Broncos beat Irish

The Clarendon Broncos upped their season record to 4-5 with a 15 to 12 victory over the Shamrock Irish Friday night. The victory made the Broncos District record 2-2 with still an outside chance for post-season play, for this to happen they must defeat Memphis this Friday. Coupled with a Shamrock victory over Canadian. This would throw Clarendon, Memphis, and Canadian in a tie for second and a coin toss would decide the play off team.

The Broncos rode the strong running of Marcus Smith, James Ariola, and Daniel Ford to victory Friday night. The first quarter saw the Broncos miss a chance to get on top early as Ford punted to the Irish 18 yd line and Arthur Harris jumped on a loose ball. A Irish interception ended that hope and the rest of the quarter saw both teams move the ball but unable to score.

The second quarter was early when the Broncos Walt Thompson jumped on an Irish fumble at the Irish 25 yd line. It took the Broncos 6

plays to score as Ariola made 8 yds over the left side of the line behind Monte Hollar, Billy Wiggs, Mike Murry and center Robb Brewer. Smith made 3 yds over the right side to give the Broncos a first down at the Irish 14 yd line. Broncos blocking on the right side were Mike Moore, Neal Bellah and Jake LaGrone. Ariola carried twice for 9 yds and Smith made the first down on the Irish 2 yd line. Ford scored from the 2 to make the score 6 to 0. The coaching staff decided to go for 2 points on the conversion and it paid off as Ariola swept left end and got the 2 points to make the score 8-0. The Irish responded with a TD drive and missed the try for 2 to leave the score 8-6 at half time.

The Broncos received the kick off to start the second half. After a run back to the Bronco 39 yd line, Ariola made 1 yd and then a Bronco explosion took place. Wes Hatley the Bronco QB went back to pass but found no receivers and ran 14 yds to the Irish 45 yd line. Marcus Smith

then went 22 yds and 18 yds to the Irish 5. Ford made one yard and Smith made 3 yds to the 1 and Smith drove in on fourth down. Jason Slavin kicked the all important point after to give the Broncos a 9 point lead 15 to 6. The Irish moved the ball but the Bronco defense stopped them each time the rest of the quarter.

The fourth period was uneventful until a Ford punt was blocked with 2 minutes remaining. The Irish then moved 15 yds to make the score 15 to 12. The point after failed and the Broncos braced themselves for the one side kick with a minute remaining. Neal Bellah made the all important recovery of the on side kick and the Broncos ran out the clock.

Smith was the offensive player of the game as he gained 106 yds on 21 carries. Walt Thompson was the defensive player of the game as he was in on 15 tackles from his linebacker position.

The Broncos end their regular season Friday night against Memphis at 7:30 in Clarendon.

General Telephone officially enters Hedley community

General Telephone of the Southwest officially entered the Hedley community into a new era in telecommunications with the conversion to an electronic switching system. Placed into service Saturday, October 25, 1986, at 12:01 a.m., the conversion to the new switch went very well, according to Jerry West, Memphis Operations Manager. "It was scheduled for the early morning hours to cause the least possible customer inconvenience," he commented.

"The conversion from a mechanical, step-by-step switching system to an electronic system brings the latest in telephone technology to Hedley customers and increases the capacity of the office to accommodate expected growth," West said. The new switch is equipped to serve customers with touch call dialing. "And," as West stated, "the difference between step-by-step switching and electronic switching is also measurable in the quality of dial tone and voice transmission, and faster processing of calls."

"At a cost of more than several hundred thousand dollars for equipment, labor and building expenses, the electronic system is an excellent investment," West said. "The new switch is less expensive to maintain and is self-diagnostic, locating any malfunctions quickly," he continued. "But perhaps the most important reasons are the improved telephone service."

"Extensive outside cable work, which began 18 months prior to the

conversion, was an important factor in the success of the cut-over," West noted. "Properly operating cable will

allow our customers to fully benefit from the new switching capabilities," concluded West.

'Don't Mess With Texas' litterbags available Free

The state's tough-talking antilitter program has made litterbags and bumper strips touting "Don't Mess with Texas" so popular that the highway department has trouble keeping them in stock.

