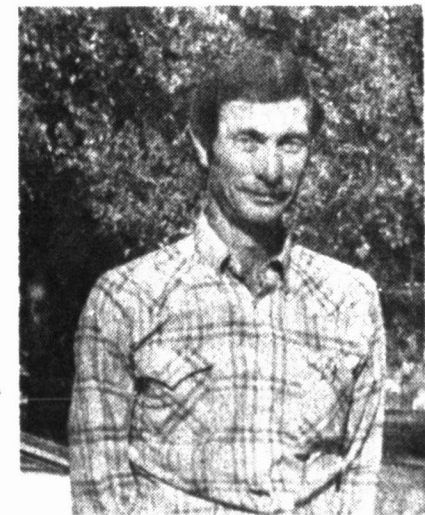

offense out gained Canadian in total yards 257 to 244. "Keep it going Broncos!"

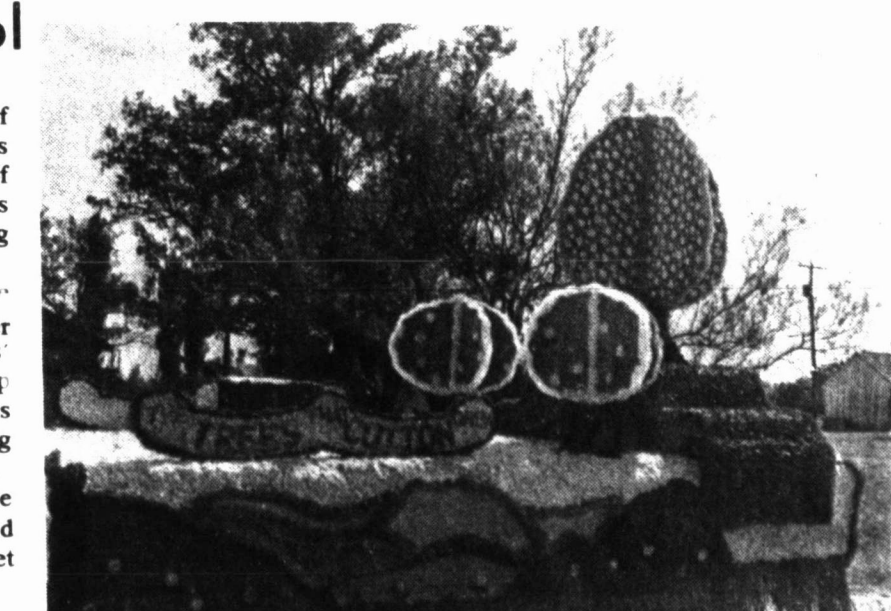
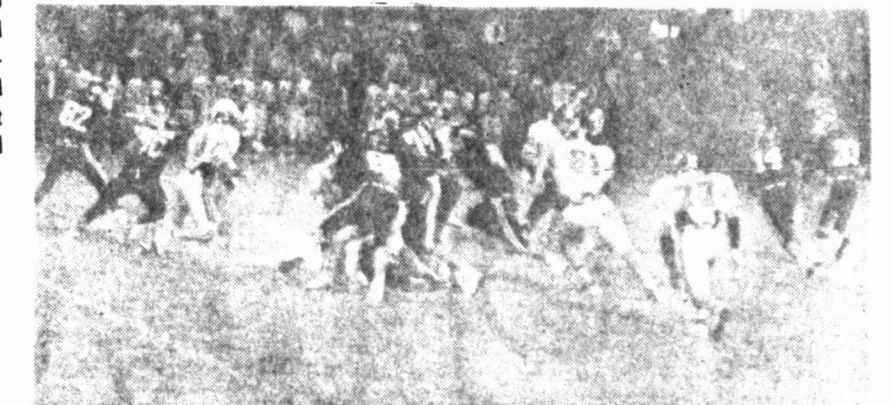
Bronco JV

