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Clarendon CISD annual performance report available

The Clarendon CISD Board of Trustees reviewed and adopted Annual Performance Report for the 1985-86 academic year in their regular February 12th meeting. The report consisted of information on student performance, program offerings, staff quality, facility adequacy, and financial costs and conditions.

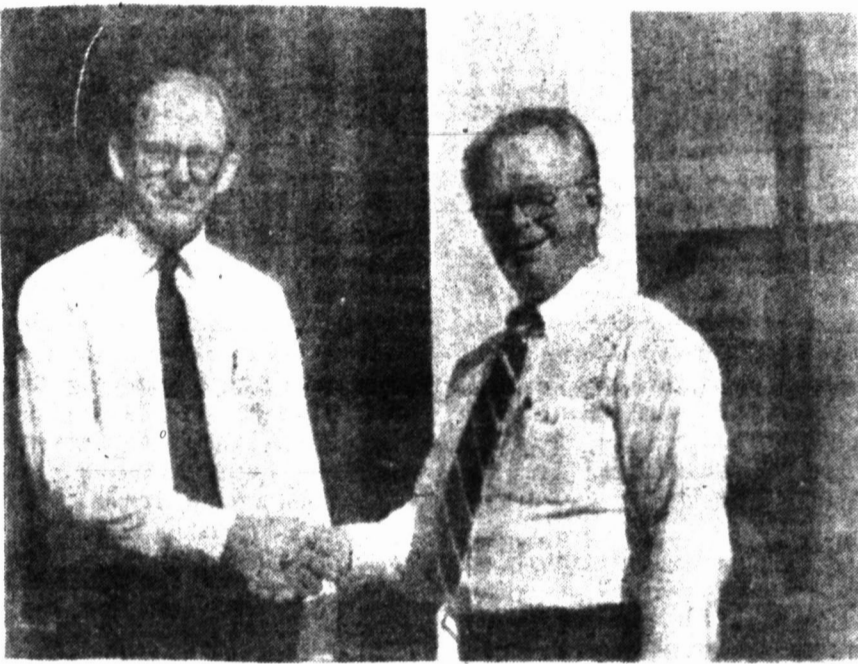
In the student performance area there was a bragging right noted - the local students are generally performing above the national average on the standardized tests.

Last year's third grade students scored the highest of all local grades on the TEAMS test. They scored in the 87th percentile in math, in the 67th percentile in reading, and in the 77th percentile in writing.

The fifth grade also scored very well on the TEAMS test. They scored in the 65th percentile in math, in the 67th percentile in reading and

in the 62nd percentile in writing. In grades K-8, only the seventh grade fell below the national average, and they fell below the national average only in math with a 41st percentile ranking.

Financially, the district is in good shape. The district spent less locally per student than is being spent state-wide. The local expenditures was \$3,087 per pupil as compared to \$3,407 on a state-wide average for 1985-86. The largest percent of the local budget was spent on instruction and support services. The local district spent eighty-one percent in these two areas as compared to seventy-four percent on a state-wide average. The district operated at a lower tax rate locally as compared to other schools in the state. The local effective tax rate for 1986 was 57.7 cents per \$100 value as compared to 66.2 cents for the state average.

Larry White hired to replace Johnston at Medical Center

Billy Ray Johnston, administrator of Donley County Medical Center, has resigned to accept a position at Park Place Towers in Amarillo. He will be Health Care Administrator and Assistance Administrator for the 10 floor retirement center. This is a private facility with 123 apartments and a 56 bed nursing home.

Billy Ray is a native of Donley County and has been administrator of the Medical Center for the past 8½ years.

Under Billy Ray's guidance, the home has received nothing but superior ratings from the Texas Department of Health.

Medical Center is a 43 bed Intermediate Care Facility with private as well as medicaid patients. The Center is a tax support institution which accepts county residents first. They have 65 employees, which puts over four hundred thousand dollars a year back into Donley County's economy.