Texans who missed getting a litterbag or bumper strip will now find them available free at all State Department or Highways and Public Transportation offices and Texas Tourist Bureaus.

"We distributed one million litterbags and 500,000 bumper strips in a two-month period when they were first introduced last spring. Initially, we expected that quantity to last us six to eight months, but we just couldn't keep them in stock," said Don Clark, director of travel and information with the highway department.

"We are encouraged by their popularity. Research indicates that states with active litterbag distribution, combined with a strong public awareness program, are making major progress in reducing litter," Clark said.

Last month, the highway department released figures showing that litter had declined 29 percent since the "Don't Mess with Texas" pro-

gram was implemented. The "Don't Mess with Texas" slogan has proved so popular that several entrepreneurs are now selling T-shirts and caps bearing the logo.

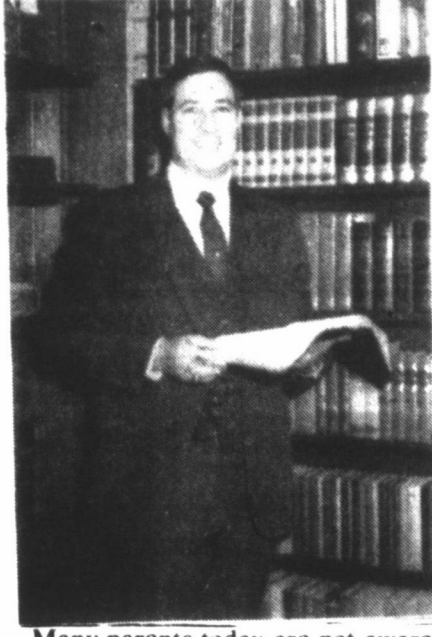
"We've even heard that some people are selling our free litterbags and bumper strips," Clark said. "But why buy what you can get free?"

Texas Tourist Bureaus are located in Amarillo, Anthony, Austin, Denison, Gainesville, Langtry, Laredo, Orange, Texarkana, Arlington, Waskom, and Wichita Falls. Offices of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation are located throughout Texas, with at least one in most Texas counties.

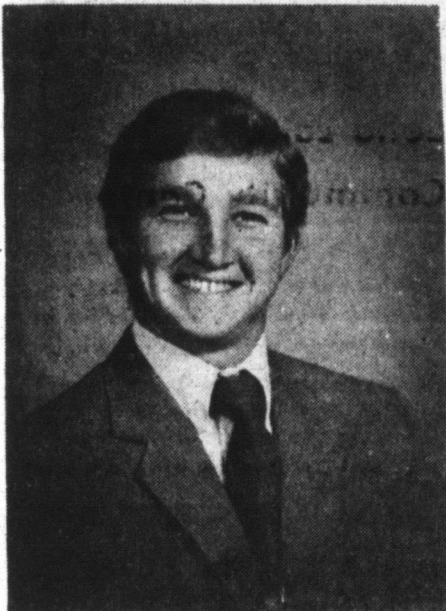

Since 1922 Shrine Hospitals have provided medical care for children with orthopedic problems or who have been severely burned. Children are treated from infancy through the age of 18, regardless of race, religion or national origin, on both an inpatient and outpatient basis. All services are provided by Shriners at no cost to the child's family or any third party reimbursing.

There are 19 orthopedic hospitals in the United States as well as 1 in Mexico and 1 in Canada and 3 burn institutes that are fully supported by Shriners.

The first hospitals were established to provide care for polio victims but with the use of the polio vaccine incidences of polio were greatly decreased. Therefore, services were expanded to include all orthopedic related problems in children and children with severe burns.

Texas is fortunate to have both an orthopedic unit in Houston and a burn institute in Galveston.

While other hospitals do microvascular surgery the Shriners Crippled Children Hospital in Houston is the only one that is strictly pediatric and had the first Gait Analysis Labora-

tory in Texas. Microscopic surgery is available and a cell-saver so that the patients own blood can be used during surgery. Surgical procedures are videotaped, through a camera attached to a surgical light, and kept in a library. No experimental surgeries are performed, "only tested, tried and true procedures are used," states Eleanor Jackson, Administrator of the Houston unit. According to Jackson "Staff members are volunteers and leading orthopedic men. It is a privilege to be on staff here - it is by invitation only and they come willingly and donate their time because they believe in the Shriner's mission."

