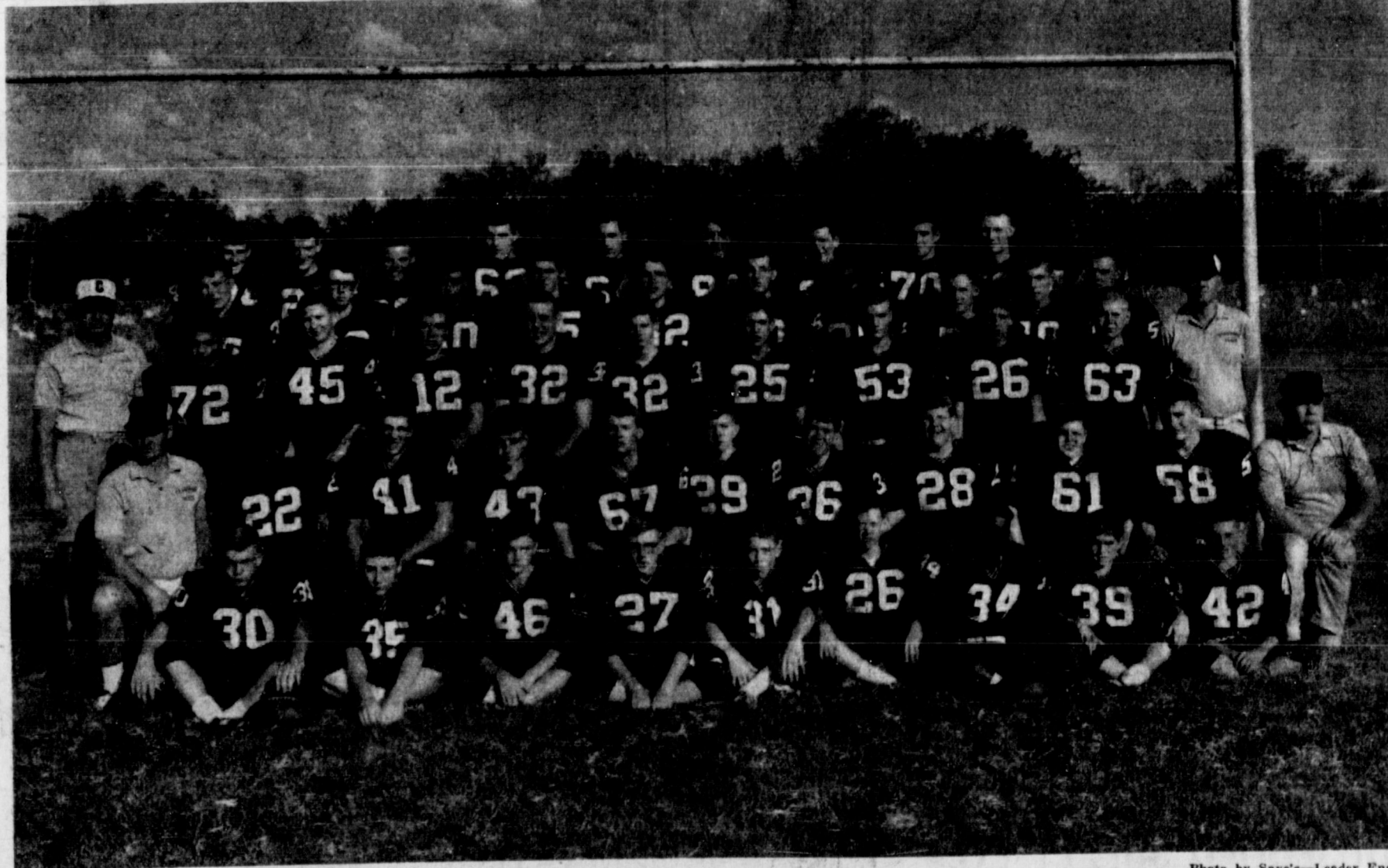

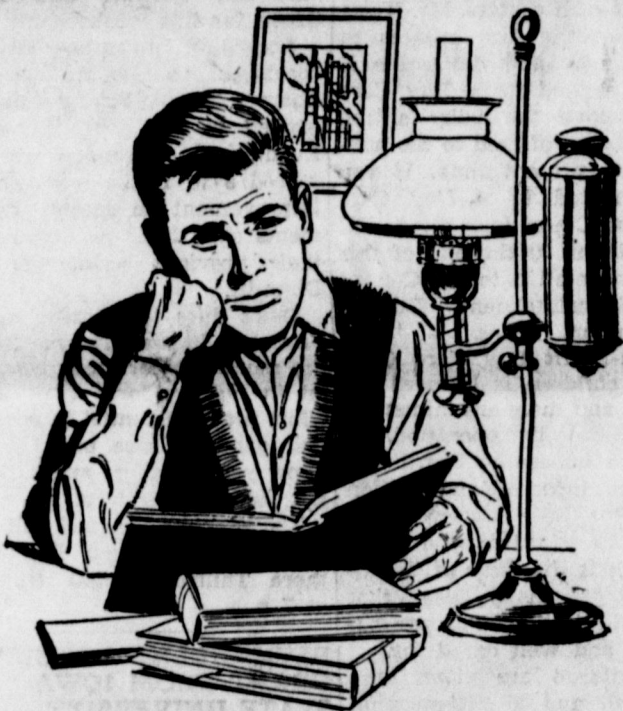

WARNING ISSUED ON DDT RESIDUES IN MILK

DDT residues in excess of recently established tolerance in milk have been reported in some areas of Texas. Improper application and/or the application of DDT in proximity of dairy farms and forage crops that are to be used as feed for dairy animals may be responsible for the trouble, explains C. W. Neeb, area Extension entomologist. He warns that DDT sprays used for crop protection should not be applied within one-fourth mile of dairy farms or forage crops.

STATE Capital NEWS

By VERN SANFORD

HOSPITAL BUILDING SIGNALLED — Texas Mental Health and Mental Retardation Board has approved \$3,200,000 in construction priorities and set aside \$3,000,000 for the Dallas Neuro-psychiatric Institute.

Major items include \$500,000 for an institute for human growth and development at Austin State School; \$397,828 for a rehabilitation building at Kerrville; \$388,859, for air conditioning at a Terrell unit; and \$290,459 for a recreation building at Abilene.

Grants in aid were approved for these community health centers:

Austin-Travis County, \$392,815; Edinburg, \$102,024; Beaumont-Port Arthur, \$395,000. Contracts also were made to assist in developing community centers in Abilene, Amarillo, Brownwood, Harlingen, Texarkana, Dallas, and San Antonio. Contract services were continued with individual physicians or hospitals in Amarillo, Corpus Christi, El Paso, Houston, Lufkin and San Antonio.

ATTORNEY GENERAL SPEAKS — Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin said it is up to each individual school district to decide if it wants to adopt the new "tenure" or "continuing contract" law for teachers. However, once adopted, the tenure plan (protecting teachers against firing without cause) becomes mandatory.

In other recent opinions, Martin held that:

- Insurance issued to an individual under a group policy does not become incontestable under the insurance code until two years from the date the person becomes insured under a master policy.
- District judges and district attorneys can claim full reimbursement for official travels out of county of their residence, effective September 1.
- Railroad Commission employ-

ees assigned to a transportation conference are entitled to travel expenses, as are state employees representing their agencies at a Texas Historical Survey Committee-sponsored dedication ceremony.

- A public weigher may not conduct weighing operations outside the area in which he was elected or appointed; deputy weighers need not be actual residents of the area they serve.
- Cities under 185,000 population cannot pay any portion of firemen's personal obligations as contribution to relief and retirement fund.
- Texas Employment Commission may contribute state funds to the premiums of its employees' group insurance coverage; but under these conditions, Commission must secure the contract of insurance, be the policyholder and pay the contributions to the company.
- Writ of possession on property sold at a tax sale may be issued to the purchaser after expiration of 20 days from end of redemption period.
- State agencies must make purchases of goods manufactured by the prison system through the Board of Control; political subdivisions may purchase directly from prisons but Board must set manufacturing specifications.

