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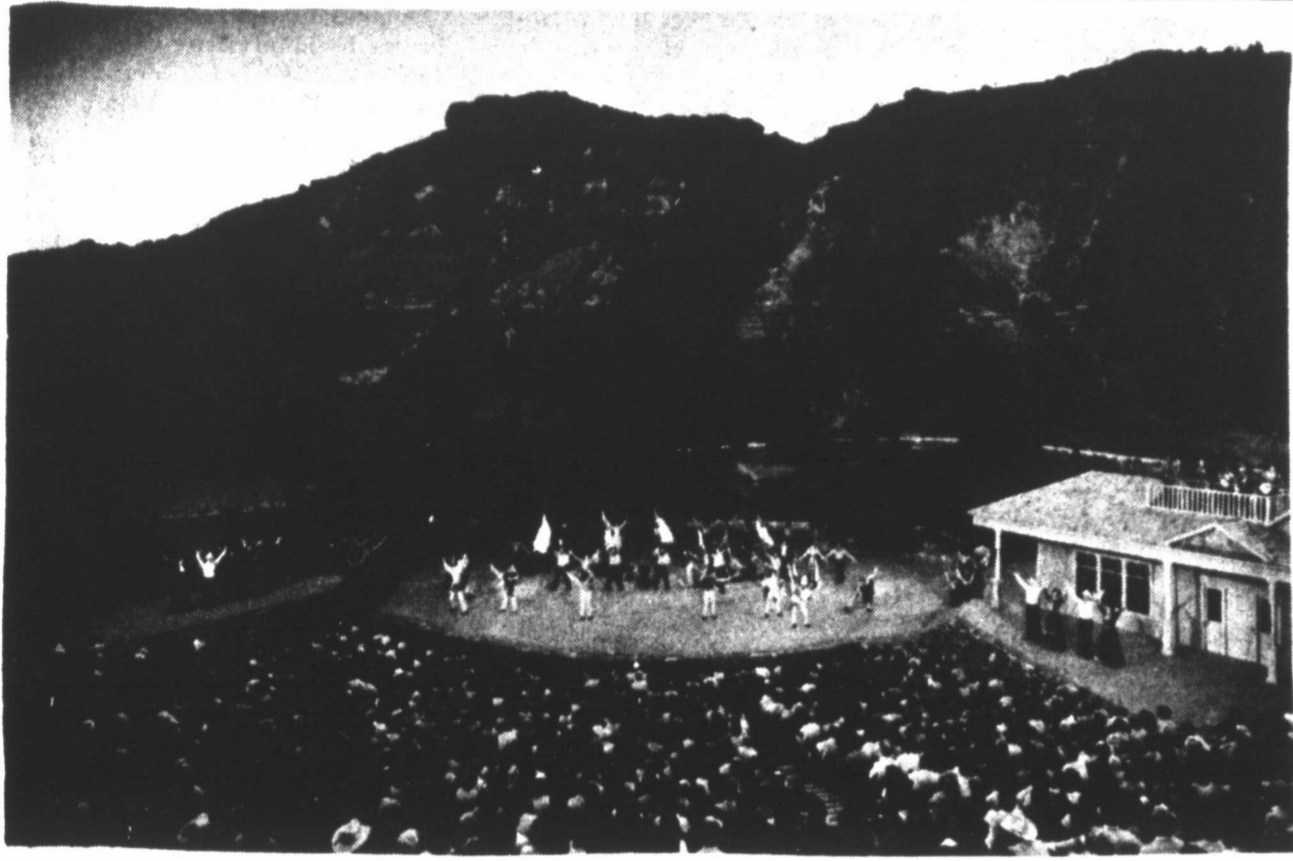

Texas sponsoring Clarendon night

In celebration of 21 years of production, "Texas" is sponsoring "Clarendon Night" at Palo Duro Canyon Pioneer Amphitheatre on Thursday, June 26, at 8:30 p.m. in appreciation to the community for their continued support of the musical drama.

Limited seating is available for the night through the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce.

Clarendon is proud to present the Clarendon Fire Department as they reenact a fire drill "as it was" using a vintage fire truck prior to the show on Friday, June 27. They will entertain in the patio area of the theatre from 6:30 to 8 p.m.

The idea for area nights grew from community interest generated from speaking engagements in ten Panhandle towns to promote new memberships in the Texas Panhandle Heritage Foundation, the non-profit producer of "Texas." This year is a start for area nights. The organization plans to feature more of the founding communities during the 1987 season next summer.

