Though forced by British soldiers to leave the tribes after only a few days, missionary Roberts saw five men "take the name of Jesus". One of these men, Chawnga, began to preach the message of Jesus Christ to his tribe and the neighboring villages.

Chawnga's vision for his son, Rochunga, was that his boy would travel to school, ninety six miles away, and learn to read and write. Supplied with only a knife, a small animal trap, and a day's rice, ten-year-old Ro made the journey alone, facing the threat of death from wild animals and the rugged elements.

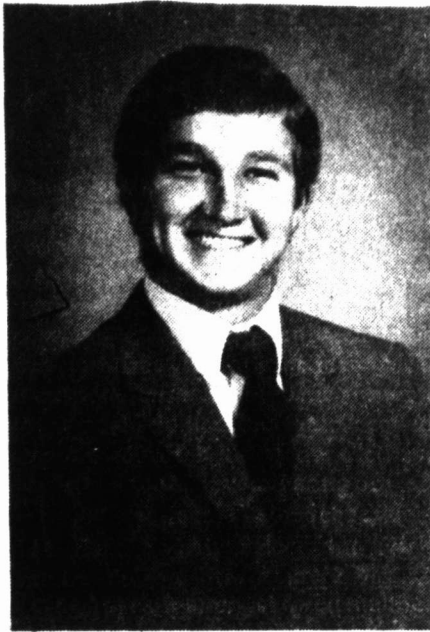
To pay for his further education, Ro served as a message runner and spy for the allied forces during World War II. With his earnings, and by the intervention of the Prime Minister of India, Ro was able to attend college in India and subsequently he went to Scotland and the United States to complete his education.

**Consider options with Generic PIK certificates**

Many producers in government commodity programs have received certificates from their local ASCS offices that are designated as "CCC-6" but are commonly referred as Generic PIK. Using them wisely can make a big difference to producers, says a Texas Agricultural Extension Service specialist.

"The certificates have three distinct features," points out Dr. Ed Smith. They are negotiable, denominated in dollars and must be liquidated before a specific expiration date."

The negotiability aspect allows the certificate to be valued at more or less than its face dollar amount depending on market conditions that exist and end use of the certificate, says Smith. In early October the certificated were selling at premiums of 110 to 115 percent of face value. The question a certificate holder must ask is whether this market rate is the most attractive among his alternatives?

A certificate holder has several options, the economist points out. For instance, the certificate can be held until the first transfer date and then exchange for cash at the local ASCS office. If the holder elects this option, the exchange will be subject to the 4.3 percent Gramm-Rudman reduction. This process, in effect, would determine the minimum value a producer would be willing to accept for the certificate. The producer would not want to receive less than 95.7 per cent of the face value, less the opportunity cost of holding the certificate.

"A second alternative is to sell or transfer the certificate to another party," says Smith. "Interested buyers may include other producers, brokers, grain elevators and merchandisers."

"Since the certificate is generic, it doesn't have to be sold locally for a specific commodity," he adds. "The alert producers will shop around to find the most competitive bid. In most cases the local ASCS office will have a list of potential buyer, both at the national and local level."

A third option available to holders of generic PIK certificates is to use them to redeem eligible commodities that have been placed under the various government loan programs offered. Reasons for choosing this option include freeing up storage, reducing storage costs, freeing grain for livestock feeding and meeting cash flow needs.

"Careful analysis may reveal that this alternative offers the highest return for PIK certificates," says Smith. "If in fact, loan redemption is

the most attractive alternative, the producer may want to increase income by buying additional certificates in the marketplace to cover total loan availabilities."

Alternatives available to generic PIK certificate holders are many, and the astute producer needs to analyze each to get the best deal, emphasizes the economist. County Extension agents can provide additional information to help with the decision-making.

**Sheriff's report**

The Donley County Sheriffs office has been kept busy in the past few weeks with several break ins, burglaries and sex offenses with minors.

