### One hundred fifty seven thousand dollars grant received by City

Dear Mayor Kuhn:

I am pleased to inform you that the City of Clarendon has been awarded \$157,000.00 by the Texas Department of Community Affairs. Plans call for the installation of sewer lines, replace 2100' of 8" collector main, provide 14 manholes, 11 clean-out facilities, a grinder pump, and 24 yard lines in north Clarendon. The City was awarded a grant last year for water and sewer improvements to this area, and this year's grant will enable the City to completely resolve the problem of providing sewer improvements to this area.

This award is made available through the fourth annual competition for funding under the Texas Community Development Program. A representative of the Texas Department of Community Affairs will contact you concerning the contract agreement. The effective date of the contract will be approximately three to four weeks from the date of this letter.

### Broncos rally falls short

The Clarendon Broncos 1986 season came to a close Friday night, but not without a bang. The Broncos fell to a strong Memphis team 35 to 26. The Broncos trailed 28 to 6 at half but trailed only 28 to 26 in the fourth quarter, but Memphis put the game out of reach with a late T.D.

The first quarter saw the Memphis Cyclones race out to a 7 to 0 lead and then add an early second TD to make the score 14 to 0. On the kickoff the Broncos got a big spark from Arthur Harris as he returned the kickoff 50 yds to the Memphis 42 yard line. On second down, James Ariola made 16 yards on the wingback trap to set the Broncos up on the Cyclone 25 yard line. Marcus Smith made 2 and Ariola lost 3 and Wes Hatley hit Daniel Ford for 4 yds leaving a fourth and seven. Smith took the halfback draw to the Cyclone five and he scored two plays later. The point after was missed and the Broncos trailed 14 to 6. The offensive line of Robb Brewer, Mike Murray, Craig Wright, Neal Bellah, Mike Moore, Billy Wiggs, Monte Hollar, and Chris Ward began to show signs of handling the bigger Cyclones. The Cyclones scored twice more in the quarter to make the half score 28 to 6. The game looked like a Cyclone rout, but it wasn't to be as the Broncos weren't quite finished.

The fireworks started early in the third quarter as Smith received the kickoff on his own 10 and broke 2 tackles and raced down the side line for 90 yds and a TD. Smith ran the two point conversion to make the score 28 to 14 but more important was the spark he gave the Broncos. After the fumble recovery by Bellah the Broncos struck again, this time the drive was for 35 yards. Smith carried 6 times in the drive for 18 yds, but the biggest play was a pass from Ariola to Jake LaGrone to the Cyclone 2 yard line. The play came on a fourth and 13. Smith ran in to make the score 28 to 20 as a pass from Hatley to Hollar fell incomplete on the two point try. The third quarter ended but there was still a lot of football to play.

Walt Thompson recovered another Cyclone fumble at the Cyclone 27 yard line. The Broncos scored in seven plays. Smith carried 5 times for 18 yds and Ariola once for 5. Hatley scored the TD on a option from the four yard line. The point after was missed and the score was 28 to 26 with the Cyclones still on top. The Cyclones went 63 yds later to make the score 35 to 26, but the Broncos came back as time was running out. The Cyclones were forced to punt but the Broncos lined up to block the punt and a back snap prevented the

punter from punting and the Broncos took over on the Cyclone 9 yd. line.

Ariola made 4 and Todd Phillips made 2 and Smith made 2 to bring a 4th down and less than 1 yd for the TD Hatley tried the sneak but was stopped short. The Cyclones ran out the clock to make the final score 35 to 26.

Mike Murray led the defense with 20 tackles. Hatley and Thompson had 15 tackles. The defense came up with four fumbles. Thompson, Ariola, Bellah and Clay Sharp got the fumbles. Sharp got to play his first full game since breaking a collar bone early in the year. Murray was named the defensive player of the game. Smith was named offensive player of the game along with Bellah. Smith had 100 yds on 25 carries. He played with a high fever. Bellah blocked very well at this tackle position. Harris was named special team player of the game.

The Broncos closed this season 4-6 and 2-3 in district. They were picked 5th in district and finished fourth.