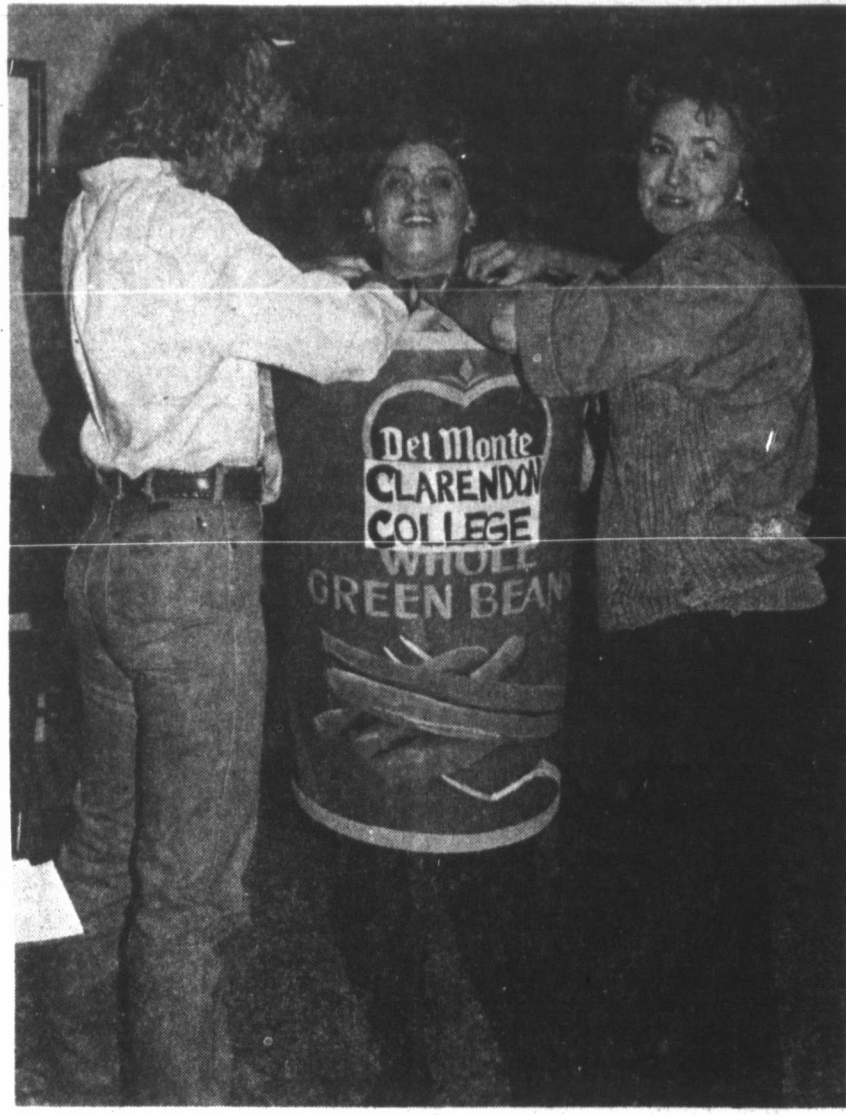

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Study examines seafood for at-home consumption

Per capita consumption of fresh and frozen seafood has risen nearly 50 percent since 1960 and is expected to grow at a faster rate than beef, pork, vegetables, cereal, and milk over the next two decades, according to government surveys.

Americans spend \$15 billion annually, or about 4 percent of their food budgets, on seafood, and the National Marine Fisheries Service projects the share of the food dollar to be almost 10 percent by the end of the century.

With those buying patterns in mind, Hsiang-tai Cheng, agricultural economist for the University of Georgia, and Oral Capps, Jr., Texas Agricultural Experiment Station agricultural economist, studied consumer characteristics to better understand who buys seafood and what types of seafood are bought.

In analyzing household expenditures, the researchers considered the effects of income, prices, socio-demographic differences, household size, geographic region, race, education, occupation, and seasonality.

Socio-demographic characteristics, the researchers say, are likely to reflect expenditure shifts due to differences in lifecycle and product

accessibility, and by differences in climate, taste, preferences, culture, and infrastructure of households.

Also, to capture shopping behavior of consumers, the study considered types of seafood outlets and the use of coupons to help explain expenditures on seafood products.

In addition, the researchers note that although away-from-home outlets account for roughly 60 percent of total seafood consumption in the United States, data on away-from-home consumption were not available. The Seafood Consumption Survey, conducted for the National Marine Fisheries Service is the source of data for the research.

Shellfish, including crabs, oysters, and shrimp, as well as finfish - cod, flounder/sole, haddock, perch and snapper - were analyzed.

