

Taxpayers save \$5,000,000 with the single location primary bill

Our State legislature faces a serious fiscal crisis. In response, many of the bills introduced in this Legislative session effect cost savings. Unfortunately, those same bills significantly reduce the level of services or have the potential to hamper the efficient administration of State government. There is, however, one notable exception.

In response to recommendations of the Office of the Secretary of State, Senator Cyndi Taylor Krier of San Antonio and Representative Richard Smith of Bryan have filed a bill proposing that the Democratic and Republican primary elections be conducted in a single location in each election precinct. This proposal will save Texas taxpayers \$5,000,000. Elections will be improved and the cost reduced dramatically by lower polling place rental costs, reducing the number of election workers, and the implementation of other economies of scale. The bill has the additional advantage of providing for professional election administration by county officials as opposed to the political party workers used in the past. This bill only "desegregates" the polling place while retaining a separate ballot and separate machines for each political party, and establishes bi-partisan election

The current primary election scheme used in Texas provides that each political party have a separate polling places, making Texas the only state without a single location primary. The resulting duplication of service by both parties, saddle our State with the highest cost per primary vote in the United States. Under the present scheme, primary costs have been steadily rising from \$1.36 in 1978 to \$4.30 in 1986. It is conclusive to note that primary election costs in Texas greatly exceed the costs of our general election. For example, the five largest counties in Texas average \$3.00 per primary vote and only \$1.00 per general election vote. In tough times, we can't tolerate such waste.

The passage of legislation mandating our State's participation in the "Super Tuesday" primary election next March also provides that the primary elections will now be held on weekdays. The single location primary bill will eliminate approximately 26,000 election workers. This reduction will address any potential personnel shortages due to the weekday date. The bill also places the responsibility for elections in the

hands of experienced election professionals in each county in Texas as opposed to political party workers. Political party workers could work weekends, but many would experience difficulty working on weekdays due to personal job commitments.

Many Democratic and Republican partisans have expressed concerns regarding the bill. Democrats claim it will create political advantage for the Republican Party by establishing primaries in counties which never have held such elections. In reponse, please remember that only 22 of 254 Texas counties did not hold Republican primaries in 1986 and The Elections Division of the Office of the Secretary of State has estimated over half of those counties will hold GOP primaries in 1988 because of the heightened interest in the "Super Tuesday" election. Further, these counties only account for approximately 70,000 registered voters which represent only 1 percent of the approximately 7 and a half million registered voters in the State. Finally, who can legitimately complain when State funds are used to make it equally convenient to vote in

The primary election will be conducted in the same manner as a general election is presently conducted. However, the combined total of primary voters will not approach the number of voters in the general election. For example, the highest primary vote turnout in Texas history since 1972 was 35 percent, well below the 68 percent watermark figure for general elections. Therefore it is clear that, with the efficient allocation of poll workers, professional election administration, and efficiency of staff, the primary election should run much smoother and faster than the general election. Bleeding disorders may be due to megadoses of Vitamin E

Hemmorhage, both in laboratory animals and in humans, after the consumption of large quantities of vitamin E, has recently been reported by a number of laboratories. These bleeding disorders could be due, at least in part, to the interference of vitamin K function by vitamin E. according to Dr. Louise Canfield-Sander, assistant professor in food science and technology and nutrition, and Texas Agricultural Experiment

'Vitamin K and vitamin E are both fat-soluble vitamins and are required the diet," explained Canfield-Sander, "but the functions of these vitamins are quite different.

"Vitamin E is required for membrane function and probably serves to protect the body from harmful oxygen by-products. First off, for you that let some generic commodity certificates expire on December 31, 1986 through March 31, 1987, you have one last chance to exchange them for cash.