The facility is known all over the Panhandle and receives calls almost daily with requests for patient transfer and admittance.

The Donley County Hospital Board hired Larry White at last weeks board meeting. Larry started work

on Monday and Billy Ray will be leaving the first of March.

Larry grew up in Clarendon and has his administrators license and was once the administrator for the Clarendon Nursing Home, which was owned and operated by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Guy White. He is a graduate of Clarendon High School and Wayland University.

"Donley County is my home and I have been more than pleased with my association with the Medical Center, and the cooperation that both the board and the residents have given me during the past 8½ years. When this opportunity arose, I felt that it was too good of an advancement for me not to accept. I have known Larry for a great number of years and I feel that I can recommend him without reservations," stated Johnston.

Larry said, "My main concern will be to keep the level of care and maintain the quality that Billy Ray has set. I welcome visitors at both the center and my office, and will be more than happy to talk with anyone about any problem. I appreciate this opportunity to serve Donley County in this capacity."

Broncos defeated Shamrock

The Clarendon Broncos defeated the Irish of Shamrock 52-41 in the Bronco gym on February 10th. The Clarendon fans saw the Broncos play one of their best games of the year. The Broncos shot a season high 49 percent from the field and a season high in assists with 19. The Broncos outstanding team defense held Shamrock's Chuck Dougherty, leading the district in scoring with 24 points a game, to 11 points for his lowest point total in district play.

"The guys played with intensity and it showed in the point difference. The whole team played well on defense, especially James Ariola and Shawn Hermesmeier. It was James and Shawn who were responsible for shutting down Shamrock's Dougherty," said Coach Loveless. Scoring in double figures for the Broncos were Chris Ward with 18 and Clay Sharp and Wes Hatley with 10 each. Chris Ward controlled the boards with 11 and James Ariola and Shawn Hermesmeier pulled down six apiece. Wes Hatley had a season high 11 assists. Jay Gage, Ken Miller, and Randy Gaines contributed to the victory.

In the last game of the season the Broncos were defeated by the Memphis Cyclones 75-48. Despite the loss, the Broncos played well shooting a new season high 50

percent from the floor and 86 percent from the charity stripe. West Hatley and Clay Sharp led all scorers with 15 and 12 points, respectively. James Ariola had a team high four rebounds. Hatley, Sharp, and Ken Miller had four assists each. Other Broncos playing well were Shawn Hermesmeier, Jay Gage, Clint Hunt and Chris Ward. "The Broncos played very hard and I was pleased with their excellent effort against Memphis," said Coach Loveless.

Early saloons of the Panhandle featured in new photo exhibit at Canyon

Images of early-day Panhandle saloons will be on exhibit during February in the Pioneer Gallery of the Panhandle-Plains Museum in Canyon. "Panhandle Watering Holes: Early Saloons of the Golden Spread" will blend historic photographs and saloon artifacts to illustrate a little-known fact of Panhandle social history.

Saloons, as well as the people who frequented them, have always been a staple item in the folklore of the West. In the early years of Panhandle history, no settlement or town was complete without at least one of these establishments. Often, the saloon was the first building in town.

According to Richard Rattenbury, Museum staffer who curated the exhibit, the region's first drinking parlors were "crude affairs, housed in dugouts, sod houses, or tents. With the arrival of the railroad, in the 1800's, milled lumber and ready-made 'saloon outfits' and other furnishings became available, and more elaborate and elegant establishments could be built."

Boscher's Saloon in Clarendon, offered the ultimate in saloon decor. The place boasted a classical twenty foot back bar; a matching package liquor case; and a matching counter, complete with mahogany and brass arm rail, nickel plated towel holders and linen "mustache" wipers.

A registration fee of \$25.00 per individual or couple will cover cost of materials and can be paid at the door. A supper will be provided each night, courtesy of the three co-sponsoring banks.

This program is intended for farmers, ranchers and others who want to learn more about these financial subjects that are becoming more important in obtaining loans.