ELECTION LAW CHANGES TOLD — Secretary of State John Hill has provided Texas election officials details of all changes in state election laws enacted by the 60th Legislature.

Major changes include:

- Voters may mark their ballots with "x" or check marks rather than scratching names of candidates they oppose.
- Counties may use electronic voting machines on approval of the secretary of state.
- Those who have not yet met state residence requirements may vote for president and vice-

president.

- Those who have moved from county to county within six months before an election can vote for statewide officials.
- Some city election dates will be changed from the first Tuesday in April to the first Saturday in April.
- Election officials will get a pay raise from \$1. to \$1.25 an hour.
- Voters in bond elections will be required to sign affidavits they own property and to identify property.
- Write-in votes will be outlawed in primaries except for party offices, like county chairman.
- Only opposed candidates have to file campaign expense statements.
- Voters again must register between October 1 and January 31. All voters must sign up (including citizens over 60 in cities of less than 10,000 population).

COOPER DAM — Texas Water Development Board is moving to end a squabble delaying the \$24,000,000 Cooper Dam development on the Sulphur River near Texarkana.

Argument has been over a federal requirement that 63,000-acre feet of water annually be discharged from Lake Texarkana below the proposed dam. This to curb pollution in Red River.

TWDB has proposed that Cooper Reservoir provide about half the pollution control water, with reductions permitted if water quality improves.

FREE TUITION EXPANDED — Under a new law in effect this fall, free tuition and fees in state junior and senior colleges and universities will be available to 5,000 to 10,000 young Texans from families with incomes of \$4,800 a year or less.

Students must have finished in the upper 25 per cent of their high school classes or score in the top 20 per cent on a standardized admission exam; must be under 25 years of age; and must have lived in the state at least 12 months before registration date. Only freshman students are eligible this year.

SHORT SNORTS

Special elections will be held November 11 to select successors to the late Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas and the late Rep. Ira Kohler of Houston; also, Rep. Otha Birkner of Bay City who resigned to become a Matagorda County Commissioner; Rep. Maurice Pipkin of Brownsville, now director of the new State Judicial Qualifications Commission and Rep. Lee Duggan of Houston, now Judge of Harris County Criminal Court No. 1.

Texas retail sales dropped 3 per cent in July compared to a nationwide drop of five per cent, according to UT's Bureau of Business Research.

After a hearing before State Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar, Lake Worth school board was directed to reinstate Supt. Grady Vaughn or pay up some \$28,000 on a two-year contract.

Texas Highway Department has asked contractors to submit bids August 29-30 on some 42 highway improvement projects estimated to cost \$27,000,000.

According to the State Health Department, Texas leads the nation in diseases preventable by immunization, such as diphtheria, polio and measles but only about 5 per cent of the nation's population lives in Texas.

Sen. D. Roy Harrington of Port Arthur is calling an organizational meeting of the Interim Committee on College Faculty Compensation for 2 p.m. September 1.

Donald B. Neuman, Austin teacher, has accepted position with the Governor's Committee on Public School Education.

Governor's Committee for Employment of the Handicapped and National Employ the Handicapped Week in Texas will meet here on September 22.

NEWS FROM

Congressman Bob Price

While the cuts in the Foreign Aid program didn't go far enough, Congress at least earned its pay in an all-night session that ended at 3:51 a.m. last Friday.

By cutting \$563 million from the President's request for an authorization of 3.4 billion, Congress was earning its pay for the 16 hour day at the rate of \$35 million an hour and final approval of the bill—I voted against it—was by the narrow margin of 202-194.

The Senate had previously cut the authorization to \$2.6 billion so the final bill will be a compromise between that and the \$2.8 billion House figure. That is the authorization only and for one year rather than the two years as proposed. Some further pruning is likely when the actual appropriation of funds for the bill comes up.

