One of the nation's oldest and largest human relations agencies, the Anti-Defamation League, in conjunction with the Texas Press Association, is sponsoring a photography contest that will reflect Texas' progress since its inception 150 years ago. Amateurs and professionals are invited to enter the Statewide Sesquicentennial contest based on the theme "The American Dream in Texas.'

The American Dream to some may be a chrome-gull winged Cadillac while to many others it may be equality of opportunity, freedom of choice, better education or harmonious relation," says Andrew Solomon, chairman of the ADL Texas Sesquicentennial Planning Group. "However Texans view the American Dream, they should capture it on film and enter their pictures in the contest."

The Texas Press Association and the Anti-Defamation League are sponsoring the contest to get Texans involved with the spirit of the Sesquicentennial. The Texas Press Association (TPA) has over 550 member newspapers including dailies and weeklies.

Each local participating Texas Press Association newspaper will select a group of finalists from photographs they receive by Septemer 1, 1986. The finalists will be sent by September 15, 1986 to the Southwest Regional office of the Anti-Defamation League where they will be judged by a preeminent panel of judges: Elvin E. Hayes, special University of Houston, University Park: Alan Shepard, former astronaut and Geoff Winningham, professional photographer.

Winners will receive gift certificates up to \$500.00 for photographic equipment and their photographs will be displayed in the rotunda of the State Capitol Building during the week of October 19-25.


### Miss Donley County Pageant June 7

### Free Well Child clinic offered Tuesday, June 10

The Texas Department of Health will provide a monthly Well Child Clinic in the Planned Parenthood facility 311 Carhart Street, Tuesday, June 10 from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon, then 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m.

The well child clinic services will be available to newborn infants and children up to the age of 18 years of age regardless of their race, sex, religion, color, national origin or economic worth.

Services provided through the well child clinics are complete physical exams, heights, weights, blood pressures, vision and hearing screening, tests for anemia and developmental

screening. Rita Anderson, R.N., Public Health Nurse, explained that the clinics are not intended to replace the physician nor to "pinch hit" as a style of substandard medical care. The purpose is to detect possible health problems. These individuals will be referred to their choice of medical care for diagnosis and treatment. Early detection of any health problems will do much to prevent complications.

### Program

Donley County Farm Bureau members can now buy infant car restraint seats at a special price from the manufacturer, and, in addition, be refunded the full cost, according to Don Springer of Hedley, county

"Car accidents are the leading cause of death for children under 5 years of age," said Mr. Springer. "That is especially tragic when one realizes that most such deaths and serious injuries could have been prevented wsith a child-restraint seat."

Child-restraint seats are also required by law in Texas.

To encourage the use of such seats among Farm Bureau members who have small children, the Texas Farm Bureau is introducing the child-saver

program. Arrangements have been made with the manufacturer for Farm Bureau members to buy an infant car seat for just \$20. The seat which

normally retails for about \$60, can be kept or passed on to someone else when the child is older. Or, the member can choose to return it to the county Farm Bureau office for a full refund of \$20.


To obtain a Safe-T-Seat, members can pick up an order form at the county office at Hwy 287 & Koogle. The order form is to be filled out and sent along with a check for \$20 to the manufacturer. The Texas Farm Bureau will pay the difference, including shipping charges. the Safe-T-Seat will be shipped directly to the member.


The seat, a convertible model, is suitable for small children up to 40 pounds or 40 inches, meeting all federal standards. It is also approved for most commercial and general aircraft.

The number of safety seats will be limited to three per member. For additional information, contact the Donley County Farm Bureau.





### One Man and a horse rides for dyslexia

Do you know what dyslexia is? Well it is a disturbance in the ability to read. Can you imagine not being able to learn to read, and if you can't read, chances are you can't learn to write.

