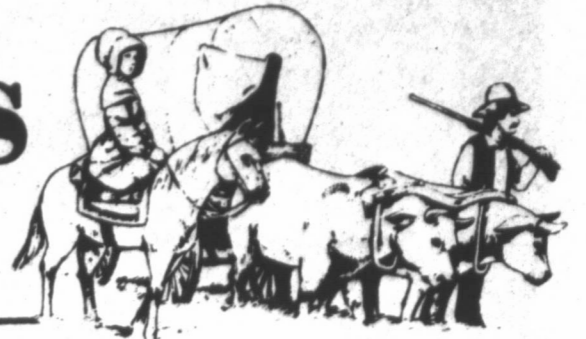

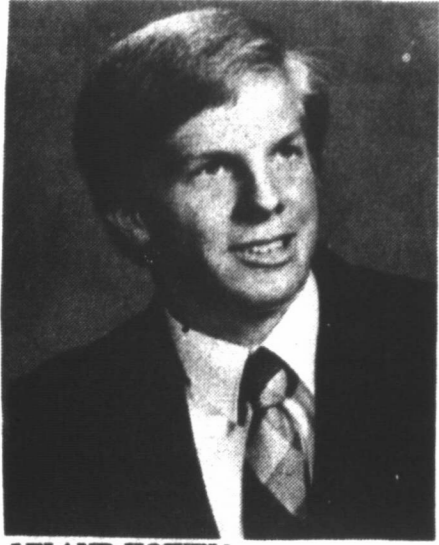

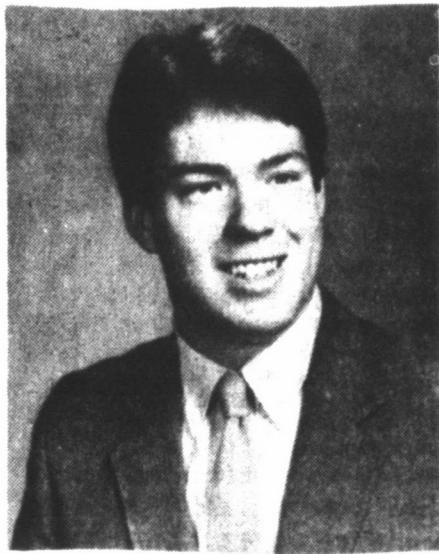

The long awaited Wagon Train will arrive in Ashtola Wednesday afternoon. They will circle their wagons on L.A. Watson's farm. The Ashtola community has made plans to feed the Wagon Train people stew and cornbread. They will start serving at 6 p.m. They will serve the Wagon Train members first and after that anyone out at the train will be served as long as the food lasts. As all the food was donated, there will be no charge, but there will be a donation box. All the money donated will be given to the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department and the money donated will benefit the entire county.

Morrison Mills donated the corn meal and different clubs in the community baked the cornbread. The meat was donated by Vance Gray. The Grocery Store donated canned tomatoes. IGA Foodliner and Gibson's donated onions, carrots and potatoes.

County youth groups will have booths for money making projects for their clubs. Boy Scouts will sell cake and pie; 4-H groups will be selling ice cream, and Girl Scouts will have Cokes for sale.

The Girl Scouts will have the opening flag ceremony and the Ministerial Alliance will be sponsoring a gospel singing.

There will be solo singers, a choir made up of Methodists, Baptists and First Christian Churches and a quartet doing specials. Those singing solos are Katherine Green, Ann Harper, Sharon Morrow, Jim Shadle, Dan Hall, Chuck Davis, and Jack Leeper.

There will be no seating facilities and you are asked to bring your own table, chairs or blankets.

CLARENDON

The Wagon Train will arrive in Clarendon around 10:30 a.m. They will turn off Highway 287 on Bugbee Street, which runs in front of the First Baptist Church, turn off Bugbee onto 5th street which runs in front of the school and continue down 5th until it gets to Jefferson. It will turn off 5th Street onto Jefferson Street at the First Methodist Church and turn again at 4th street. There one wagon will stop and there will be a brief dedication ceremony at the courthouse old water trough, which may be the only one of its kind around any courthouse in Texas.

The train will continue to Kearney Street and turn left at the post office and continue down Kearney back to Highway 287. It will then continue down 287 until the first street past Chamberlain Motor Co. They will turn, go over the railroad track, and set up camp in the Outdoor Entertainment Rodeo yard.

