Clarendon CISD annual performance report available

The Clarendon CISD Board of Trustees reviewed and adopted Annual Performance Report for the 1985-86 academic year in their regular February 12th meeting. The report consisted of information on student performance, program offerings, staff quality, facility adequacy, and financial costs and conditions.

In the student performance area there was a bragging right noted the local students are generally performing above the national average on the standardized tests.

Last year's third grade students scored the highest of all local grades on the TEAMS test. They scored in the 87th percentile in math, in the 67th percentile in reading, and in the 77th percentile in writing.

The fifth grade also scored very well on the TEAMS test. They scored in the 65th percentile in math, in the 67th percentile in reading and 66.2 cents for the state average.

in the 62nd percentile in writing. In grades K-8, only the seventh grade fell below the national average, and they fell below the national average only in math with a 41st percentile

Financially, the district is in good shape. The district spent less locally per student than is being spent state-wide. The local expendatures was \$3,087 per pupil as compared to \$3,407 on a state-wide average for 1985-86. The largest percent of the local budget was spent on instruction and support services. The local district spent eighty-one percent in these two areas as compared to seventy-four percent on a state-wide average. The district operated at a lower tax rate locally as compared to other schools in the state. The local effective tax rate for 1986 was 57.7 cents per \$100 value as compared to





Sargent Farren D. Haley and eight members of the Panhandle Regional Organized Crime Department along with Sheriff Jimmy Thompson and three deputies, Butch Blackburn, Jim Lampier and Gary Thomas with Doug Wright from the District Attorneys office raided a house on Tyng Street in Howardwick, about 4 a.m. Wednesday, Feb. 11th and arrested seven occupants.

Sheriff Thompson was acting on information received about alleged drugs and stolen merchandise at the residence. Armed with a search warrant issued by Justice of the Peace W.W. Lovelady, the officers entered the house and arrested Benjamin E. Crocker, Pampa; Norma J. Sawyer, Amarillo, Barney Earl Sawyer, Amarillo; Whitney Dean Hopkins, Duncan, Oklahoma; Chris W. Carson, Lubbock: and Jerry J. Cook, Amarillo.

The officers gathered up approximately \$14,000 in drugs consisting of amphetamines, chrystal amphetamines, cocaine, heroin, and marijuana. They also found another \$15,000 worth of stolen guns, jewelry and silver items. Wednesday afternoon Earl Sawyer took Sheriff Thompson and Gray County Sheriff Jordan to a house in Pampa where another twenty guns were hidden.

The two women are out on \$5,000 Bond each and the other five are still in the Donley County Jail.

Sheriff Thompson stated, "We feel that we have broken up a major drug ring in the Panhandle. They were not selling drugs in Donley County, but they would trade drugs for stolen goods."

Sheriff Thompson and Deputy Butch Blackburn were called out about 9 p.m. on Friday, February 13th to the old Davis Ranch, on Brice Route as a man was allegedly holding his wife and son as hostages at gun

When officers arrived at the ranch. they found Tom Hall, 56, setting in the cab of a tractor with a gun. He allegedly was waiting for a step-son to come home.

The sheriff and his deputy quickly apprehended Mr. Hall. He was arrested and charged with aggravated assault on a police officer, and bond was set at \$5,000.

CELANESE CHEMICAL COMPANY INC., P.O. BOX 937, PAMPA, TEXAS 79065 has applied to the **Texas Water Commission for three** permits [Proposed Permits Nos. WDW-244, WDW-245, and WDW-246] to complete and operate three disposal wells with authorization to handle hazardous wastes at its Pampa Plant. The disposal wells will be used to dispose of the company's process wastewater from the manufacture of synthetic organic chemicals, and assorted wastestreams which may include: process wastewater, demineralizer acidwaste [DAW], retrieved contaminated perched ground water, existing pond inventory, contaminated stormwater runoff, spill of products or expressly authorized wastes, cooling tower blowdown, wastes generated during drilling, workovers, or closure of the well and associated facilities that are compatible with permitted wastes and the reservior. 