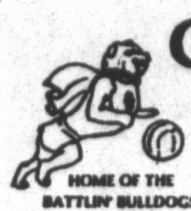

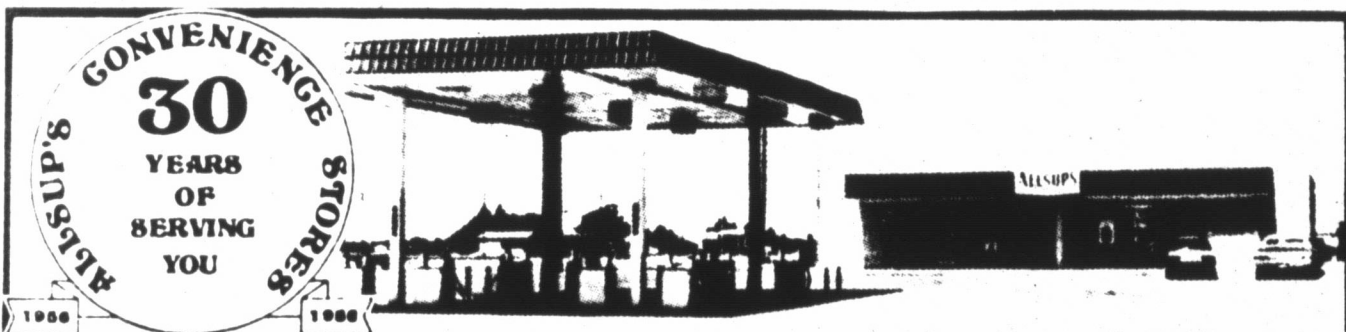

so the family has no financial obligation.

Since the Houston Unit is located in the Texas Medical Center, the latest technology is easily accessible to the Shriners patients. When this technology is considered essential to the Shriners patient's orthopedic treatment, it, too, is provided to the patient solely at Shriners expense, or through the patient's insurance. Thus, such procedures as diagnostic computerized axial tomograms (CAT scans), Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRIs) and Angiograms are provided.

Another example of when outside agencies are called upon occurs when a child is found to have tumor involvement which originally caused what appeared to be an orthopedic problem. In

these instances, referral is made to M.D. Anderson Hospital in The Texas Medical Center, with all non-insurance covered expenses being picked up by the Shriners.

While improving their quality of life physically, the Houston Unit also considers other aspects of the child's life. There are teachers provided through the Houston Independent School District (one funded by HISD and one funded by Shriners) to assure that children keep up with their schooling while undergoing inpatient care. There are Child Life Therapy and Activities of Daily Living programs to assure adjustment to physical handicaps. The staff becomes the patient's family away from home, providing a loving atmosphere in which the child is nurtured and

encouraged in self-reliance and appreciation of their own self worth.

Although most orthopedic conditions are usually not life threatening, the treatment is often ongoing and very expensive. The parents or guardians of an orthopedically handicapped child could find themselves in a position where they would have to endure and/or ignore the child's affliction. Because Shriners provide all the necessary care for free, though, this decision is never necessary, and the child is afforded every opportunity to develop to his full potential.

Thus, thanks to Shriners, the poor of the community do not have to go without orthopedic treatment for their children.

## Houston Unit carries out Shriners Mission

The mission for Shriners Hospitals for Crippled Children is to provide care for children afflicted with congenital orthopedic deformities, problems resulting from orthopedic injuries and diseases of the bones, joints and muscles. Both inpatient and outpatient care are given to children from infancy to the 18th birthday. This care is given without reimbursement from the patient, the patient's family, insurance or government funding.

The Houston Unit of Shriners Hospitals for Crippled Children evolved from the 1920's when Shriners began paying for treatment for crippled children in various Houston hospitals. In 1952 Arabia Temple Crippled Childrens Clinic was built to bring this treatment under one roof. In 1966 the Arabia Temple Shriners turned over the Houston Unit, debt free, to the national multihospital system of Shriners Hospitals for Crippled Children, consisting of 19 orthopedic units and 3 burn institutes. Since that time the Houston Unit has provided totally free medical care to 12,434 children meeting the national criteria, which are:

- 1) Financially, the parents or guardians are not able to meet the costs of treatment without substantial hardship to the family
- 2) Physically, the child must have an orthopedic condition, which, in the opinion of our doctors, is amenable to treatment.
- 3) Age-wise, the child must be between birth and 18 years of age

There is no consideration as to race, color, creed, sex, sect or national origin.