In general, they found that Southerners spend significantly more on fresh and frozen seafood than do households in any other region and that white families spend significantly less on seafood for at-home consumption than do non-white families. Additionally, those households with children spend significantly less on seafood than childless households.

In addition to increased consumption in the South and in non-white households, Cheng and Capps found that households with lower education levels generally spent more on shrimp and haddock but less on cod and total finfish than did the more educated.

The research found that households with religious affiliation spent significantly less on oysters, cod and total finfish than did households with no such affiliation.

The researchers also found significant differences in expenditures for the various seafood products according to the occupation of the household head and the urbanization of the household itself. Employment status and age of the household manager was generally found to be unimportant.

The study also found that particular store outlets and coupon values or other special offers affected purchases, with an exception for oysters. Seasonality, too, affected purchase of the products being analyzed.

Own-price effects were key factors on household expenditures for fresh and frozen seafood commodities for at-home consumption. Also, household expenditures were more sensitive to changes in household size than to changes in household income. Finally, cross-price effects of meat and poultry had relatively little effect on household consumption of fresh and frozen seafood.

Own-priced effects refer to the direct of the commodities in question - for example, the price of shrimp when considering the purchase of shrimp. Cross-price effects refer to the prices of other commodities which may influence the purchase of a particular commodity - for example, the price of lobster when considering the purchase of shrimp.

Cheng and Capps say that their research will be valuable to the seafood industry. Various producer, processor, and consumer groups may ascertain key demand factors from the study. It will also assist retailers and the newly created National Fish and Seafood Promotional Council in the identification of target groups for fresh and frozen seafood products. Even though improvements and refinements in data collection and model formulation merit attention, the scientists say their work is a fruitful, first step.

Mauro deplors inclusion of VLB in Bond rating action

Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro took strong issue with Standard and Poor's decision to downgrade from AA+ to AA the rating for a group of state-voted bond issues which includes \$1.4 billion of Veterans Land and Housing bonds.

"Our Veterans programs are the best in the nation and the bonds that the people of Texas have approved to support these programs are unmatched in their soundness and their reliability," said Mauro, who serves as chairman of the Texas Veterans Land Board.

Mauro explained that the status of the Veterans Land bonds is uniquely sound because loans made to Veterans are fully collateralized. Title to land purchased by Veterans is held in the name of the state until

the loans are paid in full, and housing and home improvement loans are insured by VA, FHA or private mortgage insurance. Security to bondholders is also assured by the Veterans Land Board's fully-funded bond and mortgage reserves.

Mauro added that "the Veterans Land Board programs use no state tax dollars to operate and have never in their 40-year history had to call on the general obligation authority of the state to meet debt service requirements. When the Board goes to the bond markets again in the future on behalf of our Texas Veterans, I fully expect that the rating services will recognize the fundamental strength and soundness of Texas Veterans bonds."

Multiple Sclerosis is a disease that worries many people in the Texas Panhandle. The area has a very high incidence rate of M.S. Twenty-five cases per fifty thousand people is the average south of the Mason-Dixon line, and yet, in Dumas alone (Pop. 13,515), we have over 20 known patients!

We have begun a search to find every M.S. patient in the Panhandle. Why? Because for each new case we can verify with statistics, we improve our chances of attracting national M.S. researchers to search our area for the elusive cause and cure of this affliction that strikes down so many young adults in the prime of life.

On October 30th and 31st, Dr. Thor Hanson, National Multiple Sclerosis Society President and Chief Executive Officer, will be in Amarillo. At that time, we would like to present him with our survey statistics as proof that this area cases, unless we have the public's help.

We are searching for (1) names

and addresses of those with M.S. who lived in the Panhandle the first fifteen years of their lives (regardless of their present location); (2) deceased M.S. patients who were reared in the area; (3) those with M.S. living in the Panhandle who are not registered with the Amarillo M.S. office; (4) anyone who lived in the Texas Panhandle for any substantial length of time and was diagnosed as having M.S.