Once the Wagon Train arrives in the rodeo yard, they will be closed to the public for a couple of hours so the people on the train can take care of their animals and do the necessary things to set up camp. After that time, the camp will be open to the public and there are several activities planned.

Dolores Crump will be having an arts and crafts bazaar next to her Art Studio, and Loretta Harrison will have concession stands as well as arts and craft on the lot in front of her Ceramic Connection which is located behind Bivens Pharmacy.

Donley County ranchers will be serving a barbeque evening meal to the Wagon Train members only. Xi Lambda Xi sorority will serve them breakfast early Friday morn-

ing before they depart.

The Clarendon Boy Scouts will be spending the night with the Wagon Train.

There will be several activities planned. Among them are 4-H K-9 Dog Show and music as well as other activities.

BRICE

Friday, May 23rd, the Texas Sesquicentennial Wagon Train will camp at Brice, Texas. Everyone is invited to come join us in celebrating this historic event. A variety of activities has been scheduled for the afternoon and evening.

Beginning at 1:00 p.m. hamburgers, chips and soft drinks prepared by the Brice Wagon Train Committee will be sold for \$3.00. Other refreshments and drinks will also be available.

Also at 1:00 p.m. a group of musicians from Silverton will perform.

At 4:00 p.m. a musical jam session featuring local fiddlers and guitar pickers will begin. All interested musicians come join in the fun.

At 6:00 p.m. Country Fever, a band from Memphis, will provide musical entertainment and then at 8:00 p.m. the Off Beats, another Memphis band, will take over and round out the evenings entertainment.

VA home loan rate drops to six year low

The Veterans Administration reduced its maximum home loan interest rate from 11 1/2 percent to 11 percent effective Wednesday, November 20.

Noting that the 11 percent rate is the lowest in over six years, VA Administrator Harry N. Walters said the reduction is a sign of continued improvement in the mortgage market.

Walters pointed out that many veterans who presently have VA home loans with interest rates as high as 17 1/2 percent may be able to refinance their loans at the new, lower rate. He urged veterans who still occupy their VA-financed homes to contact local mortgage lenders for

details on VA's interest rate reduction refinancing program.

This is the fourth decrease in VA home loan rates this year. The last change occurred on June 5 when the rate went from 12 percent to 11 1/2.

The VA will also decrease by 1/2 percentage point to the maximum rates for Graduated Payment Mortgages (GMP's) to 11 1/4 percent. In addition, the rates for manufactured homes will also be decreased. The new maximum rates are 13 1/4 percent for unit only loans and 13 percent for

loans to purchase either a unit with the lot or to purchase a lot upon which a unit already owned by the veteran is to be placed.

The rate change does not affect existing loans whose interest rate remains the same for the life of the agreement. VA home loans may be used to purchase, construct, alter, improve, repair or refinance a home. This includes the purchase of condominiums and manufactured homes, with or without a lot.

Mid-year crop and livestock report

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service will begin contacting farmers and ranchers across the state in mid-May for 1986 crop acreages and mid-year livestock inventories.

State Statistician Dennis Findley emphasized that information from these surveys will help producers adjust their production and marketing plans for 1986. "Good marketing requires good information and advanced planning. Information from these surveys will provide Texas producers with solid facts and figures they can use when making their marketing plans.

"There are many economic uncertainties facing agriculture," Findley added, "and accurate, reliable figures will give producers a chance to make sound production and marketing decisions during the coming year."

Results of the confidential interviews, conducted by mail or in person by field enumerators, will be published in June and July.

To reduce survey costs, Findley is urging farmers and ranchers to return the mailed questionnaires as soon as possible. The reported information will be combined for state and county estimates.

Annual county estimates are published for livestock, dairy, poultry, cotton, field crops, small grains, fruits and pecans, vegetables, and cash receipts from the sale of farm products.

of the bride.