Children come from the State of Texas, the northern border cities of Mexico and states surrounding Texas that find it more convenient to bring patients to Houston rather than to one of the 18 other orthopedic hospitals operated by the Shriners.

During the 20 years that the Houston Units has been under the national umbrella, Houston has spent \$30,032,940 on patient care and an additional \$531,724 on related research. These monies have provided 214,370 inpatient days; 6,396 surgical procedures; 95,486 outpatient clinic visits; 18,281 braces and 757 prostheses.

The members of the medical staff serve without reimbursement so that funds received can be spent to provide additional services for the children. Because the medical staff are so carefully screened, they are some of the most outstanding physicians available. Their dedication to the care of crippled children is evidenced by their donation of time, energy and expertise. On the Active Staff, the Houston Unit has 43 orthopedists. In addition there are 61 members of the Consulting Staff, representing a broad spectrum of specialties, i.e., neurology; pediatrics; plastic, thoracic and cardiovascular surgery; radiology; ophthalmology; etc.

In addition to treating children, the Medical Staff instruct and supervise orthopedic residents from three affiliated medical schools (University of Texas, Baylor College of Medicine and Scott and White Clinic).

The Houston Unit conducts 18 outpatient clinics to assure that each patient has continuity of care provided by medical staff members with expertise in various facets of orthopedic care.

An Outreach Clinic is provided in the Rio Grande Valley because of the number of children from that area who need the help the Houston Unit provides. This Clinic is held once every other month in a local Shrine Club building. A team of 4-5 medical staff, 2-3 orthopedic residents, 2 bracedmen, 2 physical therapists and 2 administrative people spend one day doing follow-up

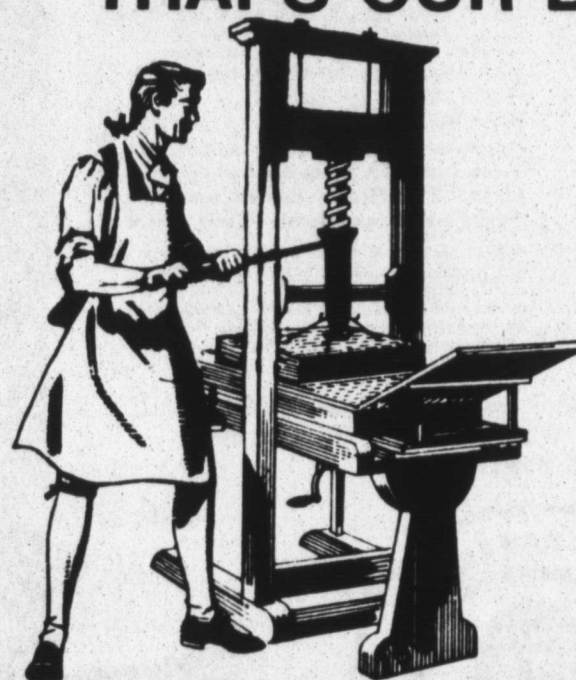
clinic visits and brace checks, as well as screening new applicants for treatment.

If inpatient treatment is required, the child is admitted to the hospital. Surgical procedures ranging from a simple heel cord lengthening to a complicated microvascular nerve transplant taking many hours are provided. Additionally, inpatients receive casting, traction, physical and occupational therapy, etc., as required.

If a child needs braces or artificial limbs, they, too, are provided. When the family has insurance, these braces or prostheses may be provided by an outside agency who will bill the third party payor. Any balance is picked up by the Houston Unit.