Houston serves an outreach Clinic in the Rio Grande Valley, near the border, every other month. Since most Mexican children do not receive polio vaccinations there is still a problem with polio in Mexico.

Most orthopedic problems are not life threatening and treatment is often ongoing and expensive. Therefore, parents who could not normally afford treatment choose to either endure or ignore the child's handicap.

Thanks to the Shriners who provide care, surgery, braces, therapy and a multitude of other services, there is no need for these children to go without needed orthopedic treatment.

R.A. "Bob" Rinehart, Potentate of the Khiva Temple says, with compassion, "There are so many children out there who need our help but don't know we are here. They need to know that help is available and it is free!"

You do not have to be a Shriner or even know a Shriner to file an application. Though you may contact any Shriner or local lodge for an

application it is also possible to contact the Khiva Temple in Amarillo or the hospitals directly and they will mail you an application or answer any questions you might have.

Everyday children are crippled, disfigured or killed by severe burns. Shrine Burn Institutes not only care for burn children but also conduct burn research and train medical personnel in the treatment of burn injuries. In the last 10 years the chances of a child surviving a severe burn has more than doubled. Treatment is provided for patients: with severe burns, needing plastic reconstruction or restoration surgery, severe scarring and deformity of the face or interference of proper mobility of the limbs.

The Burn Institute in Galveston has treated over 24 patients in the last 3 years with 3rd degree burns over 80% of their total body surface that have survived. These patients used to die with a fair degree of regularity but due to advancement in treatment of burns these patients with severe extreme burns are surviving. Due to rapid transportation, supported by local Shrine units, children are getting to the hospital sooner so that all of the burn can be removed surgically and replaced with new dressings within 24-48 hours and therefore are not dying due to shock. However, there are still great strides necessary in reducing scar. Once the patients

have been saved and returned to society as normal functioning people they are sometimes treated as freaks.

Society views these people as not normal. In light of this, when asked is it worth saving these children only to have to face this future, Dr. David Herndon, Chief of Staff at Galveston, answers, "There is no question. These children are full of life, little heroes. These children don't know they are ugly. The question comes in the eyes of society and in the eyes of the beholder. Why does society put so much attention and emphasis upon the exterior appearances. This problem is not with the children because they are normal and they are little heroes. If society treats them like outcasts they may become outcasts. I think it is a challenge to our society, now that we have reached medical miracles, to redirect its expectations of normality to include those people that our sciences save."

Smiles on the faces of the children are all that is needed to repay these fine men for their wonderful contributions to our children and their futures.

So the next time we see that clown or the man in the funny hat selling candy or tickets or whatever he asks, let us remember --