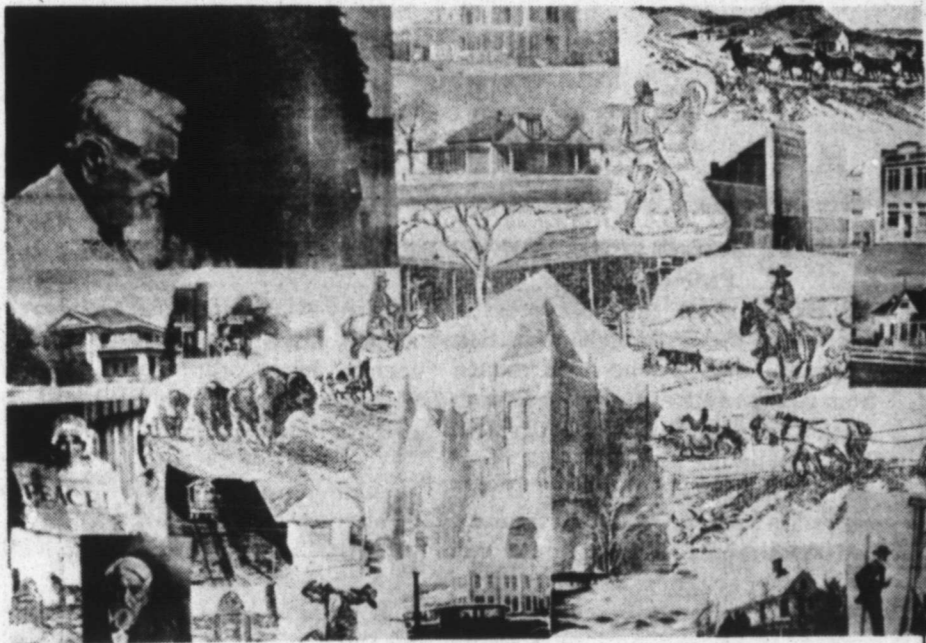

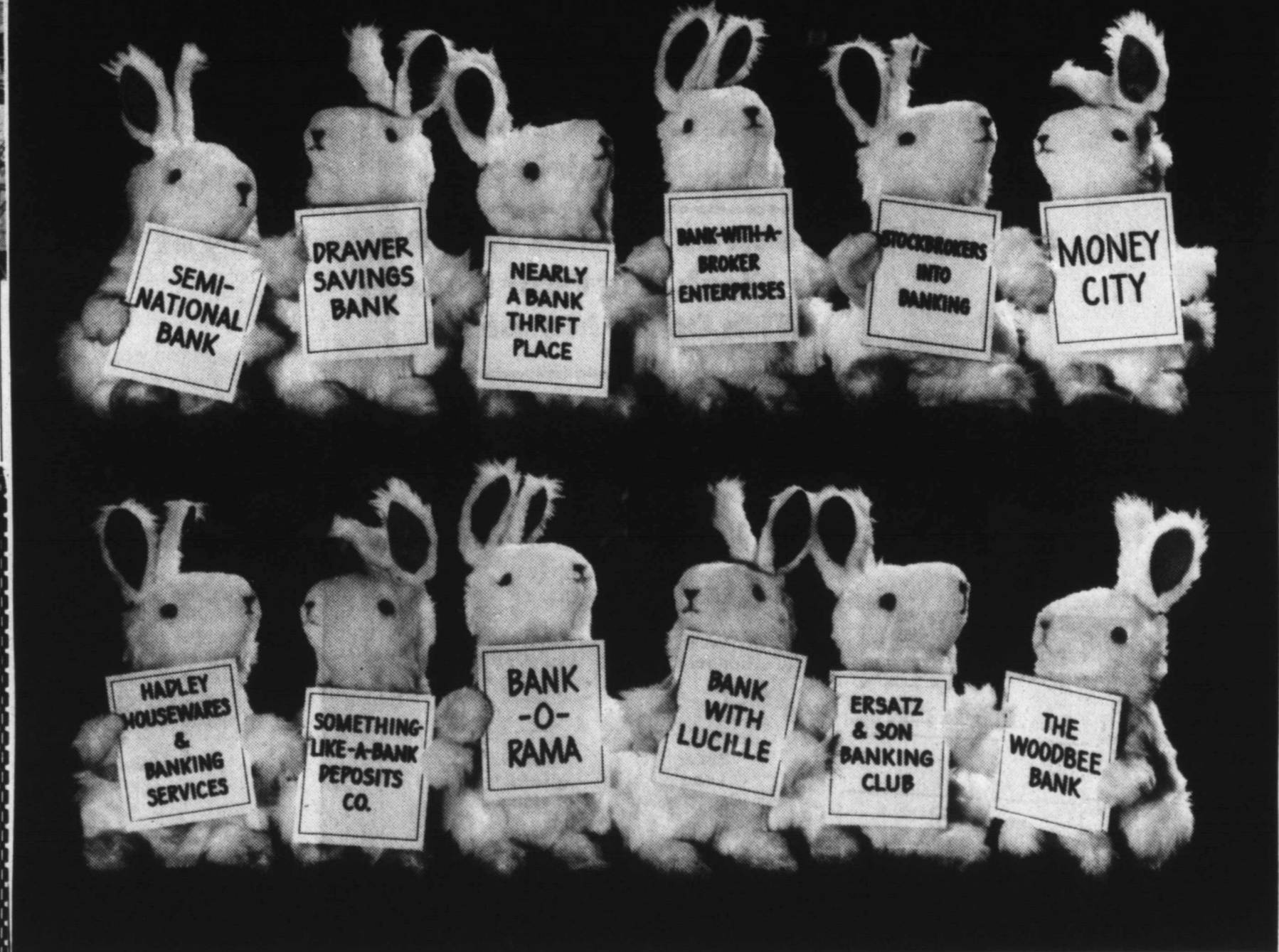

Clarendon is celebrating the Sesquicentennial as avidly as any city its size in the state. Many private citizens have taken almost religious vows as personal observances of this great event. Todd ("Lightnin'") Knorpp has resolved not to sleep in his office for the duration of the celebration. Wilbert Bernabe has dedicated himself to reproducing the entire air force of the Republic of Texas in one-third-scale radio-controlled models. Mike Butts is stocking up on horse liniment in preparation for the Wagon Train. And David Davidson, as President of the Chamber of Commerce reportedly volunteered to clean the streets after the wagons have passed.

(Susan Henson is rumored to have offered to loan him a shovel.)

The staff at Burton Memorial Library has taken the Sesquicentennial quite seriously, and have worked hard to collect appropriate reading materials for the event. Recent acquisitions include: A.C. Greene -- Fifty Best Books on Texas, Frances Edward Abernathy (ed.) -- Legendary Ladies of Texas, Sara Clark -- The Capitals of Texas: A Visual History, J.A. Rickard -- Brief Biographies of Brave Texans, E.V. Thompson -- Republic! A Novel of Texas, Donald H. Whisenant (ed.) -- Texas: A Sesquicentennial Celebration, Frank A. Drinkill and Noel Grisham -- Historic Churches of Texas, Ross

Phares -- The Governors of Texas, Jerry Staloe -- Black Gold and Red Lights, David L. Caffey -- The Old Home Place: Farming on the West Texas Frontier. That's a variety enough that almost everyone ought to be able to find something to his taste.

The library depends to a considerable extent on memorial gifts for new book acquisitions. Recent donations include gifts from Mr. and Mrs. Walt Knorpp in memory of Irma Faye Esterling, from Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Riggs in memory of O.K. Shannon, Mr. and Mrs. JEM Simmons in memory of Mattie Ramsey and Donald Ballew.