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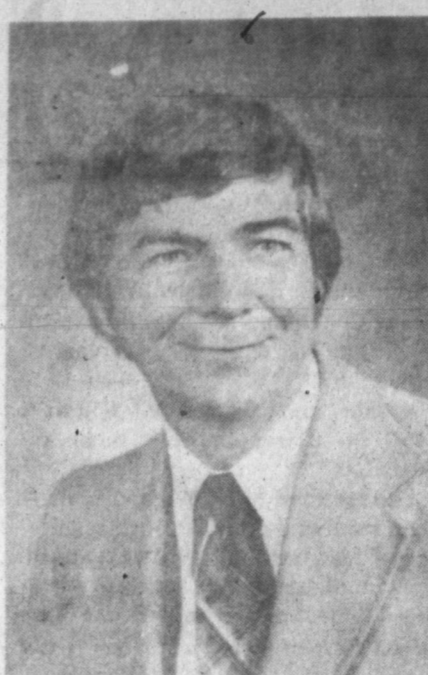

Trisha Clifford to receive Presidential scholarship

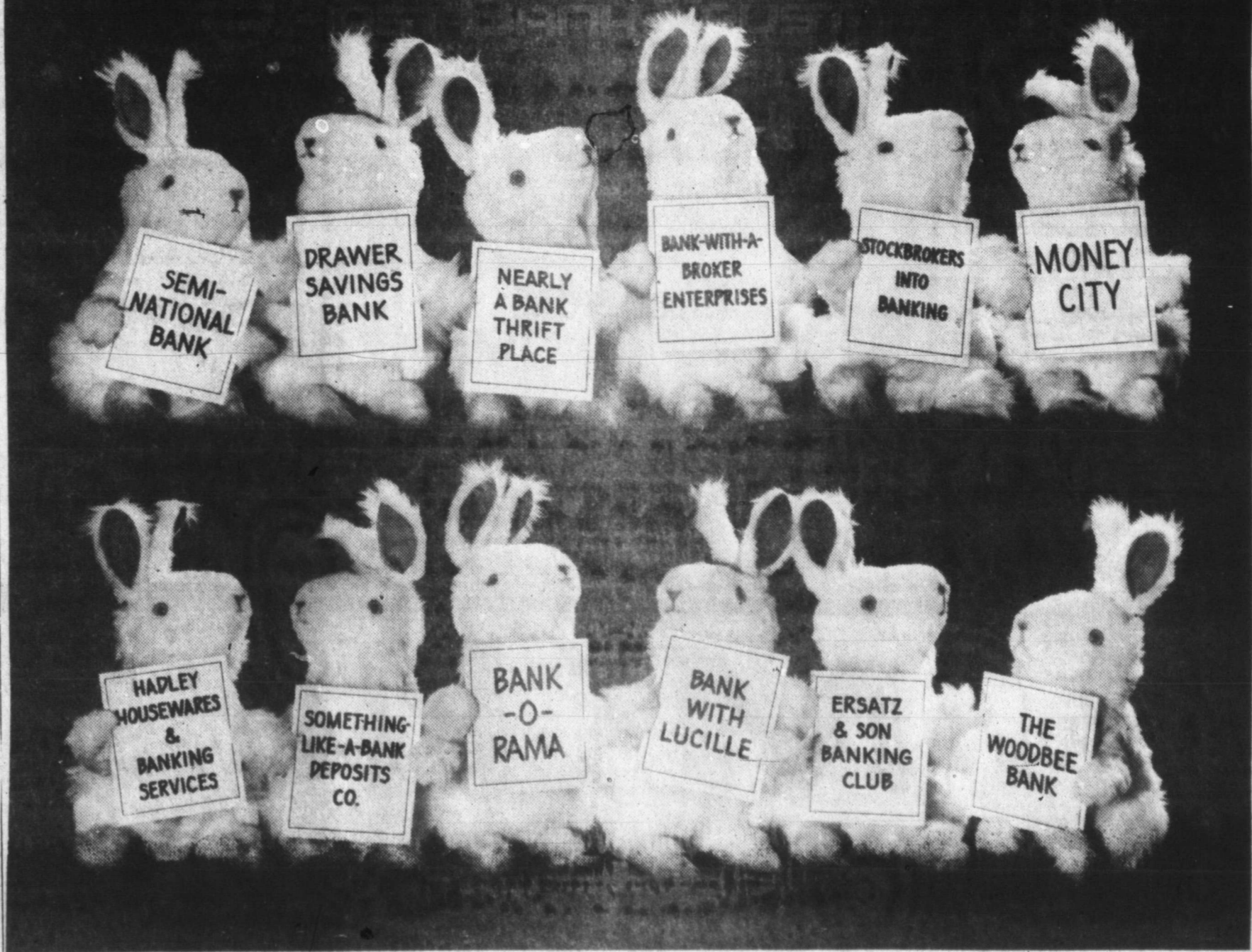

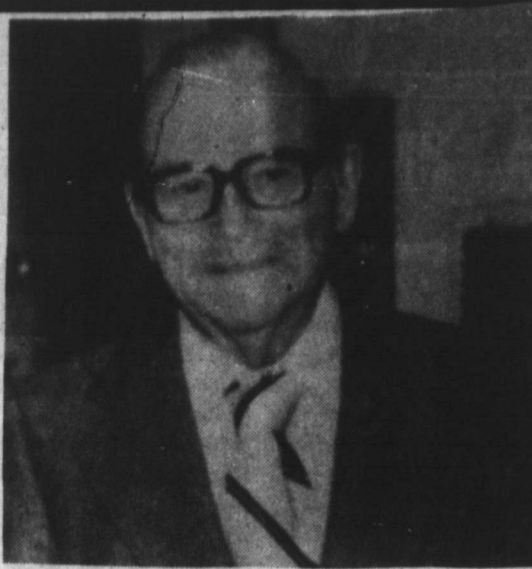

Maryland Club to aid highway department beautification efforts

The Texas highway department has a new partner in its efforts to beautify the state.

