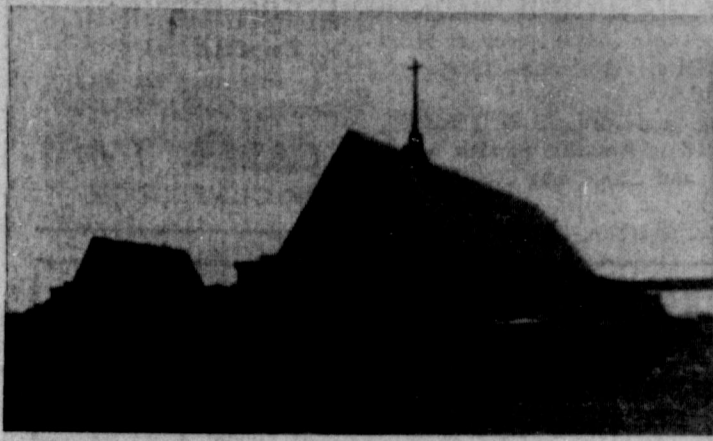

First Baptist Church To Be Dedicated Sunday, March 16

The First Baptist Church will dedicate its new \$250,000 plant Sunday, March 16. The day is also the 79th anniversary of the founding of the church. Special services have been planned for the entire day with former pastors and members as special guests.

Rev. W. F. Vanderburt, pastor from 1953-1959 will speak at the regular morning worship hour. Rev. L. A. Sartain, pastor 1947-1951 will speak at the afternoon service beginning at 2:30. Rev. Howard Scott, pastor 1952-1953 will bring the evening sermon.

Dedication vows will be taken by Pastor W. R. Lawrence and the people at the afternoon service. Following the program, a tea will be served and tours of the church offered.

Special music is a part of the three services also. Mrs. Millard Word, Canyon, will be soloist in the afternoon. Mrs. Howard Scott will present an organ recital at 6:30 preceding the evening service at 7:00. The combined Youth and Adult choirs will sing at the morning and afternoon services, and a men's quartet will sing in the evening.

Results Of Broncho Games At State Tourney Last Week

The Class A State Tournament got underway in Austin Thursday morning with Clarendon-Friendswood opening the annual sports event at Gregory Gymnasium. Friendswood, a runnerup in Class B in last year's tourney, as well as Clarendon had tournament jitters in the first quarter. Friendswood managed to pull out of their tension in the first period but it was not until in the third quarter that Clarendon settled down to play which was too late in the game to muster a recovery. In the fourth quarter Clarendon cut the Mustang advantage to 8 points. The game ended with a 51-70 score.

High Point man for Clarendon was Charles Louis with 17, followed by Everett Monroe with 14, Wayne Carter 9, Jim Moore and Steve Adams 4 points each, and Bennie Reese 3. Percentage wise Friendswood was hitting 60.4 from the floor and 70.6 at the free throw line while Clarendon was hitting 31.1 from the floor and 72.2 free throws. Friendswood's smallest lead was in the second half 53-45 with 3:50 remaining.

In Clarendon's second game the Bronchos played the loser of the Detroit-West Sabine game which was Detroit in Travis High School Gymnasium Friday afternoon. The Broncs got off to a good start and led throughout the first half but came back cold in the second half to lose the game 51-66. By periods Clarendon stood 16 to Detroit's 12, 27-22, and 31-39. Monroe was high with 17; Reese followed with 12, Louis 10, and Adams 7.

It was with pride that Clarendon fans at the game looked on their team. Their good sportsmanship in defeat and team work in play were marks of championship and the fine coaching ability of Carl Irlbeck. Neither game represented the team's best efforts. The team and fans were tense. This was Clarendon's first trip to State where their opponents had the experience of having been there previously which was in itself a tremendous advantage. It was an honor to go to State and to be fourth out of the 224 Class A teams in the State many wishing they could be there. With the experience gained this year and the fact that there is only one senior student on the Broncho squad, the Bronchos are looking forward to taking the State Championships in Class A next year.