To apply for payment, the original holder of the certificate must return the expired certificate by May 15, 1987 to this office, along with a written request for their exchange for cash. Upon approval, payment will be made equal to the face value minus 15% for handling and another 4.3% required by the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

The expired certificates may not be exchanged for commodities in the Commodity Credit Corporation In-

This is a one shot deal, so if you let this one pass, I guess those expired certificates would make good wall

We told you in the last newsletter that the Committee was asking permission to hay and graze ACR (set aside) acres. This has been approved.

This means you can hay or graze your ACR that previously we had been saying you had to stay off of from June 1 through Oct. 31.

Now there are some rules such as: 1. You cannot charge others for

grazing your ACR. 2. You cannot charge others for the value of the vegetative growth that is

haved. 3. You can recover normal and reasonable costs of letting others graze or bale your ACR such as:

a. Installing temporary (electric) fences or pumping water.

b. Swathing and/or baling the

After grazing out or haying, you may plant another cover (sudan) and hay or graze it also.

You must not remove or allow to

graze to the extent that the acreage is not protected from wind and water

Now, like all these good deals, you will have to come in and sign a form for us before you hay or graze.

Be sure and do this because we are spot checking and if you are having or grazing and haven't made applica-

tion, you will be in violation. Now talk about having your cake and eating it too -- this is a good deal for us -- let's don't abuse it.

You still need to certify your small grain by May 15th.

Now, one last time, we are checking every CRP (old soil bank) field this week for grazing. You have been reminded for the last time, if they are on the CRP acres this week and we catch them there then you are the one caught.

Fair enough - if you get caught under the gate - don't holler.

Who said it would never dry up enough to get in the fields?

Q--Can a female veteran claim her husband as a dependent?

This program has had amazing results. Mr. Peters, who types over 200 words a minute, has personally taught over 12,000 students, and about 600 schools across the nation offer his course using locally trained instructors. Mrs. Pamela Denney, Chair person of the Business Department at Clarendon College, has been teaching this course on campus for 11/2 years and will be the instructor for the two-week course this sum-

According to Mrs. Denney, it is not uncommon to find that most students starting in the program make over 20 errors while typing for 5 minutes. Many of the students learn to type for 5 minutes with no more than 1 error before the course is over, and most learn to type with no more than errors per 5 minutes timed writing, which is the accuracy rate desired for most job applicants. Speed is usually reased anywhere from 10 to 40 vords a minute.

The cost of this course with book will be \$71 for a Donley County resident and \$86 for an Out of County Texas resident. Come by the Registrar's Office as soon as possible to sign up for this course which has a 20 student limit due to machine availa-







PEN of PASTOR

"DEFILEMENT BY EVIL COMMUNICATION"

Defilement of a christian is a very serious spiritual matter. Over the past several weeks we have studied how Daniel purposed in his heart not to be defiled by the ways of the Babylonians. We must live in the world but we do not have to live like the world. And remember that God does not use or honor unclean vessels.

The week we want to talk about another source of defilement. There are those who may never be overcome by the flesh and it's appetite

but who leave themselves open to be defiled by the gossip of others. We're talking about those who allow themselves to be the garbage dump for the gossip, slander and talebearing of the backslidden and lost. James chapter three deals with the evil and damage the tongue can accomplish. It would do us well to review that chapter and heed the apostles warning. In Proverbs 26:22 we are told, "The words of a talebearer are as wounds and they go down into the innermost parts of the belly." There are never any positive results from such practices. We need to also emphasize that those who listen to such malicious conversation are just as guilty as those who practice it.

Satan loves to use gossip, slander and talebearing to cause division in the local body of believers. His tactic is to divide and conquer. But not only does he divide believer from believer but also believer from his relationship with God. In I peter 4:15 we are instructed, "But let none of you suffer as a murderer or a thief or as an evildoer or as a busy body in other mans matters." God links murder, theft and evil doing with gossip and

Next week we will see how to deal with talebearers. But in the meantime remember that those who misuse the gift of speech are always destructive. God expects his children to be positive, loving and even building up others and self in the love and grace of God.

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
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Delta Kappa Gamma held meeting

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
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