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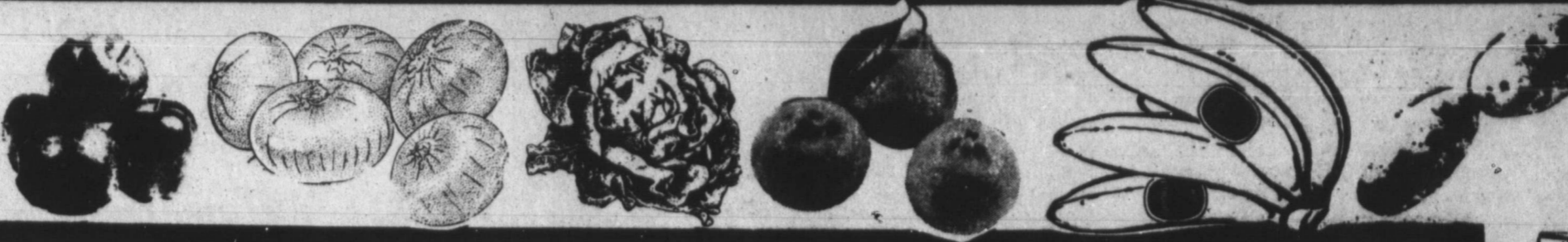
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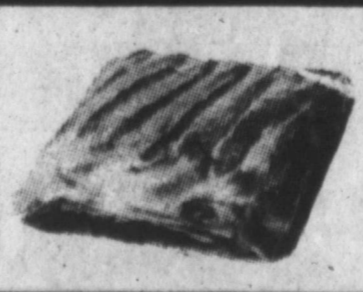
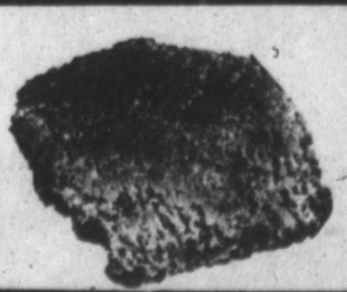
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NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING ON AN APPLICATION FOR HAZARDOUS WASTE DISPOSAL WELLS PERMITS