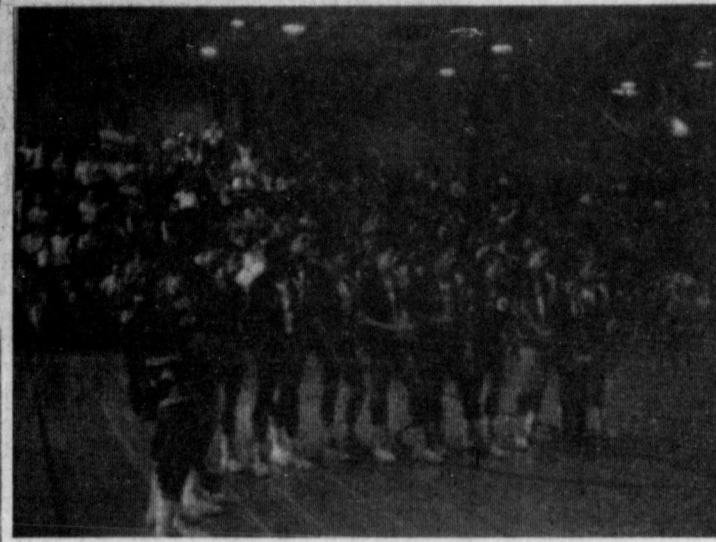
GIRL SCOUT COOKIE SALE DELAYED

Bronchos Take Fourth Place In State Play-Off Tourney

The Clarendon Bronchos were greeted as the number 4 Class A team in the state by a large delegation of supporters Sunday night at 8 p.m. when they reached the city limits following an eventful four days in the Capital City of the State where they participated in the State Basketball finals.

The Broncs were all tied up with the "State Final" jitters as were a number of the other teams going to Austin for the first time. It fell their lot to play the opening game of the play-off series before a larger crowd and the large group of Clarendon supporters present more or less had the same feeling sitting there in Gregory Gym.

The Broncs lost their first game to Friendswood 51 to 70 and Friendswood went on to defeat West Sabine to take first place. They lost their second game Friday afternoon to Detroit 51 to 66 and came home with the fourth place title which is a real honor considering the fact there were 224 Class A teams in the state that participated in basketball this year and 4,978 teams. They also placed one player, Charles Louis, on the All-State team.

Both Friendswood and West Sabine had seen previous action in the state play which is quite an advantage. The Broncs will have that advantage next year and are already looking forward to going back to Austin as the representative from this area.

Coach Carl Irlbeck, speaking for himself and the team, expressed their appreciation for the exceptionally fine following of local people to the state tournament as well as other games, for the fine backing they received by merchants and individuals in the Leader and the radio broadcast of the two games which gave those who stayed behind to keep the town running an opportunity to hear the games while they were in progress.

The Broncs and Coach Carl Irlbeck were honored guests of the Clarendon Lions Club Tuesday noon at which time the coach complimented the fine group of boys making up the Broncho squad.

Attend Church This Sunday

Chemical Weed Control Meet Mar. 18

A meeting to discuss chemical weed control in cotton and grain sorghum will be held Tuesday, March 18, at 8:00 p.m. in the Agriculture Building of Clarendon High School, according to County Agent Ronald Gooch.

Dr. Allen Weise, weed control specialist and researcher with the USDA Southwestern Great Plains Research Center at Bushland, will be the speaker. Chemicals used for preplant, preemergence and postplant weed control will be discussed and the proper use and the strong points and weak points of each chemical will be given. The program will include how to use chemicals in a band to reduce chemical cost. Other points to be discussed will include incorporation, chemical rates to use on different soil types, kinds of weeds controlled, etc.

This should be an excellent opportunity to hear the latest information on chemical weed control in cotton and grain sorghum. Everyone is invited to attend, Gooch said.