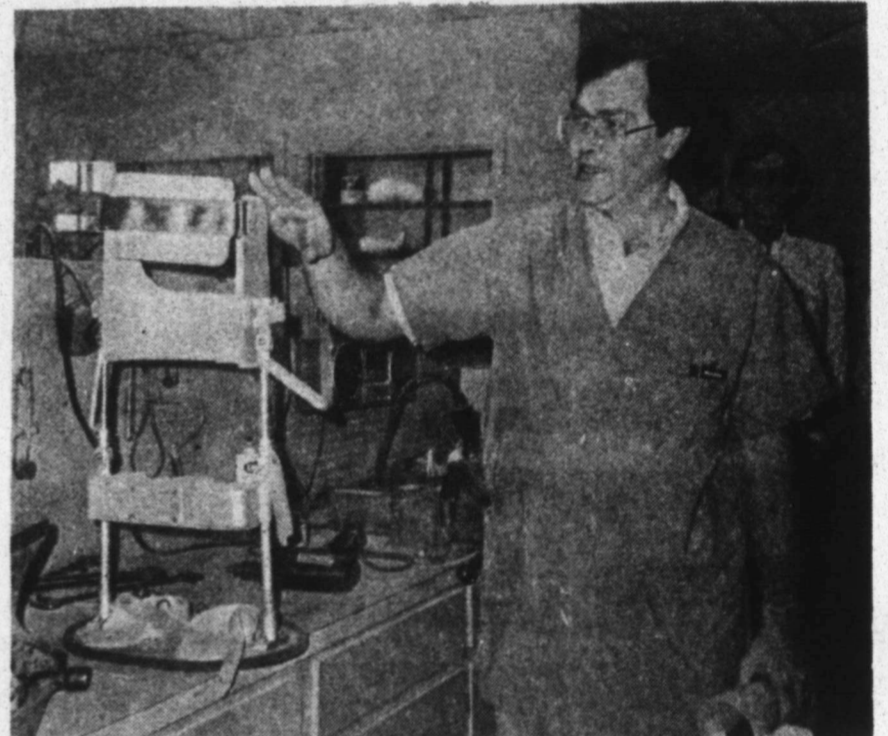

Members present were Mayor James L. Kuhn, Aldermen Steve Smith, Lloyd McCord, James Sharrar, and B.L. Graham. Member absent was Alderman Gene White. Others present were City Secretary Donna Edwards and Bud Lovelady. Minutes of the September 23, 1986 meeting was read and approved.

Motion was made to pass a resolution authorizing the submission of the Texas Community Development Program Amendment to the Texas Department of Community Affairs for TCDP Contract #705869; and authorizing the Mayor to act as the City's Executive Officer and authorized representative in all matters pertaining to the City's participation in the Community Development Program.

RESOLUTION

2. That the City Council directs and designates the Mayor as the City's Chief Executive Officer and Authorized Representative to act in all matters in connection with this amendment and the City's participation in the Texas Community Development Program.

October 28, 1986

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Clarendon met in regular session on October 28, 1986, in the Board Room, City Hall at 7:00 p.m.

Members present were Mayor James L. Kuhn, Aldermen Steve Smith, B.L. Graham, Lloyd McCord, James Sharrar, and Gene White.

Others present were City Secretary Donna Edwards, City Attorney Jim Shelton, Mr. O. V. Johnson and Mr. Jamie Johnson from Ober J Engineering Company, Mr. and Mrs. Bill Weatherly, Mr. and Mrs. Rex Anderson, and David Davidson.

Minutes of the October 14, 1986, meeting were read and approved.

Mr. O.V. Johnson and Mr. Jamie Johnson of Ober J Engineering Company of Wellington met with the Board to acquaint the Board members with the background of their company. Mr. Jamie Johnson, acting as spokesman, explained the background, and services of their company and expressed a desire to be considered for future engineering work in Clarendon.

The public hearing portion of the meeting was then opened for discussion of a proposed zoning amend-

ment requested by Judy Anderson in order that she could open a dining house in her residence. Mr. and Mrs. Bill Weatherly opposed the zoning amendment. Mrs. Weatherly, acting as spokesman, gave their three objections to the zoning amendment as being (1) loss of privacy, (2) fire hazard, and (3) potential sewer problems caused by grease in the sewer line. Judy Anderson explained that she did not plan to serve greasy foods, and that all her food scraps and any grease that there was would be saved and give to the Ag Farm. David Davidson spoke on behalf of the Chamber of Commerce and said he thought a new eating establishment would help the economy of Clarendon. City Attorney Jim Shelton assured the Board that all the proper legal steps had been met prior to their vote on the issue. After further discussion on both sides of the issue, motion was made to amend Ordinance #207 to include Dining Houses in the "R-2" Residential District by the following Amendment.

AMENDMENT TO CLARENDON ZONING ORDINANCE NO. 207 AN ORDINANCE FOR THE PURPOSE OF AMENDING CLARENDON ZONING ORDINANCE NO. 207 BY INCLUDING DINING HOUSES IN "R-2" RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT TWO.

WHEREAS, the City of Clarendon has heretofore passed and approved Ordinance No. 207 entitled Clarendon Zoning Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, said ordinance provides for four zoning districts with separate use regulations for each district; and

WHEREAS, "R-2" Residential District Two does not specifically allow dining houses and it is now for the general welfare of the community that dining houses be allowed in said District;

IT IS THEREFORE ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLARENDON, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: A dining house is defined as a building or premises including a private house where meals are provided for compensation.