"Texas" plays nightly at 8:30 p.m. except Sundays under the stars in Palo Duro Canyon State Park near Amarillo and Canyon.

Written by Pulitzer Prize winning author Paul Green, "Texas" has entertained 1.7 million persons since 1966. Last year, audiences totalling 90,000 came from all over the world to see the historical production.

It is a story set to music and dance that tells of drought and rain, sorrow and joys of the early Texas Panhandle pioneers. Told by a cast of 80, the plays emphasizes the struggles of the early settlers, farmers and ranchers and how their eventual collaboration led to the settling of the area.

Special sound effects bounce off the walls to create crackling thunder, while spectacular lighting produces a ballet of fire and realistic lightning.

Anna (Lois Hull), Uncle Henry (Gene Murray), Tuck (Jerry Williams), Calvin Armstrong (Calvin Wimmer) and Kate (Cloyce Beard). New talents emerge in Elsie (Kathy Trageser) and Dave (David Etheredge).

Area pork producers urged to participate in national elections

Area pork producers have the opportunity to participate in a U.S. Department of Agriculture sponsored statewide election, July 7-11, to help select individuals for appointment to an industry-wide body that will administer a promotion, research and consumer information order for pork.

Ronald Gooch, county extension agent, said all pork producers in Texas are encouraged to vote in the elections. Candidates receiving the highest number of votes in each State will be eligible for appointment by the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Agriculture to the State's allotted positions on the National Pork Producers Delegate Body.

The delegate body, consisting of approximately 165 producers, including two or more members representing each of the 50 states and four importers, will be responsible for administering all aspects of the pork order.

Gooch said that voting in Donley County will take place in the Donley County Extension office. The office will be open for voting each day from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Pork producers can vote in any county in their home state after signing a voter registration list certifying that they are pork producers in that state.

Pork producers are urged to vote in person at the county extension office. If that is not possible, an absentee voting packet containing a ballot and registration form may be obtained from Jim Epstein, National Pork Producers Election, P.O. Box 23762, Washington, D.C. 20066-3762; telephone (202) 475-5407. Absentee ballots must be postmarked by July 11, and received at the above address no later than July 18.

Votes will be tallied at 9 a.m. on July 15 at the local county office of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. The public is invited to be present at this official counting, and the results will be forwarded to the Secretary for consideration.

Ken Sanders has purchased Steve's Automotive at 322 Kearney Street and has renamed it the K&T Garage.

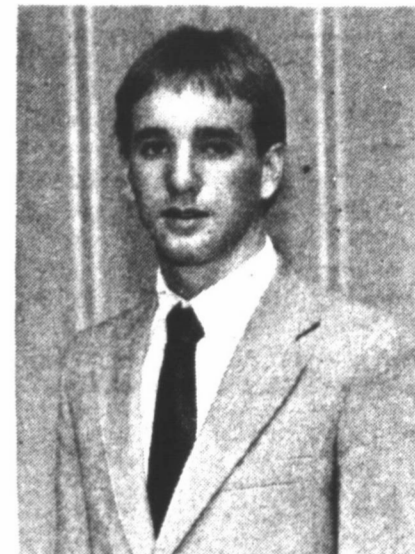

Green Thumbs attend training seminar

Green Thumb workers and host agency sponsors from a multi-county area met Tuesday, June 17, 1986, at Clarendon College.

The training seminar featured Leicia Rackley from the Armstrong County Agricultural Extension Office, whose topic was Nutrition for the Elderly; Paramedics Phillip Vargas and Patrick Robertson who gave a demonstration on cardiopulmonary resuscitation; and a safety program presented by Green Thumb staff.

Green Thumb, an older worker program, is funded by the Department of Labor through Title V of the Older Americans Act. Sponsored by Texas Farmers Union, Green Thumb provides part-time work opportunities for seniors in rural areas. Program operation began in 1970 and currently includes 126 counties employing over 1,000 older Texans who are placed with local non-profit organizations to provide needed community services.

Are you eligible for a Coors scholarship?

Adolph Coors Company in conjunction with the Texas Veterans Commission and the local distributors announced that applications are available in Texas for the 1986 Coors Veterans' Memorial Scholarship Fund, which provides more than \$500,000 to the sons and daughters of American veterans.

For the second year, Coors and the Texas Coors distributors will award scholarships through the Texas Veterans Commission. The scholarships, with a maximum value of \$5,000 each, will be awarded to eligible students who successfully have completed their freshman year of college. The scholarships allow students to complete the final three years of undergraduate studies.

