. C. Shields for the past 5 years.

Coffee and donuts will be served during the meeting. Douglas E. Cunningham, area conservationist with the SCS at Pampa will give a slide talk on soil and water conservation prior to the election.

Each S&WCD co-operator is urged to come out and vote for the supervisor of your choice. To be eligible, a man or woman must own land and live within the zone which is up for election. Ronald Gooch, county agent, will be the acting election chairman.

Clyde Gilbreth Trial For Murder Set For Tuesday, October 8

District court will get underway Monday of next week when a Donley County Grand Jury goes into session.

The Honorable District Judge Charles Reynolds will open District Court Tuesday morning with the Murder trial of Clyde Gilbreth as the first item on the docket. Gilbreth was indicted by a Donley County Grand Jury August 6th for Murder with Malice Aforethought in connection with the death of John R. Gillham July 22nd in front of his Law Office here.

A panel of 120 petit jurors have been called from which to attempt to pick a jury. These jurors have been ordered to appear before the court at 10 a.m. Tuesday.

The court has appointed Bob Gibbons Jr. of Plainview as attorney for the defendant, to be assisted by Broadus Spivey, Lubbock Attorney.

District Attorney Jack Boone will be the prosecutor and he will be assisted by District Attorney Frank Stovall of Plainview.

LOCAL YOUTH RECEIVES MERIT COMMENDATION

Kent D. Rattan, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dennis Rattan, received a letter of commendation last week from the National Merit Scholarship Program. He was one of 39,000 students receiving such a letter for his performance on the 1968 National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test taken in February. The test was taken by more than 793,000 students.

The test results places Kent among the top 7 per cent of students who took the test and in the top 2 per cent of students expected to graduate in 1969. Kent is a member of the CHS Senior Class.

Broncs Rip Dragons 42-0 Friday Night

Coach Clyde Noonkester's Clarendon Bronchos completely outclassed the Paducah Dragons at Paducah Friday night by a score of 42-0. On their way to their third consecutive victory the Bronchos gained 467 yards while limiting the Dragons to only 91.

With just 48 seconds gone off the clock in the first quarter the Bronchos hit pay dirt for the first time. Halfback Charles Louis took a handoff from QB Donnie Mooring and raced 65 yards untouched into the end zone. Phil Longan kicked his first extra point of the night to make it 7-0 in favor of the Bronchos.

After a fumble recovery by Walter Reese the Bronchos marched 35 yards to another 6-pointer on a 21 yard scamper by Steve Land. Longan again kicked the extra point, as the score stood 14-0.

Paducah took the kickoff and could not muster any type of offense and had to punt to the Bronchos. On the first play Louis took a pass from Mooring and galloped 86 yards for his second touchdown of the night. Longan kicked the extra point to make it 21-0.

When the Dragon punter got off a bad punt the Bronchos marched 29 yards with Mooring going over from the 1 for another 6 pointer. Longan's kick was true to make it 28-0.

With fifty seconds showing on the clock Junior speedster Jim Moore took a pass from Mooring and tight roped the sidelines for a 34 yard TD. Longan again kicked the extra point to make it 35-0 at half time.

With 5:47 left in the game Land took a handoff from Mooring and raced 78 yards for the last score of the night. Freshman Larry Longan, Phillip's younger brother, kicked the extra point to make the final score 42-0.

Steve Land again led Broncho rushers with 171 yards on 12 carries for a 14.3 average.

This Friday night the Bronchos host the Canadian Wildcats in the annual HOME-COMING game. Everyone come out and give the Bronchos your support.

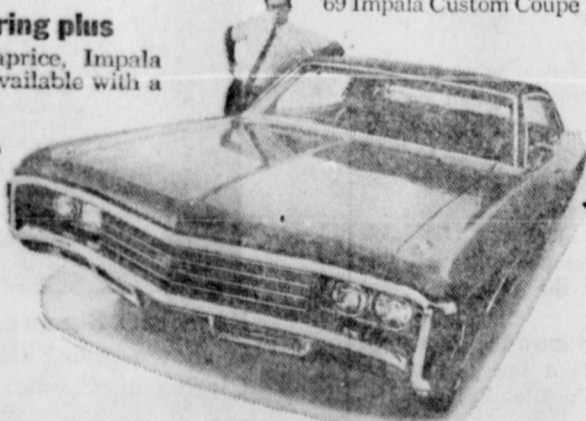