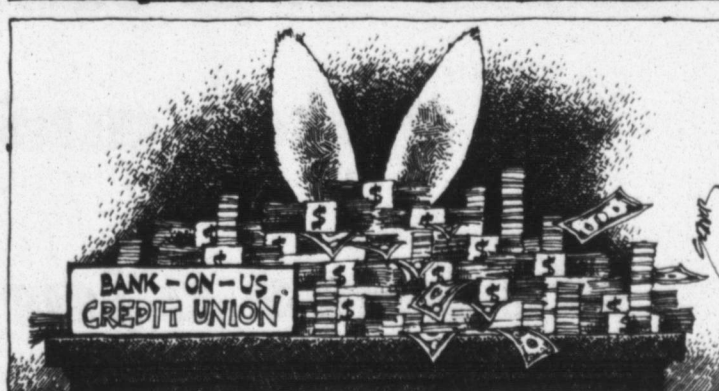
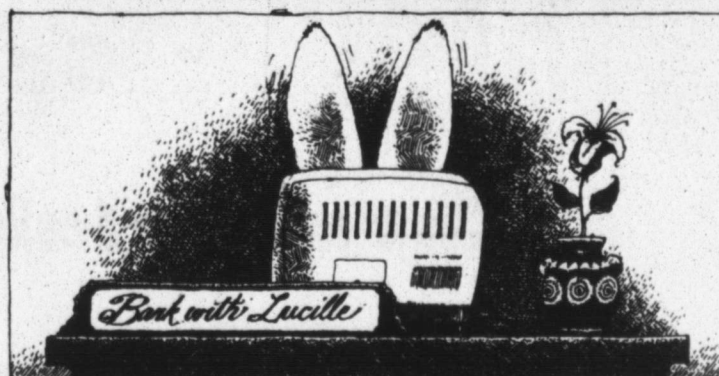
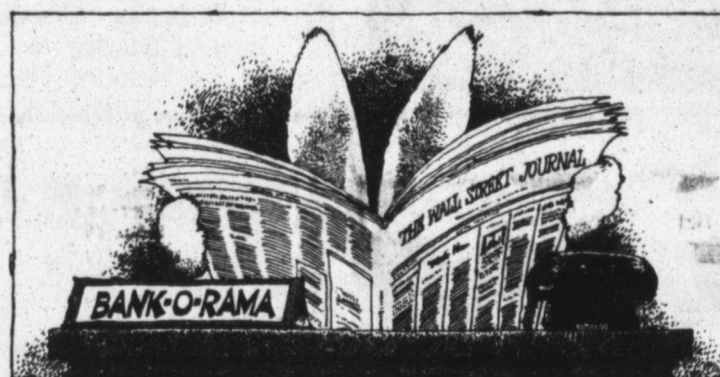

She has been a candidate for a state office in TFTA. Sheri is editor of the 1987 "Bronco" yearbook.

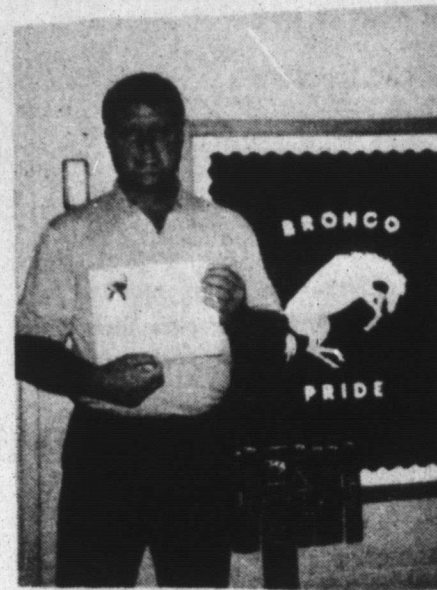
**Betty Veach**

graphy and working with crafts.

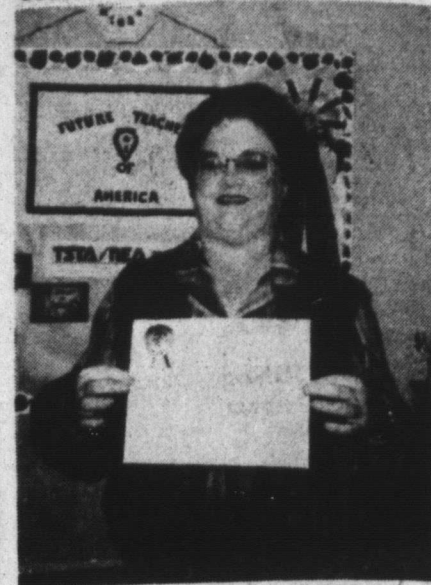

**Acreage, yield and production totals**

AUSTIN...The Texas Agricultural Statistics Service (TASS) will begin contacting farmers and ranchers across the state in late November for acreage, yield and production totals for 1986 and for end-of-year livestock

and poultry inventories. The confidential interviews, conducted by mail or in person by field enumerators, provide information used by producers to make their plans for the coming year.