"The program was designed to salute American veterans and express our company's appreciation for their sacrifices," said Peter Coors, Brewing Division President.

In 1985, Coors awarded 114 scholarships totalling \$501,000 to applicants in 49 states and Puerto Rico. Four of these scholarships were awarded to the children of Texas veterans. In addition, Coors distributors raised an additional \$254,000 through canister collections and special promotions to award local scholarships.

To be eligible for consideration, applicants must have completed at least one year of college, have a cumulative grade-point-average of at

least 2.75 on a 4.0 scale and be under 22 years of age as of July 1, 1986. Applicants must be dependents of honorably discharged American service personnel or dependents of American service personnel killed in action, missing in action or died in the line of duty. There is no restriction on when the serviceperson was in the armed forces. The student may reside anywhere worldwide, but must be enrolled full-time in an accredited four-year institution of higher education in the United States.

Applications may be obtained from Clarendon College. Deadline for completed applications and materials is July 1, 1986.

Free well child clinic Tuesday July 1

The Texas Department of Health will provide the monthly well child clinic, Tuesday, July 1, from 9 a.m. to 12 noon, and 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. at 311 Carhart Street, in the Planned Parenthood facility.

The well child clinic services will be available to newborn infants and children up to 18 years of age regardless of their race, color, religion, sex, national origin or economic

worth. Rita Anderson, R.N., Public Health Nurse explained that the services provided are complete physical exams, including heights,

weights, blood pressures, vision and hearing tests, and developmental screening. The children are also checked for anemia during the exam.

New tax law for farmers

Texas Employment Commission has passed a new law effective now. Any farmer who hires individual migrant workers becomes liable for Texas unemployment tax. At any time the farmers gross wages paid equal to \$7500 a quarter, which is any three months, he then becomes liable for all help for the rest of his business life.

If the migrant help is hired through a crew leader or labor agent and information such as, the agents social security number, permanent address, telephone number and any employers identification number are received by the farmer then the agent is responsible for the Social Security, withholding and Texas Employment Tax on the crew mem-

bers. For more indepth information you should be able to contact your accountant on this subject.

Savings Bonds sales in Texas up 16 percent

During the first quarter of calendar year 1986, Texas sales of U.S. Savings Bonds amounted to \$94,802,245, an increase of over \$13 million over 1985 for 16.4 percent, T.J. Morrow, District Director for U.S. Savings Bonds Division in Dallas, announced. These sales represent 25.6 percent of the state's 1986 assigned dollar goal of \$370 million. March 1986 sales of Series EE Bonds were \$33,634,254, an increase of 15.1 percent over March 1985.

Sales of EE Bonds amounted to \$7,386 during March 1986 in Donley County, Bill Lowe, Volunteer County Chairman, said. Total sales in the county during the period January-March, 1986 were \$11,470, which represents 31 percent of the county's 1986 assigned dollar goal.

Nationally, March sales of U.S. Savings Bonds totaled \$600 million, 40 percent above March a year ago

and the highest sales for any March since 1979. Sales of U.S. Savings Bonds for the first half of Fiscal 1986 increased 40 percent over the same period a year ago. Savings Bonds held by the American public reached an all-time high -- over \$81 billion for the first time ever -- to \$81.42 billion.

Much of the sales growth can be attributed to the new market-based rate which was effective November 1, 1982. The current rate in effect during the time of these sales (November 1985 thru April 1986) for Bonds held five years or longer is 8.36 percent. The average rate since November 1, 1982 is 9.69 percent. Bonds held at least five years earn 85 percent of the average rate on five-year Treasury marketable securities during the holding period or 7.5 percent, whichever is more. Bonds held less than five years earn interest on a fixed, graduated scale.

New conservation publication available at SCS

"Conservation Planning - You and Your Land" is the title of a new publication available from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service.

Jim Donaho, D.C. for SCS at Clarendon, said single copies are free to landowners, operators, or others interested in planning conservation land treatment.

"All land is not the same," Donaho said. "Take a good look at the land you own, lease or rent. It probably differs from your neighbors'." Soils vary in depth, erodibility, natural productivity, slope, texture, and stoniness.

"Other resources - wildlife, water, and plants - also vary from one property to another and affect how you use your land. Your land is unique; so should be the planning for its uses."

Donaho said conservation planning assistance is available from SCS through the local Donley County Soil and Water Conservation District. Although most SCS assistance is provided to farmers and ranchers on cropland, rangeland, pasture, wildlife, and forest land, you can also get assistance with solving conservation problems on nonagricultural land such as controlling erosion on construction sites or on public land.

