Don't Forget To Cast Your Ballot In Amendment Election Sat., Nov. 11

Texas voters will be going to the polls this Saturday, November 11, to vote on six constitutional amendments. To comply with publication laws, the amendments were published in entirety in August. The past two weekly issues of the Donley County Leader and the issue this week carry recaps of these amendments and offer arguments FOR and AGAINST the issues. We urge all voters to study these amendments from all standpoints and while doing so take into consideration effects not of just the present but in time to come.

All voting places in Donley County will be set up for this election. Here in town, those living east of main street will vote at the Youth Canteen and those living west of main street will vote at Lions Club Hall. Voting places will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Be sure your ballot is counted.

At last count, a total of five absentee votes had been cast.

Regardless of how you decide to vote, the important fact is that you do GO VOTE!

Amendment No. 1—Authorizes Counties to put all Tax Revenue into one General Fund without regard to source or purpose. This Amendment would eliminate all of the safeguards of proper county budgeting and would leave open the possibility of commissioners raising tax rates due to unrestricted use of available funds.

Amendment No. 2—Permits Municipalities, Political Subdivisions and State supported entities located within a Hospital District to participate in the establishment and operation of Mental Health, Mental Retardation, and Public Health Services. A large share of funds supporting these centers come from state grants-in-aid. Local hospital districts could receive this aid to provide these services as easily as centers supported by other than a hospital district making possible a duplication of health programs which could result in higher costs for services provided.

Amendment No. 3—Extends the Veterans' Land program by authorizing the sale of \$200 million of State Bonds to purchase land to be sold to Veterans and expands the program to include Veterans in Viet Nam. This program is said not to cost the tax (See AMENDMENTS, Page 8)

QUAIL, TURKEY, DEER SEASON OPENS SAT.

Nimrods of the area are already cleaning up their shotguns and rifles in preparation for the big hunting season which opens Saturday, November 11 on quail, deer and turkey. The quail season will continue thru January 31. The bag limit is 12 per day and 36 in possession. The Deer season continues thru November 26. Bag limit is 1 deer, buck or antlerless but special permit is required for taking all antlerless deer. The turkey season continues thru Nov. 26 also. Bag limit is 1 turkey, either sex.

Those living in this area are reminded that to the south, the quail season does not open until December 1 in Hall, Childress and Briscoe counties. This includes the Brice area so don't get caught off limits and have to pay a big fine. The main thing regardless of the type of game you are hunting, follow the safe hunting rules so you will return home to your family safe and sound.

place was to furnish needed water for livestock in two pastures on the place. However, it will be stocked with fish and used for recreational purposes as well as providing water for wildlife. Mrs. White plans to use the seep pond as a campsite for her troop of Girl Scouts while on outings.

The 160 acre place was originally all in one pasture. A cross-fence was planned to divide the pasture to permit rotation grazing whereby one of the pastures will rest while the other is grazed and vice-versa. The seep pond is on the boundary and provides water for both places.

Besides range management, the seep pond is an important tool in better wildlife management providing water for dove, quail, and wild turkey. The grass will seed in one of the pastures and provide food and shelter. According to Mr. White, this seep pond will give better range management and will be an important tool in better management of wildlife and recreation. Others who have built seep ponds on their places recently include Jake Hess and Dean Simon.

If anyone is interested in developing a seep pond, the SOIL CONSERVATION SERVICE personnel in Clarendon will offer any technical assistance that they have in layout and construction of this type pond.

COTTON CLASSING REPORT RELEASED

High winds and blowing dust light rain and snow brought cotton harvesting to a standstill this past week. K. E. Voelkel in charge of the USDA's cotton classing office in Memphis, Texas estimated 75 to 85 per cent of cotton open.

Through Friday a seasonal total of 8,000 samples had been classed compared to 1500 at the same time last year. Quality shows 28 percent white, 69 percent Light Spotted, and 3 percent Spotted. Predominant grades were 55 percent Middling Light Spotted and 20 percent Middling. Staple length ranged from 3/8 inch to 1-9/32 inches with the predominant 15/16. Mike readings showed 82 percent in the 30 point premium range.

Average price paid farmers for main qualities ranged from 22.15 to 20. Cotton seed brought from \$55 to \$57 per ton at most gin points.