"Currently, agriculture is faced with many economic uncertainties, and accurate, reliable figures are some of the inputs which can help producers make sound production decisions," state statistician Dennis Findley reported.

To reduce survey costs, TASS is urging individuals to return the mailed questionnaires as soon as possible. The reported information will be combined for state as well as county estimates.

Annual county estimates are published for livestock, dairy, poultry, cotton, field crops, small grains, fruits and pecans, vegetables, and cash receipts from the sale of farm products.

"A sound marketing plan requires good, reliable information and some advanced planning. Information from our reports provides producers with solid facts and figures they can incorporate into their marketing plans," Findley added.

**Would you like a windbreak?**

The Donley County Soil and Water Conservation District is selling trees for windbreaks or other needs you may have.

Shrubs and trees planted close to farm building soften harsh architectural lines and increase privacy. Evergreens and flowering shrubs beautify the farmstead setting and add to property value.

Spacing for hardwood shrubs is usually 3 to 5 feet. Spacing in the row between trees varies from 10-12 feet for evergreens and 10-14 feet for hardwoods.

The shrubs available are; Caragana, Cotoneaster, Honeysuckle, lilac, plum, sand cherry, nanking cherry, sage, and rugosa rose. Hardwoods; bur oak, little walnut, osage orange, desert willow, russian olive, green ash, pecan, ash, chinese elm, cottonwood, golden willow, poplar, hackberry and aspen. Evergreens; Afghanistan pine, arizona cypress, austrian pine, ponderosa pine, scotch pine, redcedar, eastern redcedar spruce, colorado blue spruce, pinion pine, rocky mtn. juniper.

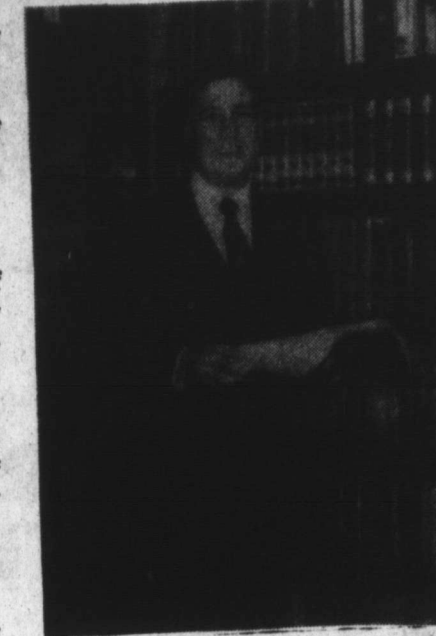

**VA Q & A**

Q-I am a Korean veteran and I am filing for a service-connected disability rating. If I am rated service-connected am I eligible for VA life insurance?

A-Any veteran who served after April 25, 1951, and is awarded a service-connected disability is eligible for Service-Disabled Veterans Insurance (RH). You must file for this insurance within one year of the award of the disability rating.

Q-I have a Loan Guaranty Certificate of Eligibility which was issued to me by the VA over 15 years ago. Can I still use it?

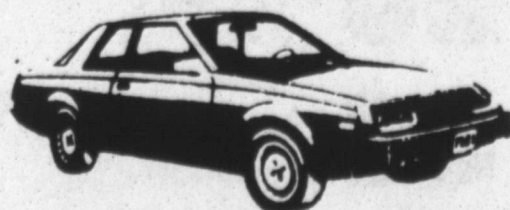

## TRIGGERS OF ASTHMA

### ALLERGENS

Allergens are an important triggering factor. Examples of allergens are:

1. Pollen
2. Mold
3. Animal dander
4. House dust
5. Certain foods

### VIRAL INFECTIONS

Viral infections of the respiratory tract also often act as a major aggravating trigger. This added irritation of the airways, including the nose, throat, and lungs as well as the sinuses, often precedes attacks of asthma. The exact biological mechanism for this is not known.

### INDUSTRIAL OR OCCUPATIONAL EXPOSURE TO CHEMICAL IRRITANTS WHILE ON THE JOB

Studies indicate that 15% of all male cases of asthma in Japan result from exposure to industrial vapors, dust, gases, or fumes.