Almost 50 amendments were offered on the bill and many of them passed. These included one which would deny U. S. sale of arms to any country shipping cargoes of any kind to North Viet Nam. If accepted by the Senate, this could wreck a pending multimillion dollar reciprocal arms sale agreement with Great Britain. Part of that deal is for sale of the new F-111 jet fighters.

Another amendment would bar aid to any U. N. member country more than two years behind in dues payments, and one would withdraw Poland's status as a "most favored nation" in obtaining special tariff considerations unless that country stopped sending military supplies to North Viet Nam.

The bill also denied the President's request for broad new authority to expand U. S. credit sales of arms abroad but did not go as far as the Senate in removing existing authority.

Interest rates on development loans were raised from one to two per cent during the first

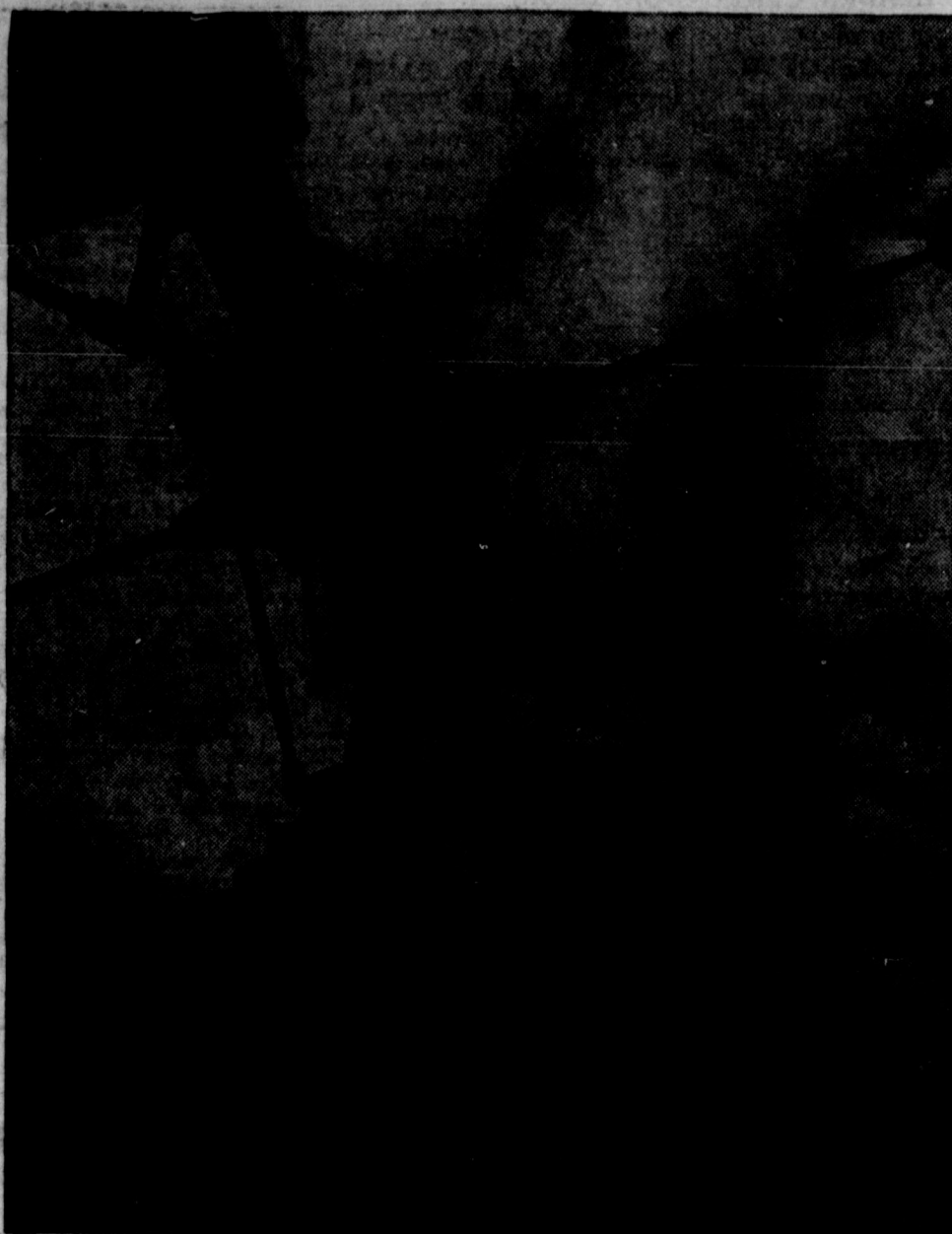
ten years but remain at 2½% during the remaining 30—not bad considering the rate of interest the Federal government pays on the money it must borrow to finance the AID program.