Gifts honoring special people are not restricted to memorials. They can be used to celebrate significant accomplishments or just as a way of saying "We appreciate you."

The United States Postal Service has responded to the Gram-

Ruddman atmosphere by raising postal rates for libraries (a national policy over which local officials have no control). As a result, costs for interlibrary loans have risen quite suddenly. Until a better way of recouping the cost can be devised, the library will have to charge return postage on ILL's. Still, the fees are modest, so there is no reason to stop using interlibrary loans.

Coming events. The Silent Auction is underway at the library. The items available for bids are impressive. Nobody claims to be able to foretell the future (the library is a non-profit institution), but folks who have not been in to check on the auction may be kicking themselves when they learn what they have missed.

One of the biggest annual events in Clarendon is the book sale. This year's book sale is scheduled for June 6th in front of the library.

Too late to classify. The library also received some economic news from Tommie Saye. Tommie promised to send in his \$10 donation to Friends of the Library immediately after James Michner submits his. Anonymous sources whisper that David Davidson might be willing to make up Tommie's donation if Tommie would substitute for David on post-wagon-train sanitary duties, but no one has determined whether Susan Henson will trust him with a shovel. Tornado sighted near Hedley Friday

Dark and threatening clouds dumped hail and rain on most of Donley County this past week.

Thursday afternoon small hail did some damage to roofs, vehicles, knocking leaves from trees and flowers and gardens.

Friday about 6 p.m. it began to rain and hail, and during the next hour, it had poured as much as 5 inches of rain in some part of the county and hail was measured up to 1 to 2 feet deep on the Farm to Market road just north of the Lelia Lake School, in a pear orchard.