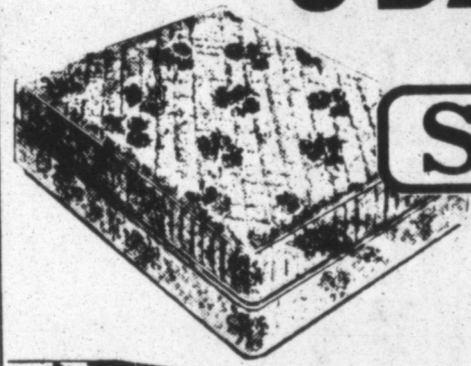
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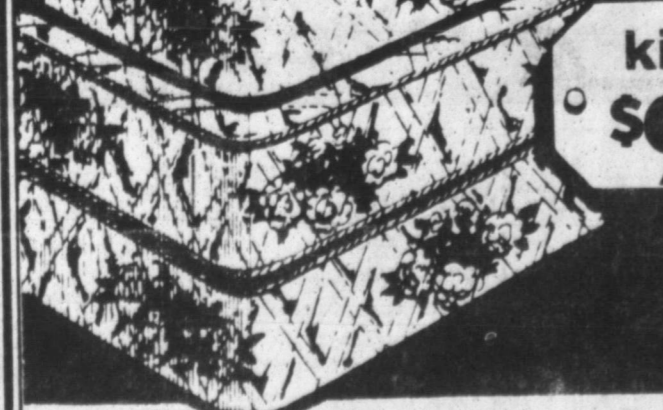

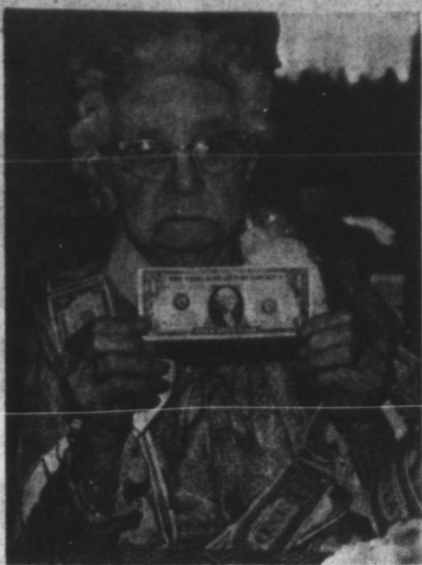
Thelma's guests were her husband Charlie and niece Ruby Dell Estlack. Blanch's family came last week and she received many useful gifts.

For Corns and Calluses

Corns and calluses may look different but are composed of the same material — layers of dead skin cells that often result from wearing shoes that do not fit correctly. The key to self-care of these hard skin accumulations is to remove just enough dead skin to provide relief from pain or discomfort. (Diabetics should avoid self-removal of corns and calluses because of the dangers of infection and toe, foot, or leg loss.)

One approach to slow elimination of corns and calluses is by soaking in warm water and using a pumice stone. A moisturizing lotion applied after stone use may be helpful.

Another approach is through application of a medicine which contains salicylic acid, the only over-the-counter corn and callus removal medicine considered safe and effective by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration. Salicylic

acid is available in liquid form (in flexible collodion) and may be applied with a small glass rod. It is also available in small plasters (pads) that can be affixed directly to the corn or callus. Directions should be followed precisely. Although softening and relief of pain may occur within a day or two, several days may be required for complete corn or callus removal.