Still under investigation is a break in at West Texas Gas, on October 12th. West Texas Gas reported some \$2,000 in checks and approximately \$1,000 in petty cash was missing. The file cabinets drawers had been jimmied and the money bags taken out of them. There was no point of entry, or sign of where the burglar or burglars entered the building. Either a door was left open, the lock was picked or someone had a key.

On December 2nd both White's Feed and Seed and Texas Saddlery were broken into. Entry was gained by prying the tin loose from the northwest corner of White's Feed and Seed. Suspect rummaged through filling cabinets and approximately \$64 in cash was taken. The Coke machine was pryed open, but nothing was taken from the machine.

A window on the east side of Texas Saddlery was used to enter the building. Five money bags were taken out of the safe that had approximately \$250 change in them, come rolled and some loose. All this was left on the floor in front of the safe. Approximately \$60 and a blue locked money bag was taken in the burglary. One desk showed signs of being rummaged through, but nothing was taken.

Between 11:30 p.m. on the 9th of Dec. and 7 a.m. on the 10th the Clarendon High School, Elementary School, Old College Building and the Administration building were broken into. Entry was gained at the High School building at the east door by knocking out the glass. Jeff

Walker, Superintendent of School, estimated the damages at least \$5,000 and damages could go higher.

Several doors were damaged in all three buildings, glass broke out of doors and windows, and the metal pull down doors which divided the upper grades from the lower grades were damaged, a coke machine was badly damaged and money scattered over the hall.

Nothing was taken, and Mr. Walker stated, "They were apparently looking for money."

No arrests have been made, and the sheriffs office is still investigating all of the break-ins.

That would have bought a lot of Christmas trees and left one pine tree for the people who use Kincaid Park to enjoy.

Two cases of sexual abuse have been filed. One charge of aggravated assault against a 13 year old. One man was arrested and has posted \$10,000 bond. The other was charged with sexual assault of a 9 year old. One man was arrested and posted a \$10,000 bond. Both cases are waiting to be heard by a grand jury.