Deputy Sheriff Charles Blackburn was called at his home to help watch for clouds. He had to get to the highway on his tractor, as he was unable to get his patrol car out. He stated, "I know I could have opened the window and touched water with my hand on the Farm to Market road north of Lelia Lake. There must have been three feet of water at that point." There is an approximate 15 to 20 acres of water in a field just east of the Lelia Lake School House where the water was up to the header on a combine in the field.

Pete Riley's field on Highway 287 was completely under water, drown-

ing 8 head of sheep. The water came up to four foot of his back door, and they moved some furniture out because if more rain came, their house would have probably flooded.

Hedley Fire Siren was sounded notifying the residents that a tornado was sighted on the ground a few miles out, headed in that direction. This tornado was confirmed by the Amarillo Weather Bureau and Hedley received from 2 to 3 inches.

Clarendon's official rainfall was reported at .55 on Thursday and 2.70 on Friday.

Lelia Lake received the worst of the hail, clouds and rain. Earl Shields of Paymaster Gin in Lelia Lake stated, "I think the county as a whole has received enough moisture to plant crops as soon as it dries up."

Sheriff Jimmy Thompson, his deputies and all the volunteer cloud watchers can not be thanked enough by the residents. They spend many many hours in the thick of the bad weather watching for tornados, so the people can be warned and have sufficient time to get to a safe place.

Greenbelt Lake only had a .21 inch rise as most of the rain fell on the wrong side of the lake for it to run into the lake.

IMPORTANT CHANGES IN THE 50/92 PERCENT REDUCTION PROGRAM

Some of you have expressed interest in the 50%/92% reduction program. This is when you reduce from your permitted by no more than 50 percent and at least 92 percent. The acreage not planted to the crop, not used for lay out (ACR) or Diversion Acreage will be designated as NP/CU. NP (Non-program crops) will not be eligible for Planted or Considered Planted credit (if any acreage of Conserving Use, CUs, is used for deficiency purposes) or deficiency payment purposes. If there are no CU acres on the farm and at least 50 percent of the permitted is planted NP acres will earn P & CP credit only.

NP (non-program crops) now referred to as Other Non-Program Crops will consist of the following: small grains not disposed of by the hard dough stage (rye, triticale); legumes except soybeans for seed; grasses for seed; vegetables; sunflowers, beans; forage and sweet sorghums for grain or seed; and peanuts.

Conserving Uses (CU) will consist of the following: small grains disposed of by the hard dough stage or left standing according to current provisions; legumes, except peas, beans, and soybeans, for hay, forage or processing; grasses for hay, forage or processing; fallow; forage and sweet sorghums for hay or grazing.

The 1986 Act includes a grandfather clause that protects producers who entered into a contract before February 26, 1986, to plant a non-program crop. This provision would qualify the acreage planted as an Approved Non-Program Crop (ANPC) and could earn P & CP and deficiency payment credit.

HAYING AND GRAZING OF ACR

Wheat and feed grain ACR (lay out acreage) may be hayed or grazed all year. Cotton ACR may be hayed or grazed prior to May 15, 1986 and after October 14, 1986. The cotton acreages may not be grazed during the 5 month non-grazing period.

PAYMENT LIMITATION PROBLEMS

Escalating payment rates and other variables are reasons that many of you are finding that your total ASCS payments are bumping or exceeding the \$50,000 payment limitation. Before making any payment limit determinations the Donley County Committee will take a very hard look at factual information such as: Bank Notes,

Security Agreements, Lease Agreements, Tax Returns, Legal Documents for Corporations, Trusts, Estates, Limited Partnerships, Lists of Farming Equipment, ETC.

You may pick up a copy of regulations pertaining to Payment Limitation at this office.

PRODUCER SERVICE RATES FOR 1986

1. Ground Measurement - \$25.00 for the first plot plus \$10.00 for each additional plot.
2. Staking and Referencing - \$45.00 for the first plot plus \$10.00 for each additional plot.
3. Bin Measurement - \$10.00 for the first bin plus \$5.00 for each additional bin.
4. Remeasurement - \$25.00 for the first plot plus \$10.00 for each additional plot.
5. Aerial Measurements - \$20.00 per farm and 2c per acre over the first 25.0 acres, excluding official acreage fields.
6. Farm Visits (drive by) - \$10.00 per farm.
7. Late filed reports - To be charged according to what must be performed by the county office. If an acreage determination must be done and can be performed using existing slides, then the aerial rate will be charged. If a ground measurement must be performed, the ground measurement rate will be charged. If no acreage determinations are required, then a farm visit (drive by) rate will be charged.

