The Clarendon C.I.S.D. hereby announces that all persons are entitled to recelve an exemption of $\mathbf{5 5 , 0 0 0}$ from the market taxes. In addition, all persons who are 65 or older or under a disability for purposes of payment of disability benefits under Federal Old-Age, Survivors, and Disability Insurance are also
entitled to an aditional exemption of $\mathbf{\$ 1 0 , 0 0 0}$ from the entitled to an additional exemption of $\mathbf{\$ 1 0 , 0 0 0}$ from the