SECTION 2: A building or premises may be used for the purpose of a dining house in the district known as "R-2" Residential District Two.

SECTION 3: The City Council may take any action authorized or permitted to be taken by the City Planning Commission or the Board of Adjustment, if said commission or board are not actively in existence.

SECTION 4: All provisions of Ordinance No. 207 which are not contrary to the provisions hereof shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 5: The invalidity of any section or provision of this ordinance shall not invalidate other sections or provisions hereof.

SECTION 6: Notice of a public hearing was published and given in the manner and time as required by law.

SECTION 7: This ordinance shall be in full force and effective from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

representative from International, Carole Dewald, spoke to the assembly. She was very good.) Door prizes were given to all who attended the convention.

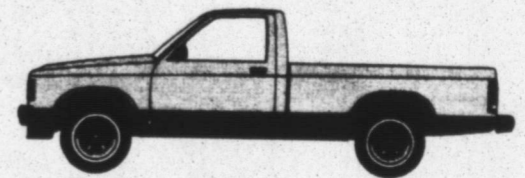

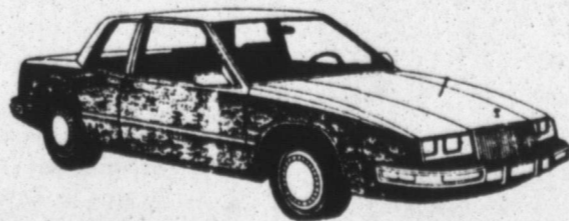

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SAFER CAPSULES

Washington State recently banned the sale of over-the-counter medicine products in capsule form. This action followed two June deaths in Auburn, Washington--deaths due to consumption of over-the-counter medicines that were laced with cyanide.

According to a survey reported in Drug Store News, 38 percent of consumers favored the banning of nonprescription drug products in capsule form. And 44 percent indicated that they favored the sale of nonprescription drug products in capsule form through a pharmacist.

Many individuals prefer capsules to tablets, possibly because they may be easier to swallow

when moistened. Yet the public is concerned about capsules and potential tampering. The producers of nonprescription medicines may be even more concerned and are doing something about it. A recent issue of American Medical News describes the efforts of manufacturers to make capsules safer. One technique involves the congealing of capsule edges following filling, thereby sealing the capsule. And some companies are now sealing capsules with a double-band at the point where the two halves meet, a procedure followed by one maker of prescription medicines for several decades.

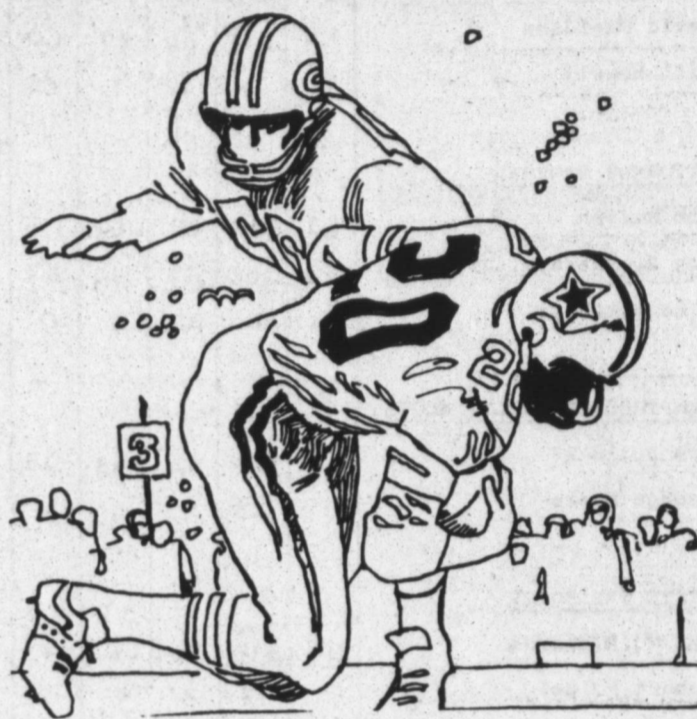



