Annual Donley County Junior Livestock Show and Premium Sale

The Annual Donley County Junior Livestock Show and Premium Sale was held Jan. 17, 1987, starting at 9 a.m., approximately 66 Donley County 4-H and FFA members exhibited their lambs, pigs, heifers and steers. Derk Aaron, County Extension Agent from Brisco County was the judge. Jerry Gage and Doyle Hall were ringmen, Jack Moreman was auctioneer, Mitchie Fuston, clerk.

Officers for the Junior Livestock Association are Mike Smith, Chairman; Ike O'Neal, Vice Chairman; Cheryl Burch, Secretary; Edward Campbell, Treasurer; Melinda McAnear was in charge of the concession stand and Cheryl Burch was in charge of buyers supper.

Before the premium auction the Junior Livestock Association gave a free barbecue at 6 p.m. Following the meal, the fifth annual premium auction was held. Each exhibitor was eligible to enter one animal in the auction. The animal itself was not sold, but interested businessmen and individuals made premium bids for the investment and effort made by the youth exhibiting the livestock.

Knorrp Insurance furnished the trophies for the beef show, Evans Fertilizer provided trophies for the lamb show, and the Clarendon Press furnished the trophies for the swine show, Jiggs Mann provided belt buckles for showmanship.

The beef was donated by Jerral Martin and the Bitter Creek Ranch, Shelton & Sons and Jenks and Bobby Boston. The pork for the barbecue was donated by Doyle Hall.

Derek Howard donated a pig to the association and they sold tickets for the pig to be given away at the auction. Curtis Schaffer was the winner and the winning ticket was drawn by 3-year-old Matthew Woody.

Doyle and Dan Hall along with Fed McAnear cooked the barbecue for the premium sale.

About 165 attended the BBQ and auction.

Snow from first storm clearing

Some of the streets are still slick and hazardous from last weeks 10-12 inch snowfall. This was the first measurable snow of the season and made highways and streets extremely dangerous. School was out for a teachers in service, therefore there was no school.

Snow plows from the highway department cleared snow and kept the highway open and traffic moved very slowly.

Around town most of the tons of snow that was cleared from the

curbs and piled into the center of Kearney street have melted, but there are still some areas that are iced over and should be taken with caution.

The only reported accident caused by the snow and icy conditions was Pheobe Ann Buntin who fell at the post office and broke her left hip and left arm. She was taken to St. Anthony's Hospital and is in room 562B. However, she may be coming home this weekend.

The weather also has effected

cotton harvest because of icy roads and snow in the fields. The cotton harvest will be delayed. The three county gins have reported they have ginned so far this season 9,312 bales of cotton and expect about 554 more bales before the season ends. It will be a week or more before they will be able to get back into the fields, if no other bad weather comes our way.

Reports came from West Texas Gin, Hedley; Clarendon Gin, Clarendon; and Paymaster Gin in Lelia Lake.

1987 Farmers emergency loans

Farmers seeking disaster emergency loans from the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) State Director, J. Lynn Futch said today.

"All family-size farmers should be aware that a newly-effective provision of the 1985 farm bill prohibits our making emergency loans for crop losses that could have been insured under multiple-peril crop insurance programs sponsored by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC)," said Futch.

"Therefore I urge every family-size farmer in the State of Texas to seriously take into account this new relationship between insurance coverage and emergency-loan eligibility."

Federally-subsidized multiple-peril crop insurance is now available for all wheat, corn, barley, grain sorghum, oats, upland cotton and rice plus an additional 35 specialty crops in most growing areas. The government subsidy reduces the program costs by about 50 percent, Futch said, making crop insurance a worthwhile option to consider regardless of the newly-required tie in with emergency loan eligibility.

If a farmer obtains the insurance required, and if the value of his crop loss is still 30 percent or more after the insurance payment, the operation will be eligible for consideration for an emergency loan.

Effective in January, the new requirement will affect crops planted in 1987, and thus will not effect winter wheat or other winter-seeded crops planted in 1986 and harvested in 1987. Insurance must be multiple peril, covering most forms of disaster rather than hail only.

The closing date for insurance sales on spring-planted crops in the State of Texas will vary. Closing date for insurance sales in the coastal and South Texas Areas is February 15th. Because of these dates and the fact that a prevented-planting endorsement for eligible crops must be elected 45 days prior to sales closing, Futch urged farmers to contact their local insurance agents promptly.

Information is also available at FCIC field offices and through most county offices of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS).

Congressman Beau Boulter Reports from Washington

THANKS, BUT NO THANKS

If someone doesn't perform the job for which he or she was hired, should they receive a raise in salary? I don't think so. And from what I've been hearing, a majority of the American public doesn't think so either.

The pay raise to which I am referring is the proposed salary increase for Members of Congress in the President's recently submitted budget. This increase would raise the salaries of most Congressmen and Senators from \$77,400 to \$89,500, and is the result of a year-long study by a government commission into the salary differences between government and private sector employees.