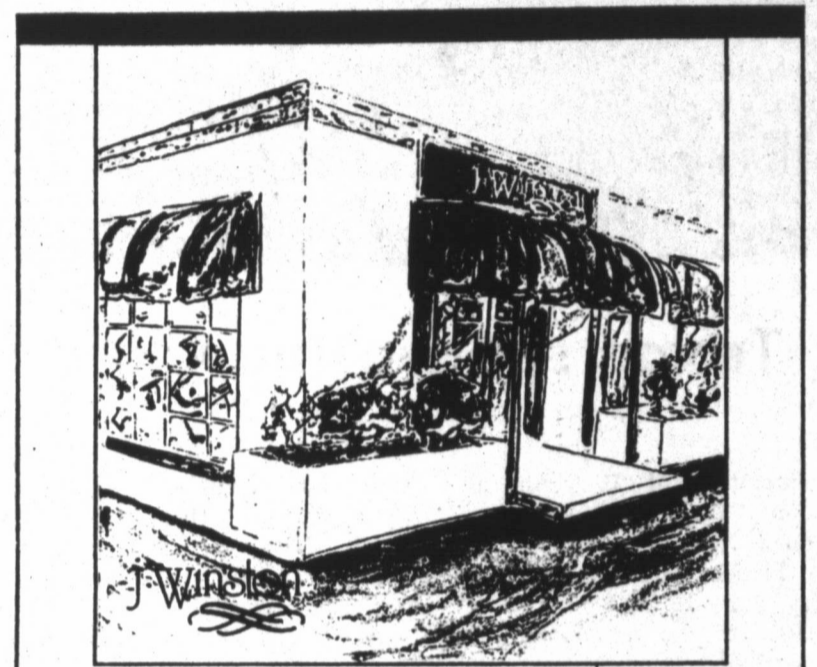
The first step in conservation planning is taking an inventory. Since knowledge about soils is basic to planning the use and treatment of land SCS will provide you with a soils map which includes the description of your soils and how they can best be used. Each soil is described in terms of its texture, characteristics, capabilities, limitations, and erosion potentials. SCS will also estimate soil erosion rates under present and planned land uses.

"When you are ready to start, we will discuss your soils, your plans and goals, your resource problems, and your conservation program" Donaho said. "Then you tell us what crops you want to grow, the livestock you want to have, the wildlife or recreation uses you want to plan, and any other interests you have that will affect your land. Together, we can explore different ways to overcome problems and to make the best use of

the land." Decisions are needed to both the use of the land and its treatment, but you must decide what you want to do, when, and how.

Connie Schollenbarger and Shannon Longan exchange vows

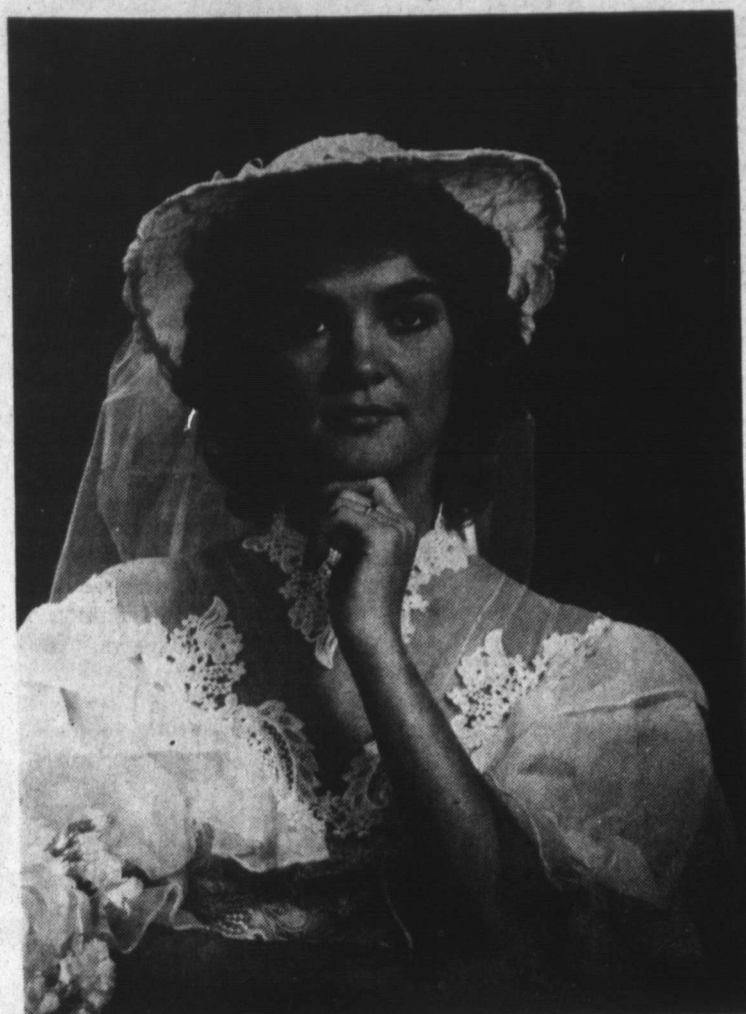
Connie Schollenbarger and Shannon Longan were united in Marriage Saturday, June 21 in the First Baptist Church by Rev. Gene Denney.