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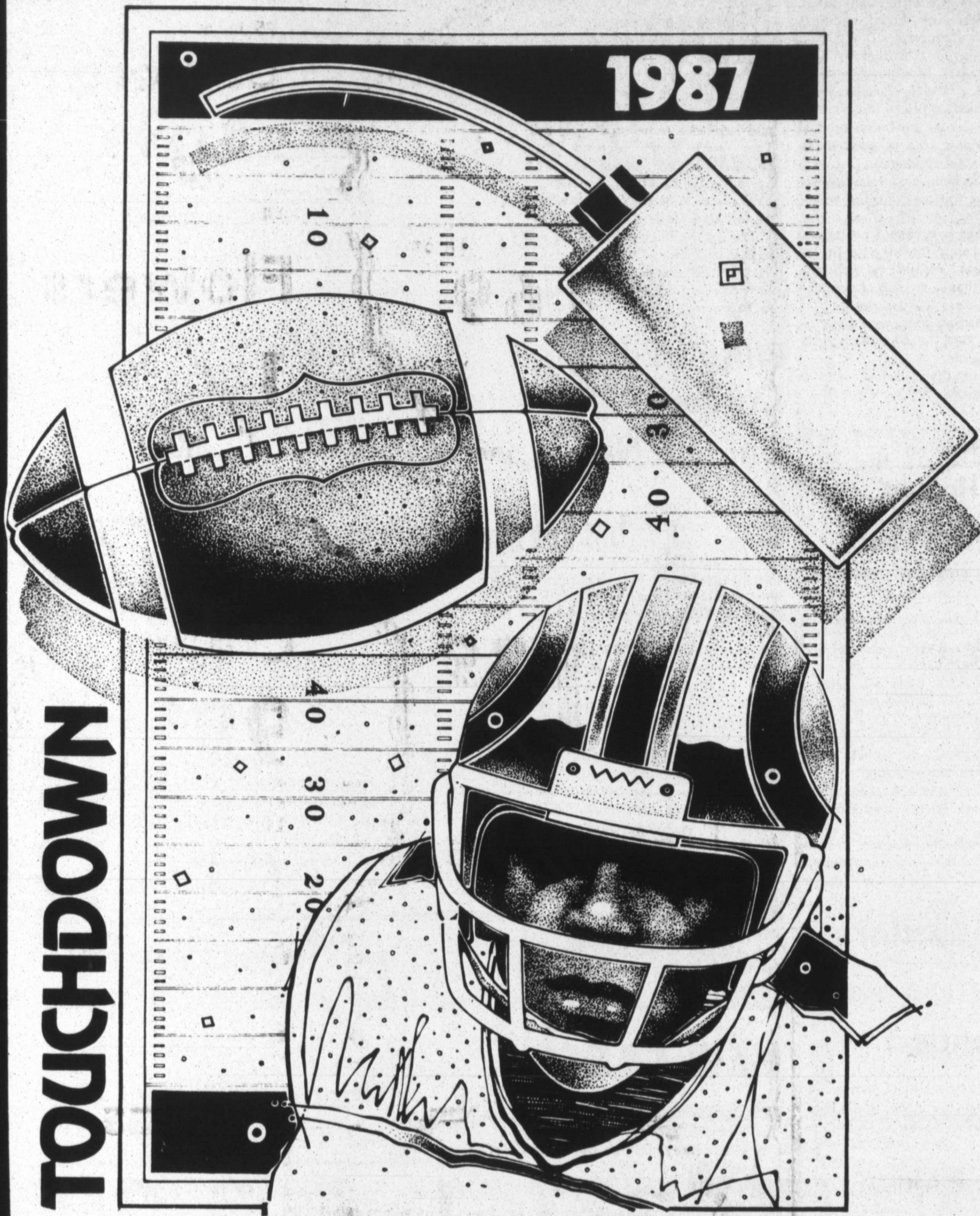

survivorship**

The signature cards you sign on joint bank and checking accounts will determine if those funds go directly to your spouse in the event of your death.

In Texas, establishing an 'and/or' joint account does not automatically create the right of survivorship.

The right of survivorship is important because it means that the surviving spouse receives the property outright, without having to go through probate. Without the right of survivorship the spouse's share of the accounts will go to his or her heirs, usually the children.

Nancy Granovsky, who is a family economics specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economics program, says that the right of survivorship can be created through a cotenancy, which is one form of joint ownership.

Three types of cotenancy are recognized in Texas; tenancy in common, community property, and joint tenancy with the right of survivorship. The main difference between tenancy in common and community property is that community property exists only between husband and wife.

Panhandle Arthritis seminar

The Panhandle Arthritis Information Center and the local Scleroderma Support Group will host an arthritis seminar on Saturday, October 17, 1987 from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. The lectures will be located at Texas Tech Health Sciences Center Auditorium at 1400 Wallace Blvd., and are free to the public. Corporate sponsor for the seminar is SYNTEX Pharmaceuticals.

Scheduled throughout the day are a series of lectures by area professionals who will speak and answer questions regarding various topics which include rheumatoid arthritis, osteoarthritis, gout, scleroderma, lupus, joint replacement, gold treatment, juvenile arthritis, physical therapy, quackery, and diet in conjunction with arthritis.

