

Wood, right, who brought in the cotton. Long, who farms 10 miles north of Hedley, had 2600 lbs of seed cotton and the bale weighed 660 lbs with 1010 lbs of seed. It was pulled from 6 acres of dry land cotton and was ginned by Paymaster here. Wood who farms at Lelia Lake, pulled his 505 lb bale from 7 acres and had 1900 lbs of seed cotton. It turned out 940 lbs of seed and was ginned at Lelia Lake.



"Now just what is the Highway Patrol going to do about all this speeding?" asks Mr. average motorist, and the answer is supplied by Major Luther C. Moore, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Major Moore has announced that the DPS has ordered enough radar speed measuring units to equip almost every patrol car in the field.