### IRRITANTS

Irritants can play a large role in triggering asthma. Some examples:

1. Tobacco smoke
2. Strong odors, such as household cleaners, paints and varnishes
3. Other chemicals such as coal and chalk dust
4. Air pollutants
5. Changing weather conditions, including changes in temperature, humidity, barometric pressure, and strong winds all are likely to affect and irritate airways.

### DISTANCE RUNNING

Distance running can also bring on an asthma attack. It has been estimated that 85% of allergic asthmatics have symptoms of wheezing following exercise, and running of this type is most likely to induce asthma, particularly in cold climates.

### SENSITIVITY TO DRUGS, SUCH AS ASPIRIN

Asthmatics should not take any medication unless prescribed by a physician.

### EMOTIONAL ANXIETY

Emotional anxiety and nervous stress cause fatigue which may be responsible for worsening the asthmatic's symptoms and precipitating an attack. However, stress is really only a secondary factor of a disease that is primarily allergic in nature. These psychological factors alone cannot provoke asthma and are more an effect rather than a cause.

Just as the power of suggestion is more powerful in some people than in others, it is important to remember that asthmatics differ with respect to the causes of their attacks. They also respond differently to medication and the amount of medication necessary to control the disease.

Here in the United States, we're all part of one of the world's unique success stories: U.S. public education!

Here are some national figures to help us understand the accomplishments of our American public schools:

- Some 80 percent of our young people currently graduate from high school and 65 percent of these graduates then attend college. Fifty percent of entering college students graduate. In England, only about 20 percent of youth graduate from high school.
- Enrollment in colleges and universities rose from 6 million in 1966 to 12 million in 1981.
- Of every 1,000 fifth graders in 1947, fifty-five percent graduated from high school and 28 percent entered college. Compare that with current figures that show that of every 1,000 fifth graders in 1970, 74 percent graduated from high school in 1977 and 43 percent entered college.
- U.S. schools enroll a far higher percentage of the nation's school-age youngsters than any other country except Japan. France enrolls 51 percent on a full time basis; Germany, 51 percent; Great Britain, 44 percent; Italy, 40 percent.
- The top 5 percent of the U.S. school population is as skillful as the top 5 percent from any nation in the world.
- The 22nd International Mathematics Olympiad, held in 1981, included competing teams from 27 nations. The eight-member U.S. team placed first.
- In 1970, 58,000 high school students took Advanced Placement Exams for college credit. In 1980, 134,000 high school students took those exams—although fewer students were enrolled in high school.
- Standardized tests show that today's elementary school students read better than did their counterparts tested in 1960.
- Handicapped youngsters in the U.S. have more education geared to their special needs than handicapped youngsters in any other nation.
- The U.S. produced the world's first astronauts to set foot on the moon; 23 of the first 25 astronauts assigned to lunar missions were U.S. public school graduates.

Fame, Tom T. Hall's songs have been recorded over the years by Perry Como, George Jones, Loretta Lynn, Johnny Cash, Bobby Bare, George Burns, Patti Page and many others.

Since his national breakthrough as a songwriter, Tom T. hasn't stopped recording his own songs. Over the years he's cut such memorable songs as "Old Dogs, Children and Watermelon Wine", "Country Is", "Sneaky Snake", "I Care", "I Like Beer", and "The Ballad of Forty Dollars". He has also written three books, including the autobiographical *The Storyteller's Nashville*, the novel *The Laughing Man of Woodmont Coves* and *How I Write Songs - Why You Can*.

Personally-speaking, Tom T. Hall is a well-rounded man. He has owned a radio station, hosted his own T.V. show, served as a board member with the CMA, ran a recording studio, owned race horses, and taught songwriting at major universities. Today he serves on the board of directors of a bank, manages a farm, and raises thousands of dollars for humane causes, and charities. His hobbies include golf, hunting, fishing, politics, literary criticism, ornithology, photography and wood-working.

Over the years, Tom T. Hall has appeared on countless T.V. shows, including *The Today Show*, *The Dean Martin Show*, *Good Morning America*, *Hee Haw*, *PBS Specials*, *Nashville Now* and the *CMA Awards Show*. He has thirty-six BMI Awards for his songs, has recorded over thirty albums, has been nominated for seven CMA Awards, won a Grammy in 1969 and was prompted to run for Governor of the state of Tennessee in 1982. Tom T. is also a member of the Grand Ole Opry.