The Panhandle Arthritis Information Center was established in 1984 to give free services to the Panhandle

area victims of arthritis. It is a non-profit organization and is supported solely by donations. Officers for 1987-1988 term are Melody L. Malouf, President; Norma Young, Vice President; Alda Lois Feferman, Secretary; and Barbara Rando, Treasurer.

Arthritis is one of the nation's most common chronic diseases and, if left untreated, can be serious. It affects people of all ages from infants to adults in the prime of life as well as older persons.

More than 36 million Americans, or one in seven people, have a form of arthritis. This averages one victim of arthritis in every three families. One million people each year are diagnosed with a form of arthritis. If left untreated, persons with certain forms of arthritis will live with constant threat of harm to their body.

However, most problems can be avoided with proper evaluation and treatment. Although there is no known cure for most forms of arthritis, many advances in research have led to information which allows victims of arthritis to control pain and keep their joints and limbs moving freely and thus able to enjoy a normal life.

Unfortunately, many persons do not know the facts about arthritis or take it seriously. They tend to put off getting proper medical help. Even when they are given medical attention and/or medication, they fail to follow their treatment programs closely. This can result in permanent damage that could have been avoided if the victim had followed the treatment program correctly.

Warn Your Children

The following came from a Dallas Police Report. Please read it and warn your kids. It could be in your community.

The Police Department has warned us that there is another danger in our community. It is a form of tattoo called "Blue Star" and it is sold all over the United States. It is a small sheet of white paper containing blue stars the size of a pencil eraser. Each star is soaked with LSD. Each star can be removed and placed in the mouth. The LSD can also be absorbed through the skin simply by handling the paper. There is also brightly colored paper tabs

resembling postage stamps that have pictures of Superman, butterflies, clowns, Micky Mouse, and other Disney characters on them. These stamps are packaged in a red cardboard box wrapped in foil.

This is a new way of selling Acid by appealing to our young children.

A young child could happen upon these and have a fatal "trip". It is also learned that little children could be given a free "tattoo" by older children who want to have some fun or by others cultivating new customers.

A red stamp called "red pyramid" is also being distributed along with

"micro-dots" in various colors and another kind called "window pane" which has a grid that can be cut out. These are all laced with drugs.

Please advise your children of these new drugs. If you or your children see any of the above. Do not handle! These drugs are known to react very quickly. And some are laced with strychnine. Symptoms are: hallucinations, severe vomiting, mood change, and change of body temperature. Get to the hospital as soon as possible and call the police.

People should always take their Social Security card with them when they get a new job and make sure that the employer copies the number and name just as is shown on the card, Jim said.

People should keep a record of their number in a safe place. Then, if the original card is lost, a new card with the same number can be obtained easier than if the number were not known.

Also, a person applying for a replacement Social Security card will have to provide documentary evidence of identity, Jim said. A person born outside the U. S. needs evidence of current U.S. citizenship or legal alien status.

If a person ever become aware that he or she has more than one Social Security number, the individual should contact any Social Security office right away. The people there will help get the situation cleared up.

It's against the law for a person to use someone else's number. It is also against the law to give false information when getting a number. Penalties include a fine or jail sentence or both.

It is a good idea for a person to check his or her Social Security record every 3 years or so to make sure that earnings are being correctly reported. This is especially true if a person changes jobs often.

A free form--SSA 7004PC-OP--is available for this purpose and can be obtained at any Social Security office. More information about Social Security numbers can be obtained at

the Amarillo Social Security office, located at 3601 W. 15th, Suite 16. The telephone number is (806) 376-2241.

Bullock to stay open extra hours

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said his office would stay open extra hours to handle a record number of telephone calls about the state's new tax law.

"We're just flat swamped," Bullock said, noting there has been an 85 percent increase in telephone calls in the past four weeks.

Bullock said the agency's switchboard and Texas toll-free number (1-800-252-5555) would be open from 7:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. on weekdays.

He said taxpayers who have been getting busy signals during peak times in the middle of the day should be able to get tax information by calling earlier or later in the day.

Bullock said the office recorded

151,517 taxpayer assistance calls in September of this year compared to about 81,000 calls in September of 1986.

"We've gotten more than 7,500 calls a day compared to our normal load of 3,800," Bullock said.