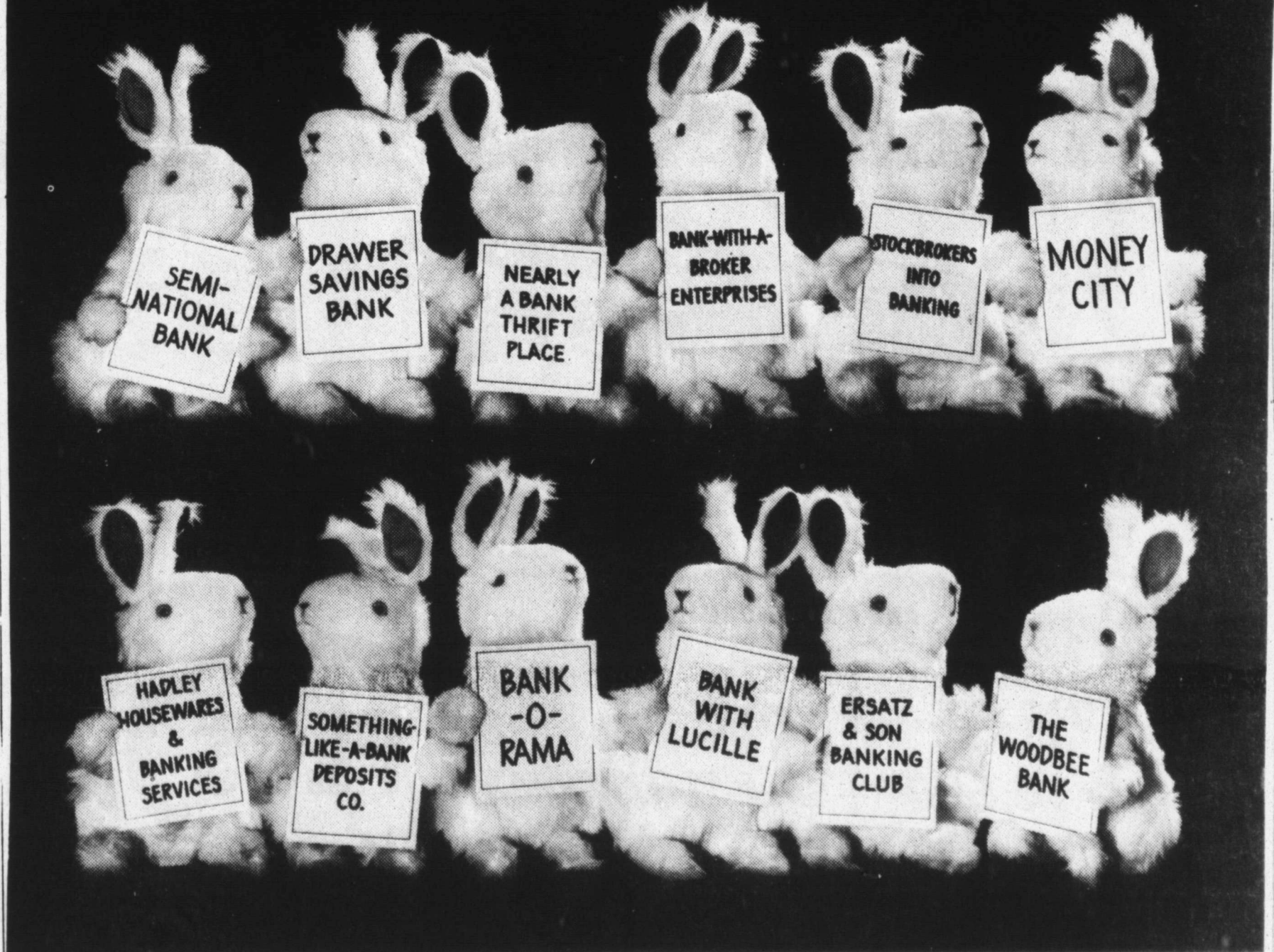

Nursing is an art and it takes a special and dedicated person to qualify. These qualifications have been found in Lori McDaniels as she performs her duties for the residents at Medical Center.

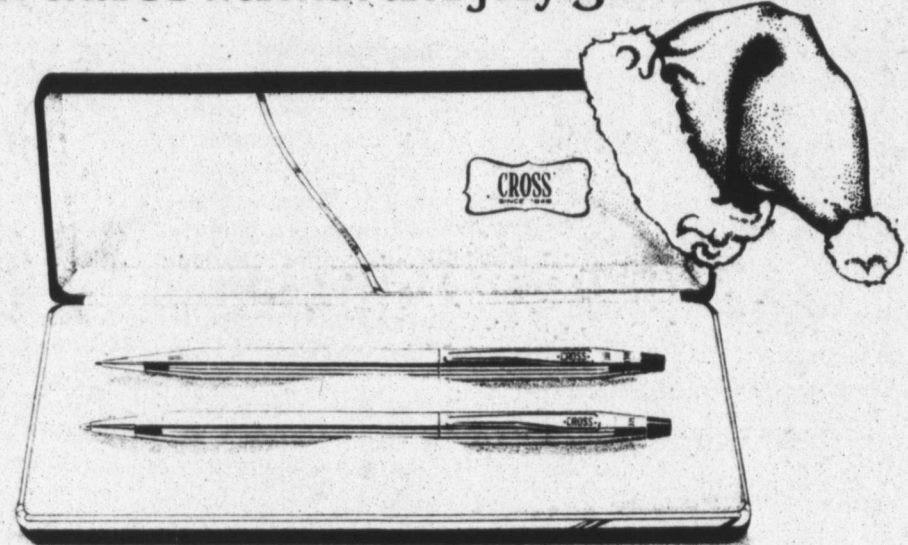