Postmaster's Corner

As usual at this time of the year, there are a few specific suggestions we like to make that will help us do a better job for you. Many people are disappointed each Christmas mostly through gross neglect on the part of someone, and the sole purpose of this article is to encourage you to help us eliminate these disappointments as nearly as possible.

Due to the increase in volume, parcel post is of great concern, and I will point out a few practices that will assure prompt delivery in good condition.

1. The Zip Code must be included in the address. The clerk must know the Zip Code before he can rate it.

2. Packages must be securely wrapped and tied. Choose your container carefully, and use cushioning around the contents to cushion it from outside impact. When items move in their container, they cannot be accepted for mailing.

3. Make sure address is legible and printed on ONE SIDE ONLY. 4. The name and address of both the sender and addressee should be enclosed in each parcel to permit identity in case of damage or loss of outside label. A contents list is good.

5. Many parcels of value are lost each year, and the only way we can be of real help is through postal insurance. For only a few cents more, you can make sure we either deliver them or pay you for them.

6. Air mail and special delivery is a big help on late mailings or long distance.

7. Mail early in the day and by all means before 4:00 p.m.

Christmas greeting cards are of concern due to illegible address, insufficient address, no return address and insufficient postage. It cost very little more to send them first class, and put your return address on the envelope. This assures you of two things. If they cannot be delivered, they will be returned to you, and if they can be delivered, the addressee will not have to pay them out. Most of us correspond with certain people only one time each year, and if they have moved, your greeting cannot be forwarded without sufficient postage or returned to you if there is no return address. Consequently, you may be wasting greeting cards year after year and not knowing they are not reaching their destination. Greeting cards for distant states should be mailed no later than December 10th, and local greeting cards should be mailed no later than December 15th.

Keep this thought in mind. Mail early in the day. You can very well imagine what happens when everyone rushes down right at closing time. The trucks have to leave as scheduled, and they can't wait for us to process all the late mail. With your cooperation, I think we can give you the best service you have ever had during this busy season.

1968 FEED GRAIN PROGRAM

This program was announced in Washington last week. However, we have not received the data concerning bases, yields, and payment rates as of this date.

We understand that the program will be the same as 1966. Some of the provisions are:

1. 20% required diversion at no pay to be eligible for payment and price support.

2. Additional diversion will be possible up to 50% of the base or 25 acres whichever is larger. The payment for this will be at 45% of the total price support times the projected yield.

3. Price supports will remain the same as for 1967. The loan rate (nationally) will be \$1.61 per cwt on grain sorghum. The price support payment paid on the planted acreage will stay at 53c per cwt.

4. Price support payments will be made on the planted acres of feed grains up to 50% of the base.

5. Small farm provisions remain the same.

Signups for participation in the 1968 cotton, feed grain, and wheat programs will be held during February and March of 1968.

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has stated repeatedly he might run for governor if Connally does not.

House Speaker Ben Barnes says he will run for lieutenant governor regardless of Connally's ultimate decision.

COURT RACES SPOTLIGHTED—State high court races are assured more than ordinary attention in 1968 primaries by the early announcements of three incumbent judges that they will not seek re-election.

Court of Criminal Appeals Judge Wesley Dice is the latest to reveal plans to step aside at the end of his present term. States Attorney Leon Douglas immediately announced as a candidate for the place.

Earlier announcements were made by State Supreme Court Associate Justices James R. Norvell and Meade F. Griffin that they will retire after next year.

Potential candidates to succeed them include Austin District Judge Tom Reavley, Chief Justice James G. Denton of the Amarrillo Court of Civil Appeals, Associate Justice Matt Davis of the Texarkana Court of Civil Appeals and Houston District Judge Sears McGee.

NEW INSPECTION ITEMS—Auto inspections, expanded by the new State law, are underway at 5,500 stations and will continue through April 15.

Don't be surprised at the additional items covered by the new \$1.75 fee. They will include:

- Required front seat safety belts on every car which has anchorages as part of the manufacturer's original equipment.

- Checking for "lash" or "play" in steering control. Vehicles will be rejected if steering wheel can be turned more than two inches without front wheel motion. It must also be possible to turn the wheels from full right to full left without jamming or binding. Vehicles with power steering must be checked with power on, and if fluid is below recommended level, car will not pass inspection.

- Wheels with defective or bent rim flanges or those with loose or missing bolts, nuts or lugs will cause rejection of the vehicle.