An increase in the state's sales tax rate to 6 percent took effect on October 1, as well as the extension of the tax to many services.

Tax specialists are answering an average of 132 calls a day, Bullock said, which is a 123 percent increase over the normal call load.

"Taxpayers are going to get a straight answer from us it just might take a little bit longer than usual," Bullock said.

Prior contract exemption offers lower rates

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said that the prior contract exemption in the new state sales tax law offers some businesses lower rates.

"A contract is just that -- a signed agreement between two parties," Bullock said. "Some of these companies have already set their budgets years ahead according to income and outgo from these signed contracts."

Prior bids, in the form of written offers, are also exempt from the sales tax increase if the bid is accepted, Bullock said.

The bid must have been offered or the contract must have been signed on or before July 21, 1987.

According to a new ruling, contracts which can be terminated by written notice from either party will qualify as a prior contract, Bullock said. Previously, these types of contracts did not qualify for the exemption.

Additions and increases to the original contract are not included in the prior contract exemption. Once the terms of a contract are extended,

it no longer falls under the exemption. Contracts that do not state specific beginning and ending dates are also disqualified from the exemption.

The state sales tax rate increased from 5 1/2 percent to 6 percent on October 1, 1987.

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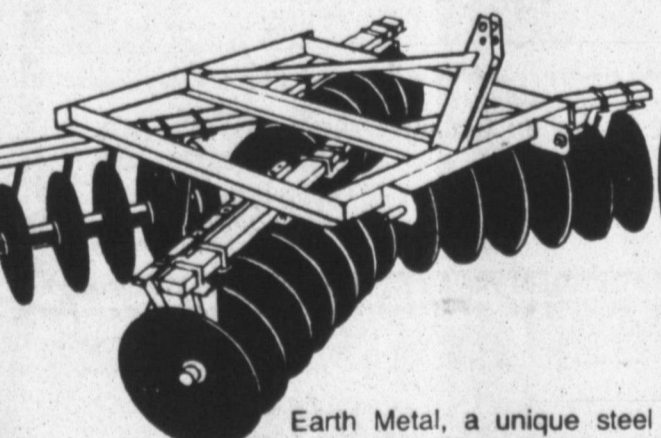
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Number is key to protection

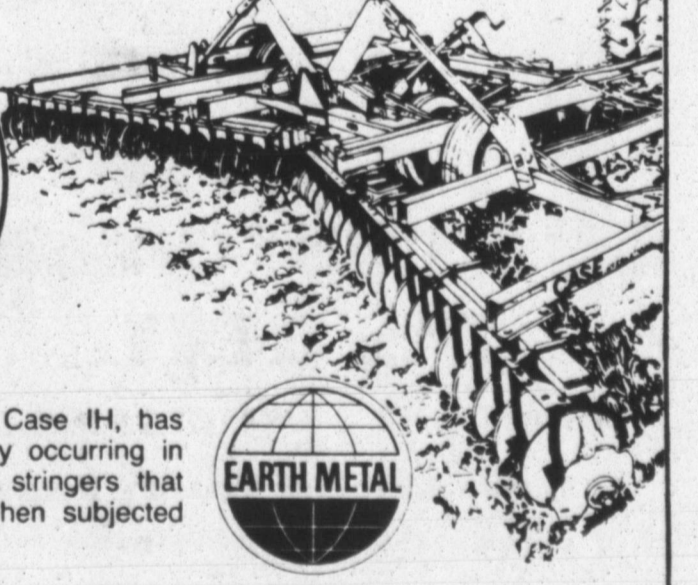
A person's Social Security number is the key to his or her lifetime protection under Social Security, Jim Talbot, Social Security manager in Amarillo, TX said recently.

All earnings that a person has over his or her working lifetime are recorded under that number. If an incorrect number is used, that person may not get proper credit for all earnings.

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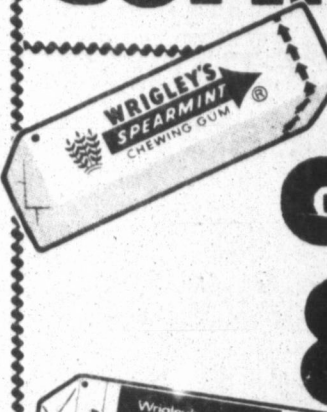