In 1967, Congress created the Commission on Executive, Legislative, and Judicial Salaries, to provide for a regular, periodic review of the salaries of high-ranking government officials. The "Quadrennial Pay Commission," as it is called, convenes every four years and makes pay recommendations to the President, who in turn responds to these proposals in his next Budget message to the Congress.

The 1986 Commission concluded that the salaries of high-ranking federal officials lagged significantly behind comparable positions in the private sector, and recommended, for example, that the salaries of Congressmen be raised to \$135,000.

On January 5, President Reagan submitted pay recommendations substantially below those of the Commission in his Fiscal Year 1988 Budget Message. These pay increases will automatically go into effect unless Congress, within 30 days of receipt, passes a joint resolution of disapproval. This resolution would then require the President's signature. If the President were to veto the joint resolution, a two-thirds veto override vote would be necessary to sustain congressional disapproval.

Well to get matters straight, a number of my colleagues and I in the House of Representatives have just one thing to say about the proposal to raise our pay: Thank you very much Mr. President, but no thanks! The cost to the taxpayer for just the

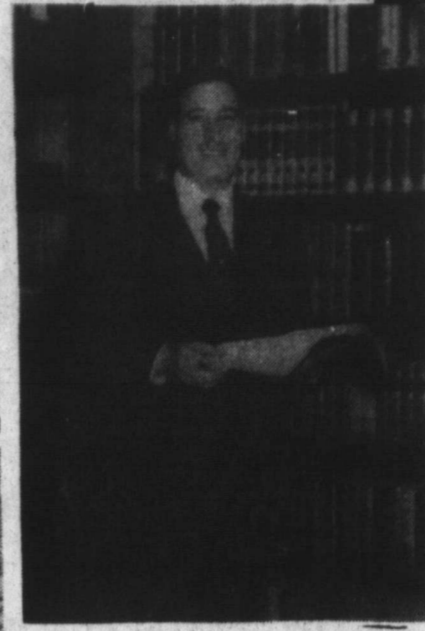

PARENTING TECHNIQUES

As any blessing can become a curse if abused or misused, so can childrearing become burdensome to the parent who purposely or unintentionally forsakes Biblical parenting principles. Our country is presently filled with unhappy homes, rebellious teenaers, disobedient and disrespectful children, angered, bewildered and distressed parents.

Sadly, even some Christian families become such. How does this happen? How can it be corrected? Suffice it to say that the family members must be saved. The husband and wife must be saved. The husband and wife must be dedicated to God and each other. The parents must walk in the Spirit and must train their children in the nurture and admonition of the lord (Eph. 6:4). "Why does it take so long to have a prescription filled?" Although patrons don't always ask this question, they must frequently have it in their minds. Even waiting a few minutes for prescriptions may seem like an eternity after spending the better part of a morning or afternoon in a physician's office.

Dispensing medication is not as simple a task as merely taking medicine from one container and placing it into another. A series of important steps help safeguard the patron's health. These steps include checking to determine that the dose and frequency of administration is appropriate for the patron's age and health condition. Prescription directions are sometimes unclear or information is missing, thereby necessitating contacting the prescriber.

When two or more medicines are dispensed, the possibility of significant drug-drug interactions must be determined.

Label preparation involves not only placing clear and concise directions on the container, but also determining which auxiliary labels are appropriate (eg, Shake Well, Keep in Refrigerator). And if insurance papers are involved, it may take as long to complete these papers as it does to check and fill the prescription.

VA pays record insurance dividend to veterans

The Veterans Administration has announced that 3.2 million veterans who have kept their GI life insurance policies in force will share a record high dividend distribution in 1987 totaling \$934.9 million.

No application is necessary. Each policyholder will receive the 1987 dividend in the month of the anniversary date of the individual policy.

The higher dividend payout is due to lower death rates among policyholders and high interest earnings on the insurance funds' investments. The figure is \$29.9 million more than paid out in 1985, when policyholders

shared an annual dividend of \$905 million.

Government life insurance has been issued through various periods starting January 1, 1919, through May 2, 1966, to veterans of World Wars I and II and the Korean Conflict.

The only VA-administered program now open to new issues to Service Disabled Veterans Insurance. It is available, without dividends, to veterans with service on or after April 25, 1951, who have a service-connected disability.

FARM NEWS

Eligibility for participation in all programs administered by ASCS is established by law without regard to race, color, religion, age, sex, handicap or nation origin.

FmHA ACCEPTING EMERGENCY LOAN APPLICATIONS

Donley County was declared eligible for FmHA disaster emergency loans on December 31, 1986. Generally, that means that farmers who have lost at least 30 percent of their production due to the declaration are eligible for FmHA loans. Proceeds from crop insurance and the PIK programs are taken into account when determining eligibility.