Q -- If I send original documents to the VA will they return them?

A -- Yes. The VA will make a copy and return the original to you. Please identify the document as an original and request its return. Please include your VA claim number with any correspondence.

I was released from active duty in 1970. My entitlement to education benefits expired. Will my home loan entitlement also expire?

A -- No. Your home loan entitlement is good until you decide to use it.

K-9 Korp rabies clinic scheduled May 23

The Donley County 4-H K-9 Korp, in conjunction with the City-County rabies clinic and Deyhle Veterinary Services, will provide a heart worm exam and dipping service.

The clinic will be held Friday, May 23, 1986, at the County Jail facility from 3:30-5:30 p.m.

The cost of the services are as follows: Dipping \$8.00 ex-par, 21 day residue, kills fleas, ticks and lice; heart worm direct exam and filter exam \$7.00; rabies \$6.00 vaccination plus \$1.00 for city tag, for a total of \$7.00.

The K-9 Korp will receive a generous portion of the proceeds for co-sponsoring this clinic. The money will be used to go to the Texas State 4-H Dog Show in Snyder, Texas in August.

Do your dog a favor. Have him checked for heart worm, dipped for fleas, ticks and lice. Do yourself a favor. Have him vaccinated!

All Donley County residents are encouraged to take advantage of all of the clinic services for your pet, and support your local 4-H K-9 Korp to state!

Heart worm is drastically on the rise. We found over 30 percent positive results last year and Dr. Deyhle says he is seeing more and more all the time. The lake area is particularly bad he says. Heart worm was considered a problem in Southern areas only at one time, but is now found all over the U.S.

Only mosquitos have been shown to incubate *Dirofilaria immitis*, the cause of heartworm disease. Mosquitos become infected upon ingestion of blood from an infected animal. When the mosquito feeds on a susceptible dog, the cycle is complete.

From the time a dog is bitten by a carrier mosquito until circulation heartworms (immature forms) are observed, a period of 8-12 months is necessary. Young dogs may show up as negative when in reality they may be positive at a later date.

It is essential to check animals (blood sample) to determine the status of infection before treatment or preventative medication is started.

The disease is treatable. Negative animals are given preventative medication (Iflarbitis) on a daily basis according to body weight starting one month before the beginning of mosquito season and continued daily during the season. Daily treatment should be continued for two months after mosquito season is over. Puppies can be started on preventative medication at two months of age. Remember if not treated or detected this can be a killer!

The 1986 season consists of 14 teams. In the T-ball division, there are 68 boys and girls playing,

Memorial Day kicks off peak driving season

The Memorial Day weekend traditionally kicks off the peak driving season. Millions of motorists will be taking to the nation's highways.

The Society of Chartered Property and Casualty Underwriters (CPCU) notes that drunk drivers and seat belt use are getting special attention this year from law enforcement and safety officials.

Encouraged by stronger laws in a number of states and massive publicity generated by victims of drunk drivers, police across the country are stepping up campaigns to keep drunk drivers off the road.

The Society says thousands of lives could be saved annually if all drivers and passengers used their seat belts at all times. The belts can prevent ejection from a vehicle and reduce contact with the interior of the

vehicle in the event of a collision.

The Society offers these tips to motorists who want to avoid becoming an accident statistic:

- Observe the speed limit.
- Yield the right of way - even if the other driver is wrong.
- Keep a safe distance from the car ahead of you.
- Drive during daylight hours whenever possible.
- Don't drink and drive.

Knowing some of the causes of accidents -- and driving defensively -- could help prevent serious accidents, the Society says.

The 55-mile per hour national speed limit has had an extremely positive effect by saving lives and reducing gasoline consumption. But driving for hours on an Interstate highway with no traffic lights can

produce conditions where even a rested driver can fall asleep, the Society cautions. A driver also could become less alert, increasing the danger of being involved in an accident.

Stopping regularly to stretch or rest, avoiding heavy meals while driving, keeping the car well ventilated, constantly checking mirrors and chewing gum are good ways to stay alert. It's also best to stop for the night when fatigued, rather than risk falling asleep at the wheel.