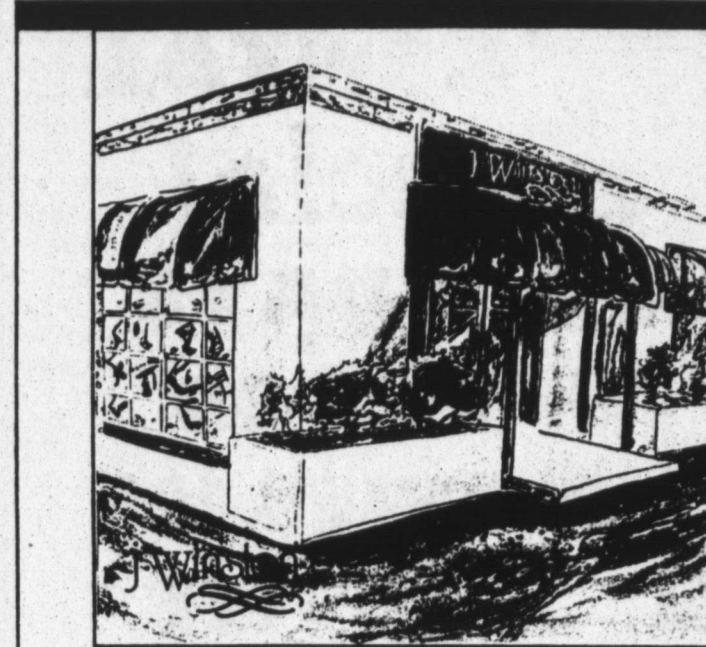

Survivors include five daughters,

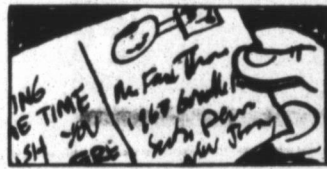

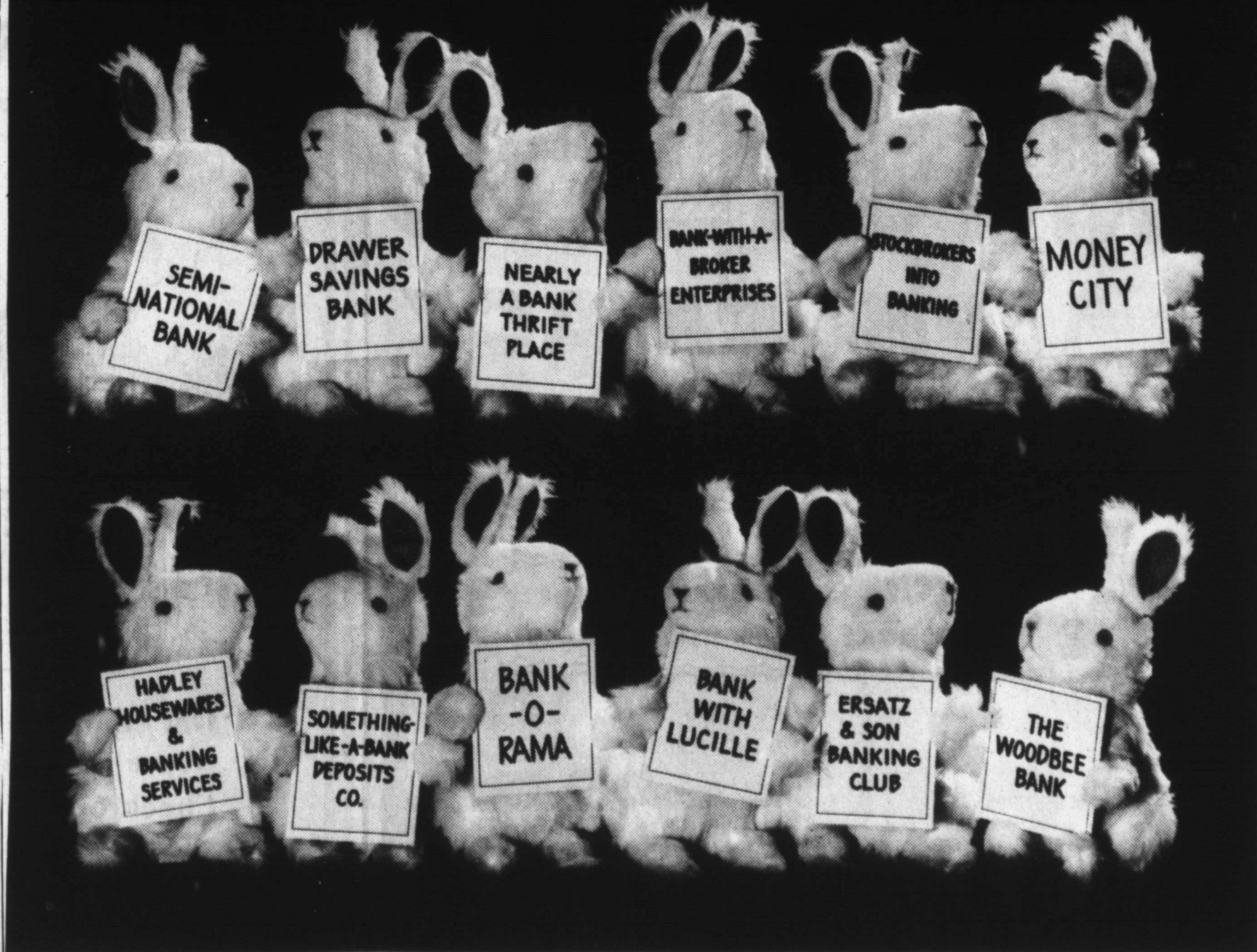

Texans to get tax break

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Texans will get a multi-million dollar tax break because of a Senate vote on the federal tax overhaul bill that will permit partial deduction of state sales tax.

Bullock said the sales tax amendment, co-sponsored by Texas Sen. Phil Gramm and supported by Texas Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, would let Texas taxpayers deduct 60 percent of their state and local taxes in figuring federal income taxes.

"The sales tax provision will save Texans who use this deduction at least \$112 million. Anytime we don't have to send over \$100 million to Washington, it's good news," Bullock said.

Bullock said Gramm's amendment was especially beneficial to Texas because the tax reform bill pending in the U.S. Senate originally allowed deductions for state and local income taxes.

"We were being penalized because we didn't have a state income tax despite the fact that we don't want an income tax," Bullock said.

Bullock said the amendment would save a deduction worth more than \$270 to the average Texas taxpayer who files an itemized return.