FmHA County Supervisor, Marvin Crabtree, is urging farmers who are interested in receiving an emergency loan to get their applications into them as soon as possible. Crabtree said, "We hope farmers will get their applications in early rather than waiting until near the deadline which is August 31, 1987. The longer they wait, the more chance there is for long delays in getting their checks. If the applications come in early, we can avoid backlogs and speed up the process."

The FmHA office is located at 416 South Kearney Street in Clarendon. You may call them at 806-974-3552.

CONSERVATION RESERVE PROGRAM (CRP) SIGNUP

We have received no official notification of the dates for the next CRP signup but believe it will be February 9th through February 27, 1987. If you are interested in bidding your land into this program please check with this office and the Donley County SCS Office during the above listed sign up period.

PEANUT POUNDAGE QUOTA UNCHANGED

Peanut program participants in Donley County will receive the same farm poundage quota for their 1987 crop that they had in 1986. The 1987 national peanut poundage quota is 1,355,500 short tons, the same as the 1986 national quota. This will be allocated in each state based on the state's percentage share of the 1986 poundage quota.

PEANUT MARKETING CARDS

Producers who have completed marketing their peanuts need to return their marketing cards and I.D. cards to this office. The sooner the cards are returned, the sooner we can compute your quota for 1987.

RECONSTITUTIONS

We need to immediately know of any changes that would cause a farm and/or farms to be divided or combined for the 1987 program year. This work needs to be completed prior to any program signup.

COOPERATION APPRECIATED

Your understanding and patience with us is most appreciated. To work through these next few months, it will be difficult for all those involved in agriculture. The disaster program is the most important program to a lot of producers, as they have got to see where they end up in 1986 before they can look at '87. We would be most appreciative of your waiting until after January 30th to sign up for the 1987 program as the signup for disaster will take all of our available time. Because of the disaster program and heavy loan program there is no advantage to signing up sooner than this for '87.

BOTTOM LINE

January 30, 1987, is the magic date and if you have not returned a complete CCC-441 (NOTICE TO PRODUCERS AND APPLICATION FOR 1986 DISASTER PAYMENT) to this office, with all signatures, no program benefits will be allowed. Again, it is your responsibility to make sure that this has been returned with all signatures.

Many of these forms were issued using an estimated amount under the total production for the crop. You MUST furnish the harvested production as soon as possible.

COMMODITY CERTIFICATES

Commodity Certificates (CCC-6's) will become null and void upon the expiration date. It is your responsibility to watch for the expiration date on your certificates.

Latest studies indicate no significant reduction in DWI related deaths

A recently completed study of drivers killed in accidents in 10 Texas counties shows some startling facts: More than half of them were drunk when they died. More than 60 percent has some measurable alcohol in their systems. And, based upon the limited data, despite the recent emphasis on the drunk-driving problem, there have been no significant reductions in such alcohol-related deaths in Texas.

The study, conducted for the highway department by the Texas Transportation Institute (TTI) at Texas A&M University, analyzed blood concentration from a sample of fatally injured drivers in the 10 counties from 1983 through 1985. The study was conducted in the counties of Bexar, Dallas, El Paso, Galveston, Harris, Johnson, Nueces, Tarrant, Travis and Wichita.

Among the 60 percent who had consumed alcohol, the average blood alcohol concentration was nearly twice the legal limit of .10 percent. The study also found that the level of intoxication among the DWI drivers did not vary significantly by either age or sex of the victim, or the time of day in which the accident occurred.

The study compared the blood alcohol concentration test results to police officers' reporting of alcohol involvement on accident reports. In one-to-one comparison of the two

data sources, only 31 percent of the accident reports for legally intoxicated drivers had alcohol cited as a contributing factor to the accident. TTI researchers concluded that accident reports do not reflect the extent of alcohol involvement in accidents. Blood alcohol concentration test results appear to be a much more accurate measure of drunk driving in fatal collisions. The Texas Transportation Institute researchers also concluded that there is a need for more complete testing of ALL driver fatalities, in order to estimate the magnitude of the drinking and driving problem in Texas.

The authors of the study noted that, based on the limited data available from the study, there has been no significant reductions in either fatal accidents, or the degree of intoxication among those drivers killed in motor vehicle collisions in Texas. This, in spite of the recent increased emphasis on drunk driving problem.

Hank Palma, Programs Manager for the highway department's Traffic Safety Section, said, "Apparently, even greater efforts are needed to reduce the alcohol problem on Texas highways."

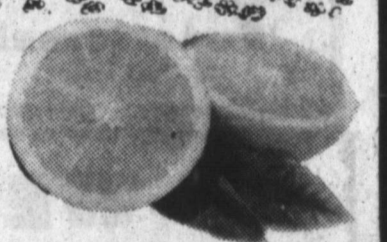