Motorists often can avoid mechanical breakdowns by having their cars serviced and checked before leaving on a trip.

The Society suggests contacting your insurance agent or company representative as part of the pre-trip preparations.

Drivers should consider increasing bodily injury and property damage liability coverage to protect against escalating damage awards in auto negligence suits. In many cases, minimum liability coverage under state financial responsibility laws falls far short of current awards.

The Society, founded in 1944, is a professional insurance organization having a membership of more than 15,000 CPCUs which includes insurance company executives, agents, brokers, risk managers, underwriters, professors, consultants, attorneys, claims specialists and actuaries.

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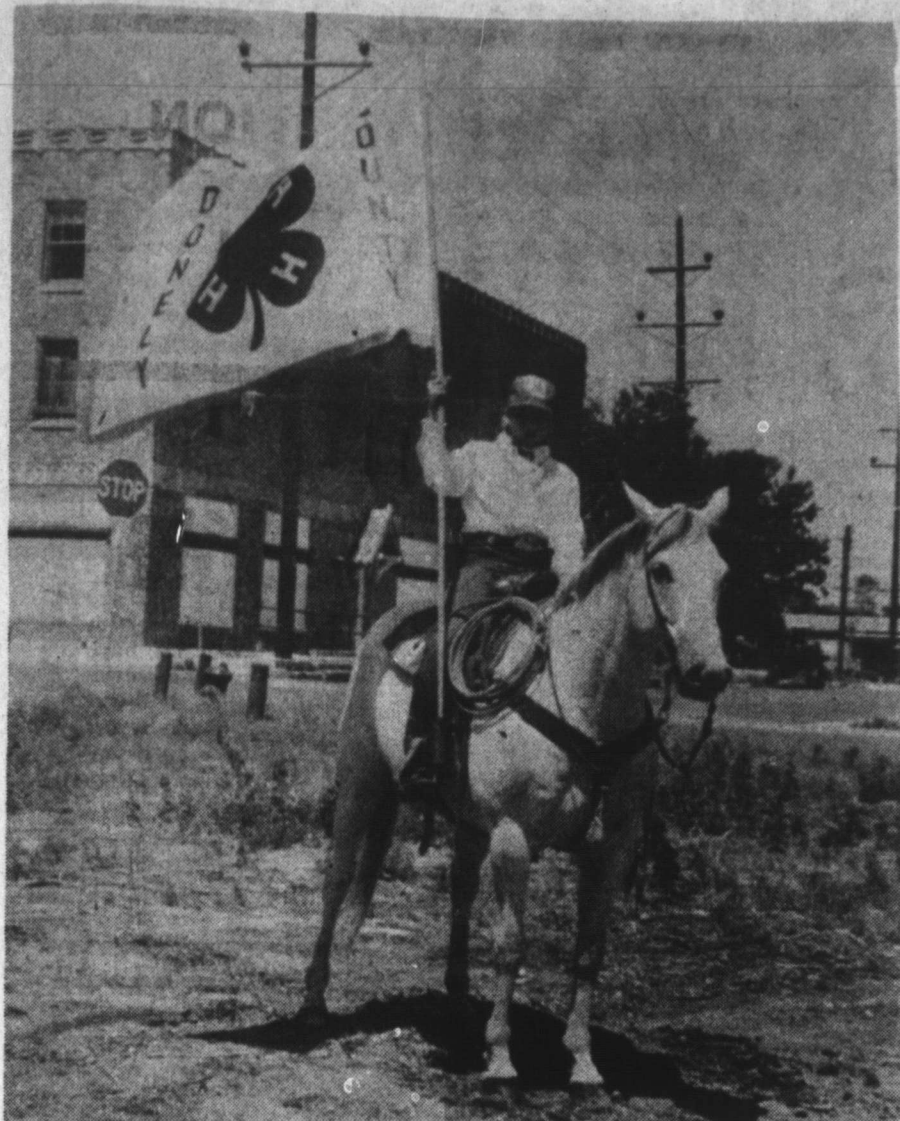

captured in the words of Malachi: "A son honoureth his father, and a servant his master: if then I be a father, where is mine honour? and if I be a master, where is my fear? saith the Lord of hosts unto you, O priests..." (Mal. 1:6).

