BAIRD — Mrs. Alvis (Atrelle) Dill of Baird has received her third Freedom's Foundation Award for her activity in promoting the American Way of Life.

Born and reared in Baird, Mrs. Dill, the daughter of Mrs. Frank Estes and the late Mr. Estes, is a graduate of Baird High School. For many years she has given generously of her talents in designing decorations for use in church, school, and civic functions.

In 1963, Mrs. Dill and Mrs. Hubert (Roberta) Ross, also a Baird native now a teacher at Grand Prairie, founded their own Visual Aids for Young Americans Co. Always stressing the theme "Patriotism Means Americanism," Mrs. Dill does the art work and Mrs. Ross the narrative for their publications. Some of these are: The ABC's of Democracy, emphasizing the "Four Freedoms: Want, Speech, Work and Fear" for use at the elementary school level; Famous American Flags, including the Astronaut Flag carried onto the moon by Neil Armstrong; and a red, white and blue tabloid "Americanism versus Communism," pointing out the difference between the two forms of government.

This last was acclaimed the year's winner of the Valley Forge Freedom's Foundation Award. The other two awards which Mrs. Dill and Mrs. Ross have received were given in 1963 and 1965, both for excellence in Americanism material.

Other booklets and teaching aids produced by their own Visual Aids for Young Americans Co. are: Six Flags Coloring Book, Aquarena Coloring Book, Slides on Phonics for Technifax Phonics Co., and Easy to Make, for the Instructor Magazine.

Mrs. Dill also has designed patterns for the Jewel Kraft Kits of Oklahoma, and for McCall's Sewing and Knitting Magazine.

At present the two partners are preparing a set of 26 Alphabet Posters.

ONE DEAD, ANOTHER INJURED IN SEPARATE AREA ACCIDENTS

BAIRD — Earl D. Campbell, 48, with killed last Friday when his car was in collision with an Allied Van Lines truck, driven by James Hayes of West Covina, Calif. A heavy snow was falling at the time of the accident.

Highway Patrolman Terry Davis investigated the accident and he stated that the car was headed west on IH 20 when the driver lost control and plunged off the road into an embankment.

Davis said Arenivaz was pinned in the car about 20 minutes before he was freed.

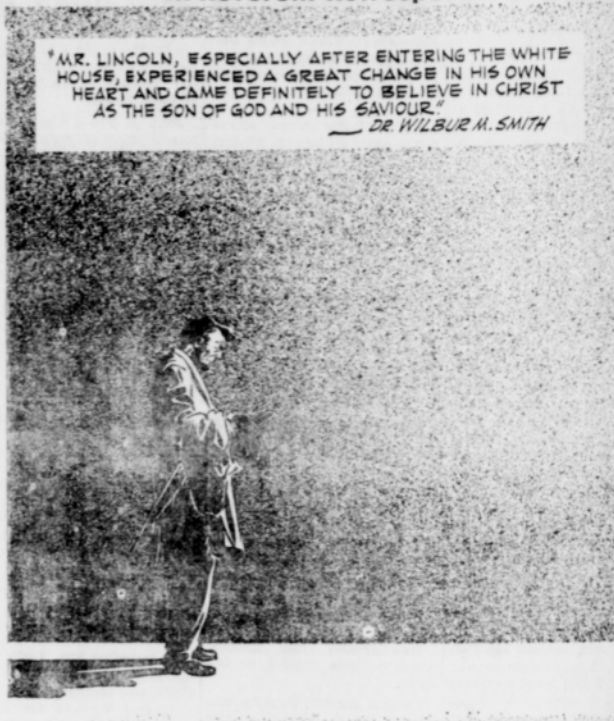

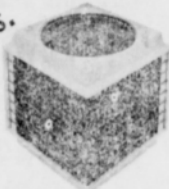

This would not be nearly so serious if people would check the preacher's answer by what the Bible says. But since the preacher is in such exalted position, they take what he says as gospel without so much as a backward glance at the Bible. This is why so many honest people are led into denominationalism. Jesus said, "In vain do they worship me, teaching for doctrine the commandments of men." (Matt. 15:9). Also, "If the blind lead the blind, both shall fall into the ditch." (Matt. 15:14).

CONGRESSMAN OMAR BURLESON ANNOUNCES FOR RE-ELECTION

Congressman Omar Burleson has formally announced his candidacy for re-election to Congress, subject to the Democratic Primary on May 2, and the General Election in November. The 17th Congressional District, which he represents, is composed of 31 Counties, covering approximately 30,000 square miles. Within this area live about 440,000 people.

Burleson says, "During my tenure of office I have followed two guiding principles: First, to know the views of my constituents and reflect their sentiments to the greatest degree possible in my action in the Halls of Congress. Second, to inform and advise as closely as I can on those issues which affect our District, our State and our Nation."

Burleson termed his approach to Government as one of "common sense," gained through the years of public service. "I have tried to see that the people's tax money is spent as wisely and as judiciously as you would have spent it had you been in my place," he said.

"The record will show that a greater part of the time I have found myself in the minority in opposing the vast spending programs of doubtful value which have been put into effect in recent years. In every Session of the Congress the record will show my votes for expenditures below that recommended by the Executive Department and far less than actually appropriated by the Congress, except in the field of National Defense," Burleson said. He continued, "Without meaning to appear boastful, if the Congress had followed those of us who have voted consistently over the years for fiscal responsibility, our financial affairs would not be in the shape they are today."

"In areas providing for the defense of our Country, I have always supported those things to make and keep our Nation stronger than any other in the world," he said.

"I have been discerning in separating those activities which the Federal Government was not designed to do, from those which are truly its responsibility," he said.

Burleson stated that activities of State and local governments, in accordance with the Constitution, should not be infringed and encroached upon by the Federal Government.

"The Federal Government does have specific missions," he said. He gave as examples the conservation of our natural resources, the defense of the Country and its general welfare. "At the same time," he said,

Burleson is a former County Attorney and County Judge of Jones County. He was appointed an FBI Agent, and served in a number of assignments over the U. S. He resigned from the FBI to join the Navy in World War II, and saw duty in both the Atlantic and the Pacific.

Burleson ended his formal announcement by saying, "Although not having opposition in this year's election, it is my hope to visit my constituency as opportunity affords. The Congress being in session at this time and expected to be long after the Primary Election, there will be little time to leave duties in Washington. I expect, however, to get back home at short intervals to do the best I can in seeing my friends and to make new ones. I believe it is incumbent upon a Congressman to know people and that they should know him, to have the best representation. This is fundamental to our system."

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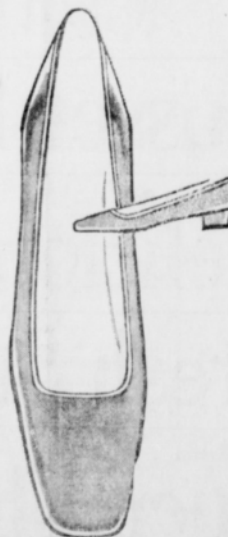
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