Texas needs much more park land. In the past, land has been offered to the State for Parks and the offers have had to be refused because of lack of money for development. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has a plan for the acquisition and development of park land for Texas, but it has been hampered by inadequate appropriations from the legislature. The creation of the Park Development Fund would allow the state to buy land and develop recreational parks. It would also provide for the preservation of 41 historical sites. No one should be more than two hours from some park. The Texas Water Development Board has recognized and stressed the recreational value of water resources to be created by it but no provisions have been made for acquisition and development of recreational areas adjacent to the reservoirs.

FOR: The investment in state park land acquisition and development would be made by state park users. A \$1.00 entrance fee at developed parks would pay of the principal and interest on the bonds. This method was proven feasible in the 1940's when repayment of a similar program was accomplished in 19 years instead of the 35 years expected. Texas needs to begin a program of land acquisition and development for park purposes to meet the demands of a growing population and to stimulate tourist trade. Money from the General Revenue Fund is not available to meet the immediate needs of such a program.

AGAINST: Many people feel that parks should be free with no admission expected. Maintenance must still come from legislative appropriations. Estimates of money to be received from admission fees and costs of repaying the bonds are theoretical. The admission charges might not be sufficient and the taxpayers would have to pay part of the cost. The Land and Water Conservation Act of 1965 provides federal funds on a matching basis for state park acquisition and development. The Legislature should appropriate funds to match federal grants after the amount of any federal grant is determined and as the need arises. It may be unnecessary to issue bonds to raise funds for matching federal grants.

NON-ELECTIVE POSITIONS UNDER THE STATE OR UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT WHERE THERE IS NO CONFLICT OF INTEREST AND WHERE THE STATE WILL BENEFIT.

The present law does not permit one to hold two positions under the state or United States. Over the years this section of the Constitution has been amended to exempt active and retired officers and enlisted men of various branches of the armed services from this provision; however, these amendments were added before the Air Force and Air National Guard were created as separate branches of the military service. This proposed amendment brings the Constitution up-to-date in this respect. This proposed amendment also states that if the second position is of benefit to Texas or is required by state or federal law and does not conflict with the original position held, the non-elective state officer may hold two positions. Also the proposed amendment prohibits members of the Legislature from holding any other office or position of profit under the state or United States.

FOR: This proposed amendment would make qualified personnel available for additional state services, thus doing away with the employment of special consultants in many instances. It would also make it possible for personnel of our state-supported schools to serve on national boards with a strong influence on allocation of federal grants. The failure of Texas to receive more than a minimum number of research grants in comparison to some other states has been attributed to this lack of representation on the influential national boards. This could result in governmental economy as funds now used for duplicating activities among the several departments by employ-

ees of each would be reduced.

AGAINST: Employees working for both federal and state governments would be subject to conflicting loyalties. It might have the effect of encouraging state officers and employees to increase their spheres of influence so that power would be concentrated in the hands of a few, and government would become less responsive to the people. The additional burden imposed on state officials and employees through a position permitted under this proposed amendment would be unfair and could also lead to less efficiency by requiring that person to divide his time and loyalty between the two offices or positions.

The amendments and a discussion of arguments for and against them are listed in the following outline. A resume of each amendment will be continued from week to week until all have been covered.

AMENDMENT NO. 5
AUTHORIZES THE PARKS AND WILDLIFE DEPARTMENT TO ISSUE AND SELL GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS IN THE AMOUNT OF \$75 MILLION TO FINANCE ACQUISITION AND DEVELOPMENT OF LANDS FOR STATE PARKS AND RECREATIONAL AREAS.

AMENDMENT NO. 6
PERMITS NON-ELECTIVE STATE OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES TO SERVE IN OTHER

(Continued from Page 1) payer. The difference in interest on bonds and that received from veterans is supposed to put the program on the credit side. Veterans of Viet Nam should have the same privileges as others. On the other hand the program invites purchase by some veterans who have no intention of using the land for productive purposes. A similiar program has twice been defeated by Texas voters.