For right now, though, he's working on a new album. His new single just out is one of his own, "Susie's Beauty Shop". His new songs prove again Tom T. is one songwriter/performer who can capture moods and characters with clarity and passion. Tom T. Hall sums up his philosophy in songwriting as "establishing a true voice - not colored by prejudice, politics or preference. If you're telling a story you have to separate all that, and just tell the tale. You have to be careful not to make judgements. You must be honest. That's the main thing in songwriting."

## Tom T. Hall

Tom T. Hall's writing has always had that focused, insightful quality. He first began developing his musical and verbal skills at a very early age. He was born in Olive Hill, Kentucky - the fourth son of a brick plant worker and ordained minister. Tom T. began playing guitar at age four and wrote his first song at the age of nine. At fifteen Tom T. Hall dropped out of school to work at a garment factory and perform with a bluegrass band on a local radio station. The band broke up as a result of the military draft during the Korean War. Tom T. stayed on at the radio station as a disc jockey. He later joined the U.S. Army in 1957, and was sent to Germany where he completed his high school education while serving in the quartermaster corps. He also entertained troops at night and on weekends. Tom T. returned to the states in the early sixties and studied writing at a small college in Roanoke, Virginia while writing radio copy for a local station.

It was during those years in Roanoke that he mailed his first songs to E. Jimmy Key at Newkeys Music Co. in Nashville, Tennessee. Jimmy C. Newman, Dave Dudley, Bobby Bare and Burl Ives were among the first to record his songs.

Tom T. Hall moved to Nashville on January first 1964. He wrote songs from nine to five, five days a week for five years. He was so prolific during those years that he couldn't get all his songs recorded by other artists - so he soon began to record them himself. In 1968, Tom signed with Mercury Records and recorded his first single, "I Washed My Face In The Morning Dew", which went Top Ten. His follow-up, "A Week In A Country Jail", took him all the way to #1 on the country charts. Soon he was also established in the pop world when his song about the Harper Valley P.T.A. became a six million selling hit for Jeannie C. Riley. The song also won Tom a CMA award. A member of the Songwriter's Hall of

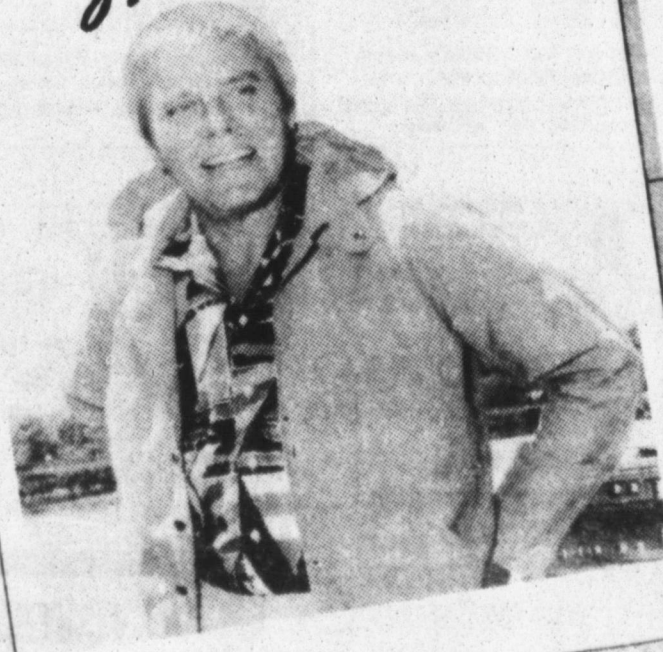

## Duke leads smokeout effort

Dr. "Red" Duke, known best for syndicated television "Health Reports," will prescribe a smoke-free day for Texas smokers as the state's honorary Great American Smokeout chairman.

This year's Smokeout, which is sponsored annually by the American Cancer Society, is scheduled November 20. The Smokeout is a light-hearted campaign encouraging smokers to give up their tobacco for 24 hours.

Last year, a Gallup survey indicated 23 million Americans quit smoking or cut down on the number of cigarettes smoked during the Smokeout.

Event planners expect a record number will make the attempt to abstain this year, as the Smokeout celebrates its 10th Anniversary.