CELANESE CHEMICAL COMPANY INC., P.O. BOX 937, PAMPA, TEXAS 79065 has applied to the Texas Water Commission for three permits (Proposed Permits Nos. WDW-244, WDW-245, and WDW-246) to complete and operate three disposal wells with authorization to handle hazardous wastes at its Pampa Plant. The disposal wells will be used to dispose of the company's process wastewater from the manufacture of synthetic organic chemicals, and assorted wastewaters which may include: process wastewater, demineralizer acid waste [DAW], retrieved contaminated perched ground water, existing pond inventory, contaminated stormwater runoff, spill of products or expressly authorized wastes, cooling tower blowdown, wastes generated during drilling, workovers, or closure of the well and associated facilities that are compatible with permitted wastes and the reservoir. Disposal of waste water for all wells is to be into the Pennsylvania Granite Wash, the Ellenberger Group, and the Reagan Sandstone in the approximate subsurface interval between 5,130 and 10,200 feet. The proposed permit will require that a performance bond or other form of security be secured and maintained in full force and effect at all times, in a form acceptable to the Executive Director of the Texas Water Commission, to provide for proper plugging and abandonment of the permitted waste disposal wells.

Disposal of wastewater by injection will be at a rate not to exceed 1,100 gallons per minute, cumulative for all three injection wells. The volume of injected wastewater would not exceed 449,388 million gallons per year [equivalent to 855 gallons per minute over 365 days], cumulative for all three proposed injection wells. The authorized surface injection pressure for each individual well would not exceed 1000 psig.

The waste disposal wells are to be located on Celanese property in Gray County, approximately 3 miles east of the City of Pampa [Section 53, Block 3]. Waste disposal well No. WDW-244 will be located at a point 2,430.6 feet east of the west line, and 2,441.6 feet north of the south line of the Illinois & Great Northern Railroad Survey, Abstract 366. Waste disposal well No. WDW-245 will be located at a point 2,830.6 feet east of the west line and 2,441.6 feet north of the south line of the Illinois & Great Northern Railroad Survey, Abstract 366. Waste disposal well No. WDW-246 will be located at a point 2,830.6 feet east of the west line, and 2,841.6 feet north of the south line of the Illinois & Great Northern Railroad Survey, Abstract 366. The center of the disposal well tract is located at latitude 35 degrees 33' 21" north, and longitude 100 degrees 53' 30" west. A 13-mile pipeline will convey wastewater from the Celanese plant southwest of Pampa to the injection wells.

Waste disposal well WDW-244 has been drilled to a total depth of approximately 9,965 feet for the purpose of testing the subsurface formations. Waste disposal well WDW-245 will be drilled to a total depth of approximately 10,000 feet. Waste disposal well WDW-246 will be drilled to a total depth of approximately 10,000 feet.

The Executive Director of the Texas Water Commission has prepared three draft permits which, if approved by the Commission, would authorize the activities and facilities described in this notice.

A Hearings Examiner of the Texas Water Commission will conduct a public hearing at

The Texas Air Control Board [TACB] may appear at the public hearing and participate as a party to address air quality aspects of the application, pursuant to the Texas Solid Waste Disposal Act, [Article 4477-7, Texas Revised Civil Statutes]. The TACB will regulate air emissions from the facility through special provisions in any permit which is issued.

The record of this proceeding will include evidence and testimony taken at the public hearing. The hearing may be continued from time to time and place to place, if necessary, to develop all relevant evidence bearing on the subject of the hearing.

The Texas Water Commission reserves the right to schedule or reschedule hearings as it deems necessary.