Dr. Smith New Head Of Country Club

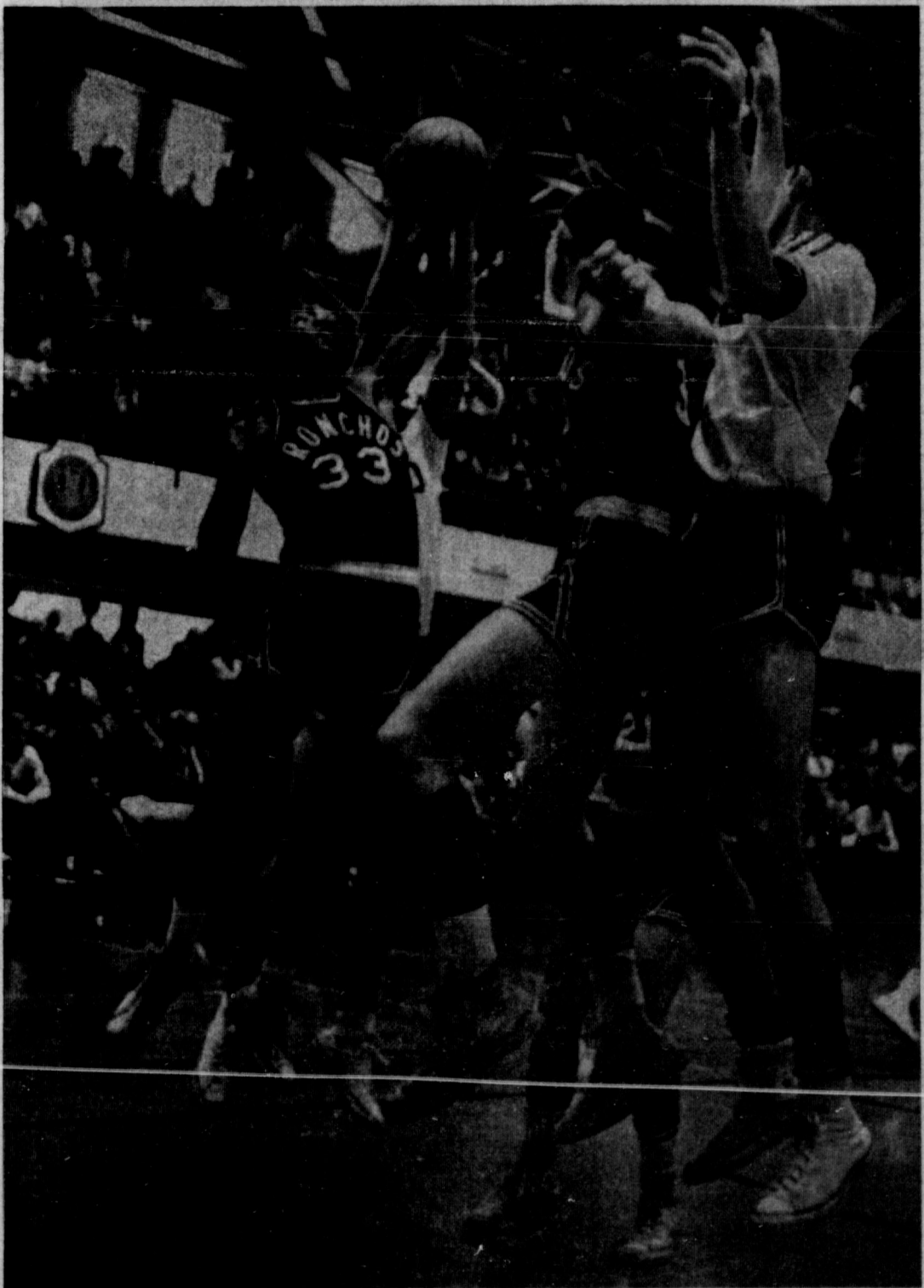

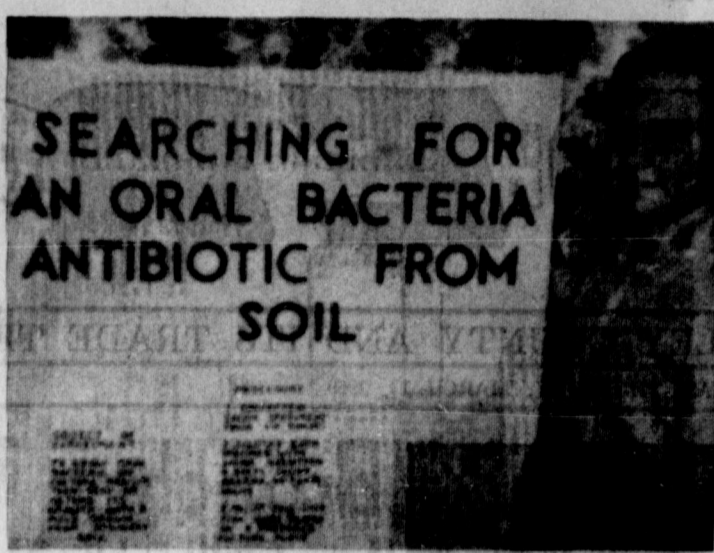

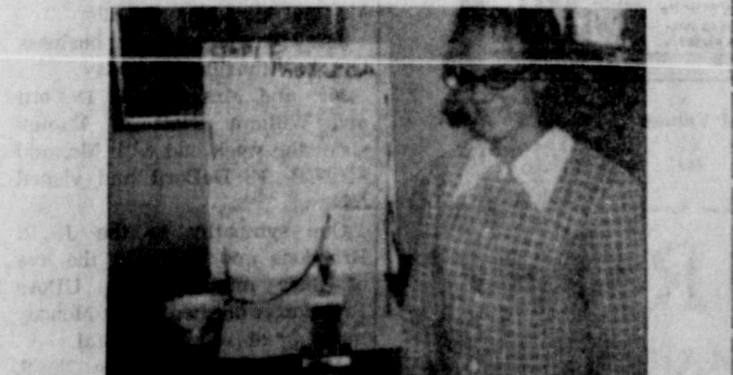

University of Wisconsin wildlife scientists have concluded that the chemical DDT, used in plant pest control operations, is wiping out large regional populations of precacious birds located at the tops of food chains in contaminated ecosystems. The scientists have established that shell thickness is correlated precisely with the concentration of DDE, the breakdown product of DDT, within the eggs. One casualty of DDT has been the peregrine falcon. The population of these birds of prey has taken a nose dive, and the population declines are marked by a characteristic reproductive failure in which adult birds accidentally break their thin-shelled eggs and eat them. Wildlife researchers have shown this breakage of egg shells corresponds with a sharp change in shell thickness beginning in 1947, one year after DDT was used generally. Source: Outdoor News Bulletin from the Wildlife Management Institute.

