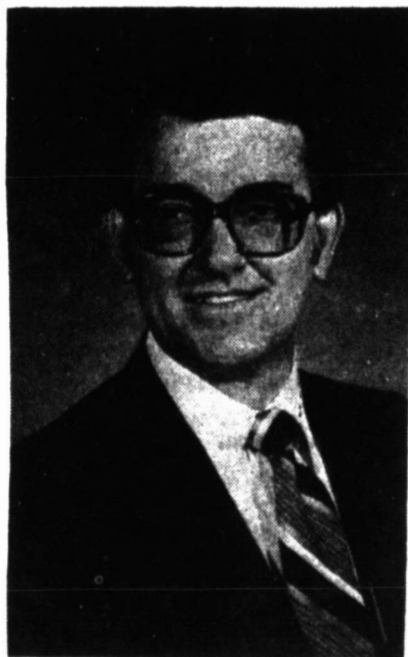
The Well Child Clinic provides physical exams, heights, weights, blood pressures, vision and hearing screening. Tests for Anemia and developmental screening.

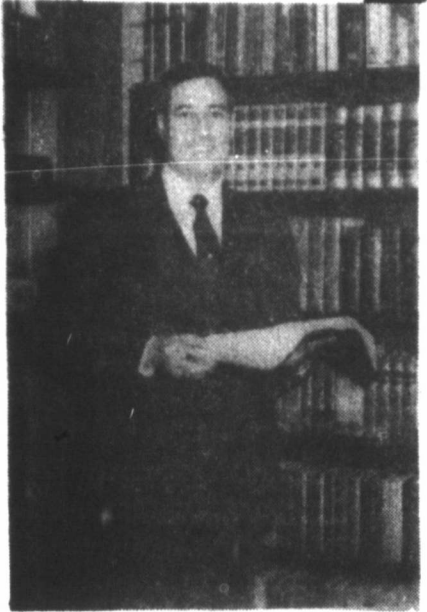

### DEFENSE AGAINST DEFILEMENT

In the first chapter of the book of Daniel we find that Nebuchadnezzar had invaded Judah and carried away to Babylon some of the choicest of Jerusalem's young men. His purpose was to take the fairest, most intelligent children of Israel and train them to be a part of his government

in Babylon. In order to do this he had to literally turn them from their Godly heritage to the ways of the pagans. Among them were Daniel, Hananiah, Mishael and Azariah. The last three became known as Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego.

In a very real sense that transformation is the same thing Satan wishes to accomplish in the lives of believers. He tries to allure us back to the world (paganism) with the flust of the flesh, the lust of the eyes and the pride of life. He knows if he can get us to look, act and think as the world, then we will become ineffective for the Lord.

I believe it is interesting that when confronted with this attempt to "Chaldeanize" these Hebrew children that Daniel made a decision. In verse eight we are told, "But Daniel purposed in his heart that he would not defile himself..." He made a decision with his head that led to a conviction of his heart. A conviction of heart becomes something you will "live by" or "die for." Daniel therefore defied the command of the strongest Monarch of his day in order to obey the Lord of all the universe. I believe he had the same determination that Paul displayed when he said, "...so now also Christ shall be magnified in my body whether by my life or my death." (phil. 1:20).

Over the next few weeks we will see how Satan sought to defile Daniel and how God worked to give him victory. As we look at this we should pray that God will also give us the same heart convictions to stand pure and apart from the world for the glory of God.

## Blockwalkers to canvass Donley County

An American Cancer Society volunteer might be knocking at your door sometime between April 5 and 12 with some good news about early detection of breast cancer, as part of the Society's 1987 Residential Education and Fund-raising Crusade.

According to Naomi Phelan, Chairman of this year's Residential "C-Days" in Donley County, the purpose of the drive is to raise funds for the Society's research, education, and service programs. Last year more than \$4,600 was raised during C-Days; \$6550 is the goal for 1987.

The theme of this year's drive is mammography—a highly effective tool in the early detection of breast cancer. A mammogram is a low-dose X ray of the breast which can detect tumors as small as a freckle. A mammogram can reveal a breast cancer before it becomes large enough to be felt. Then, if a tumor is detected, it can be removed through less extensive forms of surgery and when the survival rate is highest. Chances of survival can approach 100

percent if breast cancer is detected at its onset.

The American Cancer Society urges women without symptoms between the ages of 35 and 39 to get a baseline mammogram, for future comparisons. Women between the ages of 40 and 49 should undergo this test every one to two years, as recommended by their physician. Women over 50 should have mammograms taken annually.

Mrs. Phelan said volunteers will distribute the folder, "Now, Breast Cancer Has Virtually Nowhere to Hide" to Donley County residents. The Society's guidelines are included in the pamphlet.

The first week of April has been designated as the target date for the local American Cancer Society Fund Drive. A Blockwalker will visit your home to collect your contribution or donations may be given directly to Barbara Cosper, Treasurer for the Donley County Unit, at the Donley County State Bank. Your help is needed to defeat this disease that strikes so indiscriminately.

Clarendon's Picture Memory team from the fourth and fifth grades received second place; four of the team members received certificates

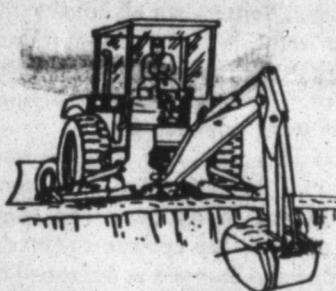
for having perfect papers. Team members were Lisa Hill, Deana Nazworth, Stacey Alexander, Julie Altman, and Beth Barbee.