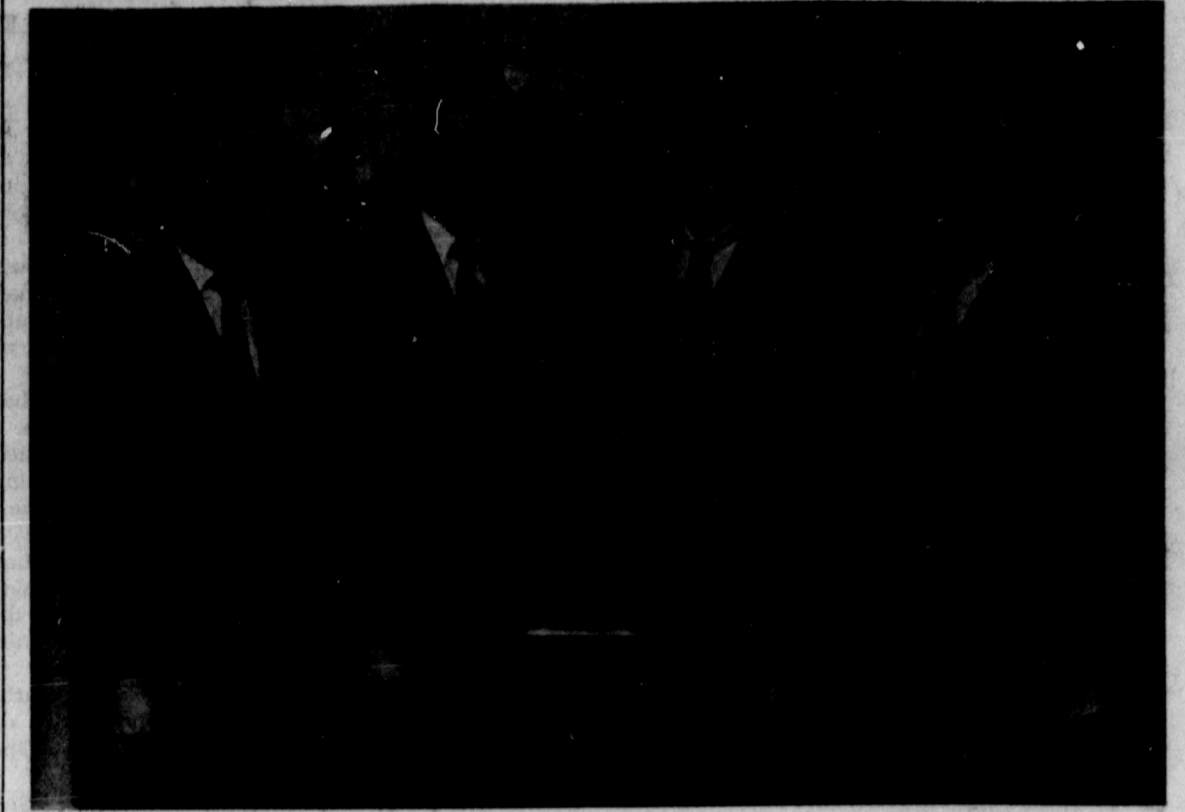
Amendment No. 4—Authorizes Counties to pay Medical, Doctor, and Hospital Bills of County Law Enforcement Officers for injuries received in the line of duty and pay salaries of injured during time of incapacitation. This amendment is permissive allowing counties to assume obligations if they so desire. At present the Texas constitution prohibits this practice. Law enforcement is hazardous but is not an occupation forced upon any individual but is engaged in through personal choice. This should come under the heading of private business. Officers should provide their own insurance and disability programs via better salaries. All county employees should be treated equally.

Amendment No. 5—Authorizes the Parks and Wildlife Department to issue and sell General

Obligation Bonds in the amount of \$75 million to finance acquisition and development of lands for State Parks and Recreational Areas. Texas needs more park land not only for its own citizens but for tourist attraction. Money from the General Revenue Fund is not available to meet the needs of such a program. Should the use of these parks be free or should an admission fee be charged? And if an admission fee is charged what assurance is there that the money received from such will be sufficient to pay part of the cost? Will the Taxpayer later be called upon to pay part of the cost.

Amendment No. 6 — Permits Non-Elective State Officers and Employees to serve in other Non-Elective positions under the State and United States Government where there is no conflict of interest and where the State will benefit. While this proposed amendment would make qualified personnel available for additional state services, employees working for both federal and state government would be subject to conflicting loyalties. Power could become concentrated in the hands of a few and government less responsive to the people.