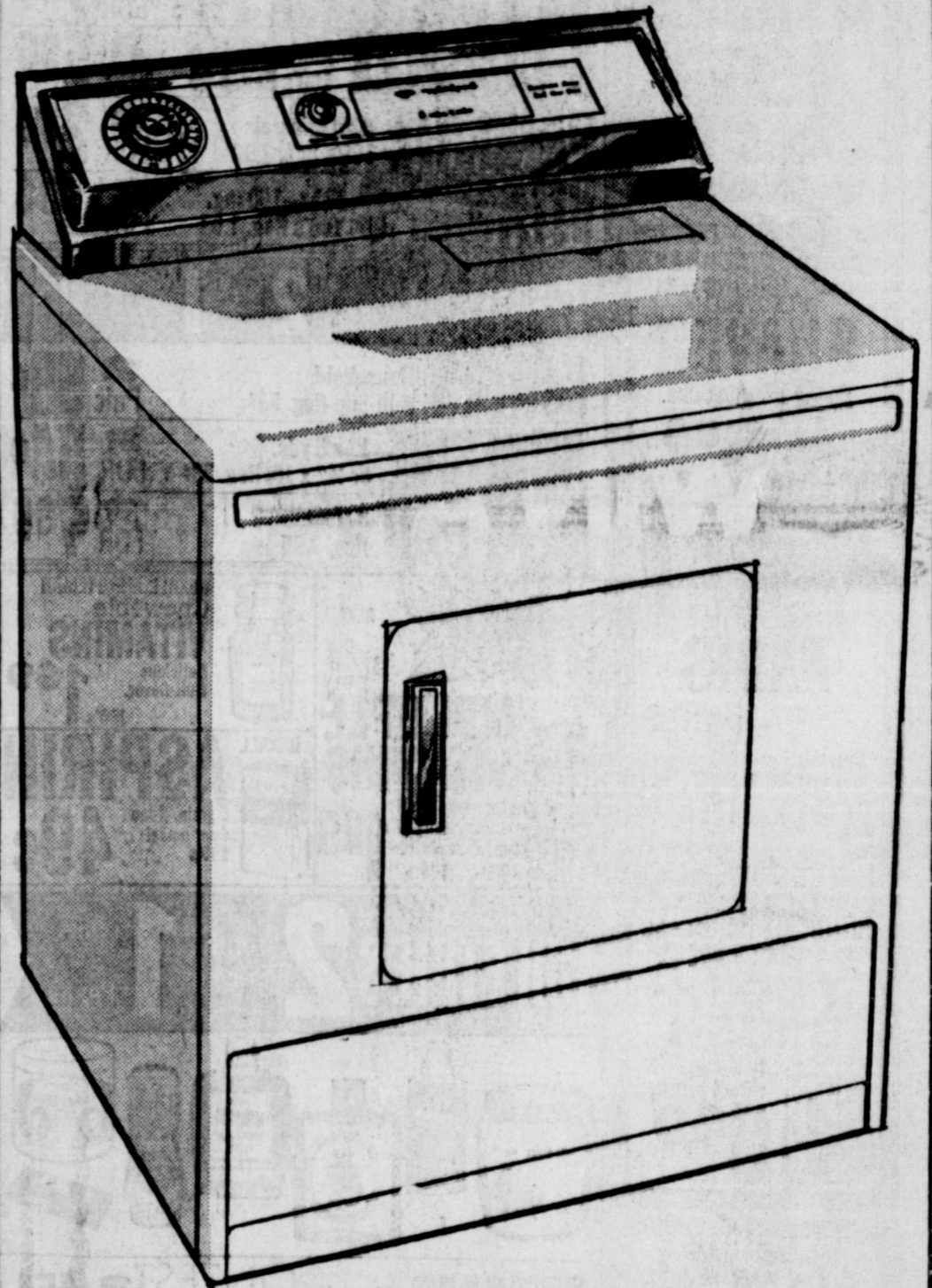

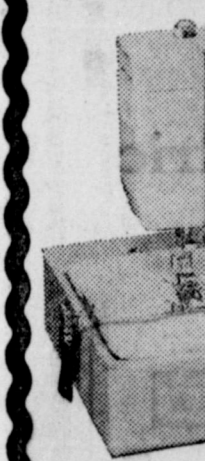

However, these are voluntary programs and each producer makes his own choice as to whether he wants to participate in the programs. Even though there is no diverted acres required under the 1969 cotton program it is necessary to sign an intention to participate in order to be eligible for the price support payment.

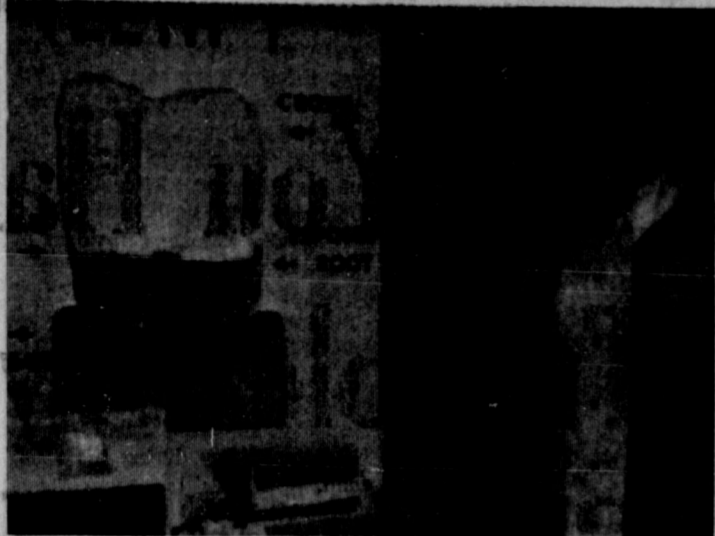
Only one week remains in the sign-up period. Don't let the date slip by.