The minority members of the House Foreign Affairs Committee expressed their views on the failure of the foreign aid program in a report on the bill. Never has the futility of foreign

aid been more obvious. During the 20 years of this do-goodism, the U. S. has spent 130 billion taxpayer dollars.

This failure was demonstrated again during the recent Middle-East crisis when such U. S. "friends" as France and India voted with the Soviet Union on the U. N. resolution calling for Israel to withdraw from captured

France alone has received over \$9 billion in U. S. aid, has not even repaid her World War I debts and also kicked our NATO forces out as well as criticizing our efforts in Viet Nam.

India not only has received \$6.7 billion in economic assistance but is now demanding more and immediate shipments of U. S. wheat for her starving millions—and this after praising Nasser and criticizing the U. S. after the Israeli victory.

India today is the No. 1 food deficient area in the world, yet the country has a cattle population (including buffalo) of well over 200 million head. This exceeds the combined cattle and buffalo population of the United States, Argentina and Australia. We respect the traditions and religious beliefs of individuals. On the other hand, where practices such as reverence for the life of animals conflict sharply with the attainment of human progress, we should not be expected to subsidize these traditions and beliefs.

The Federal budget deficit grows at an alarming rate with the end not yet in sight. The balance of payments continues to show a deficit and the present administration is pushing for an income tax boost. One might logically assume that now is a reasonable time to cut our foreign aid commitments. This would stem inflation, reduce the budget deficit, alleviate the balance-of-payments problem, and perhaps provide some relief to this country's long-suffering taxpayers.

American generosity has won us neither friends nor respect nor trustworthy allies. Nor has it accomplished the aid objectives of establishing stability and keeping countries out of the Communist orbit.

As a nation we are now engaged in a costly war in Viet Nam as well as costly warfare, education, urban development programs and a multitude of other domestic projects.

We cannot afford everything. If ever the time will come to ask: What are our priorities- it is now and the day appropriations for this huge and wasteful program are up for consideration. There was some encouragement in the action the House took and the close 202-194 vote on the bill.

DIVERTED ACRES

We have been notified that acres under the annual feed grain and cotton programs will be released for grazing October 1, 1967. This release is for grazing only. Harvesting of crops in any manner will be considered a violation.

This release is for diverted acres only and does not apply to soil bank and CAP land. Soil bank and CAP acreages may be grazed until September 30 with prior approval of the county committee. There is a charge for this grazing. Any grazing done after that date will be a violation of the soil bank contract.

NOTICE OF ASC ELECTION

The official ASC Community Committee election ballots will be mailed to eligible voters on September 8, 1967. The voted

ballots must be mailed or returned in person to the ASCS Office by September 20, 1967. Any person who does not receive a ballot but thinks he is an eligible voter should contact the office and request a ballot.

A copy of the Regulations governing ASC County and Community Committees is available for review here at the office. The ASC County Committee decides questions on election procedure or eligibility to hold such office. Such decisions may be appealed to the ASC State Committee.

The voted ballots will be counted in public here at the office at 9:00 a.m. on September 22. The vote counting may be witnessed by any interested person.

The nominee who gets the most votes will be chairman of the community committee. The one who gets the second most votes will be Vice-chairman, and the third most votes will be the regular member. Those getting the fourth and fifth most votes will be the first and second alternate. The three community

committeemen serve as delegates to the county convention to elect farmers to fill vacancies on the ASC County Committee.

The county convention will be on September 27 at 10 a.m. at the Donley ASCS County Office. The convention is open to the public.