"We're anticipating our greatest participation ever," said Oscar Newton of Houston, chairman of Texas' Smokeout efforts. "We feel Texans especially will respond to the supportive approach of the Smokeout and to Dr. Duke's plain-spoken advice," he said.

Duke, a nationally-respected trauma surgeon, has been a trusted source of health information for television viewers across the nation since 1982. His "Health Reports," produced by the University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston, are broadcast three times a week on 69 television stations in 30 states.

The "Health Reports" will feature segments on smoking and quitting smoking during Smokeout week, Newton said.

"You can't say anything good about smoking," Duke said. "But the good thing about the Great American Smokeout is its supportive approach."

"Although the Smokeout is known as a 'fun' event, it has a very serious purpose," he said. "Each year, 350,000 Americans die of diseases linked to cigarette smoking. We have to convince smokers that quitting is the best thing they can do for themselves and their loved ones," Duke said.

Communities around the state are planning local celebrations in observance of the 10th Anniversary Smokeout. Plans call for promotions at business, hospitals, schools and colleges, as well as city-wide events honoring former smokers and would-

be quitters.

Duke's "Health Reports" are carried on 18 television stations around the state, including: KTRK-TV, Houston; KRIS-TV, Corpus Christi; KMOL-TV, San Antonio; KVUE-TV, Austin; KAMR-TV, Amarillo; WFAA-TV, Dallas/Fort Worth; KMID-TV, Midland/Odessa; KTAB-TV, Abilene; KAVU-TV, Victoria; KTSM-TV, El Paso; KWTX-TV, Waco/Temple; KBTX-TV, Bryan/College Station; KIDY-TV, San Angelo; KFDX-TV, Wichita Falls; KJAC-TV, Fort Arthur/Beaumont; KCBQ-TV, Lubbock; KLTV-TV, Tyler; and KRGV, Weslaco.

## Texas population increasing nearly 20% every decade

Population of Texas will have increased from 14,228,400 in 1980, to 17,498,200 in 1990 to 20,739,400 by the year 2000.

These well-researched predictions by the U.S. Bureau of the Census indicates a slowdown in growth during the final decade of this century.

Texas will have grown 22.98 per cent in population from 1980 to 1990, but that growth will slow down to 18.52 per cent from 1990 to 2000.

The Female portion of the population, of course, will continue to exceed the Male portion throughout the entire period, as follows:

1980 -- Females, 7,230,100 --- Males --6,998,300; 1990 -- Females, 8,847,000 --- Males, 8,651,200; 2000 -- Females, 10,443,500 --- Males, 10,295,900.

## Bob Bullock reports

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday, October 30 said that Texas oil wells have produced 51.1 million barrels less this year than the year before.

This shows that the low price of oil isn't the only culprit working against the Texas economy and the Texas oil industry, he said.

"The drop in production was worth \$772.1 million at current market prices," Bullock said. "So much attention on declining oil prices may have masked the fact that production in Texas has slipped by more than 140,000 barrels a day."

He said tax records show that Texas wells were producing about 2.3 million taxable barrels of oil a day in mid-1985.

Production had dropped to slightly more than 2 million taxable barrels a day by August of this year.

Bullock said the downturn in production alone costs the state about \$35.5 million in severance taxes during the one-year period based on the Comptroller's estimated average oil price per barrel.

Further, Bullock said, active rotary rigs operating in Texas fell by about 60 percent and drilling permits were down by more than 50 percent, he said.

**\$1,987,546.72 awaiting 3,854 North Texans**

A check averaging \$510 awaits each of 3,854 North Texas taxpayers pending their contacting the Internal Revenue Service with their current mailing address. The IRS had a total of \$1,967,546.72 in undeliverable refunds for taxpayers who filed claims earlier this year. According to Terry Green, IRS Chief of Taxpayer Service, the IRS had already made at least two attempts to reach these taxpayers.

If your name appears on the following list, call IRS at (214) 742-2440 in Dallas, (817) 263-9229 in Fort Worth, or 1-800-424-1040 elsewhere in Texas between 8:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. weekdays. You will be asked for your name, social security number, and expected amount of refund. After providing the required information, the IRS will reissue your check and you should have it in time for the Christmas holiday.