He said that Texans claimed an average of \$449 in sales tax deductions in 1984 and the 60 percent rules would preserve most of that deduction.

CHIGGERS
Chiggers are small red mites that are sometimes called red bugs or harvest mites. They are most prevalent during the summer and fall - especially in the southern United States. Chigger larvae attach themselves to the skin, release a destructive chemical that causes intense itching, and then fall from the body after becoming engorged with blood.

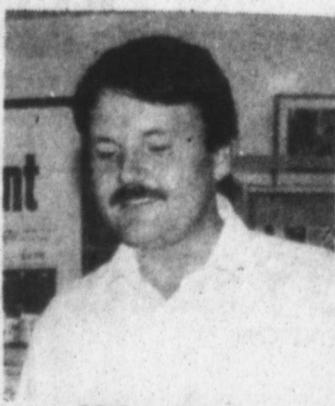
Bites are most commonly found on the feet, legs, and at the beltline and neckline. Golfers, berry pickers, farmers, hunters, and picnickers are frequently affected.

There are three approaches to avoiding

chigger bites: [1] Stay out of weeds and grasses. [2] Wear clothing that fits tightly at the ankles, waist, and neckline. [3] Use insect repellent lotions or sprays. Although repellents are not universally effective, they will turn away some chiggers and reduce the number of bites.

When chigger bites occur, the primary symptom is itching which can be relieved to some extent by any of several nonprescription products. These include several skin preparations as well as oral antihistamines. Inflammation may be relieved by hydrocortisone preparations.