Randall Hardin is a 25-year-old, McKinney, Texas man who is riding his 15-year-old Arabian champion horse, from Raton, N.M. to McKinney, Texas. He is doing this to draw this handicap to the attention of the people in hopes that they will contribute to the American Dyslexia Association, Washington, D.C. Hardin is paying his own way on the ride, and all the money he raises will go directly to the American Dyslexia Association. "I had a lot of problems growing up, especially with dyslexia. I was shuffled around from school to school. It took one school almost a year to find out what was wrong with me. I went through my first years of school without anyone knowing that I couldn't read or write," Hardin stated.

Because he could not learn to read or write, his teachers, friends and family thought he was retarded. "It really hurt when my friends and family called me stupid, and retarded. I knew I was not retarded. I would try to read and the words got

all scrambled around and by the time they got from my eye to my brain, my brain could not remember what my eye saw, and it was not until I was about 10; or 11 that they diagnosed that I was not retarded but had dyslexia. I dropped out of school, got on drugs and really messed up my life for a while, but then I decided I'd get my life back together and make something of myself," Hardin said.

Hardin went to Texas Industrial Tradé School in Dallas, received his GED, along with a certification for meg and arch welding. He is now in the construction business and trains as a runner. He is in the top 20 runners in the USA and runs 26.2 miles in 2:11.11. He is currently working toward attending the Olympic Training Center to "hopefully make the Olympic Trials in 1987."

Hardin visited the Clarendon kindergarten class with his horse, and talked to the children for a few minutes, encouraging them to study hard and keep in school.



### Hands Across **America**

Christian care about their pastor. In fact, they care very much. Because we are men and women of faith, the church and the pastor occupy a crucial spot in our lives.

We care enough about the minister to insist that he visit us in the hospital, officiate at our daughter's

service for a loved one. We care, too, about his personal life. We expect him to forego the vices we are unwilling to forego ourselves. The occupants of the pew put their pastor on a platform not only on Sunday morning but 168 hours a week.

"I want my minister to be a cut above me." Actually, church members often expect their pastor to stand several cuts above them. They think he should stroll on water and they get disillusioned if he almost drowns when water gets up his nose. Harry Levinson at the Menninger Foundation reported that the ministry probably ranks as the most besieged professional group in America.

Church members care about their pastor as a performer, but relatively few care about him as a person. It's not that they don't like him. They may think so highly of him that they do not realize that the pastor is a sheep, too. Greatness is demonstrated by the love the people in the congregation have for each other and for those God puts in their midst to minister. A great congregation will take care in how it calls its minister and then will do all it can to pay him an adequate salary. No one in his right mind enters the ministry for money. As a group, ministers are in the poorest paid profession in the nation. The lack of adequate salary. places a pastor and his family under enormous stress. Also, in our culture, salaries symbolize love and respect, and, as a result, have an impact on our self-worth. When a church deals generously in paying its pastor, it makes a pastor feel appreciated and demonstrates a tangible concern about his personal and emotional needs.

Ministers, like all of us, need stroking beyond the ritual handshake at the close of a service. They need the encouragement that honest praise can bring. When a member of the congregation drops him a note or makes a special telephone call in the middle of the week, a sheep ministers to the shepherd.

A pastor cares about the families in his congregation. More than anyone else, perhaps, he knows the husbands and wives who give him a Sunday smile but live with a fractured marriage. Because the divorce rate among clergy falls well below the national average, a church may not think must about the stress in a pastor's home. As one layman explained to his pastor's wife, "We

a great church will do all it can to protect a minister's time with his wife and children. Since a minister's work is only one ring away, a pastor often feels imprisoned by his phone. He and his family must have guarded quality time that belongs to them. The congregation must support the

Pastor. He cannot go it alone. He should be the subject of their daily prayers and the object of their earnest concern. If he stumbles and falls many will be shaken and hurt. Years ago in his lectures to students, C.H. Spurgeon wrote to fledgling pastors, "It is with us and our hearers as it is with watches and the public clock; if our watch be wrong. very few will be misled by it, but ourselves; but if the Big Ben or Greenwich Observatory should go amiss, half of London would lose it