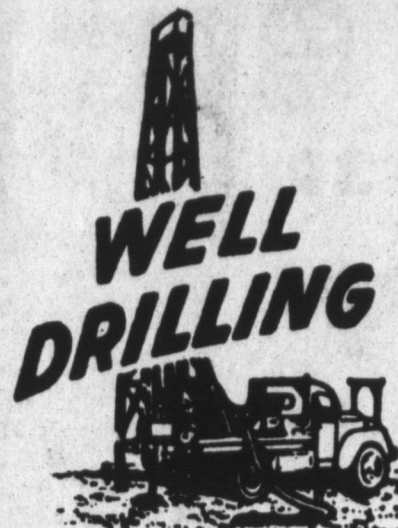

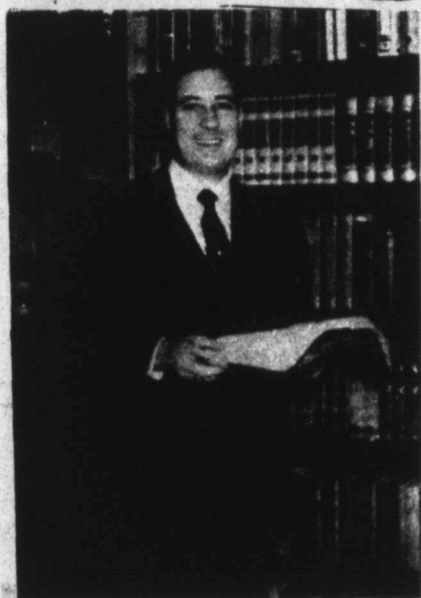

WHATEVER HAPPENED TO OUR SUNDAY BEST?

How we dress should show how we honor our Lord

One trend I have noted in our local churches in recent years is carelessness. Carelessness in dress. Many people attend the House of God attired the same way they would dress for a rodeo or a football game.

When people are to be guests at the White House for a meeting with President Reagan, they dress up. Suits and ties for the men. Pretty dresses for the ladies. Appropriate dress indicates appropriate respect. When Mr. Reagan speaks to a joint

session of Congress, the gallery guests as well as the lawmakers are all dressed in their best.

Does not our Lord Jesus Christ, the Head of the Church, deserve as much consideration and respect as our President? Does not your pastor deserve that much respect for his message? I grew up in a home with two brothers and three sisters. My job every Saturday night was to polish eight pairs of shoes. My parents taught us six children to "dress up in our Sunday best" for the House of God. When my wife and I go to hear our pastor, Bryan Augsburg, at the First Baptist Church in Arlington Heights, we dress up. We respect him and we respect the Lord he represents.

I believe pastors and their wives must lead the way in setting a proper example of dressing for the occasion. More than once I have been dismayed when I was met at the airport by a pastor and wife dressed in jeans and sweatshirts. I am not saying I am somebody special, but it seems the office of the National Representative ought to call forth respect. I do know I would never have dreamed, as a young pastor, of meeting Dr. R.T. Ketcham at a train station or airport with my grubbies on.

More than once I have been disappointed at a classy restaurant where I was meeting with a group of businessmen and a pastor, only to have the pastor show up open-collared and inappropriately informal while all the businessmen were dressed in three-piece suits and ties! I do not believe the pastor's influence and testimony were enhanced by such a breach of etiquette.

I know the Lord looks on the heart and clothes don't necessarily make the man, but how we dress when we go to worship service ought to indicate how much we honor our Lord. We do not have to be fashion models, but we should "dress up" for our Savior's special day at His special house, the local church. The spirit of what I am saying is

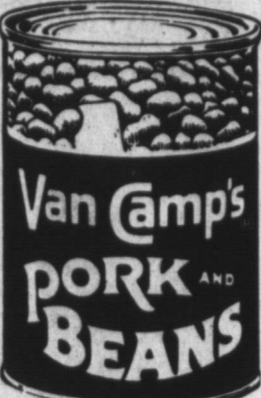

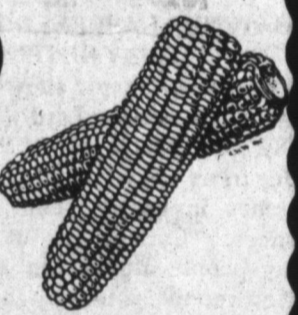

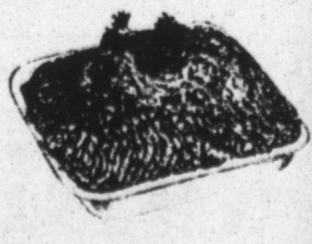