REPORTING WHEAT ACREAGES—Wheat producers are cautioned to be sure and report all acreages of wheat, including abandoned wheat or volunteer, when you make your certification since these acreages might be needed in some cases for history or payments. Also, we want to stress that you measure your acreages and not guess or estimate them. An incorrect certification may cause a penalty in your payment or a loss of all payments if an error found upon a spot check measurement is in excess of the allowable tolerance.

We here at the ASCS office will help all we can by measuring from the maps or making computations from your ground measurements. Official field measurements will be made upon application and payment of the service fee.

Remember, May 1 is the final date to report your wheat acreages. May 1, is also the final date to destroy any excess wheat or graze diverted acres.

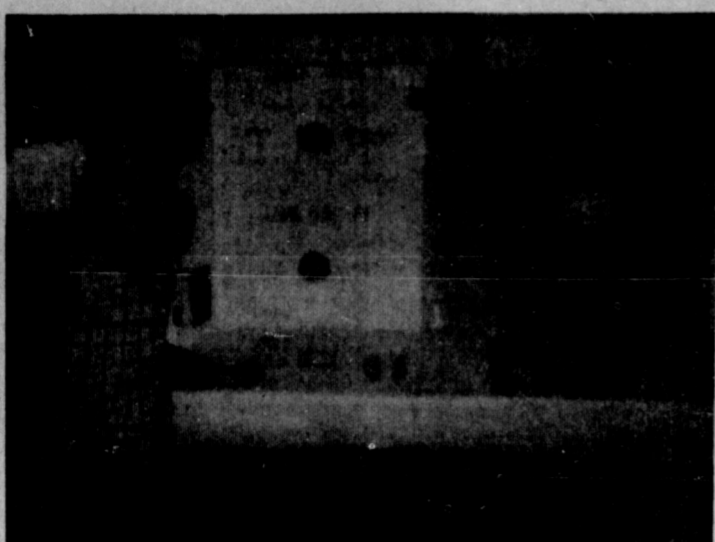

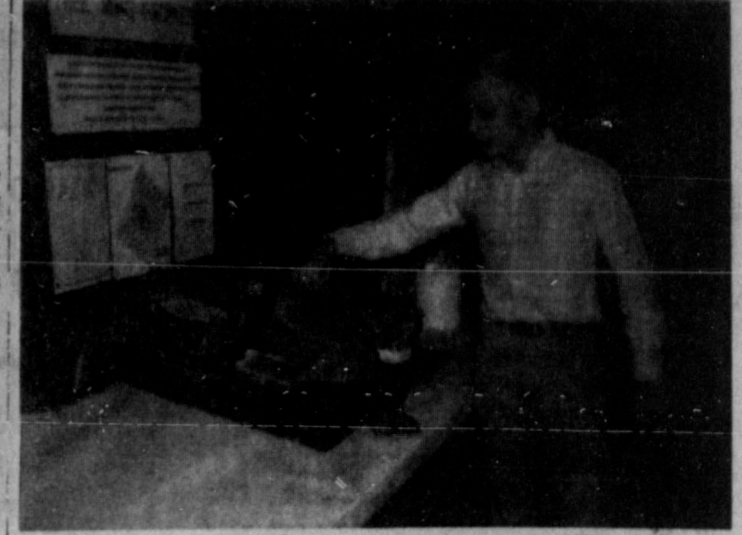
Last Rites For Joe E. Johnston Held Tuesday
